FIGHT TO FINISH NOW IN RAILWAY STRIKE

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS BLOWN SKY HIGH; MEDIATORS GIVE UP

Struggle to be Renewed With Redoubled Vigor-Seniority Question Causes Break—Canadian Disputes to be Considered Next Week.

New York, Aug. 26—The rail strike in the United States has developed into a fight to the finish, after peace negotiations had been blown sky high yesterday.

Heads of the five railroad brotherhoods acting as mediators between executive and striking shopmen in a final effort to effect separate settlement with individual roads after the Association of Railway Executives as a whole had rejected the running trades' first peace overtures, reported to the representatives of seventy-seven roads at the Yale Club that the shop crafts had turned down a proposition made to them yesterday by the carriers.

Negotiations them were sharply broken off and executives, strike leaders and brotherhood chiefs packed up their bags and began leaving town, prepared for a test of endurance.

Labor leaders then dispatched telegrams to all parts of the country, calling upon strikers to renew the struggle with redoubled vigor.

SENIORITY STUMBLING BLOCK.

The latest peace proposal centering, as was the case with all the others, on the question of seniority, briefly was that roads interested in individual settlements would pledge themselves to find employment for all strikers not convicted of acts of violence; would not curtail pension rights "or other privileges"; and would agree to submit to a commission of ten brotherhood leaders and executives all putes which could not be settled by direct conference.

GREATEST "RED" PLOT IN YEARS

Many Caught in a Midnight Raid in Michigan Hills

Leader is Captured — Pine

Knots Lighted Conference in Lonely Valley—Eighteen
Prisoners.

Chicago, Aug. 26.—In the arrest of William Z. Foster, head of the Trades Union Educational League, in Chicago, the seisure of seventeen members of the Communist Party of America, an underground revolutionary organization, and a nation-wide search for more than fifty other persons, including Rose Pastor Stokes of New York, federal and Michigan state authorities announced the breaking up of one of the greatest radisal conspiracies of recent years.

The majority of those held were captured in a midnight raid in the hills of Berrien county, Michigan, twelve miles south of Benton Harbor, where the Reds had assembled for their annual convention in a lonely glade at the bottom of a heavily timbered valley. Pine knots furnished the light by which their business was transacted; there they heard the reports of personal representatives of Lenine and Trotsky of Russia; there, the federal officials watched them, powerless to act without authority from Washington. Foster, one of the escaping ones, was trailed to Chicago. He turned up at his splice. He was arrested just after he had soud a statement denying his implication in the convention. He was taken to the detective bureap, thence to the Fiftieth street station, while warrants and extradition papers were awaited.

Mrs. Stokes was also one of the escaping ones, federal officials says. She is particularly wanted; her home in New York city is being watched, it is said here, as well as the homes of her numerous acquaintances.

The Communist Party of America was prganized in Chicago in 1919. During its early struggles, schism developed in its ranks, and later the Communist Labor Party was organized from the dissatisfied element. The remaining element was the ultra-radical group—those who spenly avowed their belief that violence was the only method by which they sould hope to overthrow the government of the United States. At first they were an open organization. Then, on New Year's Day, 1920, agents, under the firection of States Attorney Hoyne, twooped down on their quarters in a icries of raids which netted virtually all their leaders. A few escaped. Many were convicted.

Worked Under Cover.

Since that time the party has been working at all times under cover. Now and then pamphlets would appear from some mysterious source. In each case they were revolutionary in tone. "Hang the capitalists and seize the government" was their motto.

Some time Sunday the radicals became wary. They began to leave. By midnight Monday only seventeen were left. Foster and Mrs. Stokes were among the absentees. Just before dawn on Tuesday, Sheriff Bridgeman and the federal agents swooped down and the entire seventeen were rounded up. Chief among them was C. E. Ruthenberg, once a candidate for mayor of Cleveland, one of the most widely known radicals in the nation. Arrested a number of times, he is still under indictment in Chicago for his activities with the party here in 1920. He is now the national executive secretary of the Workers' Party of America, a radical organization, and is the head of its activities in this country.

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





Vacuum tubes are very sensitive electrical devices and should be screened from sources of electrical disturbances in order to obtain quiet operation. Acid flux or prepared pastes should not be used in soldering connections for tuners, audion detectors, or amplifiers in receiving circuits. The slightest trace of acid or alkali on the junction of the solder and copper will generate currents which will be heard in the receiving telephones as a form of static. Use

Iron wire is not suitable for an efficient aerial. Solid or stranded hard drawn copper wire or phospher bronze should be used. In the construction of inductance coils for short wavelength, either size No. 18 or No. 20 wire will give satisfactory results.
