#### Abstract

A manch of the Commarcial 'Travellers' Ansociation has heen' esfablished at Victoria, B.C.

Tras fire in the Cunadian Oil Co's premises in Mamilton, a week


 ago, resulted in a loss of $\$ 4,000$; insurance, $\$ 2,000$.The total number of immigrants passing Port Arthur, Ont, for the west in April, including men, women and children, was 4,967 .

Tha "Flying Yankee," running between St. John and Boston, began its operations on the 29 th ult., and is now making the usual quick trip daily.

The Yarmouth N. S. Street Railway about to be constructed is to be run with electric, imotors and the Hallfax railway is to be run by the same propelling power in June.

Cape Burton reports farming fully a month in advance of last year, with plenty of fodder for cattle. The indications are for an unusually heary hay crop this year and an abundant root crop.

Mostreal Gazette:-"Toronto is beginning to pay the penalty of greatness, The rate of taxation this year will be $13-6$ per cent. on valuation. Montreal, school tax included, levies only 1 1-5 per cent.

A gunsidy of $\$ 100,000$ has been voted by the Municipal Council of Inverness County, Cape Breton, to the Inverness and Richmond railway which is to be constructed from Port Hood to Brond Core, a distance of 50 miles.

Tra Oity Club is being re－organized，and from the large number of prominent citizens already subscribed and the higher charge，there is every probability of success．

Tue old established hardware firm of Wood \＆Leggatt．at Hamil－ ton，has diseolved，Mr．Leggatt retiring，and Geo．Vallance being ad－ mitted as partner．The firm is now composed of A．T．and W．\＆A． Wood and Wm．and Geo．Vallance．The firm will henceforth bo known as Wood，Vallance \＆Co．

Jas．A．Momparry \＆Co．have been carrying on a business as tea mer－ chants in a small way at Toronto for some time past，selling largely direct to families．The difficulty of making collections increased with time，and they now follow in the wake of many other attempts of the kind in Western Ontario．Their liabilities are put at $\$ 15,000$ ，and the assets are nominally as much，but doubtless largely in outstanding accounts．

Tue dry，warm weather prevailing for some day past is having its effect－upon inflammable risks，and insurance companies are being notified of claims from Hamilton，London，Winnipeg，Owen Sound and other parts of the country．The aggregate losses by the fire of tho 5 th instant，in Winnipeg，are about $\$ 50,000$ ，and the insurance some－ what under $\$ 20,000$ ．The oldest inhabitant has probably not wituess－ ed weather at this period of the year of ao extremely warm a temper－ ature as that prevailing for the last fow days．

At the recent adjourned annual meeting of the Fish and Game Club of this city，Mr．H．R．Ives was elected President，Mr．G．R． Starke，Secretary，and Dr．Brainard，of the Hamilton Powder Co， Vice－President．With the now committee and directorate，Mr．Ives should be in command of practical co－operation sufficient to onsure a degree of efficiency in the management of the club from a financial， us well as from other points of viow，which its large membership should claim and expect，and we have no doubt that another year will witness marked improvement all around．

The Post Officr Cuanges．－The changes contemplated under tho Amended Post Office Act of last session took effect on Wednesday，Mry 8th．On and after that date the charge for drop－letters in the follow－ ing cities will be 2 cents：－Toronto，Hamilton，London，Kingston， Ottawa，Montreal，Quebec，St．John，Halifax，Fredericton，Winuipeg and Victoria．，these being the cities which have the benefit of a free delivery system by letter carriers．The registration fee for all letters will from that date be 5 cents，and the weight of letters which will be carried for 3 or 2 cents is increased to one ounce．Hon．Mr．Haggart has evidently lost little time in carrying out the changes contemplated in the act．

Tue revelations in connection with the alleged cmbezzlement from the South Wellington Agricultural Association at Guelph，Ont．，are somewhat peculiar．Robt．McKenzie，the suspected party，who left tho city in connection with the affair，has written to say that the funds of the association were lent by him to his employer，George Murton，in January last．Murton promised to return the monoy，but being financially embarrassed，was unnblo to do so．McKenzio was obliged to dravy $\$ 20$ of the funds of the society to take him away，which，he says，ho will return so soon as he can earn it．．The liabilities of Mur－ ton will amount to between $\$ 18,000$ and $\$ 19,000$ ，with assets in the neighborhood of $\$ 8,000$ ，from which may be realized 20 to 30 cents on the doller．

The proposed huge cotton factory at Montmorency Falla，near Quebec，has been principally projected by Montreal and United States cotton mon interested in the China trade．The present intention is to manufacture nothing in this factory for the Canadian market，the idea of the promoters being to ship their entire output to China，and it is said they feel confident of being able to compete succesefully for this trade with Manchester and Lowell manufacturors．The first section of the proposed mills，which will bo 160 feet long and three storion high，is to be completed and in working order in Septomber．But pro－ vision is made for the extension of the factory，which，according to the present plans of the promoters，is destined to be the largest cotton mill in America under one roof．It is to be hereafter 750 feet long，and probably 1，150．The Quebec and Montmorency Railway runs past its doors．

## ENCOURAGEMENI TO HOME INDUSTRIES.

There is perhaps no function of the governing power more troublesome of performance than that which it is called upon to enforce in respect of the revenue. When, as in a country like Canada, the fiscal policy is to levy taxes by means of protection to uative industries, it is often difficult to define equitably what is to be reckoned as "raw material," the manufactured article in one case "being not unfrequently, the raw material in another,to ascertain in what respect the protected industry may suffer because of the duty on articles which it omploys and which in the hands of the importing merchant cannot expect to be free from a due share of taxation,-and in what degree, if any, it is to be exempt from contributing towards that portion of the revenue derived from the uso of public improvements. The vigilance, the amount of official superintondence necessary to an honest enforcement and observance of the laws and an equitable sharing of the burthen, is yet very expensive and only to be preferred or tolerated as compared with the irregularities of other times when direct taxation was yet the practice. Circumstances alter with the times, and we bave an instance to hand in the culling of timbor at Quebec, which the government seems at length determined to disconlinue.

An example of the general principle enuncinted is found in respect of our two great manufacturing industries, cotton cloths and lumber. The encouragement given to the former industry, however unprolitable to the shareholders of our cotton companies, has been productive of undoubted advantages to the people. Employment has beon furnished to thousands of our population who had otherwise beon driven to tind the means of

exiatenco at the great centres of manufacture in the New England States who in their turn add so many moro consumers to the community of these and other commodities. At the same time the competition engendered is so keen in most articles that the consumer can buy his supplies much cheaper than beforeThe large amount of capital invested and employed in these great industries is so much added to the wage-funds of the country, and so much more employment provided for the resources of our banks. 'The whole country is benefited, except the shareholders in some fifteen to eighteen mills who for one reason or another have not been fortunate in their investment.

All this is patent to everybody. Our. cotton industries have not not been wanting due attention on the part of the public press. Their doings, their troubles, their shortcomings have all been laid bare with more or less regard for the proprieties; they have been blamed unreasonably because they could not compel success, or make money for themselves or others, and with some reason because the tools they employed had been unsuccessful in other fields and could hardly expect to be prosperous in a new sphere of which they had little knowledge, and which they must acquire at somebody's expense.

In respect of our lumber interests the public is not kept so well advised. Those engaged in this great industry are generally supposed to be quite able to take care of themselves, to prefer a latssca-faire policy on the part of the government, and not being generally members of joint-stock companies, have managed to do so fairly well. The lumber trade wields a powerful influence, and as it has not often knocked at government doors, hass had little difliculty, as a rule, in obtaining any trifling favor it required in that direction. The lumberman's saw material is indigenous to the country. Unlike cotton it is a native product. Cotton costs, let us say, 10c per pound and by the application of labor has 50 to 75 per cent. added to its value; the pine tree of our forest is worth, say $\$ 1$ per thousand feet board measure, and in the process of manufacture has 500 to 3,000 per cent. added to its value. In other words the labor in the case of cotton cloth is about 25 per cent. of the value of the article produced, while in lumber it mounts up to about 90 per cent. The labor employed in our lumber manufacture is almost exclusively adult; and while in our cotton manufactories the lightness of the labor and the competition of other countries have reduced the wages of operatives to so low a degree that in many cases all the members of the family are employed at the mills, the lumberer receives wages that enable him alone to support his family, and his children are going to school at an age when those of the cotion spinner are working at the looms. If the wealth of a country consista chiedy in the labor of the people, the lumbering interests of Canada are paramount, and deserve every attention which a wise government can bestow. The result of the recent brief agitation and discussion in parlizment as to the desirability of removing the export duty on saw-logs, was determined, it is to be feared, by a regard for national dignity, all very commendable in its way, rather than by a due consideration of the probabilities of the near future. Let us hope that our far-seeing statesmen have acted the better part in the matter and that all may eventuate for the best.

Meantime there are one or twointernal inconsistencies which should claim our attention. There is but one saw-mill, that is, in the sense of cutting from the log, on the island of, or near Montreal. This was established some years ago for the additional purpose of utilizing much of the by-products or refuse which were not only an encumbrance at the mills, but a source of danger in the woods and in the great centres of the business,
wherever they were situated. The proprietor, for nearly half a century engaged in lumbering operations in Canala, early perceived the advantages to be derived not only from manufacturing nearer to market, but from the employment near a large city of the refuse from the great quantity of slabs which hitherto had been worse than useless to the lumber manufacturer. The wood which remains after the slabs are sawn intolath makes excellent kindling and fuel which can be sold at a good profit. In the upper country they were obliged to haul them away or burn them, often a source of danger; or they were suffered to accumulate and dry and bake in the summer bun of successive boasous, matil their fate was determined by the match or pipe of some careless smoker at a moment when the country is parched for want of rain, carrying fire and destruction to extensive arens of standing timber, to thousands of logs hung up from previous seasons, and often to the garnered harvest and the buildings of the pioneer husbaudman. The owner of this sawmill, procures his logs along one of the lower tributaries of the Ottawa and is obliged to send them down the canal at Grenville to his mill at the upper end of the island. For this he is obliged to pay a rate largely in advance of what is charged for square timber and long cuts through the entire system to the harbor in front of this city. The logs for the saw mill referred to only run through two of the locks between Lachine and Montreal harbor, but for this they pay toll all the way, and when they are sawn into planks or boards, and they use the remainder of the locks, they are obliged to pay tolls on the entire system again, thus paying the tolls twice over. The tolls on logs of 13 leet long and under is about \$0. per lockage, while square timber and longer loge or spars pay only $\$ 1.50$ to $\$ 1.75$ per lockage: flour and grain, likewise, when retained at mills on the line of the canal are charged one toll only, paying this at the end of the first trip, and being allowed passage free of toll to the harbor on reshipment. This manutacturer employs only adult labor at his mill; he pays a large amount annually for wages which are expended again in purchasing necessaries at our shops, in manufacturing a, natural product of which the labor is probably not less than 90 per cent of its market value, a product of which a portion again yields employment to numbers of builders and other city mechanics; he converts an olherwise useless product into a marketable commodity, he contributes towards saving our forests from destruction by fire, and in roturn for all this the country charges him for floating his logs a part of the way down the Ottawa a higher rate than it does the square timber man who "hews to the line" in the woods and leaves highly inflammable parallel rows of kindlings in his tracks which soon require but little provocation to begin the work of destruction over thousands of acres of valuable forest lands. This is an anomaly to which the attention of the government has probably not yet been directed, and which we hope to see removed al an early day. Encouragement to our home industries is not generally in inverse proportion to the amount of labor employed upon them.

## BUSINESS IN FRANCE.

Notwithstanding the political turmoil in which France has been plunged for some time past, there is every indication of material prosperity. As shown by the recent oflicial reports of trade, the revenue has exceeded the estimates by 8 millions, and is upwards of 15 millions in excess of the revenue for $1887_{j}$ The steadiness of business, commercial and financial, is shown by the manner in which the market outlived, without a panic, the collapse of the Panama Canal Co., which absorbed a capital of 280 millions, not to mention the failure of the financial concerns interested in the recent copper syndicate. Revolutions have been caused in France under less provocation in other years. As tending to this state of material prosperity there are mentioned the increased octroi on commodities at the city gates of Paris, the revenue from the theatres in that city, the abundant production of wine in 1888, the increase in railway returns and the advanced prices obtainable for real estate. There are evidences of still greater import, ghowing that the people are making and saving money more rapidly than ever in a comntry where thrift is practised to a degree not even excelled by the people of scotland. The number of depositors in the sayings' banks, and the amounts of the deposits are largely increased. Houses are being put up in town and country, this last being universally conceded to be the most palpable and unmistakable evidence of material progress, a point which our own citizens ait this moment can well apply to the condition of things in Montreal, where in whatever
direction we turn our eyes, improvements and buildings are going on.

According to recent American returns, the French debt is $\$ 8,142,007,500$ on the consolidated 3 per cent. and $4 \frac{1}{2}$ rentes due. 'I'he interest is upwards of $\$ 150,000,000$ annually, apart from the large intorest charged in other formb. In spite of the vast army expenditure, France would appear to be enjoying, on the whole, the blossinge of prosperity to an extent not exceeded, perhiaps at the present day by any other country.

It is anticipated that the Exposition opened at Paris a few days ago will surpass in magnificence and attendance that of eleven years ago, when the number of visitors was reckoned at upwards of twelvo millions.

## THE TEA ITRADE.

The long expected improvement in teas has not yet put in an appoarance and the market is quiet both here and in Now York, which city is looked upon as the leading toa centre in the United States. Of late the dealers have shown a quiet confidence in the outiook and this seems to be justified by facts connected with the trade.

The season just closed has boen a disappointing one to the Japan traders, as despite low prices and a light supply compared with former yoars, there has been no "boom," or oven an upurard turn which would bring out the late shipmonts at a fair profit. In both the United States and Canada there are considerible stocks of early high-priced toas, which, in the absence of improvement, are bound to lose money heavily. Sottlemente at Yokohama amount to 181,800 piculs, aqainst 200,000 piculs, and at Kobe to 137,500 picule, against 142,500 piculs, whilst total exports from both parts amount to $39,643,297$ lbse, against 42,978,080 llos. last year, and 45,172,470 Jbs. in 1886-87. In trying to oxphain the peculiar condition of the market, dealers may not have fully taken into account the increasing consumpLion of cocoa and its preparations, and also of coffee. The list of lable boverages has certainly been onlarged in recent years.

Black tea has suffered most from the depression, and this is said to be due to the use of India and Coylon teas in greater yuaptity and to the fact that the Chinese teas have been losing favor through carelessness in preparation and handling. Jhinking tho maket had touchod boltom, Canadians bought largely in Loundon and this accounts for the large supplies booked here on the Nestorion and Assyrian. As theso teas were bought at a cheap rate and the markot has boon cleared of cheap lines, the speculation may prove auccessful in the long run. The London sollers wore ploased to get rid of their holdings as they expected to purchase now soason teas at a very low rate, but since then the market has improved in tone, if not in price. Unless common teas move up, the Chinese will not be willing to prepare any for the markot, and oven a rise of le@1 $\frac{1}{2}$ e would scarcely be a sufficiont inducoment for them to prepare any great quantity. If tho recent severe decline in Jondon was the very bottom noteh in the depression, Canadian buyers have beon extremely lucky in their late inveatments there.

Japan advices stale that the now season opened at about the same prices as those of a year ago, which were $\$ 42 @ \$ 45$ per picul. After ruling at those figure antil after the middle of the month a decline of \$5 occurred. Tho market so far has displayed about the same features as last year. Sample purchases are alrondy on route, but the first regular stenmer will leave Yokohama on the 11 th inst. It is as yet too early to form any idea as to how tho bulk of the offerings will go, us the first sales, as usual, consist of fancy linos of choice garden pickings.

Supplies of old teas in both China and Japan are well reduced, in fact wo have been told that recent orders from Canada havo revenied the fact that none are now available for shipment. The first shipments of new teas from Japan include only high-priced grades not used in Canada, and no large quantity goes even to the United Shatos. The great bulk of the teas consumed here como into the primary markets from about the tenth to the fifteonth of May. On this market, the demand at present is for Japan teas, costing from 130 up to 20c, and low grajes of the new crop will very probably find a good domand on arrival. During the weok about four huadred half chestg, which were offered in Montreal al 18 c , without buyors, have been forwarded to Now York, where they are said to have found a purchaser at the price asked. With regard to the large quantity of teas on the Nestorian, we have been told that it includes some large parcels bought six weoks ago and more. Bhack teas show an advance of di(a)d from the lowost point. It uppears that the depression
in London was partly owing to the banks selling out the stocks of insolvent imporiers, the quantity closed out for one estate being not less than 00,000 packages.

The purchases on Montreal account are reported to have aggregated 45,000 packages-more rather than less. They cost from $4 \frac{1}{d}$ up to 7 d , and already show a good profit. They are intended for country trade and the lumber districts, and experts say thoy are very good value for the money.

## TREATMENT OF CUSTOMERS 'IEMPORARILY <br> EMBARRASSED.

A subscriber in Wiarton writes us on this subject as follows:
"Dsar Sia,-Upon reading over the large aumber of business failures recorded in your valuable columns overy week, I would ask you Lindly to allow mea small space through which I wish to ask for a little information. I would first like to know why it is that when an honest and industrious retailer, during a dull season in business, gets a little behind in his paynents, he is either served with a demand to mako an nseignment, or is closed up and sold cut. I am referring to that class of retailers whose assets excced their liabilities, and are doing their utmost to get along-men who would not sacrifice principle for the sake of robbing their creditors out of a fow dollars. What I would like to know is this:-Why the wholesale dealers accept a few cents on the dollar, thereby losing a fair portion of the debt justly due them? Why they will close ip and sell ont a person's stock that will more than pay the liabilities and take away from him every means by which he has to redeem himself and save his business? Why do they not allow him a little time-sulticient to tide him over the dull season, and by so doing, lend him. valuable assistance and eventually receive their 100 cents on the dollar? You will greatly favor me, Mr. Editor, by giving me the desired information.'

## Wiarton, 29th April, 1889.

It is exceedingly rare that wholesale firms with suflicient resources at their command undertake to drive a careful, honest customer to the wall; but when the retail merchant has spread his purchases among a large number of houses, it is not surprising that he should, if ever he get in a tight place, find one or two among them disposed to fancy themselves excoptionally aggrieved and entitled to special consideration; or when a case occurs resembling that of the honest Walkerton dealer referred to last week, creditors may naturally conclude that they have no alternative but to close him up. There are peculiar circumstances in every case of failure and settlement, but it is to we feared, as our correspondent implies, that creditors in regurding them are too often guided rather by expediency than by justice or by consideration for other customers in the locality. A great doal of indulgence was gatated to weak customers by Wholesale houses during the past winter, which, because of its open character and the consequent lessened demand for winter goods, and the check to lumbering operations-all following a deficient harvest,-made payments slow and, in hand-to-mouth cases, collections almost impossible. There is a limit to the ability of every wholesale house in respect of indulgence to embarrassed customers; and when the request becomes too frequent, it is not surprising that the line is drawn somewhere. Many of the extensions and compromises of the last four or five months were kept to the parties concerned and only leaked out when too late for reference. It is iwpossible in the space at our disposal to do more every week than ghance briofly at the canses of most of the occurring suspensions or failures. In many of the cases reported the amount of assets givon is merely nominal, consisting largely of bookdebts worth probably 15 to 30 cents in the dollar, or of unprofitable real estate or other properly. Many of the cases referred to by our correspondent are never disclosed. The rule with wholesale men is in the direction of confidential lemency to customers unable to meet their ongagements, As long as the prospects are fair or not utterly hopeless, creditors are inclined to afford all the indulgence that circumstances warrant or require.

## A MUCH-NEEDED INYENSION.

In Europe and America for years past there have been inventious and experiments looking to the perfect combustion of fuel, nearly all of them taking the name and character of smoke consumers, all with some merits to recommend them, counterbalanced by demerits that limit their utilization. Patent fuels have been tried, and abandoned almost as soon as patented, liquid fuels have been tested, and have' met with a large measure of success, but in the storage and carriage of liquid fuels there has always been danger, and in the fluctuations of values on petroleum and coals the latter has continued to hold supromacy as the fuel of the world.

How do we burn the black diamonds that are so essential to the civilization of the present age? An eminent writer, speaking upon this very matter ten years ago, said our mode of burn-. ing coal was barbarous; it is barbarous still.

A London (England) journal recently referred to the smoke overhanging that city as "the modern plague;" but we need not go to London for illustrations. The heat of summer is approaching, when travel increases, and the wearied merchant seeks fresh air by travel and rest at the seaside. Rest at the seaside may be had, but will travellers dare open the windows of the car in which they travel with their families, sweltering with heat, oppressed with dust? Outside is seen an immense volume of smoke travelling with the cars, more than the trainin length, dare they expose themselves before an open window? No, to do so means grit and smoke in their eyes, with discomfort for the balance of their trip.

Manufacturers of agricultural and other implements strive to get the finest paints, and send their goods away painted and varnished with artistic taste, but how very often, nay, how rarely is it otherwise, their goods when not under cover arrive at destination covered with cinders, and that which was a "thing of beauty" from the artist's hand when shipped, a coal-soiled, scarred piece of machinery at place of arrival, with journals and bearings so full of grit from the locomotive that the machines have generally to be taken partially apart, cleaned and reooiled before use.

Nor do the railways escape the damage to their fine palace cars, the wear and tear by grit upon their rolling stock from flying pieces of coal, cinders, sparks and grit, being beyond their power to calculate. There is one way, however, in which railways do suffer damage in a direct apparent form from the smokestacks of their locomotives, by fires, from which at least one of our railways is anid to average losses of. over $\$ 40,000$ a year. How great and immense therefore, would be the moneyed gain to railways and to manufacturers from any device that would overcome the discomforts of travel, the damages and loss to the public and to therailways. Railway companies are constantly striving to overcome such evils, but they have not been very successful; they believe they can never get too much draught in their locomotives, hence their efforts by blowers, steam-jets and exhausts to drive the greatest possible amount of air through the gratebars, sometimes with power so great as to carry not alone cinders and grit, but fine and good-sized lumps of unburnt coal into the outer atmosphere.

The evils referred to are being lessened by superior merit in the design and construction of locomotives, we have a recent sample that reflects credit on Mr. Brown. the Mechanical Superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., who has just sent ont from the works of that company in this city a locomotive that challenges comparison with any in America. The reference to that particular locomotive is, however, a digression; we return to the evil, the " modern plague,", the source of diecomfort, loss and damage in railway travel, the cause of contention, civic interference, and even of law suits, in manufacturing cities; is it preventable?

We are led into the foregoing thoughts by a conversation with a former resident of this city, a well-known ex-Montrealer. Accident some years ago turned his therghts into a different channel from that of the smoke consumer inventors, lack of time and opportunity postponed consideration of matters for a time, but of late he has had sufficient success to enable him to answer our question - "Is it preventable?"-in the affirmative, and he shows his confidence by taking out Canadian and foreign patents.

Railways, by blowers, steam-jets and the exhaust, disintegrate the coal upon the grates, driving air through the boiler tubes and smoke-stack with sufficient force to carry fine particles and nuggets of coal into the outer atmosphere; he says, instead, that better results can be had by aiding Nature in bringing about a decomposition of the fuel for its union with the gases of combustion in the furnace.

Railway men and others think that they can nover getenough air with a view to draught. Ho contends that a sufficiency of air is necessary to combustion, but that an excess of air lowers the temperature of the furnace, and is as detrimental to combustion as an insufliciency of oxygen. Combustion takes place according to the density of the atmosphere; railways and others endeavor to acquire density by force in driving the air through the grate-bars outward through the chimney; he strives to create continuously a density in the atmosphere of the furnace by expansion through beat and the generation of gaises that are
expelled into the furnace over the fire bed; and by his invention he claims to have succeeded so effectually as to ensure the complete combustion of the fuel, whereby fuel, whether of a hydrocarbon or a carbonaceous nature, is absolntely consumed before it reaches the smoke-stack, leaving neither grit, sparks or smoke to pass through the chimney.

Trade Relations Witi Canada.-The Ohicago Evening Journal of the 2 d instant, gives an account of the visit to that city of the "United States Seunte Committee ou Trade Relations with Caundn." The committee consists of Senator Hoar, chairman; Senators Allison, Hale, Dolpt, Pugh, Butler and Voorhees. It is attended by Sergeant-at-Arms C. B. Reade and his assistant. The business of the committee, as expressed in the resolution appointing it, is "to report upon the relations of the commerce and business existing botween the United States and the dependencies of Great Britain in America, and to investigate whether the obligations of existing treatics and of international law are and have been observed by the people of both countries, and the number, amount and character of existing claims against Great Britain by reason of violation of such obligation toward the people of the United States in such depeudencies." This inquiry is not to be carried on in Chicago, but the members are here werely because this city was selected as the place where thoy should meet before starting on the work given them to do. No formal session was held this forenoon and none will be held liere. Sergeant-at-arms Reade, in talbing the programme over with $n$ reporter, said:- " The committee has had no formal meeting here as yet. All the mombers have not arrived, and some of them will not reach here bofore this aftornoon. The committee will leave here for San Francisco, where its investigation will really begin. Just what scope they shall tako or in what manner they shall be carried on has not been decided, and will not be until the committee is on the train. It hae been decided, however, that the inquiry shall not touch upon the railroad relations with Canada. That part of the question will not be taken into consideration at the prebent time. At Sau Francisco there will probably be 100 witnesses examined. From San Francisco the committeo will go to Porthad, Ore, and will pursue its investigntions there. It will thence go to 'lacoma, Wash, T., and from there to Victoria, british Columbia. It will return thence by way of the Norihern Pacific road and will stop at St. Puul. From St. Paul it will retura to Ohicago; and on reaching this place again will break up, and the members will return to their homes. It is not the intention to take any evidence at this point."

Tee Manufacturera' Lifs Assoranoe Co.-The new orgadization at the headquarters of this company in 'Toronto, consequent on the retirement of Mr. J. B. Carlile from the position of general manager at the last annual meeting, bas been making satisfactory progress meantime under the control and direction of Mr. J. L. Kerr, the secretary-manager Mr. Kerr has been ably seconded in his efforts by Mr. A. H. Gilbert, for several years connected with the Sun Life, and who has recently assumed the position of Superintendent of Agencies in which capacity, with his valuable experience, he should prove a tower of strength to the company. With a view to a more energetic extension of the business in this Province, a meeting of the local Board and the principal oficers was held in Montreal on tho 2 d inst, at which the following gentlemen were present: J. L. Kerr Secretary and Acting Nanager, A. H. Gilbort, Superintendent of Agencies, A. F. Gault, of Gault Bros. \& Co., W. H. Holland, Superinteadent of the Accident Co.; R. R. MacLemnan, of Alexandria, llobt. Archer, of Montreal, with Messrs. E. A. Baynes General Agent P. Q. and R. Oroft Hulme, Provincial Manager. The last named gentleman has been appointed manager of the business for the Province of Quebec with headquarters in Montreal, co-operating with Mr. E. A. Baynes, whose position continues unchanged. Mr. Hulme is no tyro in life insurance. He bringe to the company an experience extending over a quarter of a century, with such institutions as the Standard Life, the British America and other staunch companice which he represented in Belleville, and with his energy and ablility should contribute a due share in bringing tho Manufacturers' to a front place in the ranks of Canadian lifo assurance. Notwithstanding the criticism levelled at the company since the change of management early the prebent year, the businebs appears to be well maintained. The last three months show a alight falling off in the amount of business done, as compared with the corresponding period of i887, but the premium receipts, on the other hand, show a considerable and satisfactory increase. Mr. A. H. Gilbert's circular to agents, dated the Ist instant, breathes a propor spirit, and should go far to popularize him with the field officers of the company. The new blood infused runs in the veins of men of experience but who still have thioir best
working years in advance. It romains to be seen what they will do in face of the heavy takk which lies before them.

T'ue work of the Session has ended at Ottawa, and one hundred and ten now Acts grace the statute books. Of these, only two are public bills, the Combincs aud Extradition Acts Forty-five are Government meanures, and the remainder private acts, including four of divorce. 'The curions may be interested to learn that the members managed to talk about two milliou eight hundred thousand words, or nearly four thourand columms of hansard. In the course of his speech proroguing Parliament the Governor-Gencral said :-I have reason to hope that the authority which you have conferred on my Government will enable them to conclude an arrangement for effective steam commomication with Europe and with Asin whereby the trade and commerce of Canada will be widuly extended, and the traffic parsing over her lines of communication be greally developed. You have again made liberal provibion for extending the railway facilities of the Dominion and for increasing their effeiency. The Act refating to the electoral franchise will, I helieve, be fond an important improvement dauding to economy and certainly in the administation of that branch of the law. The measure by which the system of speedy trinls for crimimals has been extended to the Maritime Provinces is likely to provu a valuable eddition to our crimimal procedure. It is gratifying to know that your address referring to the boundaries of Ontario will lead to the enrly settlement of the principal question which has remained unsettled to the present time between that Province and the Dominion in a manner entirely satibfactory to all concerned. The amondment of the laws rolating to copyright will, it is hoped, remove some of the embarrasemente under which the printers and publishers of Canada have labored for some years past without doing injustice to authors in this or other countries. You have provided for greater eflicioncy and economy in the postal service; for giving greater facilities for the bettlement of our lands in the North-West T'erritories, and for increabing the arfeguards of hife and property on our ships. Many of the other moasures, athough of a minor character, will be found of great usefulness in conducliag the affairs of the Administration
'I'ie Cantemnial.-'The Centennial of Wabhington's inauguration us the first President of the United States has been observed with kreat enthasiasm and with appropiate ceremonies from one end of the great lepublic to the other. It has beon said that our Americam consing have within tho past fow years colobratod no lese than thiticoa contennials of one kind or another, but none of thom seem to have buen so genorally and so hearily observed as the one just brought to a close. 'Ihe occasion is one well calculated to stimulate the mational sentiment and directs attention anow to American methodh, many of which have now been on trial for 100 years. The Ohicago Inter-Ocean well suys:-"Ihe adoption of the Coustitution ermated a new world ta woll as a now Nation. It established a strong goverument witha strong purpose, and that purpose was not more or less than the development of all the resources with which 'God and Nature' had undowed this country in order that it might be the happy mad prosperous home not only of the three million revolutionists and their lineal doscendmuts, but of millions and millions of adopted sons und daughtors. It was to be a land ol freedom and a land of plenty. It was to be 'arefuge and a recruiting station' for the forcos of freedom the world over. 'The condition of Burope, and indeed of the whole earth, was to bo bettered by the over-improving condition of America. It was not contemplated that wo should aid rovolution abrond, either by overt act or oxpressed sympathy; it was intended that the neod of revolution abroad should be lassoned, in part by the inducements which this country ofiored to the industrious buit unprosperous poople of other comatries, and in part by the sure infection and contagion of a liboral form of Government upon despotic or oligarchic forms. Thu expectations of our forefathers lave been realized. We have become a grout mation, rich in cities and in all surts of possessions."
 'Ioronto, for some time trusted of the Joseph Hall, Works Nstate (Oshawa), has just patented a nuw invention for this purpose which bide fair to offect a marked oconomy wherever stenm is used for heator motive power. 'lhe invention "relates to that clabs of dovices in which stemm is introduced into the furnace to aid combustion. . It is for use ns an attamhent to furnaces of every kind, for the purpose of incrensing the efliciency of the furnace and the perfect combustion of The fuel. The form of the device is of necessity varied so to shape according to the size and kind of anch furmee or boiler, according to the room-gpace arailable, and where available on a boiler or in a furnace or in elose proximity thereto for may part of the devico. What ho chaims ae now is (1) the superhoator and burner consisting of an
outer casing, a perforated tube within the outer casing, forming a space between it and the casing, iron or steel filings or pieces filling said space, and noziles connecting the inner tube and outer casing, substantially as described, (2) the superheater and burner consisting of an outer casing, a perforated tube within the outer casing and forming a space between it and the casing, wire-cloth surrounding the perforated tube, iron or steel filinge or pieces filling said space, and nozzles connecting the tube and outer casing.
"A Dead Beat Reotster."-The Chicago Inter-Ocean announced recently that the butchers and grocers of the West Side in that city, had begun a crusade on dead beats. After several preliminary meetings a general meeting was held, at which about filty were present and a permanent organization effected. The organization is known as the Grocers and Butchers' Social and Mutual Benefit Society of West Chicugo. A constitution and by-laws were adopted and officers elected. "One of the first purposes of the organization is the proparation of a 'dead beat' register, in which sball be entered the names of those who won't pay grocers' bills. This is to be acceasible to all the members of the society, aud is believed will protect them in giving credit. Avother object is to promote a better acquaintance among this class of tradermen and lessen the jealousies that exist among them and which work so much to their disadvantage. Meetings will be held twice a month on the second and fourth Wednedays of the month." This is an example which may well be followed in Canada. Its establishment would have the effect of making numbers of citizens who live upon credit, apply their carnings in paying cash for their daily wants.

The United States railway managers are working with might and main to destroy the competition of Canadian roads. It now comes to light that the movement for the imposition of custom duties on railroad cars crossing the border from Canada is not directed excluaively nor mainly against cars engaged in the traflic between the two countries and bringing imports into the United States from the Dominion. On the contrary the Treasury authorities have been urged to rule that all railroad cars engaged in traffic between points in the United Staten by way of Canadian lines, are subject to a bigh rate of duty at the border when re-ontering this country, although engaged in domeatic trafic. This serves to explain what was otherwise hard to understand. It was not easy to see why there should be such an energetic movement for the asbessment of duty on cars taking stuff from Oanada when such action would inevitably lead to the retalistory levy of duty on United States cars entering the Dominion If American shippers wish to continue to avail themselves of the competition of Canadian carriers and not suffer patiently undor the heel of the great railway monopolies, it is time thoy mado themselves heard.
J. S. Bobuok \& Co.-This will never dol The leather men of Montreal, in their strongth or their weaknesses, have nevor hitherto givon any occasion for boing credited with doing thinge by half measures or in a small way. It is to be feared, however, that degeneracy is beginning to mark thom, and that failures running into hundreds of thousands, and even millions, are gradually becoming things of tho past. One wholesale leather morchant, commenting upon the failure of the firm whose name heads this article, at the close of last week, was loud in his lamentations, and so dramatic as to quote the old usuror, who lost his diamonds and his daughtor at the one and same time, declaming aloud: "The curso never foll upon our tribe till now I" Tho dea of any firm doing a wholesale leather busivess failing for so paltry a sum as $\$ 10,000$ is somothing that has aronsed the deopest feelings and indiguation of the trade, and they are not likely to recover from it until it has been proved that this is merely a triffing " exception," which proves the rule.

Salrs of unclaimed goode, which are advertised from time to time, are alleged to have given rise to a torm of cheating which is very profitable to the principals. It some instances, it is known that men have been employed several days in advance making up and branding tho packages. At London, Oat, recently, according to an Advertiser correspondent, "the auctioneer had the audacity to take a quantity of trash on his own account and the Custom Honse officials allowed him to offer thom for sale as boing part aud parcel of the unclaimed goods, and least there should be any suspicion of their real character, and to put inteuding purchasers entirely off their guard, these bogus packages were actually handed to the anctioneer by a well-known customs oficial in common with the real articles." This is a species of frand which the public should keep in remombrance.

Notwithetanding the protective tarif of 75 per cent. the Boston \& Sandwich Glass Co., of Mnsachusetts, established some 40 years ago,
bas been obliged to go to the wall．Commenting on the failure，the Philadelphia Record says ：－＂It could not contend against the duty on Nopa Scotia coal and the chesp natural gas of Western Pennsylvania． It was impossible for the company to longer pay the tariffeubanced cost of coal and compete with natural gas in the manufacture of glass－ ware．No thriff，however high，will securels protect any industry against natural disadvantages；and where the unrivalled natural ad－ vantáges of cheap rav materials exist；as in Western Pennsylvania， no tariff is needed．

Cincinnami Price Curfent：It is unfortanate for insurance that there are a good many adjusters who think that ability in their profession is to first suspect that every loss is tainted with fraud，and to go to work at it in that view．If they cannot find that the insured has been trying to cheat them，then they go to work to cheat the insured， acting as though that in every loss comebody must cheat and some－ body be cheated．Some adjustors in their zeal to＂make a salvage＂ create a prejadice againat their companies，ard do thom an injury that a long lifetime of faithful service could not repair．

Two of the magaificent structures erected on our prinoipal busi－ pess thoroughfare will be formally opened next week．The New York Life building on Place d＇Armes now vies with the double towers of the great church，its neighbor，in point of imposing altitude and grandeur．Futuro views of the city will not be complete without a place for the building of the New York Life．The opening will be celebrated by a banquet at the Wiadsor．The Imperial Fire Insurance Company，another neighbor，erected on the sito of the old City Bank， is scarcely less conspicuous and imposing．In point of architecture it has proved an agreeable surprise to all who watched its progress． being now one of the handsomest buildings in Canada．The managers of the Imperial also propose celebrating their inauguration by a banquet

## 'THE GRAND TRONK RAILWAY MEETING.

At the half-yearly meeting of the shareholdors of the Grand Trunk rallway in London on the 10 th , ult., Sir Henry TyIer, the president, concluded an interesting speech as follows :-Since January 1, 1889, there have been threo now porions of railway oporated by ue, two of them relerred to at the last mecting-three of them, in fact. There is the United States and Canada railway, which is twenty-two miles long, in continuation of our Montreal and Champlain Junction railway. It goes from Fort Cuvington to Meeaina Springe, and connects there with tho Rome, Watertown a:d Ogdensburg railway. We shat! have considerable intorchange of traffic by this routo, especially coal trallic to Montreab. We havo alrendy purchased some bituminons conl by this route, and we think this can be brought into competition with the conl which we get from Nova Scotia. We have thas somewhat cheapeaed the conl from Nova sicotla. Beauharnois Junction railway; 102 miles long, is also a brauch of the Nontreal \& Champlain Junction railway, and you will remember that we have obtained a bill for these portions of the lino at a very cheap rate indeed. Also, wo have been operating 19 milos of the South Norfolls railway, from near Simcoe to Port Rowan, on Lake Eriu. This is a branch of the Georginn Bay \& Lake. Erie railway, which is the best paying branch which we have, and it rums through a very good ngricaltural district. Another railway with which we are now exchanging truffic is the Lako Erie, Ebeex \& Detroit River railway, 35 miles long, from Walkersville to Ruthven. That also was opened for traffic at the end of December. It has been coustructed by an independent company, orgauized by Messrs. Walker. They operate it, and they have made it for the purpose of developing some extensive limber lands in that direction. It is a connection for us with a new district, from which wo had not previously obtained may traflic. With regard to consolidntion, the work of consolidating the Hamilton and Northwestern into the Grand Tiunk system has been proceeding. 'The Northern establishments at 'roronto, 1 told you, were so valunble to us that it would have been worth while even to have taken the line over for the sako of obtaining that property. However, they are now entirely morged into the Grand l'muk, and proper connections havo been made for further economy in operating. Certain works have been carried on at Orillia also for greater economy. Our first statement, as regards tha Northern and Hamilton and Norlhwestern, is a very batisfactory one. No doubt it will improve from year to year, and that butter seasons of traftio will be developed. But I think wo have every renson to be satishied with thif, our latest acquisition. The percentago of working expenses has been reduced, us I expected it would, under our maintenance. 'The expenso of working that line in 1887 was $61: 37$ per cent, and that has been reduced during the halfyear to $\mathbf{5 9 . 2}$ per cent., and there is a good balanco after paying ali interest charges. Now, on the subject of the

wo have ben getiling for the past balf yemr 17 per ceat. of the eastbound dead freight out of Chicugo, mal our railway shows a very gratifying increase, as you will eco by tho hgures. Ia 1885 we carried 11.9 per cent. of the trathic ; in 1886, 12.9 ler cent ; in $1885^{5}$, 13.2 per cent. ; in 1888, 17 per cont. 'lhat is partly duo to extra facilities which we have provided, ns I described at the last meeting, and paticalarly at Elsdon, where wo hato made a transfer elevator, which las had a very good effect in luriuging to as the trufic. Of course, tho rates of this traflic wero much lower than in 1887 . If we had only good rates unon this trafic thu Chicago and Grand Trunk would have yiolded us most ratisfactory results in the past halfyear, and if we can only keep up the rates, as 1 have stated, tho Ohicago and $G$-and lruuk will give us $n$ monst satisfactory result in tho next half-year. To givo you an iden of tho extent of our trafic, we carried during the past linalfyear 227 of the grain trafic, 19.22 of the provision tranlic,
and of the oil-cake, hides, and so on, smaller proportions; but the average, as I have stated, proportions; but the average, as I have stated, on all the Chicago and Grand Trunk braffic out of Chicago, two-thirds of it was carried on our main line to Portland, Boston, and other places, and one-third across our Great Western systom to Now York, Philadelphia, Buffalo, etc., and to show what proportion we get in percentage, compared with other lines, here is a statement which shows the through shipments in 1888 of all the flour and provisions. I have given the whole at 17 per cent ; but of all the flour, grain and provisions the Chicago and Grand Trunk carried 18.6 ; while the Michigan Central carried 17.1 per cent.: Lake Shore, 166 ; Fort Wayne, 16.6 ; Pan Handle, 0.4 ; Baltimore and Ohio, 10.7 ; Nickel Plate, 10.4. So that alows you our officers have been doing their duty with respect to getting traffic, tor wo had, as you will see by that, the largest amount of the flour, grain, aud provisions of any line out of Chicago on the Grand Trunk.

on this occasion. We have dealt wth certain matters during the half-year which more or less concern our celations with the Canadian I'acific. There was, if you remember, a circular signed by a Mr. Secretan, who was not himeolf a holder of Grand Trunk securities, and could not refer to anybody who was, as
forming one of the committee of which he forming one of the committee of which he anid so much. Then there was Mr. Gramshaw's letter, which I need not say anything more about, and there was a memorial which we thought proper to address to the Canadian Government, and I think the memorial has had a very important effect already. (Applause.) Wo were very much obliged to you for signing it in such large numbers, because we consider it as bearing practically the unanimous assent of the proprietors to the terms of it. In fact, it was only carrying out your own wishes in representing to the Canadian Government the injustice of their subsidizing lines out of the resources of the Dominion for the sake of competing with us in districts which were alrady sufficiently served by railwav accommodation; and not only so, but subsidizing lines out of the trxes-we ourselyes being the largest taxpayers in the country. Well, I mentioned the subject of fuel just now, and how wo were hnadicapped as regards other railways by the amount which it costs to put fuel on our tonders; but I ought, in mentioning it, to have stated that we have to pay half-a-crown a ton duty on all the coal we import into Canadr from the United States, and what do you think that comes to during the year? Upon last year's consumption of fuel that part of the fuel which we get from the United Statee, wo paid $£ 56,000$ of duty to the Canadian Government. I do not know how great a proportion of that goes to subsidizing the lines which are in competition with us, but a considerable portion of it does, and I say that it is a great injustice to the Grand Trunk company, to which Canada owes so much in tho pust. (Ories of "Shame.") I think it is only right' to those gentlemen who have so kindly signed that memorial, to enable us make proper representations to the Cauadian Government, to ask you unanimensly to approve of a resolution which will be laid before you by a gentleman preseat approving of that momorial. It will be read to you presently, as soon us we have got through our ordinary busiuess. There is one other matter, perhaps, which 1 ought to mention-that is the Canadinn Pacific lave been promotiag a bill in the Canadian larliament of
sombwhat hatraobdinafy charagter.
It has been a good deal altered in paesing through committea, patly, I think, in consequence of the menorial. (Applause). As it stands now it is really more for the Uamadian Pacific shareholders than for ne to discuss it, but I cannot belp observing upon one clauso or series rather of clauses of that bill which arc of the most extraordinary character. That bill provides that when, I think it is, 10 per cent. of the debenture interest in any one halfyear, or if it is paid quarterly it would, I suppose, be in auy one quarter, is unpaid, that then the debenture nolders shall ipso facto havo a right to vote, and the ordinary fhareholders, or holders of common stock shall cense to have votes in the concern. I do not
know what has induced the company to introduce such a measure or such a provision into their bill. I suppose they cannot have any idea of its becoming operative very soon, but if they have no such idea, why did they introduce it? (Laughter.) I confess I never was so startled at seeing any provision in a railway bill as I was on seeing that. Howrailway bill as I was on seeing that. How-
ever, it is a good deal more for the Canadian Pacific shareholders to consider than it is for us. Of course they are going on with their railway from London to Windsor, aided by tho Canadian Government, alongside of our double line, eighty miles in length, and we cannot help it. We must make the best of it; but, as I said before, I have rot as much fear of any harm that they will do us as many people have I think we shall be able to hold our own under any circumstances. (Cheers.) Now, I have said something nbout the rates already. I should like to sny one or two more words upon that suhject. When I was out in Canada last autumn and in the United States, the rates were being put down and they were kept down in some extraordinary mode for which there uppeared to bo no possible reason. Well, one reason has since been given. I do not mean to say it applied to all the companies that were putting down rates, but it certainly applied especially to ono company. I shall not mention the name of that company, but it has been publicly discussed. It appears that the president of the company, with the company's money, was actually buying corn in Chicago or the West for transport along their railway, and it seems pretty clear that they were doing something which was very unreasonable and very improper in buying corn with the company's money, and thist that might possibly give them a reason for keeping down rates in order to sell their corn at a profit. Well, when you are dealing with presidents of companies that act in that way, of course it is no use our having meetings round a table, pledging ourselves to behave honorably towards one another in regard to our lines. However, I am happg to say there has been some improvement in

The law has been amended, and whereas the officers who transgressed that law were sub-
ject formerly to fine, they are now subjected ject formerly to fine, they are now subjected in addition to imprisonment. (Hear, hear) The law now onacts that not only all the agents and officers and servants of railway companies who infringe the law, who give rebates or concessions, or who intringe the law in any ordinary way, sball be subject to a fine of $\$ 5,000$, but also that they may be imprisoned for a term not exceeding two years. And not only the officers and servants of railway companies, but the shippers also. Any shipper who falsely represents the contents of packager, to :ecure a smaller rate or a lowor classification, may also be fined $\$ 5,000$ and imprisoned for two years. Well, I think that is very important, at.d it is a very curious thing that since that amended law came into effect, on March 2od, there was a sudden stop even to rumors of rate-cutting. (Laughter.) Both the slippers and the agents admit that they did not care much about fines: Their firms or their companies might have paid their fines perhaps, but their firms or their companies won't go to prison for them, and I really have greater fat th in the maintenance of rates now that the imprisonment clause las been enacted than in anything which I have seen for some time past (Cheers.) I think this now law will certainly be efficient in clenching what was done at the meeting of January, 1889, at the honse of Mr. Pierpoint Morgan, in Now York, whero the bankers agreed, if you will remember, not to provide money for making competing railways, and tho railway companies agreed to cense thedr rute-cutliug. Bat no agreement can possibly be considered permaneut in America-even what they call the "gentlemen's agreement" -the agreement hhich was made at Mr. Morgun's house-withoutstringent peaalties, and this question of improvement is a string: ent penally which may give greater effect to that agreement. I nm happy to say that the Western and South Western lines have already entered into agreements on the lines proposed ; that
the central traffio association-
that is to eny, lines east of Chicago and west of the Atlantic trunk lines, are organizing
their arrangements; and that the Atlantic trunk lines themselves have entered into a new contract; and also that the Now England lines are negotiating similar contracts. The chairman and the officers of the Interstate Commerce commission, having greater powera, are also very active, and it looks very mach as if we were going to enter upon an era of peace and good will amonget the railway companies ; and if we only do that, and if it comes into force for the rest of the present jear, we need have no fear whatever about the receipts we shall receive on the Grand Trunk railway. So, then, gentlemen, although we have during the past half-year lost $£ 100,000$ of net revenue, when we look closely to the matters which I have mentioner, I do not think we need be discouraged. On the Grand Trunk proper the decreased rate per ton per mile on freight alone accounts for $£ 66,000$ of it, and that was from mad competition, which we hope now, under better arrangements, and this better state of the law, wo shall not suffer again. Then, as I faid, we lost nearly $£ 36,000$ from passenger recoipts in an extraordinatily wet, cold year, and with an amount of competition in regard to low fares such as we have never had before, and cut rates for immigrants which we hope will not occur again. Now, these figures will account for $£ 102,000$ of this loss; and then we had on the Chicago and Grand Trunk for similar reasons Hearly $\boldsymbol{f 1 5 , 0 0 0}$ less, and from the Grand Haven and Milwaukee railway $£ 13,000$ less of net revenue, and other sums account for about $£ 30,000$ more, which we actually lost in net revenue. Now, we are not always going to heve cold and wet seasons; we are not always going to have starvation rates; we are not always going to have bad harvests. I think we can rely upon nature for its averago over a series of years. We cian rely mort than ever we have done before on the nction of the Interatate commerce commisaion and the extension of its powers. We can rely better upon that than on the juint action, as in the past, of the various companies in their practically uncontrolled condition, for better rates; tut 1 am sure, gentlemen, that we can thoroughly rely on the devotion of our officers in Canada to take what advantages they can of more favorable conditione, and we can answer for them that they w!ll strain every nerve to make up for past losses, and to improve our net revenue for past losse
