

Dr. J. B. Curtis is dead. The news is epochal in the history of our little town. A truly good, as compared with things hereabout, a truly great man has passed, and we all bow in sorrow and mingle our tears with the tears of those most intimate ones to whom he was dearest and best. Only just around the 60th mile-stone, he died utterly worn out in service to his fellowmen, and "greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." Although dead in the flesh the Doctor's spirit will long live among us. During 30 long years of practice, in the storms of winter, the weltering heat of summer, at midnight, early in the morning or at noon, whether next door or to the remotest reaches of the hinderland, Dr. Curtis invariably responded to the call of the

In affairs of the town Dr. Curtis was always interested. He served for years as a Commissioner of the old Fire and Water Corporation, and in all public, as well as in every matter, nis even, level-headed judgment stood out conspiciously, Never an extremist, he held his convictions firmly, but with that eveness of ten per and quiet dignity that brought him respect and admiration, even from those whose ideas were opposite to his own. For many years he served bis own. For many years he served as chairman of the country, Dr. Curtis, forbidden on the advice of expert medical men to engage in any arduous work, was constant day and night in his ministration, and—he gave his life to his fellowmen.

It is all to his credit, and quite his due, to recount in brief his early struggles. Orphaned early in life, he ventured alone in the world, and at a time in the country's history when proverity was the chief asset of most. His livelihood was precariously gained in his youthful days, but at seventeen the lust of knowledge was strong within him, and as yet he had never gone to school. To "work for his board and go to school" was the experience of many of his generation, and in the home of the late Howells Corbett of Lakeville. He attended school for three succesive terms, to a third class female teacher, and then went to Normal school and was graduated with a second class, license! Never to school before he was seventeen, he was a teacher at niheteen and he taught, and taught well and with understanding. "I have been instructed to make these features of China's case absolutely clear to the Canadian Government, particularly emphasizing the fact that China, having suffered so much from being passive in the past in all these international complications, is now determined to fight things out publicly and to make clear that, in preparing for a future crisis, she will play her part precisely as European powers have done in the past. China as a belligerent must be considered, and she demands that necessary steps be taken to provide for that. China is determined to have interpreted clearly Article 21 of the Covenant of the League, laying down the untenable doctrine of so-called reginoal understandings, which is not only a direct challenge to China's transfer internations.
