THE TIMES' WASHINGTON LETTER

(From our regular correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—The news that the United States customs officers are making the matter of exacting duties on the presents brought home by the Philippine natives is not dignified even if it is backed by the president in his dual role of father and head of state. In attempting to enforce the tariff laws in regard to dutiable articles brought into the country by travelers the government always places itself in a contemptible and contradictory position. In this case it reaches the zenith of its absurdity and may well be a spectacle to make a patriotic American blush for his native land. These gifts were made by a people anxious to pay tribute to a country for which they have at present no interest and which they would not voluntarily pay a tribute to it and they did it in the best and most respectful form they knew. Miss Roosevelt was without alternative in the matter of accepting them. To have rejected them to the customs officers would have been to have been bored by the presentation and it is doubtful if she would have looked at the gifts if they had been displayed at an exhibition; but she has had good training and she had good advisers and she accepted gracefully, took a personal interest in supervising their packing, and with a grace which she showed again, for she entered no protest and has very skillfully concealed any disgust she may have felt. Miss Roosevelt is rich in her own right, having come into the possession of her fortune twenty-five birthday last year. She could well afford to pay the duty, no matter what she thought about the justice of it. But no sooner had the announcement been made that duty would be collected than she behind the announcement began to judge. It was just and right to demand duty, but it was not just or right to demand too much. A careful inventory of the goods would be made and in order not to excite any disaffection in the White House they would be valued as low as possible. Therefore inspectors who couldn't tell jade from lapis lazuli or royal astoria from Copenhagen are to be given the task of appraising with full instructions as to the injustice of taxing the president's daughter an unseemly amount.

And meanwhile what of the rulers of Japan, China, Korea and the friendly princes of the Philippines? They are sitting at home reading with satisfaction that their gifts are still lying in the Georgetown custom house, while the government is preparing for the city, post-haste, for a few dollars. They read that they are to be appraised according to the judgment of customs inspectors who wouldn't know oak wood from weathered oak and that Secretary Taft has said that all the presents together wouldn't bring two hundred and fifty dollars at an auction. Does any one suppose that their pride of being in friendly relation with the United States is increased by such information? Does any one suppose that they rejoice that they paid honor and distinguished courtesy to the daughter of the president of such a cheap price, dollar chasing republic? The popular pride in the country has been given a rude shock by this ridiculous business. Spying on friendship, petty skimming for the dollars due, looking for gifts in the mouths of those who are not the characteristics of a great people.

It is the common opinion in connection with the affairs of Miss Roosevelt serves to bring to mind the whole farcical system of collecting tariff on the goods brought home by tourists. Each returning traveler from abroad is allowed one hundred dollars worth of personal effects, and all that he has bought in foreign countries over this amount he is supposed to declare. OUT ON BAIL OF \$25,000

MAY GO TO OTTAWA

Delegation of I. C. R. Freight Handlers to Ask for Higher Wages.

A delegation to Ottawa representing the I. C. R. freight handlers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is a possibility. The wage question is the reason. The local union, No. 8, held a general meeting yesterday in their room, Charlotte street, the vice-president in the chair and the matter was taken up.

The petition fund was debated on and the question of better wages for the freight handlers was gone into vigorously. Letters from Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec and several from Nova Scotia unions in sympathy with the St. John men were read. It is likely the delegation from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will meet the government next January.

The men receive \$1.40 a day and claim it is insufficient, and not just in comparison with the pay of others.
