CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—This organization shall be called the New Brunswick Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II.—The object of this Convention shall be to promote Home Missions in this province, to assist the N. B. Seminary and the Baptist Annuity Association, and generally to foster all interests that immediately pertain to the welfare of the Eaptist denomination in New Brunswick.

ARTICLE III.—The members of this Convention shall consist of delegates of Baptist churches in New Brunswick. Any member in good standing in a Baptist church may become a member for one year on payment of five dollars, or a life member on payment of twenty-five dollars at one time. Each Baptist church may send three delegates, including its pastor, and an additional delegate for every hundred members above one hundred.

ARTICLE IV.—This Convention shall meet annually, the second Friday in September, at 10 o'clock, a. m., and at such other times as it shall direct. Special meetings may be called by the President upon written request of a majority of the Board of Directors

ARTICLE V.—The officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Statistical Secretary, a Treasurer and an Auditor. There shall be a Board of Directors, composed of twenty-one persons, seven of whom shall be elected annually. The duties of the board shall be the supervision and conduct of the work of the Convention between the times of meeting. The officers of the Convention shall be ex officio members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI.—The Constitution may be altered or amended by a twothird vote of all delegates present at an annual meeting, notice of change having been given one year previous.

Bye-Laws.

I. The Board of Lirectors shall meet monthly at such place and time as they may decide upon, notice of which shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

II. Not hall be given by the President in the Messenger and Visitor, for at least two weeks, of any special meeting of the Convention or Corporation called by the requisition of the Board of Directors.

III. The Board of Directors shall have full power to transact all business between the Annual Sessions of the Convention, such transactions to be regarded as done by the Convention or Corporation itself.

the word could not be obtained at all. The fathers went from settlement to settlement carrying the message, and succeeded in a wonderful way in evangelizing many of the more important communities of their time. The circumstances of today, with the changed condition of things generally prevented the success of transient ministrations. Settlements have now assumed a more permanent and stable character, and in our present fixed state of society regular services seem a natural demand. Hence the Board has striven to open up fields and grant assistance with a view of establishing self-supporting interests. As far as possible weak churches have been urged to co-operate in the support of a pastor and the Board has been careful to give its help where there seemed to be the greatest need. He closed with an appeal for a hearty support of our Home Mission work, as on its success depended the success of every kindred interest.

Bro. E. N. C. Barnes, a student missionary at Cardigan, referred to the destitution of many interior settlements, and presented a vivid picture of the earnestness and deep interest which he had met in home missionary work. He urged a deeper appreciation of the work and claimed that when we thoroughly understood the needs and sought the proper qualifications we might look for blessed results to follow.

Bro. I. N. Thorne, missionary at Harcourt, began by asserting that a Christian to be a success in mission work should be a man with a mission. God has always supported his servants as he did Noah, Jonah, and others of former times. The service involved hardships, but the reward will surely come in the end. He had himself felt greatly encouraged with this assurance even amid the most trying difficulties and he relied firmly on the promise of that crown of life which was to be given to every faithful servant.

REPORT ON COLPORTAGE.

The invention of the Printing press marks a new era in the spread of knowledge and the advance of civilization. Prior to this education was confirmed to particular classes, but with the introduction of the printed page the means of acquiring knowledge fell within the reach of a larger number.

As improved machinery took the place of the primitive hand presses this general dissemination of knowledge became still more far reaching. Like the waters seen in Ezekiel's vision, which were but a small stream at the first, they soon became rivers to swim in, and to-day the printed page has become one of the most potent factors in moulding public opinion throughout the civilized world.

This force however can be utilized for evil as readily as for good, and Satan's followers, quick to recognize every point to their advantage, have for long been flooding the homes of our people with a corrupt and vitiated literature most blighting wherever it has gone. Advocates of false doctrine are availing themselves of the aid of the press in scattering broadcast their pernicious theories. Every manner of superstition and delusion now boldly appears in print and ravages our homes. As a result an appetite is being aroused for that which is curious and sensational, instead of that which is sober and tending to true righteousness of character. A race of sickly sentimentalists, unfit for practical labor is

Thers are a grasped, must while the incr work of pre missionaries, experiences, growing up about us, error abounds in the minds of the people; the teachings of God's word are perverted and lightly esteemed, and a wide door is being opened for doubt and infidelity.

Every paster must have felt that the giving up of this force, which rightly directed might be a power for great good, to the use and service of the devil has in no small degree impeded the prosperity and growth of our churches. We have deplored the condition of things, but we have done little to better it. Denunciation of the wrong from the pulpit has not been followed as it should have been with practical conflict with the evil in everyday life. And the question is asked, how can it be helped? Can anything more be done? We answer, yes!

The counteracting force is to be found in effective colportage service. The supply of books of excellent character is abundant, and Baptist authors have not been remiss in furnishing their quota of the supply. Let there then be colporteurs who shall carry these works to the homes. Let them be sold wherever possible, and if not sold let them be distributed. It is impossible to introduce such literature in any other way. Very few of our own people will inquire after it, but if it is brought to them many will purchase it.

In the next place we would briefly mention two of the benefits resulting from such work. (1.) It is a most efficient aid to our pastors. There are few if any of these who have not felt their inability to carry out the last part of the commission, and teach the people to observe all things commanded by Christ. The fields over which we are placed are so large, the services to be held so many, and the time demanded by long drives and preparation for services so pressing, that little opportunity is given to come into close personal contact with the people. This is a common source of weakness in our present pastoral conditions.

A Colporteur, regularly visiting the fields, holding spiritual intersourse with the imnates of the homes and leaving with them books pure in their tone and Christian in their influence will to some extent supply this lack. The one means of regenerating and sanctifying men is by the truth of revelation. In proportion as our ministry is a ministry of the word, will it be a ministry of power! And next to the living voice proclaiming that word will ever stand the gospel of the press as a factor in forming religious opinions and moulding Christian character. Shall such an important factor be neglected by Christians, and be wholly given to the agents of evil? God forbid. By all means we would say let it be utilized in the work of the church of God.

There are a large number of works, which if carefully read and fully grasped, must inevitably produce deeper consecration and truer living, while the increased intelligence resulting from such reading will make the work of preaching much easier. The biographical sketches of our missionaries, the stories of native converts with their many thrilling experiences, must have the general effect wherever read of widening the

A colporteur might also carry to good advantage, works of reference such as a Bible Commentary, and a Bible Dictionary for Sunday-school libraries. These would place within easy reach of our teachers much needed help, throwing light upon obscure points and thereby increasing their efficiency in teaching.

(2.) A colporteur in disseminating Baptist literature is preparing the way for a general advance along denominational lines. There is a false charity in this age which pleads for a compromise literature, "a charity much like that of Adam who found even Paradise too narrow for him." Now it should be understood that compromise with error is treason to the truth; that in yielding to this demand we are tearing down a temple founded on the Rock of Ages, whose superstructure has cost the blood of the martyrs and the sufferings of faithful ones, who, rather than yield that truth have sealed their testimony with their blood. Too much of the strength of the Baptists has in the past been given towards the dissemination of pro-baptist principles and the furthurance of many errors which have long vexed the peace of the Christian church. Against this we would raise our earnest protest.

The report was spoken to by Bros. J. Coombs, C. N. Barton and T. H. Hall, and adopted.

The committee on Temperance presented their report which on motion was laid on the table until afternoon.

A communication from Dr. Gates, concerning Home Mission work was read by the secretary and 'in reply the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

In view of the fact that a proposal is to be submitted to the three associations asking them each to elect six members on another Home Mission Board for the Province.

And in view of the fact, that unanimity in the administration of this important work is very desirable.

Therefore Resolved, that this convention, in event of the formation of such board by the associations, agrees to hand over its home mission work at the end of the present year, provided such board shall make an annual report of its affairs to this body to be incorporated with its minutes from year to year.

On motion the report on Temperance was taken from the table and discussed.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

Realizing that to be a Christian is to have our wills surrendered to, and in unison with the divine will, and knowing that it is God's purpose to give to His Son the heathen for an inheritance, and uttermost parts of the earth for His possession, it is for us to prove our connection with the Diety and go forth to conquer the world for Christ. If we do not do this we are indeed hypocrites in our profession, not having the mind of the Lord, who has bidden His followers to go into all the world and preach His gospel to every creature.

While the need of men and means is so great let every Christian practice self-denial that the Lord's treasury may be full and that laborers may be supported in all parts of His vineyard. As a denomination and as indivdual Christians we should be ashamed of the small amounts at present given to forvard so desirable a work. According to the statement given by our secretary in the Messenger & Visitor, after Bro. Barss's \$3,000. and the \$1,500. pledged at the Maritime Convention, the Board would still lack about \$2,000. to discharge all obligations against it.

The Board has however decided to send out this fall Mr. and Mrs. Churchill, Mrs. Sanford, Miss Gray and Miss Blackadar. Brother and Sister Archibald have already arrived home, and we rejoice to learn that physicians hold out good encouragement for Brother Archibald's complete recovery.

On our mission field the cause of God is slowly but surely progressing We have seven churches, with a membership of 314, 59 of whom have been added during the year. There are also 48 native helpers, 18 preachers, 18 Bible women and 8 colporteurs. May God's blessing rest upon these and let us ever plead that the power of the Holy Ghost may accompany the service they give.

SABBATH FORENOON.

At 9.30 a. m. Elder G. W. Springer conducted a service of praise and prayer, in which many took part. These exercises proved a helpful introduction to the work of the day and were greatly enjoyed by all present.

From 10 to 11 a. m. Pastor Bynon gave a Model Sabbath School Lesson founded on Ezra Chapter I., followed by remarks from President Ervine.

At 11 o'clock the regular preaching service opened with reading of John xv11, by Elder Hughes and prayer by Dr. Black. REPORT ON GRANDE LIGNE.

It is with no little pleasure and thankfulness to God that we review in part the glorious work done in Quebec by our brethren of this important mission. When this school was started some sixty years since there was at the time as far as known but one French Protestant in the province of Quebec. To-day there are about 20,000 of this people who are not in bondage to the Roman Catholic church and many of them are doing all in their power to spread the glad tidings of Salvation through their native province. When we consider that at the first Roman Catholics possessed the land, and that even yet priestly terror and all its accompanying superstitions abound to a great extent, it is no small wonder to us that in spite of all these difficulties God has verified His promises and has brought out many into His marvellous light. This fact should encourage us to support Grande Ligne with even greater devotion than heretofore-

Prominent among the influences that have conspired to bring about the present prosperity of the mission is that of the school conducted at Grande Ligne by Principal Massé and his efficient staff of teachers. During the last year 135 pupils have been enrolled in its classes; of these 116 were boarders at the school. As a result of the faithful work done by Pastor Parent, assisted by the teachers and students, twenty-seven have professed faith in Christ and have been baptized. Of these two had been brought up Roman Catholics. The standing of the school is such that many intelligent Roman Catholics highly commend it and wish there were more its equals in this respect.

The school should receive our support not because it was the first Protestant mission school in the province, but also because God has

blessed it to the conversion of thousands of French Romanists.

It has given the open Bible and a pure gospel to the French of Canada and by a special providence God has entrusted its care to the Baptist people of this country. If we neglect it the glory of Christian missions in Quebec must pass to other and more worthy hands,

The mission has not been idle during the year. Its twelve devoted men and two Bible women have done a work which we believe must cause angels to rejoice and upon which a loving Master will pronounce the words "Well done." The funds have been carefully administered and the most rigid economy has been practiced in every way; the salaries in every case have been far less than they should have been. May our brethren in New Brunswick nobly do their part in raising the \$15,000

that is asked from the Maritime Provinces, that God's will may be fully done in the dark province of Quebec.

Report adopted.

Rev. C. W. Townsend read the report on Education, which on motion, was laid on the table until evening.

Adjourned with prayer by Elder Hughes.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Session of Baptist Annuity Association held from 2 to 3.30 p. m., after which Convention resumed business. Prayer offered by Pastor Cornwall.

The matter of starting a Church Edifice Fund having been brought to the attention of the Convention it was resolved that the treasurer open an account for that purpose and that he be authorized to receive and hold in trust any funds that may be given to it.

On motion of Bro. C. W. Pierce, seconded by Elder Springer, it was resolved that the Convention approve of the publication of *The Home Mission Journal* and hope for its continuance.

Resolved that 1600 copies of the Annual be published for distribution among the churches.

Adjourned with prayer by Pastor Bynon.

MONDAY EVENING.

Opened at 7 p. m. with prayer by Elder Hughes. In the absence of the president, Rev. A. B. Macdonald, vice-president took the chair.

Votes of thanks were tendered to the church and community for the cordial welcome and entertainment given and to the quartette, organist and choir for music furnished during the session.

Similar votes of thanks were also tendered to the railways and steamer lines for courtesies extended to the delegates in attendance.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Believing that Christianity is promotive of intelligence, that Christ came to enlighten men intellectually as well as spiritually and that the Holy Ghost, being the Spirit of God, is in the fullest sense the Spirit of Truth we feel bound to advocate the ardent pursuit of knowledge through all her wide realms. We record with gratitude the fact that the gospel has ever been the means of delivering men from the thralldom of ignorance, that the school has been the child of the church, and that superstition has fled before the advance of that faith which was once delivered to the saints. We are confident that nothing revealed in the scriptures will ever be contradicted by any authentic discovery of science, Nature and revelation having the same author, God, who cannot deny Himself, will ultimately be found to be in perfect accord, the one being but the complement and completion of the other. We therefore have no fear as to the result of any investigation either into the works of God or the nature of man, assured that the fuller our information the greater will be our appreciation of the wisdom, power and goodness of the adorable

We rejoice in the excellent system of education which prevails in this province, the benefits of which are open to the children of the poorest as well as to the richest. We would gladly acknowledge the part played by our Normal School in not only providing an abundant and efficient staff of teachers: but also in supplementing the work of the common schools and hereby qualifying many of our young men and women for success in the various walks of life. It affords us much gratification to remember that by reason of such advantages numbers have risen from our humblest homes to adorn the best positions in commercial, professional and legislative circles.

As Baptists we have a special interest in our own educational institutions, and we would be peak for them the sympathy, support and patronage of our people. We desire to express our confidence in the work being done in the various departments at Wolfville. Being under judicious management, these institutions are worthy of our affectionate esteem and generous regard. We deem it of the utmost importance that our children should embrace the opportunity thus provided for acquiring an advanced education free from anything injurious to their morals or subversive of the religious principles held by their parents. We further consider it advisable that those who have evidence of a call to the gospel ministry shall seek to avail themselves of the great help afforded by Acadia University in qualifying men for so noble a life work. While we do not believe in a man-made ministry, and while we thankfully recog-

nize the blessing that has attended the labors of many brethren who never graduated from any earthly college, yet we are persuaded that a true man of God will render all the more effective service when prepared by a course of competent and careful training.

We have heard with satisfaction of the success attending the Acadia Forward Movement, but we regret that such success has been to a considerable extent mitigated by failure in several instances to redeem pledges made. In all justice be it said that such failure has been chiefly due to the deaths of prospective donors. We sincerely trust that the shrinkage thus occasioned of some \$2,000 will be more than met by additional subscriptions.

Report adopted.

After scripture reading and prayer the president called on Rev. W. E. Hall to speak in behalf of the Acadia Forward Movement. The Secretary followed making an appeal for inmediate help which resulted in securing cash and pledges amounting to \$200. At the conclusion of the appeal a social service was held which could not fail to prove a blessing to all who enjoyed it.

HOME MISSION REPORT.

Another year of anxiety and of sustained effort in our Home Mission Department is closed. What its possibilities have been and how we have utilized them eternity alone will reveal. With great needs continually pressing upon our attention and with but scanty means to meet those needs, your board has striven faithfully to do that which commended itself as best in the jndgment of the members. length the many painstaking deliberations over the work of the year would not here be in place; suffice it to say that month by month these domestic interests, vital to our denomination and to the cause of God at large, have received our most careful and prayerful consideration.

In accordance with a time honored custom we herewith present an account of our stewardship with a brief review of the fields and work attended to by us in the various parts of the province. Other interests assisted by the committee of the Maritime Convention will be found referred to in the re-

ports of that body.

BUCTOUCHE.

In December of last year Bro. R. Barry Smith, a licentiate, who had given much promise of success in the profession of law, but who has of late been called to the work of the ministry, was engaged on this field. The statious occupied by him have been; St. Mary's, Dundas, Little River and Buctouche. Concerning his work Bro. Smith says: "Encouraging results are following the ministrations of the word. In the strength of the Lord we are trying to make a successful assault upon the powers of evil. Our conference meetings at McLauchlan Road and Little River have been seasons of power. One pleasing feature in our work is the large attendance of young people of both sexes at all the meetings, and another is the harmony that reigns at Little River, The enemy made sad work there formerly, but I have faith to believe that our blessed Master has taken the reins of the church and that He will hold them." The congregations are large all over the field. Bro. Smith was called to ordination at Little River, May 25th, of present year, and has since been actively engaged in full pastoral, work. The board continues a grant of \$100.00 per year towards his support.

HARCOURT.

The stations of this field have been occupied throughout the year by Bro. I. N. Thorne. He has held preaching services at Mortimore, Canaanville, Trout Brook Grangeville, Canaan Station and Harcourt. Three Sabbath schools are also conducted in connection with the services. We quote Bro. Thorne's report as best showing his everyday experiences. He writes: "I feel to thank God for what He has done for us here especially in Canaan. The school house, which had been closed for some time against the Baptists has again been opened. I am praying that the light of God's word may be revealed to those who but see men as trees walking, that they may acknowledge the truth in the beauty of obedience by walking in Christ's footprints. I stop off at Canaan Station, I. C. R., about nineteen miles north of Moncton, and at our services here it has been my privilege and joy to hear an aged man, now eighty-four, at the close of a cottage prayermeeting appeal for the first time for mercy, at the cross. May the God of all grace heal his soul, and may this be the beginning of better days in Canaan Station.

We should not get discouraged with our scattered flock when we look on others right among us who have had far greater opportunities and yet their church is almost asleep. I pray God that the flood-gates of His divine love may be opened on the Baptist cause, as it is His cause, and may we believe that He is able to take care of that we have committed to His charge."

SHEDIAC.

The services of Elder Corey have been retained during the year just closed. Our cause here has had much to contend against. Surrounded by a large body of French Romanists and also by various Protestant communities, with constant removals from among our own congregation, it has been difficult to maintain aggressive work in Shediac and its vicinity. From this point to Cape Tormentine there is however much ground that ought to be occupied and the board is hopeful that before long we may be able to station a regular missionary in this part.

CALHOUN'S, WEST. Co.

This station has been supplied by the pastor of Dorchester, assisted by a small grant from the board. Some other points near by also require attention but as yet no satisfactory arrangement of the interests has been effected. Bro. Burgess reports: "Two families have of late removed from the field, both Baptist. There are some persons who are gradually coming to our views, but in my enclosed report I have not included them, as I wish to state fairly the condition of the field. Our services have been regularly continued and the only meetings held here are those conducted by the Baptists. The people attend regularly and give the best of attention to the preaching of the gospel. am hopeful that in the near future some will identify themselves with us by baptism. I plan to hold some special services soon."

CAPE TORMENTINE.

In the early part of the convention year the board gave assistance to a student of Acadia who spent his vacation supplying Cape Tormentine and Cadman's Corner. An interesting cluster of settlements lies within reach of the missionary stationed here and we are greatly desirous of securing a permanent laborer. Bro. Colpitts left the work on the first of November last, returning to his studies. He reported a good Sabbath school and a resident church membership of forty-two.

UPPER CAPE AND PORT ELGIN.

During the part of the convention year falling in 1899 Rev. J. W. Gardner was assisted by our board with a grant of \$50.00. The original grant of \$100.00 by the advice of Bro. Colpitts and others familiar with the field was assigned for Cape Tormentine and Upper Cape under one pastor, but as a different arrangement was entered into by the churches \$50.00 was paid to Bro. Gardner and a portion to Bro. Colpitts for the time he spent on his part of the field. The plan preferred by the board however was to have united Cape Tormentine, Cadman's, Upper Cape and Bayside under the care of one man who should reside if possible at Cape Tormentine.

HILLSDALE AND ST. MARTINS SECOND.

Pastor Bynon has had great reason for encouragement and Baptist affairs here are looking up. In his report Bro. Bynon says; "We have a loyal and true band about us. I have arranged to hold services in Black River, three miles from Coleraine, and also at Hardingville. Our congregations at Hillsdale were the largest during the past winter we have yet had. Our Sabbath Schools are good; our B. Y. P. U. better, and our prayer meetings best. We have also put extensive repairs on our church buildings. Hillsdale edifice is now all that heart could desire. We have decided to erect a building of our own at Coleraine. I feel that I must remain here until this is completed."

TABERNACLE, ST. JOHN.

Rev. W. J. Halse resigned the pastorate of this church in October last, and during the greater part of the year since that time the congregation has been supplied by different brethren. Not long since the church called Bro. P. J. Stackhouse, a recent graduate of Acadia, who is at present ministering acceptably to the people worshipping here. Bro. Stackhouse gives promise of being a successful winner of souls for his Lord and Master, and we hope for the best results from the union now consummated.

JERUSALEM.

During part of the convention year just closed Bro. W. E. Carpenter, licentiate, was stationed on this field. Since his removal in December last the board has not granted any further assistance, owing to the fact that its hands were already overladen. Rev. W. J. Gordon, pastor in Kars, has of late been caring for the interests here in connection with his work across the river. The board is of opinion however that a man should be stationed on the west side to give that amount of attention which those communities naturally require. For the present however this seems beyond our reach.

DECEASED MINISTERS.

M. NORMANDY.

At St. Marys, Kent Co., Bro. Normandy fell asleep in Jesus, on December 8th, 1898, in his 76th year. Born in Romanism and educated in the doctrines of that system Bro. Normandy was until twenty-seven years of age a faithful worshipper among his own people. God had however a more glorious revelation in store for him. Under the teaching of Madame Feller and the open Bible he saw himself a sinner, and soon found Christ as his Saviour. Immediately he conferred not with flesh and blood, but leaving all for Christ's sake he went forth to proclaim the gospel that had brought life and peace to his own soul. About forty years ago he came to Nova Scotia to evangelize the French Romanists of that province, preaching, visiting and distributing tracts and Scriptures-Several years since he settled as French missionary in Kent Co., where he was indefatigable in his efforts in behalf of the Catholic people.

He was also instrumental in forwarding the erection of houses of worship in Dundas, St. Marys and Cocagne, and greatly assisted in repairing the house at Buctouche. In his latter days he worked at his trade supporting himself and his aged partner, preaching from time to time at McLean Settlement, Victoria Road and other places. He was superintendent of the St. Marys Sunday School until his end; he was also vice-president of the Kent County Baptist Sunday School Convention, for which he rendered important service. His religion cost him much. To him Christ was a real friend. As a minister of the gospel he was earnest, simple and faithful, ever zealous to promote the truth and anxious to win souls to Christ.

"With Jesus now at home, he is forever blest; his pain and toil are o'er, he's entered into rest."

J. HERBERT FOSHAY.

This brother, although not resident in the province at the time of his death, was formerly well known among us and deserves a brief notice in these sketches. He was born at Hopewell, N. B., May 22nd, 1854, and was the son of Rev. E. Foshay, a former pastor in New Brunswick. He studied at Wolfville, N. S., without however completing the regular course. On entering the ministry his first pastorate was in Lobo, Ont., where he was ordained in 1877. He subsequently held pastorates in

P. E. Island, also in Sussex, N. B., and in Windsor and Yarmouth, N. S. Early in 1899 he was called to Middleboro, Mass., where after a brief sojourn of eight weeks he passed to the spirit world, March 2nd. He never preached to his new charge, except in the dying testimony he gave in his last sufferings among them.

WILLIAM H. MORGAN.

His birth took place at Little Britain, Ontario, August 30th, 1864. He received his early training in the public schools of his native province, and later took a course in the Christian Theological Seminary, Stamford-ville, New York. He held pastorates of Markham. Ont., Lubec and Pembroke, Maine, before taking his last charge at Oak Bay in Charlotte County, N. B. Here he settled in January 1897, and during the brief pastorate given him in this latter place thirty were added to the churches on the field. Largely through his efforts a new church building was erected at Town's Corner, St. James, which was subsequently opened in May 1899.

As a preacher Bro. Morgan was evangelical and sound; he excelled in the conduct of social services; as a pastor he was wise and faithful. His death occurred March 23rd, 1899.

G. M. W. CAREY, D. D.

We now note the fall of a veteran in the service, and of one who was widely known not only in Canada, but also in Great Brittain and the United States as well. Rev. George Montgomery West Carey was born near Belfast, Irelaad, March, 1829, and had at the time of his death completed the alloted three score and ten years. His early life brought him into association with the Moravian brethren at one of their schools, and for them he always cherished a very tender regard. When but a lad he came with his parents to Canada, settling in Ontario.

He took a lengthened course of study at Rochester, New York, which proved to him of lasting benefit. Often he referred to the helpful influence he had received from Martin B. Anderson and others who were honored of God in training so many eminent servants for His cause.

Dr. Carey's first pastorate was in St. Catharine's, Ontario. Afterwards for fifteen years he served Germain Street Church, St. John, until 1881, when he removed to Liverpool, England, to take charge of she Princess Gate Chapel in that city. Returning to America in 1885 he supplied for a short time at at Bay City, Michigan, and although offered its pastorate he decided instead to take the Brantford Church in Ontario. Later he became pastor in Ottawa, remaining until the summor of 1893. We next find him in Brussels Street Church, St. John, where for over five years he continued to minister with marked acceptance. Dr. Carey was no ordinary man. His pulpit abilities were of a very high order, while his general demeanor and Christian conduct was such as to greatly enhance the superior ministerial gifts which he possessed. At all the denominational gatherings he was ever a conspicuous figure and his words of tenderness and helpful counsel were much appreciated by his brethren. The Board has held its quarterly sessions in Fredericton, where its chief business has been transacted.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY.

To the Baptist Annuity Association. located in New Brunswick.

DEAR BRETHREN,—The following is a report of the proceedings of your Board since the last annual meeting held at Havelock, Kings County, N. B., on the 12th. of September 1898:

Your Board has held three meetings since the last annual meetings the records of which are open to inspection.

During the past year the sum of twelve hundred dollars has been withdrawn from the amount of the deposit in the People's Bank of New Brunswick and placed on a mortgage on freehold property in the city of Fredericton at six per cent interest. The sum of two hundred dollars has been paid in on account of the principal of a mortgage from J. Wm. Babbitt, leaving the sum of one thousand dollars as the addition to the principal of the mortgage account during the year.

A loan of four hundred and twenty dollars on a mortgage on lands Oromocto Island, Sunbury County, N. B., is now in contemplation by

Constitution of the N. B. Baptist Sabbath School Convention.

ARTICLE I. This organization shall be known as the New Brunswick Baptist Sabbath School Convention.

ARTICLE II. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary-Treasurer, an Auditor and Executive of five brethren, together with one from each County in the Province. Any five of these shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

ARTICLE III. The membership of the Convention shall consist of the Superintendent and two delegates from each school in the Province. All pastors shall be ex-officio members.

ARTICLE IV. The annual meeting of the Convention shall take place in connection with the sessions of the New Brunswick Baptist Convention, opening on the day previous to that gathering.

ARTICLE V. The object of the Convention shall be to advance the interests of Sabbath School work in the Province—

- (a) By the appointment and support of a Sunday School missionary;
- (b) By striving to effect the co-operation of all the Baptist Sundayschools in the Province in the more successful prosecution of our great denominational enterprises;
- (c) By maintaining colportage work to circulate denominational literature in our Sabbath-schools and home;
- (d) By the organization of County and Parish Associations, auxiliary to the general body.

ARTICLE VI. Special meetings of this Convention may be called at any time by the Executive, due notice of which must be given by the Secretary in the Messenger and Visitor.

ARTICLE VII. This Constitution may be added to or amended at any regular meeting of the Convention by a two-thirds vote.
