Address Was Passed the House of Commons Without a Division.

ASKATCHEWAN DECLARED VACANT.
Chorley Devlin, the Young Man From Wigan, Grows Quite Excited

When Taunted by Mr. Dupont Regarding His Course on the Remedial Bill—Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper Deals With Pariah Politicians From the Maritime Provinces—Sir Oliver's Maiden Speech in the Senate and Senator Ferguson's Apt Criticisms.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The principal feature of to-day's discussion in the House has been the scorching which Sir C. H. Tupper gave to the new Minister of Finance. The aggressive and aggressive the sharp points made by the late Solicitor-General.

Mr. Laurier informed Mr. Lemieux that the Government had not considered whether it would take part in the Paris Exposition in 1900. Mr. Laurier said that as soon as the Speaker's attention was called to the fact of the vacancy in the proper way, the Premier would accept the nomination. Sir Charles Tupper thereupon formally notified the Speaker that the seat was vacant.

Mr. McCarthy suggested that it would be well for Sir Charles to withdraw the Speaker should issue his warrant for the election of another member. Sir Charles accordingly made that motion and it was duly carried.

Mr. Dupont resumed the debate on the Remedial Bill. He had not proceeded far in his criticism of the Remedial Bill, when Mr. Devlin interrupted. The member for Wigan arose and said that the Government was serious about the measure.

Mr. Dupont's reply was that he supposed the member for Wigan was not a subsequent repentance for having voted against his leader on that occasion.

Mr. Devlin thereupon grew excited, thumped his desk and declared if Mr. Dupont would not stop his remarks, he would resign his seat.

Mr. Dupont retorted that at Somher Park in Montreal, Mr. Laurier's presence, Mr. Devlin gave abundant evidence of his sincerity.

Mr. Devlin, still more excited, repeated his offer to resign if proof could be shown that he had not done so.

At this Mr. Speaker intervened, order was restored, and Mr. Dupont proceeded to say that for proof of his sincerity he need only refer to his published in the Liberal papers.

Mr. Craig on his feet, pointed out the achievements of the Conservative Party in the past. Their record was one of which they had good reason to be proud. They had stood for Canada first and refused to barter away their rights.

Mr. Laurier's speech was a vigorous speech, criticized the personnel of the place Ministry as paying particular attention to Mr. Fielding's record in the Government of Nova Scotia. A comparison of the two sets shows an expenditure of \$400,000, superannuations \$500,000, subsidies to provinces \$300,000, redemption of debt \$500,000 on debentures falling due Dec. 1.

SIR OLIVER GIVES A HINT
Of the Coming Election to Make the Senate an Elective Body

IN HIS MAIDEN SPEECH YESTERDAY
The Government to Try to Capture the English Dead Meat Market

The Liberals are Already Beginning to See the Difficulties in the Way of Their Proposed Tariff Changes—Dominion Millers Object to Any Tariff Reduction on Wheat—The Labor Union Law—Personal and General Notes From Ottawa.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—Sir Oliver Moray, realizing the truth of the old adage that more flies can be caught with sugar than with the finger, the proceedings in the Upper House today were certainly more interesting than in the Commons. It is not often that one hears a maiden speech in Parliament of a gentleman who for forty years has been in public life and for twenty-three years has held the position of Premier of the chief province of Canada.

Lord Russell of Killowen and his party remain until Tuesday, the Chief Minister being invited to accept a banquet to be tendered him by the Government in the House of Commons on Monday evening, to which all Privy Counsellors and legal members of the House were invited.

The attention of Sir Charles Tupper was called to the latest outbreak of F. W. Glen, Sir Charles considers it tantamount to a back-swing on Mr. Glen's part. If that gentleman is in earnest and will put up \$25,000 in the Bank of Montreal, Sir Charles will immediately cover it and enter action against Glen in the courts.

A telegram was received from Mr. Robert Birmingham to-day saying that the position of Conservative organizer in the province of Ontario was a very regrettable one, and his friends trust that he will soon be fully restored.

A body of Armenians made an attack upon the banks and a number of houses in Galata and Constantinople, slaughtering the inhabitants of the dwellings and the occupants of the shops, and throwing their bodies into the streets.

The sea clerks' riot.
London, Aug. 27.—A special despatch from Constantinople says that yesterday afternoon a party of 40 men, armed with revolvers and bombs, forced their way into the Ottoman Bank, attacking the guards who were guarding the doors of the institution.

A bomb was exploded near the Zanibar say that the bombardment of the palace lasted 50 minutes. The firing was done by the warships Kanguk and the Sparrow. The followers of Said Khalid were stationed in the main road, and the British sailors and marines were fired upon by the British soldiers and marines until their position was carried.

Berlin, Aug. 27.—The Vossische Zeitung's correspondent in Constantinople says that many hundreds of corpses were lying in the streets, and that a Turkish mob attacked the houses of Armenian inhabitants.

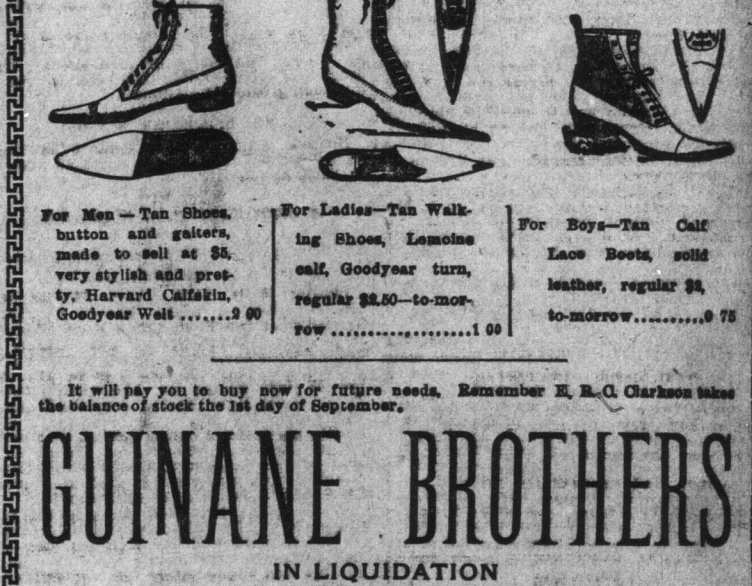
