The railway rates to Portland and St. John are equal, as are also the ocean rates from both ports to foreign ports. A combination of these two rates will not cost the shipper any more via one part than the other, the carrying companies absorbing the wharfage charges.

As to the volume which will be done over the State Pier, this depends entirely upon the activities of the American railways. As to Canadian traffic, it must be borne in mind that the import tonnage through Portland last year was, and for the future will practically be nil, because of the 10 per cent preference in customs duties on traffic imported through Canadian river and ocean ports.

The distance from Portland and St. John to Liverpool is practically the same.
