





EDMONTON, Alta, Sept. 4.—An alusion to the demand of the west for eciprocity was made in the civic address to the Duke of Connaught presented by Mayor Armstrong.

"It is incumbent upon us. if we are true to our best interests, to use all lawful endeavors to enlarge our commercial bounds in order that a ready market may be obtained for our ever-increasing products of the soil, to the end that our people may know that they are subject to only fair, commercial and economic laws and in order that the very best results may be obtained, for thus, and thus only, shall content and loyalty rest upon permanent and abiding basis."

In his reply the duke made no reference to this passage, doubtless on the ground that it savored too much of politics.

Facilities and Privileges for Canadian Farmers and Protection for British Artisans in Colonial Markets Would Insure Cheaper Food and Larger Market for Canadians

hearty endorsation of the Imperial policy of the Borden Government was given The World last night by John W. Dennis, of Lincolnshire, Eng., a large ritish land-owner, who was in Toronto esterday. Mr. Dennis was formerly mayor of Westminster, and has been a member of the British Tariff mission since its inauguration by Joseph Chamberjain. He is also one of the leading members of the British Unionist Party, and in all probability will contest a seat at the next British

Mr. Borden has made a powerful impression in England by means of his broad and statesmanlike views on the policy of Canada as a unit in the Imperial whole and as a factor in determining the policy of the Empire, declared Mr. Dennis.

Imperial Preference. Imperial Preference.

"As regards imperial preference, I have been studying the question closely from all points of view, for a number of years, and I am looking forward with a considerable amount of confidence to the next opportunity that the British electors will have of voting on the tariff question. I do not think that the opportunity is far distant. When it does come, the British workingman will show that the dear food bogy is dead, as far as he is concerned, and he will be ready to support a policy that will provide him with greater earning power and, therefore, greater spending power.

"A part of the policy adopted by the Unionist Party that is well-known here in Canada is in regard to the treatment of preference to colonial products.

Greatest Importer.

"The chief exportable surplus product of the Dominion of Canada will be food products and the greatest food product importer in the world is Great Britain. If Canada can dispose of her surplus food products to Great Britain at considerably better; terms than other countries it follows that the market for the Canadian products will be to a very large degree extended.

"This necessarily implies no diminution of competition which the British farmer would have to meet. It will be the competition of his kith and kin, but it will be more the less palatable on that account. Unless a scheme is devised to offset such competition to an extent which will place the British farmer on a level with the Canadian farmer in British markets.





Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years to do may homestead a quarter section of available Duminion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, sen, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties,—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occapied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
