#### DATES TO REMEMBER.

July, 1871.—Chief Little Pine, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to Toronto and other places, and addressed the white people, urging that a "Big Teaching Wig am" might be built for the young Indians belonging to his tribe. This was the beginning of the Shingwauk Home.

SUMMER OF 1872.—Chief Buhkwujjenene, of Garden River, accompanied Mr Wilson to England to plead the cause of his people. About £800 was collected, and with this sum the first Shingwauk Home was erected.

SEPTEMBER 22ND, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was opened; 15 pupils, boys and girls, were present.

SEPTEMBER 28TH, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was burned to the ground, six days after the opening.

July 30TH, 1874.—The foundation stone of the new Shingwauk Home was laid by His Excellency, Lord Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada.

OCTOBER, 1874.—Our work was recommenced with 18 Indian children, boys and girls, who, with their matron and teacher, occupied a frame building temporarily for the winter.

August 2ND, 1875.—The present Shing-wauk Home was publicly opened by their Lordships Bishop Hellmuth and Bishop Fauquier.

August 19th, 1879.—The Wawanosh Home was opened for use, with 15 Indian

July 23rd, 1881.—The Marquis of Lorne and suite visited the Shingwauk Home.

August 29th, 1883.—The Bishop Fau-quier Memorial Chapel, in connection with the Indian Homes, was opened.

APRIL 15TH, 1885.—A talk with Chief Buhkwujjenene about the troubles going on in the North-West suggested the idea of establishing several Branch Homes.

August, 1885.—Mr. Wilson, accompanied by three Shingwauk boys, paid a visit to the North-West, going as far west as Regina.

June, 1886.—First arrival of boys, Sioux and Ojibway, from the North-West.

June, 1887.—Two Blackfeet boys from the Rocky Mountains came to the Shing-

### OUR INDIAN HOMES.

Last year we gave our kind helpers a brief history of Our Indian Homes from the very commencement. About fifty or so of those Reports are still on hand, and copies can be sent to any new friends who may desire to know something of our early history. In this report we shall just tell as briefly as possible what were the chief events of the past year, and then give a list of the eighty-nine pupils who were with us during the year, with a short account of each. We think that this will interest our friends generally, and especially those who contribute towards the support of individual pupils.

#### THE EVENTS OF THE YEAR.

January.—Towards the end of this month, Mr. Wilson visited the great American Institutions for Indian children at Carlisle in Pennsylvania, at Hampton in Virginia, and in Philadelphia. The result of these visits was the application to Government for assistance towards the extension of the Shingwauk Home so as to take 300 pupils, and the establishment of Receiving Homes at various distant points. The Indian department has the matter now under consideration, and appears inclined to regard the proposal favorably.

FEBRUARY.—As a result of the trip to the States, "the half-day system" was introduced at Our Indian Homes. Every pupil is now half the day at school and half the day learning a trade, or doing necessary work about the Institution. The only ones that keep at school the whole day are those

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ys from Shingpreparing to be teachers. When we introduced the system we let the boys vote on it, and they were unanimously in favor of it. As another result of the trip to the States we formed during this month an "Onward and Upward Club." The meetings are held weekly, and consist of readings, recitations, music, debates, &c. Sometimes also a social is given, to which the outside public are admitted. Those who join the club pay a fee of 10 cents, and receive a printed card, which they are to read every morning and ask God to help them. At the end of three months they may be admitted to a second grade, and at the end of a year to the highest grade, and receive a handsome framed certificate of full membership, the fee being \$1. There are at present 13 members, White and Indian, belonging to the second grade, and 34 members belonging to the first grade. Another result of the visit to the States was the setting on foot of a little monthly paper, called "Our Forest Children," in imitation of the "Indian Helper," published at Carlisle. The little paper has already upwards of 500 subscribers.

MARCH.—During this month our new hospital was first brought into active service, our kind friend, Miss Pigot, voluntarily undertaking the duties of nurse and general manager. A little girl, named Jane Warren, was taken very ill at the Wawanosh, and we wrapped her up in blankets and brought her in a slegh to the hospital. This was the first patient in the hospital, and it was nearly six weeks before she was well enough to go back to the Wawanosh. During that time there were 5 boys and 3 girls received as patients for short periods, so that Miss Pigot had her hands full. The sick wards are very cheery and bright, the beds covered with snowy white counterpanes, and everything as comfortable and neat as possible. A new hardwood floor has been laid in our dining hall, and a raised "captain's seat" placed at one end. The Captain (David), sits here and keeps order during meals, and 3 other boys wear white aprons and wait at table.

MAY.—Mr. Wilson went on a trip to the North-West; visited Mr. Burman's Mission at Oak River, and the Indian Reserves between Qu'Appelle and Regina; then on west to the Rocky Mountains to visit the Blackfeet Indians. Visited Mr. Sim's Mission at Blackfoot Crossing, and succeeded in bringing back two Blackfeet boys, Appikokia and Etukitsin, to the Shingwauk Home. Mr. Wilson got back from this trip on the 12th of June. Mrs. Bligh entered on her duties as Lady Superintendent at the Wawanosh Home May 11th.

June.—We celebrated the Queen's Jubilee on the 21st. The two firs piers of the new railway bridge across the St. Mary River were completed this month.

July. -- Eight Indian boys, viz.: Subguj, Joe Sampson, Matthew, Ned Beesaw, Isaac Sampson, W. Riley, E. William and Wagimah were confirmed by the Bishop in the Fauquier Memorial Chapel on the 4th Sunday after Trinity. The prize-giving was on the 7th instant, the Bishop giving away the prizes. Holidays commenced the following day.


SEPTEMBER.—We had a visit from Miss Brown on her way out to Blackfoot Crossing. She took messages from the two Blackfoot boys, and a pair of shoes for Etukitsin's mother. We commenced this month building the Washakada Home at Elkhorn, on the western boundary of Manitoba. It was to cost \$1350, and to accommodate 16 pupils. The building is already completed and an order has been sent to furnish it. We hope to open it in the spring. It is proposed to establish a second Branch Home at Banff, in the Rocky Mountains, if the way seems to open for it.

October.—Mr. Wilson took a party of 20 Indian boys and 10 Indian girls to Montreal, Ottawa, Carleton Place and Kingston. Those that went on the trip were David, Johnny Maggrah, Gilbert, Wasi, Matthew, Sabguj, Appikokia, Etukitsin, Sharpe, Cromarty, Aleck Beesaw, Riley, Joseph Soney, Frank, Sylvester, Willie Adams, Oshkahboose, Smart, Negaunewenah and Elijah—boys; and Mary Peters, Maria Jackson, Philamine, Harriet, Lily, Dora, Fanny, Gracie, Marion and Louisa—girls. The trip was very enjoyable and most successful in every way.

November.—The boys celebrated Guy Fawkes' day in the usual style with a bonfire and fireworks. To put a stop to petty thieving, to which a few of the boys seem addicted, we have appointed three constables among the boys, and 6 boys form the jury. The jury not only present their verdict but also recommend the punishment. If a boy is suspected of stealing, or other serious offence, the magistrate issues a warrant, the constable arrests the offender and lodges him in the lock-up; jury and witnesses are summoned, and a time is appointed (generally within a few hours), for the trial. On the 28th inst. the railway reached the Shingwauk Home on its way westward, and a half holiday was given to selebrate the event.

DECEMBER.—Bible class is held every Wednesday and Friday evening. And in addition, and this during winter, we have "twenty minutes Bible study," from 8.55 to 9.15 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday nights. The attention of the control of t dance at this is voluntary. A little box is kept, in which questions on Bible subjects are dropped by any who wish to do so, and when we meet we examine these slips, one at a time, and try to search out the answers. There is generally an attendance of 15 or 16 at these meetings. Christmas DAY being on Sunday, we had all the fun and feasting on Saturday. The day passed off very happily and the children had a "big feed;" but we are rather inclined to covet the turkeys and oranges which seem to be piled up on the tables of the Girls' and Boys' Homes and other such institutions in Toronto, Montreal and elsewhere. Our boys and girls have never yet even tasted the drumstick of a turkey, and an orange is to them almost an unknown fruit. Our Christmas Tree was on the 30th inst., and was a great success. A number of nice presents were sent to individual children by their kind supporters. On New Year's Eve we had a delightful little service in our chapel at 11.30 p.m., and when the old year had sped and the new year was come, there was a great handshaking and ringing of bells and drum-All the boys were weighed and measured as usual on New Year's eve. #### FOURTH CLASS.

Boys only.—Preparing to be School Teachers; Reading Fourth Book; Studying Arithmetic, Geography, English Grammar, English and Canadian History, &c., and learning Collects, Church Catechism, Bible, &c.

1. David Minominee—age, 21; height, 5ft. 6in.; Ojibway, from Parry Island, 250 miles distant; Captain of the School. Not a fast learner but very studious; conduct excellent; has been supported for several years partly by St. Paul's Sunday School, Uxbridge, and partly by All Saints' Sunday School, Collingwood; is now in his last year and will try for Teachers' Examination next July. Indian name, Shahwunahsuhwa (Thunder in the South).

2. John A. Maggrah—age, 19; height, 5ft. 7½in.; Ottawa half-breed, from Sucker Creek, Manitoulin Island, 150 miles distant; acts as Steward, gives out the stores, &c.; very reliable; conduct excellent. A very steady worker and very anxious to improve himself; supported by a kind friend who signs himself "Evangelical Churchman;" is now in his last year, and will try for Teachers' Examination next July; hopes to be a missionary. Indian name, Keche Ojibway (Big Ojibway).

3. Albert Sahguj—age, 16; height, 5ft. 4in.; Ojibway, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant; East Dormitory Monitor. Very studious; good at Mathematics; conduct excellent; supported by the Sunday School at Yarmouth, N.S.; Sunday School takes great interest in him; studying to be a teacher. Indian name, Zhagonabe (Bending Feather).

4. Joseph Soney—age, 14; a stout, strong boy; height, 4ft. 11in.; very studious; conduct excellent; North Dermitory Monitor; Pottawatimi, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant; supported partly by St. Mark's Sunday School, Parkdale, and partly by St. Paul's Sunday School, Port Dover; studying to be a teacher. Indian name, Kechemahmaungahkogun (Very Big Bones). This is a decided misnomer, as he is very fat-fleshed and well favored.

5. Thomas Johnson—age, 18; height, 5ft. 10in.; Ojibway, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant. Very studious; draws very nicely; conduct excellent; has been learning bootmaking for some time and become quite proficient, able to turn out a good pair of boots without any assistance. Was taken ill with a serious attack which the Doctor feared to be aneurism of the aorta, last April, and sent home by first boat, his father coming to fetch him; is now much better and hopes to come back in Spring, but not to follow his trade as it is not thought safe. He will probably study to be a school teacher; was supported by the Chapter House Sunday School, London, Ont. Indian name, Kazheyaushe (Fast Sailor).

6. Thomas Jackson—age, 17; height, 5ft. 6in.; Ojibway, from Sarnia, 300 miles distant. Fairly studious; clever at drawing; Began learning water colors; conduct very good; learned the carpenter trade and made very fair progress, but was in poor health during his last year; left a month before completion of his five years owing to poor state of health; was supported by St. John's Missionary Association, St. John, N.B.; his supporters took great interest in him. Indian name, Ashquagezhik (End of the Sky).

7. Edward Beesaw—age, 15; height, 4ft. 11in.; Ojibway half-breed; partly French; home at Serpent River, near Spanish River, North of Lake Huron, 100 miles distant. Three of his sisters have been at the Wawanosh, and one brother is still at the Shingwauk; got on fairly well at school, but failed to apply himself sufficiently to his work; was also a ready, obliging boy, but fond of mischief; stayed six years at the Shingwauk, and left last Summer; is now farming with his father; was supported, but not very regularly, by Trinity and St. Peter's Sunday Schools, Brockville. Indian name, Wasuhwudoong (Yellow Beard).

#### THIRD CLASS.

8. Thomas Wagimah—age, 15; height, 5ft. 3½in.; Ojibway, from Garden River, 10 miles distant. A slow boy in every way, but tries to do his best; conduct good; has been seven years at the Institution; has become a fairly good bootmaker, and we hope shortly to set up a little shop for him at Garden River, where he may make shoes and cobble for his fellow Indians. Any assistance towards this will be acceptable. Was supported first by Miss Baring, England; lately by the Memorial Church Sunday School, London, Ont.

9. John Pedahtig—age, 15; height, 4ft. 9in.; Ojibway, from Sarnia, 300 miles distant. Did very fairly at school, but not very healthy, and obliged to leave in Spring on account of poor health; conduct good; will return if health restored; was supported partly by the Sunday School at Mount Forest, and partly by a kind friend, Mrs. McWilliams, who took much interest in him. Indian name, Keche Ningahsemoon (Big Sail).

10. Smart Altman-age, 15; height, 5ft.; Ojibway, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant. Been nearly five years with us, and made fair progress; a useful, obliging boy; been learning bootmaking for more than a year and has got on very well; time was completed last Summer, but does not wish to leave till he knows his trade; has been supported steadily by Trinity Sunday School, Galt; two brothers and one sister have been at the Homes. name, Naunge (Light Weight).

11. Alexander Asince—age, 12; height, 4ft. 6½in.; Ojibway, from Christian Island, 250 miles distant. A bright little fellow and made good progress at school; had a bad attack of inflammation about the eyes in the early Spring which kept him confined in the hospital for many weeks; on this account he did not return after last holidays, but will come back next Spring; was partly supported by St. John's Sunday School, St. Thomas, Ont. means "Little Shell." Indian name

12. James Henry—age, 17; height 5ft. 9in.; Ojibway from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant; paid good attention to his lessons, and was a capital boy to work, but unhappily proved himself dishonest on more than one occasion and had to be dismissed from the school. The Indian Agent, we are glad to say, sends a good report of him since he got home. He was supported in part

by St. George's Sunday School, Goderich.

13. Willie Adams—age, 14; height, 4ft. 9in.; Ojibway, from Sarnia, 300 miles distant. Has been over six years in the Institution and has no wish to leave at present; a nice, obliging little fellow, and anxious to learn everything, but somewhat wanting in application. He has travelled through Ontario and Quebec with Mr. Wilson; has been supported steadily by the Church of the Redeemer Sunday School, Toronto. Indian name, Pazhegeezhik (Cloud Running in a Line). Willie gained 17 lbs. in weight during the year.

14. John Thunder—age, 22; height 5ft. 5in.; Sioux, from Bird-tail Reserve, Manitoba, 900 miles distant. Was able to read and talk English a little when he came, having been at an Institution in the States for about a year; made very good progress in lessons, but only stayed a little over a year; supported by

Mr. Rowswell, of Elkhorn. Indian name, Haka (Last Boy).

15. Sylvester Keezhig—age, 14; height, 4ft. 10½in.; Ojibway, from Cape Croker, 250 miles distant. Doing very fairly at school; a polite, useful boy; has been learning tailoring for about six months; supported by St. Matthias

Sunday School, Montreal, Indian name, Nemesho (Grandfather).

16. Peter Oshkaboos—age, 14; height, 5ft. 1½in.; Ojibway, from Serpent River, 100 miles distant. A very steady, industrious boy; tries his best to get on well at school, and a few weeks ago began to learn tailoring; is supported by Mrs. Niven's Boys' class, Montreal. The boys raise the money in great measure by making articles of wood-work for sale; they take great interest in Peter, and often exchange letters with him. His Indian name is Pamoosa (Walker).

17. Joseph Sampson-age, 17; height, 5ft. 4in.; Pottawatimi, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant; Front Dormitory Monitor. A very useful, obliging boy, generally employed as a "work boss" over the boys; tries to do his best at school. Joe is one of those boys who ran away two years ago, taking a sail-boat and enduring great hardship on the rough Autumn waters of Lake Huron, over 300 miles. He was brought back in the Spring and is now doing exceedingly well. He is supported by St. James' Sunday School, Morrisburg. Indian name, Pamoosah (Walking About).

18. Mackenzie Naudee—age, 16; height, 5ft. 8in.; Ottawa, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant. A boy of very bad disposition; was one of the

three that ran away with the sail-boat; was brought back, but finally expelled

last Spring; last reports are that he is doing badly.

19. William Riley -age, 16; height, 5ft. 3½in.; Ojibway, from Walpole Island, 340 miles distant. A polite, useful, well-behaved boy; makes very fair progress at lessons; also doing well as a carpenter; time will be up this year, but wishes to remain until he knows his trade well; has been supported steadily by St. Paul's Sunday School Toronto; they take great interest in him, and send him many nice presents. Indian name, Miskwaujejauk (Red Stork).

20. Abram Isaac-age, 15; height, 5ft. 5in.; Ojibway, from Sarnia, 300 miles distant. Has been with us on and off for several years, but has been tiresome in staying away twice after the holidays, which has put him back both in lessons and trade; was formerly supported by Holy Trinity, Toronto, but they have now taken another boy, and Abram is without support. Indian

name, Pamahsung.

21. Samuel Wasi-age, 17; height, 5ft. 61 in; Sioux, from Bird-tail Reserve, Manitoba, 900 miles distant. A well-behaved boy, and has made great progress both in school work, talking English, and trade (waggonmaker). While several of the other Sioux boys left at the end of the year, Wasi has stuck to his post and evidently wishes to learn all he can; he is supported by Holy Trinity Sunday School, Toronto. This Sunday School has maintained a pupil in our institution ever since the first beginning of our work in 1873. Nancy Naudee, their first protege, is now married and has a family.

22. Matthew Sampson—age, 15; height, 5ft 5in.; Ottawa, from Sheshegwaning, Manitoulin Island, 100 miles distant. A quiet, well-disposed boy, making good progress at school and a good worker. An elder sister of his is

Conduct good; only came last Fall and hardly knows anything yet, but tries to learn; supported by All Saints' Sunday School, Toronto, in place

of No. 27, who has left.

90. David Osahgee—Although not in residence, may still be regarded as one of our pupils, as we are responsible for his support, and the payment of his school fees at Trinity College School, Port Hope. He is an Ottawa, from Walpole Island; Indian name, Waubegeezis (Grey Moon); age, 19; St. Paul's Sunday School, London, Ont., pays us \$120 per annum towards meeting his expenses. We recently applied for a position for David as a clerk in the Indian Department at Ottawa, when his time at school is completed, and have received word in reply that a clerkship at a salary of \$400 per annum will be given him, with a subsequent rise of \$50 per annum till it reaches \$1000, provided he passes the Civil Service Examination, and proves himself fitted for the work,

We had intended to append some account of other pupils who have left us,

but the particulars required have not reached us in time.

#### HOMES FOR INDIAN CHILDREN.

I GIVE and bequeath unto the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the Lake Superior Mission, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the sum of ......; to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, exclusively out of such part of my personal estate, not hereby specially disposed of, as I may by law bequeath to charitable purposes; and I hereby lawfully charge such part of my estate, with the said sum upon trust, to be applied toward the general purposes of the said mission and its various Homes for the Christian training and civilization of Indian children; and the receipt of the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the said mission, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Legacy. (And I direct that the duty upon the said Legacy be paid by my executors out of the said fund).

The will or codicil giving the bequest must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses, who must subscribe their names in his presence and in the presence of each other.

Note.—This testament must have been executed one year previous to death of Testator, to give it effect over Mortmain Acts.
