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## PREFACE

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Of modern languages none can be studied from the printed page with so much satisfaction as Spanish. This is because the orthography of Spanish is phonetic, and also because the language contains no difficult sounds to be learned from a teacher, but only sounds which are common to all modern languages. The grammar of Spanish is also simple and regular, more similar than that of English, French, Italian or German.

In spite of these facts however, the subject has not been very attractive to the student, for the text books on Spanish are much inferior to those used in teaching the other languages.

The method followed herein, is the same Analytical Method, which we have used with so much success in the teaching of Latin and French, and will, we trust, prove equally efficacious for Spanish.

In the preparation of all our lessons, we have always striven to present the matter in a form intelligible to the stupid or inapt, not only because the latter are in the grand majority, but also because what they can comprehend, will be all the more clear to the intelligent and bright.

## Lección Primera

(First Lesson)

### A (pronounced *ah*)

NOTE A.—The Spanish *a* is heard approximately in the English words *are*, *part*, *half* etc. It has never the sound of *a* in *war*, nor any other sound than the above. Pronounce the consonants as in English unless otherwise directed.

NOTE B.—In words of more than one syllable, accent the syllable before the last, that is, pronounce it with a little more stress than the others. In doing this, however, be careful not to alter the vowel sound in the other syllables, as one is apt to do in English. Thus, CÁR-TA (not *car-tuh*). PA-TÁ-TA (not *pah-tuh-tuh*). Give each vowel its true sound.

NOTE C.—This vowel has practically the same sound as the English *e* in *they*, *prey*, etc. It must never be given any other sound.

NOTE E.— This vowel has the sound of the English *o* in *rose* or *post*. It must never be pronounced like *o* in *or*.

**NOTE F.**— When a word of more than one syllable ends in a vowel, it has the accent on the syllable before the last (as stated in note B), but if it ends in a consonant the accent is on the last syllable.

(2) **La** is the feminine form of **el** and is used with feminine nouns. Be sure and always pronounce the final *e*.

(4) y, when followed by another vowel, is pronounced like the English y in year.

## U

NOTE G.— This vowel is the same as the English *u* in *rule, true, etc.* It must never be pronounced like *u* in *use*, which is really *yu*, thus, **UN** (*oon* not *yoon*).

NOTE H.— By combining or blending two vowel sounds we form a diphthong (double sound). The following are the diphthongs beginning with the vowel *i*, which must be very short, almost like *y*.

<b>ie,</b>	tiérra, tiéne, viéne, tiémpo,	( <i>earth, has, comes, time</i> )

NOTE I.— The following three diphthongs begin with the vowel *u* which is very short, almost like *w*

<b>ua,</b>	água, cuándo, cual,	( <i>water, when, which</i> )
<b>ue,</b>	buénō, puérta, cuénta,	( <i>good, door, account</i> )
<b>ui (uy),</b>	muy, cui ládo,	( <i>very, care</i> )

The first element of the above diphthongs is very short and never bears an accent. When therefore any of the above combinations of vowels are written with the first vowel bearing an accent mark, they will not form diphthongs, but must be pronounced separately. Here are examples:

<b>Día,</b>	envío.
Day,	shipment.

(5) Care must be taken to give the *u* its true sound in words like *GUSTO* and *PUNTO*. The student is very apt to pronounce *gus* and *pun* as in English.

### 2nd. class of diphthongs.

NOTE J.— In all the preceding diphthongs, the first element is short and weak. We now come to a class of diphthongs in which the first element is prolonged, the second being short. Of such nature is the English pronoun *I* (*ai*).

**ai** or **ay** (like English *ai* in *aisle*), *hay*, *aire* (*there is, air*)

**ei** or **ey** (nearly like *ei* in *vein*) *veinte, rey,* (*twenty, king*)

**oi** or **oy** (like *oi* in *oil*) *soy, sois, doy, voy,* (*am, art, give, go*)

NOTE K.— The *ai* and *oi* are well pronounced by a certain class of Londoners, who bring out the final *i* element quite distinctly. The *ei* is somewhat similar to *ai*, but begins with the sound *e* (*ay*). It is likewise well pronounced by Londoners in words like *vein* (almost *vay-een*), *uent* as one syllable). The *final* element of the above three diphthongs, being short, never bears an accent. When therefore any of these combinations of letters are written with an accent on the final letter, they must not be blended, but pronounced separately, e. g. *CAÍDA* (*a fall*).

Other combinations of vowels do not blend and form diphthongs, however rapidly they are pronounced.

**LECCION PRIMERA***Triphthonge*

A triphthong (*TRES, three times, PHTHONGOS, sound*) is a prolonged vocal sound, in uttering which the tongue moves through three different vowel positions. The word *guay* (oh!) contains a triphthong. It is the middle element *a* which is most prolonged, the *u* element and the *y* being very short, that is, pronounce the *ay* as before indicated and make a short *u* sound precede it. So *buoy* (ox) contains a triphthong, of which the middle element *e* is prolonged.

## Lección Segunda

### THE CONSONANTS

**NOTE A.**— Most of the consonants are pronounced approximately as in English. We will notice those only that are peculiar.

#### **z**

The *z* is lisped, being somewhat like English *th* in *thin*.

Switzerland, time, arm, pencil, blue, reason.

#### **c**

*C* has generally the sound of English *c* in *cat* (there is no *k* in Spanish). Before *e* or *i* it softens as in English, but is usually lisped like the *z* above explained, (see Obs. 1).

#### **j**

*J* is like a very strongly aspirated *h*, or, more strictly speaking, is like the German or Scotch *ch*. The Spanish letter *h* has no phonetic value, being always silent.

(kah-hah ee-hah ee-ho ho-vain hoo-lee-o hoo-nee-o moo-hair)

#### **g**

The Spanish *g* has usually the sound of English *g* in *go*, but becomes equivalent to the Spanish *j* (see above) before *e* or *i* (just as English *g* becomes *j* in like case).

(hay-nay-ral frah-heel co-lay-hee-o ay-heep-to lee-hay-ro)  
General, fragile, college, Egypt, light, quick.

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(1) In some parts of Spain and in South America and Mexico, the *z* instead of being lisped, is given the pure *s* sound (as in *pass*).

When we wish the *g* to have its true sound before *e* or *i*, we write *gu*.  
The *u* is here merely a graphic sign and must not be pronounced.

The *ch* is pronounced like the English *ch* in *much*.

## II

The *ll* is counted as a distinct character from the *l* and is pronounced something like the English *ly* or *lli* in *William*. To produce this sound correctly however, the *tip* of the tongue should not be applied to the palate (as in English), but against the upper front teeth. The *flat surface* of the tongue should come in contact with the palate.

## ñ

This character (note the mark over it) is distinct from *n*. It is much like the *ny* or *ni* in *onion*.

When *r* begins a word or is doubled (*rr*) it is strongly rolled, somewhat as in Scotch. Otherwise it is lightly pronounced.

## qu

Qui (*q* is never written alone) is pronounced like *k*, not like *ku*. The *k* is

(2) When the *u* is not preceded by a vowel, it will be more difficult for the student to pronounce, and he will require to follow closely the directions given above.

## S

This letter is alwnys like the *s* in *this*, never like the *s* in *his* (which is really a *z*). The sound of English *z* is never heard in Spanish. Hence also *x* is always like *cs*, never like *yz*.

## T

*T* has always the sound of *t* in *tin*.

## Double Letters

Strictly speaking, the only letters that may be doubled are *n* and *c*, for *ll* and *rr* are counted as separate characters. The *c* is only found doubled before *ion*, thus, (*acción*), the first *c* being pronounced *k* and the second *th*, (*ak-thion*).

When the vowels are doubled, pronounce each separately, thus, *ca-ay*, (*gray-ay*).

## Silent Letters

The *h* is the only silent letter in Spanish. All others should be pronounced in the way before indicated.

## Tonic Accent

RULE 1.— Words ending in a vowel (or diphthong) are accented on the syllable before the last.

Libro, muchacho, memoria, media.

(3) Be careful not to say *azi* for *asi*, or *aza*, for *ca-sa*. There is no *z* sound (or soft *s*) in Spanish. The Spanish *z* is pronounced *th*.

(4) The *nn* is chiefly found in words like these, which have the prefix *en* or *in*.

**RULE II.**— Words ending in a consonant are accented on the *last syllable*.

Metal, señor, español.

**EXCEPTION.**— The consonant *s*, being the mark of the plural of nouns and adjectives, is not to be counted as a consonant in using the above rules. Similarly, since *n* is generally the sign of the plural of verbs, it must likewise be disregarded, thus:

Rosa,	rosas,	él tiene,	ellos tienen.
Rose,	roses,	he has,	they have.

The application of the above two rules is a simple matter and hence the accented syllable is not marked in Spanish, except when it violates the above rules. Thus:

Frágil, difícil, francés, razón. (5)

#### Graphic Accent

This accent or mark is used to distinguish words whose orthography would be otherwise alike. It is not properly speaking an accent and does not affect the pronunciation.

#### Syllabication

**I.**— The consonant goes with the vowel following it: ca-sa, (not cas-a).

**II.**— If two consonants come together, they are divided: in-mor-tal. But *ll*, *ch*, *rr* count only as one consonant and are not separated. So *bl* or *br* (and other consonants followed by *l* and *r*) being easily pronounced together, must not be separated.

(5) Up to the present we have marked the tonic syllable of every word. We will mark it in future only when it does not occupy its usual place.

(1) **El HERMANO** (masculine), but **la HERMANA** (feminine). Use **el** with a masculine noun, **LA** with a feminine noun.

(2) **El LIBRO** (masculine), but **la HORA** (feminine). In English only words denoting living beings can be masculine or feminine, but this is not so in Spanish. The general rule for Spanish, is that words ending in **a** are fem., those ending in any other letter are masculine. Names of **males**, however, are always masc., and names of **females**, fem., irrespective of the ending.

(3) **El** is used instead of **LA**, for euphony, before a fem. noun of two syllables, beginning with a unaccented (**ha** is to be treated as **a**). Before fem. nouns of more than two syllables, either **EL** or **LA** may be used.

(4) When the noun is plural use **los** instead of **el**, and **las** instead of **la** (just as in English you would write "these" instead of "this").

(5) Most adjectives are written after their nouns. Notice how they agree in gender and number with their nouns. If the adjective ends in **o** in the masc., it changes this letter to **a** for fem. Adjectives ending in **e** (OBRE) do not change for feminine.

(6) A *el* is always contracted to *al*, but *a la* does not change.

(7) De *el* is always contracted to *del*, but *de la* does not change. De means of or from.

(8) We would use *ELLAS* (not *ELLOS*) in referring to nouns of the fem. gender.

(9) It is usual to add *OTROS* (*others*) to *NOS* and *VOS*. Compare the French *NOUS AUTRES* and *VOUS AUTRES*.

(10) Notice that the forms of the verb vary with the different persons. English uses the form *are* with *we*, *you*, and *they*, but Spanish has a distinct form for each person. The forms in parenthesis above, are little used, as we will see presently.

¿Es usted el maestro de español? — Sí, señor. (II)  
Is your Grace the teacher of Spanish? Yes, sir.

¿Son ustedes Españoles? — No, señor, somos Alemanes. (12)  
Are your Graces Spaniards? No, sir, (we) are Germans.

What hour is (it) = what time is it? Es la una (hour).  
It is the one (= one o'clock).

Es muy temprano. Es tarde. No, no es tarde.  
It is very early. It is late. No, it is not late.

¿Qué horas son? (or Qué hora es?) — Son las dos (horas).  
What hours are it? It are the two (= two o'clock).

Es la una y media. Son las tres (horas).  
It is the one and a half (half past one). It are the three (o'clock).

Son las dos menos cuarto.  
It are the two less a quarter (= a quarter to two o'clock).

Son las dos menos diez minutos.  
It are the two less ten minutes.

Son las dos y cuarto. Son las dos y diez minutos.  
It are the two and a quarter. It are the two and ten minutes.

Es el mediodía.  
It is the mid-day (noon). Es la media noche y diez minutos. (13)  
It is the mid-night and ten minutes.

Faltan diez minutos para las nueve (las nueve menos diez).  
Fail ten minutes for the nine.

El tren sale a las nueve en punto.  
The train leaves at the nine on point (sharp).

¿Cuántos libros tiene usted? (Yo) tengo seis libros.  
How many books has your Grace? I have six books.

Uno, dos, tres, cuatro, cinco, seis, siete, ocho, nueve, diez. (14)  
One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten.

¿Cuántas años tiene usted? Tengo veinte y dos años.  
How many years has your Grace? I have twenty and two years.

(11) **Usted** is the polite and usual mode of address, hence the third person of the verb largely replaces the second person. Compare the French **MONSIEUR EST-IL FRANÇAIS?** (*Is Monsieur French?*)

(12) The pronouns may be omitted since the form of the verb shows which pronoun is understood.

(13) The word for twelve is **DOCE**, but we never say **LAS DOCE** in speaking of time. For twelve noon we say **EL MEDIODÍA**, and for twelve midnight, **LA MEDIA NOCHE**.

(14) The **ie** in **DIEZ** is a diphthong, but the **ie** in **DÍA** is not, because the **i** is accented.

Adiós, tengo una cita a las tres.

Adieu, I have an appointment at three o'clock.

Notice that we use **ESTAR** instead of **SER** to denote *situation*. Hence also **ESTAR** is used with adjectives which express a mere temporary state, such as *seated, tired, sick, well, busy, ready, glad, open, shut*, and other words which express states which we think of as changing continually in a person or thing. Of course all states are more or less subject to change, but there are some which we think of as merely transient, and others as more or less stable or fixed. Thus we could quite consistently ask every day if a person was *well, tired, pleased, ready, busy*, etc., whereas we would hardly ask more than once if he were *French, English, old, rich, honest, big, dark, fair*, etc.

(1) Notice that *su* may be translated *his*, *her*, *its*, or *their*, according to the gender of its antecedent noun.

(2) The adjective *VUESTRO* is very little used; we use instead the phrase *DE USTED*, a contraction of *DE VUESTRA MERCE*, *of your Grace*, or *DE USTEDES (DE VUESTRAS MERCEDES)*.

(3) Notice that the possessive adjectives agree with the nouns possessed.

(4) These possessive adjectives (written after their noun) must agree in gender and number with the nouns they modify, just like any other adjectives. The forms *mi*, *tu*, *su*, (written before their nouns) agree only in number.

**El es un amigo mío.**  
He is a friend mine (of mine).

**Un amigo suyo.**  
A friend his (of his).

**Unas amigas mías (tuyas, suyñas).**  
Some (female) friends mine (thine, his).

**Adiós señor mío.**  
Good bye, sir.

**Bienvenido, amigo mío.**  
Welcome, my friend.

**Ella es una amiga mía.**  
She is a friend mine.

**Unos amigos tuyos.**  
Some friends thine (of thine).

**¡Dios mío, qué muchacho!**  
My God (my goodness), what a boy!

#### *The Possessive Pronouns*

**Mi caballo es mejor que el tuyo.**  
My horse is better than (the) thine (thy one).

**Mi casa y la tuya.**  
My house and (the) thine.

**Mis sombreros o los tuyos.**  
My hats or the thine.

**Mis casas o las tuyas.**  
My houses or the thine.

**Mi sombrero es mejor que el suyo.**  
My hat is better than the his.

**Mi casa o la suya (5).**  
My house or the his (hers, theirs).

**Mis casas son más grandes que las suyas (las de él).**  
My houses are larger than the his (those of him).

**Este libro es mejor que el mío.**  
This book is better than the mine (my one).

**Esta casa o la mía.**  
This house or (the) mine.

**Estos libros o los míos.**  
These books or (the) mine.

**Estas cartas o las mías.**  
These letters or (the) mine.

**Vuestro maestro es más sabio que el nuestro.**  
Your master is more learned than the ours (our master).

**Tus libros son mejores que los nuestros.**  
Thy books are better than the ours (our books).

**¿Cuál libro es este? — Es el mío.**  
What book is this? It is mine (my one).

**Es el tuyo.**  
It is thine (thy one).

**¿Cuýo (or de quién) es este libro?**  
Whose (of whom) is this book?

**Es mío.**

**It is mine (= belongs to me).**

**¿Cúyos son estos libros?**  
Whose are these books?

**Son míos.**

**Son tuyos.**

**They are mine (belong to me). They are thine.**

**¿Cúya (de quién) es esta carta? — Es mía.**  
Whose (of whom) is this letter? It is mine.

**Es nuestra.**

**It is ours.**

(5) The possessive pronouns are really the possessive adjectives used with a noun understood and hence agree with the noun understood in gender and number, e. g. **MICASA o LA TUYA**, my house or the thine (house).

## LECCION SEXTA

¿*C*uáles son estas cartas?  
Whose are these letters?  
Son nuestras.  
They are ours (belong to us).  
Son suyas.  
They are his (hers, theirs).

NOTE — The possessive pronouns always take the article **EL**, **LA**, (*los*, *las*), and agree with the noun they stand for. Hence notice the difference between the two following sentences.

Este libro es **el** mío (*pronoun*).  
This book is mine (= my one).  
Este libro es mío (*adjective*).  
This book is mine (= belongs to me).

The adjective lays stress on the possession, and is equivalent to "belongs to me". The pronoun does not emphasize the possession.

Juan no tiene **su** libro.  
John has not his book.  
Usted no tiene **su** libro.  
Your Grace has not his book (= your book).  
María tiene **su** libro.  
Mary has her book.

NOTE — Since we address a person in Spanish as "your Grace" not as "you", we consequently speak of a book etc. belonging to "your Grace" (not to you) as *his* or *her* book (*i. e.* the book of your Grace), just as we would if it belonged to your brother or sister. The "your" therefore practically disappears in Spanish.

Aquí están las cartas de él. Here are the letters of him.	Las cartas de ella. The letters of her.
Aquí están sus cartas de él. Here are his letters of him.	Sus cartas de ella. Her letters of her.
Aquí están sus cartas de usted. Here are his letters of your Grace.	Estoy á sus órdones. I am at your service (orders).
¿Está su señor padre en casa? Is your father at home?	

NOTE — For the sake of clearness we may add as above **DE EL**, (*of him*), **DE ELLA**, (*of her*), **DE ELLOS**, (*of them*), or **DE USTED**, after **SU**, unless of course the person to whom **SU** refers has been mentioned immediately before. When **SU** stands alone, and no person to whom it could refer has been previously mentioned, it is taken to refer to **USTED**.

Mi carta y la suya (la de usted).  
My letter and the his (that of your Grace).  
He recibido la suya de 20 del corriente.  
I have received the his (yours) of the 20 th. of the current (month).

**A casa, en casa**

¿Está el señor García en casa?  
Is Mr. Garcia at home?

Quiero ir a casa.  
I desire to go (to) home.

¿En casa de quién está él?  
In the house of whom is he (in whose house)?

**Demasiado (too much)**

Doy a V. demasiada molestia.  
I give to your G. too much trouble.

Hace demasiado frío.  
It makes too (much) cold.

**Bastante, enough**

Tengo bastante dinero.  
I have enough money.

V. habla bastante bien.  
You speak sufficiently well (pretty well).

**Vez**

Una vez.      Dos veces.      Muchas veces.      Rara vez.  
One time (once). Two times (twice). Many times (often). Rare time (seldom).

¿Cuántas veces?  
How many times (how often)?

Más de una vez.  
More than once.

A veces.  
At times (sometimes).

Otra vez.  
Another time (again).

**Otro, otros**

Deseo otros libros, otras cosas.  
I desire other books, other things.

Deseo otro libro. (6)  
I desire (an) other book.

No hay otro medio.  
There is no other means (there's no other way). When must I come again?

Aquí está el perro otra vez.  
Here is the dog again.

Otro dia.  
Another day.

Un día sí, y otro no.  
One day yes, and another no (every second day).

V. habla mal de los otros  
You speak ill of others (= other persons).

**Uno y otro**

¿Cuál de estos libros quiere V.?  
Which of these books desires your G.?

Uno y otro (or los dos).  
The one and the other (both).

(6) UN is not used before OTRO. *The other is el OTRO.*

**Ni uno ni otro.**

Nor one nor the o'her (**neither**).

**Ni una ni otra de estas casas es bastante grande.**

Nor one nor the other (**neither**) of these houses is enough **large**.

**Ni.....ni, neither.....nor**

No tengo ni pluma ni tinta.

I have not nor pen nor ink (**neither pen nor ink**).

**Ni pluma ni tinta tengo.** (7)

Nor pen nor ink have I.

### Jamas, nunca

¿ Ha estado V. **jamás** en Paris ?

Has been your G. ever in Paris ?

No he estado **jamás** en París.

I have not been ever in Paris.

¿ Ha estado V. en París ? —

Has been your G. in Paris ?

Nunca he estado en París.

Never I have been in Paris.

Una disgracia no viene nunca sola.

A misfortune not comes never alone.

No sé si **jamás** he estado allí.

I dont know if ever I have been there.

**Jamás** he estado en París.

Never have I been in Paris.

**Jamás (or nunca).** (8)

Never.

No he estado **nunca** en París.

I haven't been **never** in Paris.

(7) When **NI** comes after the verb, **NO** must precede the verb, but if **NI** comes before the verb **NO** is not used.

(8) **Jamas** is used in the sense of *ever* and *never*. **Nunca** only means *never*. Both words when following the verb require **NO** before the verb, but if they precede the verb **NO** is omitted.

## Lección Septima

### Ese and aquel

Aquel libro es pequeño.  
That book is small.

Ese libro es pequeño.  
That book (of yours) is small.

NOTE — AQUEL means *that* and may be applied to any object ; ESE also means *that* but it is only used when addressing a person, and implies that the object is either *near* such person, or is the property of such person.

Aquellos libros son pequeños.  
Those books are small.

Eses libros son pequeños.  
Those books (you have) are small.

Aquella casa es más grande que esa.  
That house is more large than that one (of yours.)

Aquel hombre es más fuerte que ese.  
That man is more strong than that one (near you).

Aquellas casas son mejores que esas (casas).  
Those houses are better than those (near you).

### The neuter gender

We have seen that all Spanish nouns are either masculine or feminine. The neuter is used with a few *indefinite* adjectives or pronouns. What is meant by "*indefinite*" will be apparent from the following examples.

Aquello no es posible.  
That is not possible.

Eso no es posible.  
That (which you state) is not possible.

Esto que yo digo es cierto.  
That which I say is certain.

Eso parece imposible.  
That appears (seems) impossible.

¿Qué es esto?  
What is this?

¿Qué es eso? (I)  
What is that (you have)?

Consiento en ello.  
I consent on (to) it.

Another use of the neuter is with adjectives used instead of abstract nouns, thus :

Amo lo bueno, lo bello, lo verdadero. (2)  
I love the good, the beautiful, the true.

(1) It will be seen that the pronouns *this* and *that* do not here stand for any definite nouns.

(2) It must not be forgotten that all nouns will be referred to as *he* or *she* in Spanish, and that it can only be used where something indefinite is referred to.

El ha dicho *lo* siguiente, esto es:  
He has said the following, that is:

## SINGULAR

Aquel (masc.)	este,	ese,	el,	( <i>el, he, him</i> ),
Aquello (neut.),	esto,	eso,	lo,	( <i>ello, it</i> ),

Aquellos (masc., neut.)	estos,	esos,	los,	( <i>ellos, they, them</i> ), (3)
Aquellas (fem.)	estas,	esas,	las,	( <i>ellas, they, them</i> ). (4)

En *lo* más mínimo.

In the most least (at the very least).

En *lo* sucesivo.

In the future.

Por *lo* pronto.

For the present.

Hemos enviado la cadena: puede V. contar con *ella* esta vez  
We have sent the chain: you can count with (on) *her* (it) this time.

Hemos enviado las cadenas: puede V. contar con *ellos*. (4)  
We have sent the chains: you may count on them.

Hay una venta pública, ¿puede V. asistir a *ella*? (Obs. 4)  
There is a public sale, can you attend to her (be present at it)?

El muchacho desea vender esta cadena, pero no consiento en *ello*.  
The boy wishes to sell this chain, but I do not consent to *it*. (5)

*Pronouns used conjunctively*

NOTE — A pronoun is conjunctive when it serves to unite two sentences, as  
*I have the book which you require* (= I have a book. You require *ti* is book).

El libro que está aquí es *mío*.  
The book that is here is mine.

El libro que V. tiene es *mío*.  
The book that your G. has is mine.

El hombre que está aquí.  
The man who (or that) is here.

El hombre que yo veo.  
The man whom (or that) I see.

(3) The masculine plural and neuter plural are alike.

(4) **Ellas**, feminine, because it represents CADENAS which is feminine. So *ella* in the preceding sentence.

(5) **ELLO** does not refer to CADENA, but represents VENDER ESTA CADENA, to sell this chain, and is therefore neuter. In all cases where a pronoun represents a phrase it will be neuter.

Veo un hombre *quien* (or *que*) es muy pobre.  
I see a man who (that) is very poor.

El hombre de *quien* (not de *que*) habla V.  
The man of whom you speak.

Los hombres con *quienes* (not *con que*) trabajan V. son Franceses.  
The men with whom (pl.) you work are French.

**Nota** — While *que*, (*that*) is much used conjunctively in the place of *quien*, (*who*), it is never so used after prepositions. Just as in English one could not say "*the man of that you speak*" for "*the man of whom you speak*". But *CON QUE*, *DE QUE* etc., is used in referring to things.

El libro *de que* habla V. La casa *en que* estamos.  
The book of which your G. speaks. The house in which we are.

#### *El cual, la cual* (fem.) for *que* or *quien*

Tengo un libro, **el cual** (or *que*) es muy interesante.  
I have a book the which (which) is very interesting.

Tengo una carta, **la cual** (or *que*) es muy interesante.  
I have a letter, the which is very interesting.

Aquí está la carta *de la cual* (or *de que*) habla V.  
Here is the letter, of the which your G. speaks.

Los hombres de **los cuales** (de quienes) hablamos.  
The men of the which (of whom) we speak.

Las mujeres de **las cuales** (de quienes) hablamos.  
The women of the which (of whom) we speak.

¿Dónde vive la mujer *a la cual* (a quien) ha escrito V.?  
Where lives the woman to the which (to whom) has written your G.?

¿Dónde vive el hombre **a el cual** (a quien) ha escrito V.? (6)  
Where lives the man to the which (to whom) has written your G.?

¿Dónde vive el hombre **del cual** (de quien) habla V.? (7)  
Where lives the man of the which speaks your G.?

It will be seen that **EL CUAL**, **LA CUAL** (fem.) may be used in place of either *QUE* or *QUIEN*.

#### *Cuyo, cuya* (fem.) used conjunctively

El muchacho *cuyo* padre está en el campo.  
The boy whose father is in the field.

El árbol *cuya* fruta está madura.  
The tree whose fruit is ripe.

(6) Remember that *A EL* contracts to *AL* and *DE EL* to *DEL*.

(7) The pronouns *qui*, *quien*, *cual*, when used conjunctively, do not take the graphic accent.

El hombre *cuyos* hijos están en el campo.  
The man whose sons are in the field.

El hombre *cuyas* hijas están en el campo. (8)  
The man whose daughters are in the field.

### El que, la que (*fem.*)

Este libro es bueno, pero prefiero *el que* V. tiene.  
This book is good, but I prefer the one which your G. has.

Esta carta o *la que* V. tiene.  
This letter or that (one) which your G. has.

Estos libros y *los que* V. tiene.  
These books and those which your G. has

Estas casas y *las que* V. tiene.  
These houses and those which your G. has.

Pedro es *él que* ha hecho esto.  
Peter is the one who has done this.

Maria es *la que* ha dicho esto.      El es á quien debo la vida.  
Mary is the one who has said this.      He is the one to whom I owe life.

### The neuter lo que

Esto es *lo que* V. desea.      Digo *lo que* siento.  
This is that which (what) you want.      I say that which (what) I think.

¿Escucha V. *lo que* digo?      No sé *lo que* quiero. (9)  
Hears your G. that which (what) I say?      I dont know what I want.

Deseo saber *lo que* V. cree que podemos hacer.  
I desire to know what you think that we can do.

He estado en París, *lo que* me ha hecho mucho bien. (10)  
I have been in Paris, (a thing) which has done me much good.

¿Comprende V. *todo lo que* digo?  
Understands your G. all that I say?

No es todo oro *lo que* reluce.  
It is not all gold that which glitters.

### El de, la de (*fem.*)

Mi libro y *el de* V.  
My book and that of your G.

Mi pluma y *la de* V.  
My pen and that of your G.

(8) *Cuyo* is a possessive pronoun (sometimes an adjective), and like all possessives, agree with the *thing* possessed.

(9) English generally uses *what* for *that which*.

(10) The *which* does not refer to Paris, but the *being in Paris*, hence the neuter *LO QUE*.

Mis libros y los de V.

My books and those of your G.

Mis plumas y las de V.

My pens and those of your G.

Estas telas son superiores a las de Italia.

These cloths are superior to those of Italy.

### Que si, que no

¿Cree V. que esto es bueno?

Thinks your G. that this is good?

Creo que sí.

I think that yes (I think so).

Creo que no (pienso que no).

I think that no (I think not).

Digo que sí.

I say that yes (I say yes, or, that it is).

Verdad que sí.

Truth that yes (it's really so).

Por supuesto que V. habla español.

For granted (=of course) that you speak S.

Por supuesto que sí.

For granted that yes (of course).

¿Habla V. español?

Speaks your G. Spanish?

Por supuesto.

For granted (of course).

Por supuesto que no.

Of course not.

(2) The *o* is also dropped from **PRIMERO** and **TERCERO** when these adjectives come immediately before their nouns.

(3) **Cualquier** is derived from **CUAL**, which, and **QUIERA**, *you may like*, hence the plural **CUALESQUIERA**. It generally drops the *a* when coming immediately before its noun. The ending **QUIERA** does not change for plural or for gender.

Which book do you G.?	Whichever you please (= either).
Deseo <i>cualquier</i> libro.	
I desire whatsoever book (any book at all).	
Deseo <i>algunos cualesquier</i> libros.

No diré esto á <i>quienquier</i> .	
I shall not tell this to whomsoever (to any one whatever).	
Esta casa es más alta que <i>cualquiera otra de la ciudad</i> .	
This house is more high than whatsoever other of the city.	

**Grande and ciento**

Esta casa es muy grande.	Es una <i>gran</i> casa. (4)
This house is very large.	It is a large house.
Más vale un pájaro en la mano que <i>ciento</i> volando.	
More is worth a bird in the hand than (a) hundred flying.	
Tengo cien pájaros.	Cien mil pájaros.
I have (a) hundred birds.	A hundred thousand b.
	One thousand one hundred.

Nobody is perfect.	Nobody speaks of your G.
Nada es más fácil que esto.	Sin preguntar nada á nadie. (6)
Nothing is more easy than this.	Without asking nothing to nobody.

**Alguno, ninguno**

Tengo algunos libros (*or* tengo *unos* libros).  
I have some books.

¿Tiene V. algunos libros (*or* tiene V. libros)? (7)  
Has your G. any books?

(4) GRANDE when used before a noun (masc. or fem.) beginning with a consonant, drops the final *de*. In the plural the full form GRANDES is used.

(5) CIENTO drops the final *to* before a noun. UN is not used before CIENTO or MIL.

(6) NADA and NADIE although negatives, take NO before the verb, when the verb precedes them. (See Les. 6 Obs. 8 )

(7) In the interrogative English uses the word *any* instead of *some*.

*¿Tiene V. alguna cosa (= algo) que hacer?*  
Has your G. anything which to do?

*¿Ha estado V. alguna vez (jamás) en París? (8)*  
Has been your G. any time (ever) in Paris?

*Algunos* de estos libros tienen veinte páginas.  
Some of these books have twenty pages.

*Algumas* de estas casas tienen seis cuartos.  
Some of these houses have six rooms.

*El* está en *alguna parte*.  
He is in some place (somewhere).

*No* está en *ninguna parte*.      *No* quiero *ninguna casa*. (9)  
He is not in not any (no) place (nowhere) I dont want no house.

*No* quiero aceptar *ninguna cosa* (*nada*).

(11) **Algun** for **ALGUNO**, **NINGUN** for **NINGUNO**; these words being compounds of **uno**, drop the **o** if they immediately precede their nouns.

(14) **Mismo** thus placed after a noun or pronoun, serves to emphasize the latter, much as the word *self* does in English. Old English also made frequent use of the expression *self-same*. French similarly uses the word *même*.

(15) **Sí** is only used in reference to the subject of the verb, so that **MISMO** does not add much to its meaning.

(17) *E* is the old form of *y* and is used instead of the latter before a word beginning with *i* (or *hi*, since *h* is silent). The reason for this is obvious.  
*U i-* is used instead of *e* before a word beginning with *o* (or *ho*).

## Lección Novena

### THE DIRECT OBJECT

Amo mi libro.  
I love my book.

Veo la puerta.  
I see the door.

Amo **a** mi madre.  
I love my mother.

Veo **a** la señora.  
I see the lady.

Veo **al** perro. (1)  
I see the dog.

NOTE A.— The preposition **a** is generally thus used before the *direct object* of a verb when that object represents a *living thing* such as *man, dog, etc.* This rule is not absolute and may be disregarded. It is fairly well followed, however, especially when the word representing the *living thing* is *particular or definite*, that is, preceded by a definite adjective, like *this, the, my, your, his, our*. (Words like *some, a, several, many, one, two, three, etc.* are *indefinite*, since they do not specify any *particular object*).

¿A quién buscas V.? Busco *un* médico.  
Whom seeks your G.? I seek a doctor. I seek the doctor (*lit. to the*).

¿Qué busca V.? Busco *algunos* amigos.  
What seeks your G.? I seek some friends. (*indefinite*)

Veo **a** este caballero.  
I see this gentleman.

Veo *seis* caballeros.  
I see six gentlemen.

Conozco **a** este caballero.  
I know this gentleman.

Conozco *muchos* caballeros.  
I know several gentlemen.

NOTE B.— **A** is also used to distinguish the object from the subject in a sentence like, *Rige al nombre la preposición*, (the preposition governs the noun). Without this **a** this sentence might mean that *the noun governs the preposition*.

**A** is never used to indicate the object when the verb is **TENER**, (TENGO MI PERRITO, not **A** MI PERRITO), nor should it be so used when there is a dative in the sentence (i. e. when the regular preposition **A, to**, occurs). Thus, Doy MI PERRITO AL MUCHACHO, *I give my dog to the boy*, not Doy **A** MI PERRITO AL MUCHACHO.

Estoy muy contento de ver **a** V.  
I am very glad of seeing your G. (glad to see your G.).

### The position of the pronoun-object

El hombre **nos** conoce.  
The man us knows (knows us).

El hombre **os** conoce. (2)  
The man knows you. (pl.)

(1) The **a** of course joins with **el**, giving **al**.

(2) The object, when a pronoun, is placed before the verb. The pronoun **vos** in such case drops the **v**, becoming **os**.

Veo al muchacho. **Le** veo. Veo á la señora. **La** veo. (3)  
 I see the boy. Him I see. I see the lady. Her I see.

¿Conoce V. á este hombre? **Le** conozco muy bien. **Los** conozco.  
 Knows your G. this man? Him I know very well. Them I know.

Conozco á esta señora. **La** conozco. **Las** conozco. (4)  
 I know this lady. Her I know. Them (fem.) I know.

¿Ha visto V. mi perro? No **le** he visto.  
 Has your G. seen my dog? Not him I have seen.

¿Ha visto V. mis libros? Yo los he visto. Yo no los he visto.  
 Has seen your G. my booke? I them have seen. I haven't seen them.

¿Ha leido V. los periódicos? No los he leido.  
 Has read your G. the papers? I haven't read them.

Él nos ha visto. Él os ha visto.  
 He us has seen. He you (pl.) has seen.

¿Tiene V. mi libro? Si, le tengo.  
 Has your G. my book? Yes, him (it) I have.

¿Tiene V. mis libros? Los tengo.  
 Has your G. my booke? Them I have.

¿Tiene V. mi carta? La tengo. (5)  
 Has your G. my letter? Her (it) I have.

¿Tiene V. mis cartas? Las tengo. No las tengo.  
 Has your G. my letters? Them (fem.) I have. I haven't them.

#### The neuter lo

¿Cree V. esto? Lo creo. No lo creo.  
 Believes your G. this? I believe it. I dont believe it.

¿Quiere V. saber esto? Lo quiero mucho.  
 Desires your G. to know this? I desire it much.

El muchacho es malo. ¿Quién lo dice? Yo lo digo.  
 The boy is bad. Who says it (who says so)? I say it (so).

Estoy malo. Lo siento mucho. ¡Cuánto lo siento!  
 I am ill. I feel it much (am very sorry). How I feel it (regret it).

(3) Notice that when *him* and *her* are objects of a verb they are placed in Spanish before the verb, the form *le* being used instead of **EL** and **LA** instead of **ELLAS**.

(4) Notice that **LOS** and **LAS** are used instead of *ellos* and *ellas*. We would never say *ellos* (or *ellas*) *conozco*.

(5) **La**, feminine, because referring to **CARTA**.

¿Como lo pasa V. hoy?  
How does your G. pass it to-day (how do you feel to-day)?

No lo hemos hecho tan mal.  
We haven't done (it) so badly.

### *Lo often used for le or la*

Strictly speaking *Lo* only applies to the indefinite *it*. The names of definite things, such as *book*, *table*, etc., are either masc. or fem., and the proper form to use in referring to these things is either *le* or *la* (fem.). However *Lo* is much used for *LE* and *LA*, when *things* (not persons) are referred to. (6)

¿Habla V. el español?  
Speaks your G. the Spanish?

Yo **lo** hablo un poco.  
I speak it a little.

¿Tiene V. mi libro?  
Has your G. my book?

Yo **lo** (or *le*) tengo.  
I have it.

¿Ha tomado V. mi libro? Lo he tomado. No lo he tomado. (7)  
Has taken your G. my book? I have taken it. I haven't taken it.

### *The Dative le, les (pl.)*

¿Qué da V. al muchacho? —  
What gives your G. to the boy?

**Le** doy un libro.  
To him I give a book.

¿Qué da V. á la muchacha? —  
What gives your G. to the girl?

**Le** doy una rosa.  
To her I give a rose.

¿Qué da V. á los maestros? —  
What gives your G. to the masters?

**Les** doy libros.  
To them I give books.

¿Qué da V. á las señoritas? —  
What gives your G. to the ladies?

**Les** doy rosas. (8)  
To them I give roses.

*Le* estoy muy agradecido.  
To him I am very grateful.

¿Qué ha dicho V. á este señor?  
What has said your G. to this gentleman?

No *le* he dicho nada.  
I didn't say nothing to him.

¿Qué ha dado V. á mi hermana?  
What has given your G. to my sister?

*Le* he dado una rosa.  
To her I have given a rose.

¿Qué ha dado V. á estas señoritas?  
What has given your G. to these ladies?

*Les* he dado rosas.  
To them I have given roses.

(6) But do not however use **ELLO** for **ELLA** or **ÉL** in similar cases.

(7) Be careful not to separate the past participle from its auxiliary verb.

(8) It will be noticed that the preposition *á* is not expressed with the dative pronoun. In English the *to* may also be omitted, thus, *I give him (or them) the roses*, or *I gave to them the roses*. It is important to distinguish the dative from the accusative (direct object), thus, *I gave the girl (dative) her way* and, *I gave the girl (acc.) away*, or *I cut him (dat.) a piece*, and *I cut him (acc.) in pieces*.

## LECCION NOVENA

It must be remembered that the forms *le, la, lo, las, los*, etc. are only used as the direct objects of verbs. After prepositions the forms are *EL, ELLA, ELLAS, ELLOS*, etc.

Tengo libros *para él*.  
I have books for him.

*Le amo.*  
Him I love.

Tengo libros *para ella*.  
I have books for her.

*La amo.*  
Her I love.

Trabajo *con ellos*.  
I work with them.

*Los amo.*  
I love them.

*With Prepositions*

él, him,  
ella, her,  
ello, it, (indef.)  
ellos, them,  
ellas, them, (fem.)

*Accusative*

le, him,  
la, her,  
lo, it, (indef.)

What says he of him?      What says he of it?      He is satisfied with it.

*Position of pronoun-object with an  
INFINITIVE, IMPERATIVE, or PARTICIPLE*

¿Dónde está el muchacho?  
Where is the boy?

No puedo verle.  
I canoot see-him.

Deseo verle.

I desire to see him.

Deseo verla.

I desire to see her.

Deseo verlos.

I desire to see them.

Aquí vienen mis hermanas, deseo verlas. (9)  
Here come my sisters, I desire to see them. (fem.)

Quiero una pluma, pero no puedo comprarla.  
I want a pen, but cannot huy-her.

Tengo unas flores, quiero darlas á mi hermana.  
I have some flowers, I wish to give-them to my sister.

¿Puede V. hacer esto?      No puedo hacerlo.      No quiero hacerlo.  
Can your G. do this?      I cannot do-it.      I dont want to do-it.

Aquí viene mi hermana, tengo algo que decirle. (dative)  
Here comes my sister, I have something (which) to tell to her.

Veo mis hermanos, quiero verlos, tengo algo que decirles.  
I see my brothers, I want to see them, I have something to tell to them.

(9) It will be seen that the pronoun object is attached to the end of an infinitive instead of preceding it as in the case of a finite verb.

Aquí vienen mis amigos, tengo algo que darles.  
Here come my friends, I have something to give to them.

Deseamos sentarnos. Deseamos levantarnos.  
We desire to seat ourselves (sit down). We desire to raise ourselves (get up).

La gramática es el arte de expresarnos correctamente.  
(The) grammar is the art of expressing us (ourselves) correctly.

¿No tiene V. otra cosa que enseñarnos? No quiero enseñarlos.  
Has not your G. anything else to teach us? I don't want to teach you (pl.)  
Tengo un reloj, estoy dándole cuerda.  
have a watch, I am giving it cord (winding it up).

Viéndole, viéndola, viéndolo, viéndolos, viéndonos. (10)  
Seeing him, seeing her, seeing it, seeing them, seeing us.

Hágalo V. por amor de Dios.  
May your G. do it for the love of God (for heaven's sake).

Dígalos. Tómelos. Tómelos. (11)  
May your G. say it (or Say it). May your G. take her. Take them.  
Enséñenlos eso. Voy á hacerlo.  
Teach us that. I am going to do it (to do eo).

Tenga V. la bondad de hablar alto.  
May your G. have the goodness (of) to speak high (loud).

Dénos V. un cuarto.  
May your G. give us a room.

Tengo una pluma, deseo cortarla, ¿tiene V. una corta-pluma?  
I have a pen (quill), I wish to cut it, has your G. a pen-knife (pen-cutter)?

NOTE — Once more we would remind the student that the pronoun-object should always precede its verb, except when that verb is an infinitive, a present participle, or an imperative (or subjunctive used imperatively).

(10) It will be seen that the pronoun-object is also joined to the end of a present participle.

(11) The true imperative forms are only used in the 2nd. person, but as we generally use the third person in addressing one in Spanish, we are obliged to use the subjunctive in place of the imperative. The above forms are therefore subjunctives used imperatively.

## Lección Décima

### *The pronouns continued*

?Qué dice él de mí?

What says he of me?

?Qué dice él de tí?

What says he of thee?

Él habla le sí.

He speaks of him(self).

Él *me* da un beso.

He to me gives a kiss.

El se compra un sombrero.

He for him(self) buys a hat.

Él **me** ama.

He me loves.

Él **te** ama.

He thee loves.

Él **se** engaña.

He him(self) deceives.

Él **te** da el dinero.

He to thee gives the money.

¿Me comprende V.?

Do you understand me?

NOTE — We have already seen that the pronoun-object must precede its verb. Now when MI, TI, SI, are pronoun-objects they change i to e, becoming ME, TE, SE.

Los niños **se** divierten.

The children them(selves) amuse.

Ellos **se** engañan.

They them(selves) deceive.

No me gusta este libro.

Not to me pleases this book (this book does not please me).

Me gusta el te muy dulce.

To me pleases the tea very sweet (I like tea very sweet).

Me parece que V. **se** engaña.

To me it seems that your G. deceives himself (is mistaken).

A mí me parece que eso no es verdad. (1)

To me it to me seems that that is not true.

A nosotros nos parece que V. **se** engaña.

To us it to us seems that your G. deceives himself.

A él no le gusta el libro.

To him not to him pleases the book.

¡A mí qué me importa!

To me what to me does it matter!

¿Cómo se llama V.?

How does your G. call himself (what is your name)?

(1) For emphasis or contrast the pronoun is repeated with the preposition. The form used with a preposition differs from the form used as object of a verb.

Yo me llamo Juan.	
I call me (myself) John (my name is John).	
¿Cómo se encuentra V. hoy?	
How does your G. find himself to-day?	
No me siento bien.	Me duele la cabeza.
I dont feel myself well.	To me pains the head (my head aches).
¿No se engaña V.?	
Does not your G. deceive himself (are you not mistaken)?	
Él me ha dicho esto.	Él me ha dado un libro.
He to me has told this.	He to me .. given a book.

NOTE — It will be remembered that when a pronoun is the object of an *infinitive*, a *present participle*, or an *imperative*, it is attached to the end of these forms.

El muchacho viene á verme.	¿Quiere V. acompañarme?
The boy comes to see me.	Does your G. wish to accompany me?
Él va á enviar me á París.	¿Quiere V. pasarme el pan?
He is going to send me to Paris.	Will your G. pass me the bread?
Él debe afeitarse.	¿Desea V. lavarse?
He must shave himself.	Does your G. desire to wash himself?
Déme V. fosforos.	Dispónseme V.
May y. G. give me matches.	Escúcheme.
Présteme V. su reloj.	Siéntese V.
May your G. lend me his watch.	May your G. seat himself (sit down).
Levántese V.	
May your G. raise himself (get up or stand up).	
Dése prisa.	
May your G. give yourself haste (make haste).	
No estoy listo, estoy alistandome.	
I am not ready, I am preparing myself (getting ready).	
Está haciendo tarde.	
It is making itself late (it is becoming late).

*The third person used for second person*

NOTE — We have already seen that the third person in Spanish replaces to a large extent the 2nd. person. We will here give further examples :

V. no tiene su libro.  
Your G. hasn't his book.

V. se engaña, voy á darle su libro.

Your G. deceives himself, I am going to give him (you) his book.

Voy á darle á V. su libro.

I am going to give him (your G.) his book (going to give you your book).

Yo le doy su libro.

I to him give his book (or I give you your book).

A él yo le doy su libro.

To him I give him his book (I give him his book).

A V. yo le doy su libro. (2)

To your G. I give him his book (I give you your book).

Yo le he dado mi libro.

I have given him's your G.) my book.

Le doy las gracias, cabellero.

I give him (you) thanks, sir.

Les doy las gracias, cabelleros.

I give them (your Graces) thanks, gentlemen.

Le doy á V. las gracias.

I give to him (your G.) thanks.

Les doy á ustedes las gracias.

I give to them (your Graces) thanks.

¿Cómo le va?

How goes it to him (y. G.), how are you? In what can I serve him (you) sir?

Quiero darle algo.

I want to give you something.

Voy á hacerle una visita.

I am going to make him (y. G.) a visit.

Caballeros, tengo algo que decirles.

Gentlemen, I have something to tell to them (your Graces).

Yo le estoy á V. muy agradecido, señor.

I am to him (to your G.) very grateful, sir.

A V. le gusta andar á pie.

To your G. it pleases him to go on foot.

A VV. les gusta andar en coche.

To your Graces it pleases them to go in a carriage.

No le conozco, señor.

I dont know him (y. G.) sir.

No le conozco á V., señor.

I dont know him (y. G.) sir.

Le doy los buenos días, señor.

I bid to him (y. G.) good day, sir. (I bid you good day, sir).

Yo le digo á V. adiós hasta mañana.

I bid to him (y. G.) adieu until to-morrow.

¿Cuánto le debe á V.?

How much do I owe to him (y. G.) Your G. owes me nothing.

(2) Where ambiguity might exist, we may add A EL OR A USTED according to the meaning. In many cases the context will make it clear who is meant.

*¿Le gusta el vino?* or *¿Le gusta á V. el vino?*  
To him (your G.) pleases the wine?

*¿Quiere V. vino?* *Si le gusta á V.*  
Wishes y. G. some wine? If it pleases to him (y. G.) = if you please.  
*¿Quiere V. pan?* *Si le gusta.*  
Does y. G. wish some bread? If it pleases to him = if you please.

*Quiero hacerle una pregunta.*  
I wish to make him (y. G.) a question (to ask you a question).

*Le pido á V. mil perdones, señor.*  
I ask him (y. G.) a thousand pardons, sir.

*Les pido á VV. mil perdones, señores. (3)*  
I ask to them (your Graces) a thousand pardons, gentlemen.

*Yo le digo á V. la verdad.*  
I tell him (your Grace) the truth.

*No les conozco á ustedes, señores.*  
I dont know them (your Graces) gentlemen (= I dont know yon).

*¿Les han dado á ustedes mis libros?*  
Have they given to them (your Graces) my books?

#### *Verbs used reflexively*

*Yo me lavo, I me wash.* (tu te lavas), *él se lava,*  
*Nosotros nos lavamos, we us wash,* (vosotros os laváis), *ellos se lavan.*

*Debe afeitarme nhora*  
I must shave myself now.

*V. se ha engañado.*  
Your G. has deceived himself.

*¿Cómo se llama V.?*  
How calls himself your G.?

*Yo me llamo Juan.*  
I call me John (call myself John).

*Yo me siento.*  
I seat myself (I sit down).

*Quiero sentarme.*  
I wish to seat myself.

*Yo me acuesto.*  
I lay me down (lie down, go to bed).

*Deseo acostarme.*  
I desire to lay me down (go to bed).

*Yo me levanto.*  
I me raise (get up, or stand up).

*Deseamos levantarnos.*  
We desire to raise us (get up).

*Yo me equivoco.*  
I mislead myself (am mistaken).

*V. se equivoca.*  
Y. G. misleads himself (is mistaken).

*Deseo tomar un baño.* or  
I desire to take a bath.

*Deseo bañarme.*  
I desire to bathe myself = take a bath.

*Él va á casarse.*  
He is going to marry himself (get married).

(3) A **V.** and a **VV.** (a USTEDES) may be omitted in most sentences of this kind without causing much ambiguity.

**Él va a casarse con la hija del señor Ribera.**

He is going to marry himself (get married) with the daughter of, etc.

**El tren se para aquí. (4)**

The train stops itself here. May y. G. serve himself to enter (please enter).

**Sirvase sentarse.**

May y. G. serve himself to seat himself

**Sirváense entrar, caballeros.**

May your Graces serve themselves to enter (please enter).

**Estos caballeros se paracen mucho, uno á otro.**

These gentlemen resemble themselves much the one to the other (each other).

**Estas hermanas se paracen, una á otra.**

These sisters resemble themselves the one to the other.

**Estos caballeros se gustan uno á otro.**

These gentlemen please themselves the one to the other (please each other).

**Me alegra mucho saberlo.**

I rejoice myself much to know it (I am glad to know it).

NOTE — It will be seen that the verbs are used reflexively in Spanish in a great many cases where English would not use a reflexive construction. Some Spanish verbs are only used reflexively. In Spanish we often use a dative reflexive pronoun, as in the following examples:

**Yo me acuerdo de esto.**

I recall to myself of that (remember about that).

**Yo me acuerdo de mis amigos.**

I recall to myself of my friends (remember my friends).

**Yo no puedo acordarme de esto.**

I cannot recall to myself about that (I cannot remember that).

**Uno no pue<sup>l</sup>a acordarse de todo.**

One cannot recall to him of all (one cannot remember everything).

**Quítate el sombrero.**

May your G. remove to himself the hat (take off your hat).

**Me duele la cabeza.**

To me pains the head (my head aches).

**¿Se acuerda V. de mí? (5)**

Does your G. recall to yourself of me?

(4) **El (ELLA, ELLO)** has the *special* reflexive form **SE**, which also answers for the plural **ELLOS**, but the other pronouns have no special reflexive form.

(5) It is evident that in all these examples the reflexive pronoun is dative.

## Lección Undécima

### The pronouns continued

(1) Se is used instead of LE or LES before le, la, lo, los or las, as it is more easily distinguished from the latter than le or les.

(2) Since SE may mean him, her or them, we may add the explanatory A EL or A ELLA, etc. after it, as above.

Aquí viene mi hermana, voy a prestarle mi libro.  
Here comes my sister, I am going to lend her my book.

Yo se lo presto á ella.  
I lend it to her.

Yo se lo presto á él.  
I lend it to him.

Yo se lo presto al muchacho.  
I lend it to him, to the boy.

¿Me da V. su libro?  
Gives your G. his book to me?

Se lo doy (for *le* lo doy).  
To him (your G.) I give it.

Se lo doy á V.  
To him (your G.) I give it.

No se lo doy á V. (3)  
I dont give it to him (your G.).

No puedo dárselo á V.  
I cannot give it to him (your G.).

No puedo decírselo  
I cannot tell it to him (your G.).

Yo se lo presto á V. mi libro.  
I lend him (your G.) my book.

¿Se los ha dado ella?  
Has she given them to him (your G.)? Ella no me los ha dado.  
She has not given them to me.

Déselos al muchacho.  
May your G. give them to him, to the boy.

Se lo agradezco infinito.  
I acknowledge it to you infinitely (thank you much for it).

#### *Idiomatic use of lo*

Yo creo que el perro está aquí. — Yo lo creo tambien.  
I believe that the dog is here. I believe it also (believe so too)

Haga V. una lista de estos artículos.  
May your G. make a list of these articles. Lo haré.  
I will do it (do so).

El español es muy fácil.  
Spanish is very easy. No, no lo es.  
Nn, it is not (so).

¿Eres mi amigo?  
Art thou my friend? Lo soy. (4)  
I am (that).

V. es Español.  
Your G. is Spanish. ¿Quién lo dice?  
Who says so?

¿Está mi hermano aquí?  
Is my brother here? No lo sé. (5)  
I dont know (it).

(3) If *him* refers to *your Grace*, we may add a V. after it.

(4) To merely answer *soy* would not be considered in Spanish as complete.  
*I am what?* *I am the aforesaid.* Compare the French *JE LE SUIS*.

(5) *I dont know* (whether he is or not = *lo*).

*Idiomatic use of reflexive verbs*

**El globo se divide en dos hemisferios**

The globe divides itself (is divided) into two parts.

**¿Cómo se llama esto en español?**

How does this call itself in Spanish (what is this called in Spanish).

Se llama "libro".

It calls itself (is called) "book".

**¿Cómo se dice esto en español?**

How does this say itself in Spanish (how is this said in S.)

Aquí se habla español.

Here Spanish speaks itself (is spoken).

Aquí se vende pan.

Here bread sells itself (is sold).

Ya no se usan las plumas de ganso.

Now goose quills do not use themselves (are not used).

Se dice que el señor García está en París. (6).

It says itself (it is said) that Mr. Garcia is in Paris.

Aquí se ven todas clases de casas.

Here all kinds of houses see themselves (are seen).

Aquí se ve la catedral.

Here the cathedral sees itself (is seen).

Mis niños se educan aquí. (7)

My children are educating themselves here (are being educated here).

Todos los días se aprende algo más.

Every day something new learns itself (is learned).

It will be seen that the idiomatic use of the reflexive largely takes the place of passive voice in Spanish. Indeed the Spanish passive is little used.

I hie me to-morrow (am going away to-morrow).

*¿Adónde va V.?*

Whither is your G. going?

We us hie.

Ellos se van.

They themselves hie.

*Yo debo irme.*

I must hie me.

Debemos irnos.

We must hie us.

He must hie himself.

*No se vaya V. tan pronto.*

May not your G. hie himself so soon (dont go away so soon).

NOTE — It will be seen that *ir* means *to go*, while *irse* has the meaning of *to go away*. The same distinction is made between *DORMIR*, *to sleep*, and *DO-  
MIRSE*, *to fall asleep*.

I remain (am) to you very grateful.

*Ese lugar queda (está) bastante lejos de aquí.*

It will be seen that the Future tense is formed by adding to the Infinitive of a verb the forms of the Present of HABER (viz. *he*, *hemos*, etc.) The *h* not being pronounced is dropped, thus, PARTIR, EL PARTIRÁ (= *partirha*), he will depart, TEMER, ELLOS TEMERAN (= *temerhan*), they will fear. It is on this plan that the Future of all verbs is formed.

Give the 3rd. person, singular and plural, Future, of the following :

*Hablar, comer, escribir, ver, llamar, enviar.*

The Perfect tense is simply the Present of HABER used with a past participle of a verb. Now the past participle is obtained by adding *do* to the stem of the verb : **AMADO**, **PARTIDO**, **TEMIDO**, (*e* changing to *i*).

Give the past participle of the following verbs :

*Hablar, comer, llamar, enviar, salir.*

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(4) The verb takes the ending *s* when the subject is *tu*, and *is* when the subject is *vos*. But *1-is* contracts to *is*.

*Use of the Perfect tense*

The Perfect tense is used like the English Perfect (*I have loved*), but also like the English Preterite (*I loved*). Thus if we wish to say in Spanish *I wrote a letter yesterday*, we would say **yo he escrito UNA CARTA AYER.** (5)

The student should practice using both the Perfect and the Future until he can employ them without hesitation in expressing himself.

## THE SUBJUNCTIVE MOOD

The Subjunctive is much used in Spanish, replacing to a large extent the Imperative. When we request or *order* a person to do anything, we use the third person of the Subjunctive.

## THE ART OF SPEECH

To learn to translate or write a language is one thing, to speak it is another. Many persons succeed in the former, who utterly fail in the latter. What is the secret of translating? The mastery of the main principles of syntax (without necessarily touching on the technicalities) and the possession of a vocabulary more or less extensive.

The secret of learning to speak is this: committing to memory ready-made phrases and using them as the occasion arises. The student who in studying a text-book contents himself with merely translating, without attempting to commit to memory the common phrases he meets with, never learns to speak the language he is studying.

Speaking does not mean *composing*, it rather means uttering constructions that have been well committed to memory. This self evident truth has been much overlooked by teachers, but has been recognized by some, and hence there are a number of methods for learning languages which contain no grammar whatsoever, but merely phrases for the student to memorize.

*Where these methods fail*

The utter lack of any system, order or gradation in these phrase-methods is really amazing and is quite enough to condemn them. But what renders them absolutely valueless is that they contain no word of explanation of the constructions or idioms given, and it is extremely difficult, if not impossible, for a student to memorize phrases which he does not clearly understand.

We have in the preceding pages introduced the student in a practical way to the general syntax of Spanish, being careful to explain all idiomatic constructions met with, and we think we have placed him in a position where he can intelligently memorize the common phrases of Spanish speech, and that he can do this without great effort. Let him remember it is not sufficient to memorize the phrases, he must use them.
