HELD AT PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, MANITOBA, JUNE, 1888.

The FIFTH SESSION of the Manitoba and North-West Conference of the Methodist Church was opened in the Methodist Hall, Portage la Prairie, on Thursday, June 21st, 1888.

Rev. A. STEWART, B.D., President of Conference, took the chair at 9 a.m. and gave out the 753rd hymn, after the singing of which Rev. J. M. HARRISON, Secretary of Conference, read the Scriptures, and Rev. T. M. FINN and Rev. JOHN McDUGALL led in prayer.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The following report of the Board was adopted:—

Twenty-six candidates presented themselves for examination, only nine of whom wrote upon the entire work prescribed for their respective years.

To these certificates were awarded as follows:—

In the third year, one first-class; in the second year, one first and one third-class; in the first year, one first-class with honors, and one first-class; in the preliminary, one first-class, one second-class, and two third-class.

Candidates who intend writing in preliminary course shall hereafter send intimation of the same to the Chairman of District in which they reside, not later than the first day of March.

Examiners shall forward to the Secretary of the Examining Board, not later than the first day of March, manuscript questions on each subject allotted to them, which shall be printed under the Secretary's supervision, and forwarded by him to Chairmen of Districts, not later than the fifteenth of March.

The Examinations shall be conducted in each District where there are candidates, on the third Wednesday in April, by the Chairman and members of the Board resident within the District. But in cases where the distances are very great, the President shall grant permission to Chairmen to arrange for examination of candidates under supervision of the nearest ordained minister.

Time shall be considered an element in the Examinations, and in all cases where time is set by an Examiner, it shall be strictly adhered to.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

Report of Treasurer for the year ending August 31, 1887, for publication in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

As Treasurer of the above Fund I think it important that a Report of the Fund should appear in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences for the information of those concerned in its management and success.

An *interim* Report was sent to the Conferences last year, but as the year closes on the 31st August, this is the first regular Annual Report that could be published in the Minutes since the last General Conference.

The following are the receipts and expenditure as they stood on the 31st August, 1887 :

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past year.

The actual amount received from the Conferences during the year is only \$1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large proportion of the collections for the then current year, just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been paid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, the amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully small.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the Quadrennium there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The question, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested, at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer \$7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot be continued. Some provision must be made, evidently at a very early date, to meet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing this, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment annually of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

To the Presidents and Members of the several Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church :

The Report of about nine months' operations for this year is as follows:—307 Circuits have reported \$2,224.88 as collections for the year, averaging about 30 per cent. more per Circuit than last year. The greater portion of this sum has been absorbed in paying interest on appropriations, and the balance, with the sum received from the churches to report, will be used in paying the most needy claims in part. As was done last year, a full report will be sent out early in September, which it is hoped will be read in all the churches when contributions are asked for. The Treasurer is giving the best and most careful attention he can command to the administration of this Fund, and earnestly hopes the ministers and members will steadily increase their givings, which last year averaged less than four cents per member for the whole Church. May this rate be doubled. Let all the people say "Amen."

In presenting this Report for the consideration of the Board, the Treasurer has pleasure in stating:—

1. That there has been an increase in the Permanent Fund amounting to \$4,244.23.

2. The estimates for the year, which were made with great care, were sufficient to meet the expenditure, and the debt has been considerably reduced. It was the desire of the Treasurer to make these estimates as close as possible, in order to keep the assessments to Circuits down to the lowest possible amounts.

3. The annual income from all sources has fully met the expectations of the Treasurer. Notwithstanding the low rate of interest, there has been an increase realized from this source of \$1,679.29. A part of this

increase, however, should have been paid in and accounted for in last year's Report. The Book Room has paid \$6,000 to the Fund, an increase of \$2,000. The several Annual Conferences have paid the amounts in full apportioned to them, with very trifling exceptions, which are very easily explained.

4. The claimants have been paid in full, and the debt with which we commenced the year, has been reduced \$1,667.25, leaving only a balance of \$1,044.95.

5. On the whole, the working of the new law has been an encouraging success during this, the first year of its existence, and augurs well for the future. I do not claim for it absolute perfection, but it cannot be changed till the next General Conference. As we cannot "mend" it till then, let us, as ministers and laymen, "keep it," and with the improvements that may be made at the next General Conference, it will be a lasting blessing to the Church in all time to come.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee regrets that in some instances the direction of last Conference, viz., that the Chairman and Secretary of each District be a committee to prepare proper returns, and hand them to the Secretary of Conference in time for the first meeting of the Committee, was not very well carried out. Some of the schedules had to be filled up since Conference met. Decided advantage has been experienced from the explanations offered, adopted and printed in the Minutes regarding the filling up of the Circuit schedules, and your Committee would recommend that they be reprinted in connection with this Report this year. They are as follows:—

1. The column headed "Salary, Board and Fuel," should show the amount raised by the Circuit or Mission for these items only.

2. The column headed "Circuit Deficiency" should contain the amount (if any) which the Circuit falls short of its appropriation for salary, board and fuel, previously made by the Quarterly Official Board, and confirmed by the Financial District Meeting.

3. The column headed "Total Received" includes only the amount under the column for salary, board, etc., together with any additional sum received from the Contingent Fund or Missionary Society for salary, board and fuel.

4. The "Grand Total" is designed to show everything raised by the Circuit. The District Schedules should contain columns for totals raised for "Connexional Funds," "Circuit Purposes," "Ministerial Support," and "Grand Totals." At present special columns have to be added, which requires time that should be saved. We recommend drawing the attention of the Book Steward to this matter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee have observed that, owing to the fact that the work assigned them was being done by the Dominion Alliance, the members of the Committee appointed by last Conference did not meet during the year. A communication having been received from the President of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, we beg to say that we rejoice in the success that has attended the work of this Union, and trust that still greater success may attend its operations, so that we may all rejoice together in the glorious results that shall attend our common work.

The difficulties connected with the proper enforcement of temperance laws are so great that the zeal of some has been checked; nevertheless, we hail with joy the growing interest displayed in the cause of temperance by other branches of the Christian Church. We therefore reaffirm the position taken by the Methodist Church, viz., that we cannot rest satisfied until this evil, sapping, as it does, the life-blood of virtue, de-throning reason and cursing society, be driven forever from our land.

In order to accomplish this, your Committee would continue to urge upon our Ministers the importance of preaching at least one sermon a year on Temperance, as required by the Discipline. We also urge upon all Sunday-school Superintendents the duty of instructing the children on this subject, and seeing that they sign the temperance pledge.

We furthermore ask all our people to refrain from supporting any candidate for political or municipal honors whose sympathies are antagonistic to the cause of Prohibition.

The defeat of the Scott Act in several counties, the united action of the liquor men in violating the laws of our land, should only stimulate Temperance people to greater efforts, and thus emphasize the fact that nothing short of Prohibition will meet the requirements of our Master, "who will have all men to be saved."

Finally, we pledge our hearty support to the Dominion Alliance in attempting to drive out of our land this giant curse of the nineteenth century.

The Committee on Church Property recommend as follows:—

4. That permission be granted the Trustee Board to sell lots Nos. 1 and 2, Taylor's survey of the Goddy estate, being part of lot No. 65, of the Parish of Portage la Prairie; also, the lot known as the Brooks property and the second lot north of the said lot, situate on the west side of Goddy Street, between Saskatchewan and Lorne Avenues, also being part of the said parish lot No. 65; also, the rear portion of ninety-one feet frontage on Saskatchewan Avenue, north of the Methodist Hall, being also part of the said parish lot No. 65; also, lots Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8, situate on the north side of George Street, being parts of lot 61, Parish of Portage la Prairie.

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE.

Your Committee feel that the subject of evangelistic agency is brought forcibly to the attention of this Conference by the gratifying success attending the labors of Methodist evangelists in the East. This success, together with the peculiar circumstances under which we labor in this country, seemed to your Committee a Providential call, urging our Conference to take immediate steps towards introducing in this country some such agency. Your Committee have not failed to consider the evils that may possibly grow out of such methods of Gospel work in connection with a system like ours, nor were they unmindful of the mischief that has been brought about by some who sanction unauthorized and self-appointed "evangelists." We feel bound to advise this Conference to adopt the policy of the Eastern Conferences, and give no countenance to evangelists except those coming to us duly accredited by an evangelical church, and who are amenable to our Church courts for their conduct and teaching. We cannot yet set aside any of our ministerial brethren for this work as some Conferences have done. But we learn with gratitude that Rev David Savage, and a chosen assistant will give three months of service to this Conference. Your Committee cannot but look upon this prospective visit as most opportune and of God. We, therefore, recommend the Conference to extend to Bro. Savage a hearty welcome, and thus enable him to pursue his chosen work. Your Committee can urge this more freely, because the many requests by the brethren, coupled with pledges of support should he come amongst us, assure us that the Conference in this matter will not be required to assume any financial responsibility. Your Committee, having further learned that Revs. Crossley and Hunter are likely to labor during the year within the bounds of our Conference, would recommend that they also be given a hearty welcome. REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. Regarding the McDougall Church boundary:—

Whereas the Conference of 1887 fixed the southern boundary of the McDougall Mission; and

Whereas the Trustee Board of McDougall Mission have overstepped that boundary, thus encroaching on the territory of Zion Church; and

Whereas the Zion Church Board have, by memorial, objected to said encroachment;

Therefore we recommend that no permanent church edifice be erected outside of the boundary defined by Conference, and that within a period not exceeding two years the McDougall Church be established north of Manitoba Street.

But inasmuch as there have been some misunderstandings in regard to this matter, your Committee would advise that both the congregations in question work in harmony in the matter of expense incurred in the removal.

N. B.—With regard to the above, the Conference adopted the following, on motion of Rev. William L. Rutledge:

That the dispute between Zion Church, Winnipeg, and Fort Rouge and McDougall Churches be referred to the following Committee: President of Conference, Chairman of Winnipeg District, Superintendents of Zion and Fort Rouge and McDougall Circuits, and Messrs. A. Monkman, S. Walker, R. T. Riley, J. Davis, and J. A. M. Aikins, and that the finding of this Committee be referred to the next Annual Conference.

2. *Re* Memorial from British Columbia Conference:

Having read and carefully noted the facts contained in the memorial sent to this Conference by the British Columbia Conference, regarding the action of certain Government officials who have misrepresented the loyalty of Methodist Indians, and have charged our missionaries with other motives than the good of the Indians; and being in sympathy with our brethren, whose interests are seriously affected by the same; therefore this Committee earnestly request the Conference to endorse the application of the British Columbia Conference for a commission to be appointed by the Central Board of Missions to look into the matter, and give a correct report of the existing state of affairs to the world.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee having carefully considered the reports from the various fields throughout our jurisdiction, beg leave to submit the following :—

A general review shows the work for the most part to be in a very satisfactory state, though there are exceptional cases where circumstances have caused a decline. Through the development of the shipping, farming, and mining interests at and near Port Arthur and Fort William, an important Church interest has grown up in those places, and the work has greatly developed during the past year. Fort William becomes self-sustaining this year, and will employ two men. Throughout the bounds of Manitoba great advance has been made in all departments of the Church's work, and all its interests have advanced. The membership is greatly increased in every District, and all the financial interests have improved. A number of Missions now become self-sustaining.

On reaching the "Territories" we find a little variation. In the eastern part of Assinaboia, through circumstances over which we had no

control, the membership has decreased, but the funds of the Church show a slight increase. Under the circumstances, this last fact is most encouraging. In the western portion the case is very much better, as also in Alberta and Saskatchewan, where both funds and membership have shown a satisfactory growth.

THE INDIAN WORK.

Looking north from Winnipeg we find that, notwithstanding the fact that three of the most important missions have been for some time without missionaries, the work has been maintained with one exception (at which place we have an efficient local preacher) by native teachers and by native local preachers, and up to the present there has been no falling off—rather an increase. A great advance has been made in the arts of civilization by many of the natives, those of Fisher River living in comfortable houses.

Your Committee cannot but regret the desultory manner in which the day-schools have been conducted, owing to the fact that on the termination of a teacher's engagement a successor has not always been appointed. Efficient, godly teachers should be kept there, the salary attached to the position being always sufficient to entertain the hope that none other would be employed. We feel sure if these schools could always be supplied with such teachers, the result would appear in an almost immediate improvement in the Indian children.

Looking West among the Crees and Stoneys we find the progress made has been very satisfactory, the membership having everywhere increased. Both Sabbath and day-schools are better attended than formerly. The Orphanage at Morley, begun a few years ago, has clearly proven that taking the children away from vicious associations and throwing around them civilizing and Christian influences is the true method of mission work among the Indians. Returning to their own homes after such a training a small percentage doubtless will fall away, but a large number will grow up Christians and become a blessing. Already the tribes are seeing the advantage of such institutions, and if the means were forthcoming they could be greatly multiplied, seeing the cry constantly comes, "Give us a school," "Send us a teacher." Even paganism begins to feel the influence of such institutions. White Cap has lately appeared both before the missionary and Government officials, with offers of Indian help and faithful attendance if they could only have a school. The Blood Indian work, from the beginning, has been exceedingly difficult, as a suitable interpreter could never be secured. Consequently our missionary was compelled to learn the language, so that up to the present time it may be said these people have scarcely had the Gospel in their own tongue. We are glad to note that the Government is inaugurating a more liberal policy in respect to Indian schools, and we believe that with a well developed system, a new era has dawned for the Indian. Your Committee is of the opinion that it is of great importance that the Conference be put in possession of the fullest information respecting all its work at the earliest possible moment in its Annual Sessions.

But inasmuch as there are certain matters of information not provided for in our Conference Schedules, the Superintendent of Missions prepared on his own responsibility a special form of report, and sent a copy to each

The rich spiritual fervor that blessed us at our last Conference was carried to our fields of labor, and we believe many have consequently enjoyed a measure of spiritual life they had scarcely known before.

Altogether we believe that, as a Conference, and also as individuals, we have most abundant reason to "thank God and take courage."

May a double portion of His blessed Spirit rest upon us during the coming year.

OF THE
MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST CONFERENCE
OF
THE METHODIST CHURCH
TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEAR BRETHREN,—

It is with feelings of profoundest gratitude to our Father in Heaven that we assemble again in our Annual Conference, and renew our greetings to you in the name of the "blessed and only Lord God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." We have been the recipient of many blessings as a Church and people since last we addressed you in words of loving counsel. We were able last year to speak of the evidences of spiritual life and power which had been vouchsafed to us; and again we set to our seal that the Lord has been good. The record this year is again one of advancement in the temporal and spiritual interests of our Church. Many souls have been gathered as sheaves in the Master's harvest field, and the membership of our Church has increased from 6,192 to 7,010, or 818 since our last Conference. The financial interests of the Church have also been well sustained, so well indeed that the large increase must awaken in all our hearts a deep sense of gratitude to God for this evidence of our people's love for the Church, her institutions and her God.

the contributions per individual member for the support of the various institutions of the Church was \$12.48 $\frac{1}{2}$, which will compare favorably with any Conference in any part of the Dominion. At the beginning of the year our work was sadly crippled for want of laborers to occupy the several fields. Consequently the results are not at all what they would have been had all the posts been occupied. Nevertheless we are thankful to say the demand is more nearly met this year. Eight young men have entered the work from within the bounds of our own Conference, and thirteen have been received from elsewhere, so that the pressure has been greatly relieved.

This year no less than ninety-seven men have received appointments. But though so many, when we look at the fields "white unto harvest," and hear the many calls for help, we feel like saying as the disciples when laying the five loaves before the hungry thousands, "Lord, what are they among so many?" May He who is Lord of the harvest multiply both the sowers and the seed until the glorious harvest answers fully the perplexing question. Instead, therefore, of feeling that our highest hopes have been reached, the situation rather suggests the necessity of renewed consecration to God and to His service, whatever that may mean to us. We have gained a step, but it is only a step, in the upward climb, and our present position is only a vantage-ground from which to take another. Each advance only reveals larger fields and greater possibilities and louder calls to more enthusiastic labor.

We note with gratitude the deepening spiritual life of our people, as evinced in the soul-stirring testimonies of those who attend our Annual Conference gatherings. There is surely a greater longing after holiness of heart and life, and we believe that not only here, but all through our Church, there is a better apprehension of the meaning of God's gift to men, and consequently an increased desire to know and reach our glorious privileges in Christ Jesus our Lord. And we are certain that in this is the best possible assurance of the Church's strength. Sin is to be mourned over, evil of every kind is to be deplored, but the secret of power with which to conquer all these is to be found in the purity and holiness of our lives.

Not merely by denouncing sin in men will we prevail against it, but by showing to the world a "better way." Multitudes are living under the chains of sin to-day because they have never been fully convinced of any real possibility of their deliverance from its power. Be it ours to say to them by our life that our Christ is a complete Saviour, "able to save to the uttermost all who come to God through him." Of course there is contained, necessarily, in this the thought that we, as members of Christ, must come out from the world, and be separate, and touch not the unclean thing. If we would save the world we must abandon its sins. We reiterate the statement, that the common and popular sins of the day, such as dancing, card-playing, horse-racing, Sabbath-breaking and dram-drinking are not only opposed to the rules of the Methodist Church, but every year's experience only adds to our profound conviction that all such practices are totally opposed to, and subversive of, the life of God in the soul. Let us never forget that a sin is no less a sin because it is popular, nor is it any less dangerous to the individual because many commit it.

But the religion of Christ is not passive, it is active: "Son, go work to day in My vineyard." The cause of Temperance needs your active assistance. Before us as citizens lies a duty in this matter, and we believe that whatever that individual duty may be, no man may shirk his duty and be guiltless.

We earnestly commend to your thoughtful and prayerful consideration the claims of Wesley College. A good start has been made, funds have been collected, and we believe this autumn will see it in full operation. We believe the time has fully come when the Methodist people of this North-West should take hold of this matter in a way that would convince the world they are in earnest.

We have been losing, from year to year, some of our best young men from the ranks of the Ministry, because we could not give them the educational facilities and advantages they felt they needed, and were determined to have. They went elsewhere for their education, and returned not again among us.

We cannot afford this loss, and we cannot afford the far greater loss that will be entailed upon us if the youngmen who stay with us are denied the advantages which would enable them to develop their best powers. Remember it is always true, that in proportion as our young men suffer, we all suffer with them, for we are members one of another. Remember what our fathers did, and of their poverty when they established Victoria University, and let us be encouraged and inspired to emulate their nobleness and self-sacrifice, and we may be assured the fruit will come to us sooner than to them.

Many of them are dead without ever seeing the crowning fruit of their labors; but we are now equal to the situation, and take hold of this matter in the name of the Lord. Many of us will live to rejoice in the fruit of our labors in seeing Wesley College an honor to ourselves and the Methodist Church we represent in this great North-West.

Again we commend to your loving regard all the institutions of the Church. Be true to her and to all her interests, and in this way be true to your own. Uphold her honor, sustain her interests, be true to her ministers not only in temporal matters, but by faithful work and by love and prayer.

And now, dear brethren, "we commend you to God and the Word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and give you an inheritance among them that are sanctified." That God the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost may be very gracious unto you, and bless you, and cause His face to shine upon you in blessed and everlasting peace, is the constant and earnest prayer of your loving pastors in Christ Jesus our common Lord. Amen.
