"The policy of the liberal party is the same as it ever was: "'A Canadian navy, built (As far as immediately practicable), equipped, maintained and manned in Canada'. This policy is now in concrete form before the house, Mr. Guthrie having moved an amendment, still undisposed of, that the \$35,000,000 asked by the government be expended in Canada in the construction and equip-ment of naval forces. ment of naval forces.
