



Here is a suggestion for the "put-away" season from a clever housemother who is the wonder of the mothers of the neighborhood for her skill in the art of freshening, and making over half worn clothes.

"When I put away my winter dresses,I always put them away clean, because it's much harder to get the dirt out when things have been lying dirty all summer. It doesn't matter how much I hate to do it now—I'll hate it just as much in the fall.

Sometimes when I want to freshen up a dress that I'm not afraid of shrinking, I put it right in the tub just as it is and give it a good scrub.
