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



Philadelphia, June 17—As the British steamship Highland Monarch was proceeding down the Schuylkill River today bound for Auckland, New Zealand, eleven members of the Chinese crew leaped overboard in an endeavor to escape. Four werdrowned and the rest captured.

The men rescued are in a police station, while those who did not get away from the ship are in irons on board.

The trouble started last night. The Highland Monarch has been lying in the Schuylkill river at Point Breeze, in the extreme southwestern part of the city, for three weeks, loading case oil for New Zealand.



RE you one of those people who think that vices and virtues, or what commonly go by those names, are north and south poles?

Because they aren't.

You may think that you can put all the vices in one box and label them "vices," and all the virtues in another and label them "virtues," and set them side by side and that they will never jump over into each other's

as great a person as Goldsmith's authority for a character, "e'en whose failings leaned to virtue's side."

And we all know an unselfishness that is so extreme as to be selfish in its appropriation of all the self-abnegation

It is this "sympathy" that refuses to step on the worm that destroys the beautiful trees and vegetation.

Real genuine sympathy is about the most beautiful quality a man or woman can have, but this sloppy, mushy, short sighted, indiscriminate emotion that dares to call itself by that name isn't sympathy.

How can it be anything good when it places a little present suffering above much future happiness?

How can it be anything good when it places the welfare of a single individual above the welfare of the community?

DR. CARMAN IS EXPECTED TOMORROW

Encouraging Reports Submitted to the Methodist Conference at Sackville Yesterday Afternoon-Great Advance at Mt.

Sackville, June 16—The fourth session of the Methodist conference convened at 2 o'clock, Dr. Sprague in the chair. Rev. J. W. McConnell submitted the report of the board of trustees. The total receipts were \$560.99; total expenditures, \$559.66, leaving a balance of \$1.33.

Rev. C. W. Hamilton, of Salisbury, submitted the report of temperance, prohibition and moral reform committee. The receipts from the various districts were as follows: St. John, \$131.09; Fredericton, \$66.25; Woodstock, \$37.37; Chatham, \$28.05; Sackville, \$82.95; St. Stephen, \$27.25; Charlottetown, \$48; Summerside, \$33,50; total, \$453.47.

The children's fund committee reported through Rev. James Crisp.

Rev. Dr. Graham, general educational secretary, gave a particularly strong and stirring address. There had been unprecedented progress, he said, in educational work during the last quadrennium. The income had grown from \$30,000 the first year of the quadrennium to over \$50,000, during the past year; \$117,000 had been raised in preceding quadrennium and \$186,000 in this quadrennium, an increase of 60 per cent. In the preceding quadrennium there were 480 probationers, in last 1,054; \$9,600 had been paid in fees for probationers in preceding, and in last quadrennium,

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest
Land Regulations.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nise miles of his homestead or a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


