NINTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Toronto Infants' Home and Infirmary, was held at the Home, St. Mary street, on October 11th, 1884, at 3 p.m. There were present a number of ladies and gentlemen interested in the welfare of the Institution, amongst whom were Sir Wm. Howland, Mr. W. B. McMurrich, Ald. Harvie, Mr. James Graham, Rev. Mr. Parsons, Rev. Mr. Whitcomb, Dr. Spencer, Rev. Mr. Pater-son, Rev. Mr. Milligan, Mr. Brookman.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT:

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In presenting their Ninth Annual Report the Managers of the Infants' Home and Infirmary would first thank those who have so kindly helped them in their work during the year that has passed, and at the same time would urge them to greater zeal in the future. The Treasurer's Report will show that a great effort has been made to meet the expenses of the year, and for the *first time there is no deficit*, but we most earnestly beg you still to come forward and help us in our great work, for great it truly is, for who can measure the possibilities bound up in the lives of these little children whose very helplessness appeals to us to protect and cherish them.

During the present year we have received :

Of the infants 20 have been sent in by order of the Mayor, and for which the city pays \$5.00 a month, and here we should like to mention, that while this is all we ask it does not nearly defray the expense incurred ; for each one of the infants we must have a nurse, and that nurse must be lodged, clothed, and fed ; also the nurse brings her own child, and that too must be cared for ; so that at the least calculation each child costs us \$10.00 in addition to the \$5.00 paid.

It has been thought by many that our doors should be open to all who choose to apply either for admission themselves, or for their children ; but we consider that we should be making very bad use of the money entrusted to us by the public, and should certainly lay ourselves open to the charge of encouraging vice if we proceeded on any such principle. Each case that comes before us is carefully considered, and the most destitute and friendless (provided they come within the rules of the Home), are the first admitted ; and we have often been greatly cheered by the marked improvement in

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the character and conduct of the inmates. To many of them it is the first home they have ever known, and the first time they have ever come under humanizing influences.

It has been suggested that a system of endowing or supporting cots by annual subscriptions of \$50, would be a good one, and we cordially agree with this suggestion and shall be more than glad to see many of our cots so provided for.

On account of the special nature of our work, which is quite as much Hospital as Refuge work, we still hope in respect to the Government Grant, that all the inmates of the Home will be placed in a higher schedule of the Charities Act, which will entitle them to a larger allowance than they now receive.

We are very sorry to have to record the continued illness of Miss Gwyn, our valuable Lady Superintendent, who though unable to take her usual active part in the affairs of the house still continues to ably direct its internal management, assisted by our Matron Mrs. White, and the Head Nurse Mrs. Cameron.

During the past year we have had many substantial helps. In the spring, being sorely pressed to meet our general expenses, several members of the Board came forward, one generously giving \$500.50 : two, \$100 each, and other members smaller sums, in all \$1,100.10, which made up the arrears. The City Property Committee, with the consent of the Mayor and Council, kindly remitted the ground rent of the lot on which the Home is built, charging us only \$1.00 per annum, a merely nominal rental, for which we are indeed grateful.

In concluding, we would most thankfully acknowledge the kind help of the Doctors, the Clergy, and many others, who have so willingly and cheerfully given time and money in our service, and specially would we mention the Rev. C. J. Whitcombe, who holds a service for the women every Sunday afternoon, as well as a Bible Class every Tuesday evening.

Bible Classes have also been held regularly every week by Mr. Sims and one of the Lady Managers, and during the coming winter, a lady who is a warm friend and supporter of the Home, has kindly consented to take the Bible Class on Sunday evening, so the spiritual welfare of the women will be well cared for. There was also a Night School carried on through last winter, commenced by Canon Osler, assisted by four ladies, which was much appreciated by the women. We hope to have some volunteers for the same work during the coming winter; and we feel sure that those who so liberally give to others, will, themselves, receive abundant blessings from the hand of Him who gives good measure, pressed down, and running over.

OBITUARY.

It is with great sorrow that we have to record the deaths of Mrs. Dixon, and Miss Chapman, who were both workers in our Home, the latter having held a Bible Class weekly for more than two years. Truly it may be said of both of them that they were found with their lamps trimmed and burning when the Master came and called them.

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PHYSICIANS' REPORT, 1883 to 1884.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

The Physicians in attendance on the Infants' Home beg to submit their report for the year ending September 30th, 1884:

The number of Infants admitted during the year was 165; the number of Nurses admitted during the year was 80.

The deaths among the Infants were 51, giving a per centage of 30.9 as against 34.9, that of the preceding year.

The mortality in each month is as follows: Oct. 0; Nov. 3; Dec., 0; Jan., 4; Feb., 1; March, 9; April, 7; May, 7; June, 4; July, 7; Aug., 3; Sept., 6. At least one-third of these deaths, however, took place in infants who were admitted in a hopeless and dying condition, the result of exposure, neglect, and in many cases, of drugging; these hopeless cases should properly be excluded in reckoning the percentage of death rate, which would be exceedingly satisfactory. Almost all the deaths, it may be observed, occurred before the age of twelve months, three only being registered at a later period of life.

Marasmus, as is always the case, has proved the most fatal disease we have had to contend with, fully half the deaths being due to this alone, and this condition is invariably found to exist, more especially in foundlings, and those infants who are admitted from the establishments known as baby farms. The remainder of the death rate has been made up of ordinary diseases of infancy.

The health of the Nurses has been good. We have, however, to record one death which took place in July, after a long and painful illness.

We beg to thank our Lady Superintendent for the constant care and attention she has bestowed throughout the year on the inmates of the Home, and who, assisted by our Matron, has done so much to promote the welfare and prosperity of the institution.

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APPENDIX.

From an able Address, from the President to the Board of Management, on the INTERNAL ECONOMY OF THE "HOME," we extract the following:—

On entering the first decade of our existence, I may be permitted to address a few words to my fellow-workers, and I would thank you for placing me once more in the position of your Presiding officer.

What was nine years ago an experiment in this city has, by the blessing of Him for whom we work, become an established and necessary institution. Each year brings its lesson of experience. We have yet much to learn, and must be content to move slowly. A short review of the past, and a few suggestions for the future is all I will inflict upon you.

Several necessary repairs have been made during the summer—the concrete floors in the kitchen and scullery have been covered with stained wood; those in the laundry, &c., repaired: the furnace having been examined by an expert, was put in thorough repair, &c.

Several of our elder children have been placed in what we have reason to think will prove comfortable and happy homes.

The weekly visiting will, I trust, be efficiently carried out this year, and be what it is intended to be, an assistance to the Superintendent and Matron in matters of domestic detail and discipline.

One very great drawback to the pleasure with which we review the past, and the hope in looking forward to the future, is the very serious illness of Miss Gwyn. I am confident that I speak the sentiments of the Board in deeply lamenting her suffering, borne as it is with heroic fortitude, and in requesting her to consider this her home so long as it may be agreeable to her.

We have opened the year with a clean balance sheet—the first in our history—owing to the munificence of several members of the Board, and hope that, with due economy and increased means, we may not have to face once more a deficit of \$1,200. In order to obtain increased income, a memorial to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council has been drawn up, and lies on the table for additional signatures. We are asking to be placed on the same schedule of "The Charities Aid Act" as the Hospital for Sick Children, which, if granted, will largely increase the possibility of extending our work.

I hope before the year closes we may see our way to provide a detached building for the relief of contagious and infectious diseases. It is most pitiful to be compelled to refuse aid to a wailing infant, struggling with whooping cough, or other infectious diseases. For them there is absolutely no provision.

Let us "thank God" for the past, and "take courage" for the future; trusting that "He, who has led, will lead."

INFANTICIDE AND FOUNDLINGS.

Report of the Special Committee of the Provincial Board of Health.

Dr. Cassidy then read the report of the Special Committee on the advisability of taking precautions to prevent infanticide in this Province, and on the best means by which the present large mortality among foundlings may be diminished.

After giving a summary of the provisions of the law in England relating to infanticide, it stated that infanticide was comparatively a rare crime in this Province. In the Registrar's report for 1882 only one instance was reported, although the illegitimate birth-rate for the same year was one for every forty-three births. One reason for the absence of the crime was no doubt owing to the existence of humane feeling among the unwedded mothers. Another reason was, that the large majority of the illegitimate births occurred in lying-in

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The report then quoted the provision of the English Life Protection Act of 1872, one of which required the owners of all houses where more than two children were taken in to nurse to be registered, and to be subject to inspection. This Act had a great tendency to prevent the mortality among children in baby farms.

The rules of the foundling asylums in Massachusetts were given, and it was stated that under their system the percentage of death among foundlings had been greatly reduced.

The Toronto Infants' Home had also been very successful in reducing the mortality among children of this class, in consequence of the wise system of nursing adopted there. The percentage of deaths in that institution in 1883 was only thirty-five, and the present year it was only thirty-one.

The report recommends the obtaining of bills from the Legislature modelled after the plan of the English Infanticide Acts and the Infant Life Protection Act.

It also recommended to the consideration of the Government the good results in saving life which followed the adoption of the plan used in the foundling asylums of Massachusetts.

The committee, moreover, found that the system of nursing infants followed at the Infants' Home in this city was scientifically correct, and fairly successful, if measured by the results; and recommended that all Foundling Asylums in this Province desirous of receiving aid from the Government should be induced to adopt a similar plan.

The report was adopted.—*Mail*, Nov., 27th, 1885.

NOTE.—Owing to the serious illness of the Superintendent, and the absence from town of the retiring Secretary, the usual history of each child in the Home cannot be inserted this year.

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RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Street, every Monday morning, between 11 and 1.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by the physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months to the Institution in return for board, lodging, and clothing of herself and child. Should her own child die during her residence, she must continue the care of her charge until the expiration of her term, or until such time as she leaves by permission of the Board.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or nurse) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee, shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, &c., of the applicant entered on the record and registered as an inmate.

5. No re-admission of women to this Home.

ADOPTION.

Persons wishing to adopt babies must send to the Home certificates, stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.

A PRAYER FOR THE INFANTS' HOME.

O Gracious God and Saviour, who hast promised that where two or three are gathered together in Thy name Thou wilt meet them and answer their petitions, mercifully look on us Thy servants, and grant us Thy blessing.

We thank Thee that Thou hast put it into our hearts, and those of others, to care for these little ones whom we are gathering into this Home.

We thank Thee for the measure of success Thou hast bestowed on our efforts; and we pray Thee still to prosper and bless our humble endeavours to save both mothers and children. May we not grow weary in our labour of love, and do Thou increase the number of our helpers. Enable us by Thy grace to persevere amidst all discouragements, and to feel ourselves, and to show to others, that Thy blessing rests with us. Fill our hearts with zeal on behalf of these helpless little ones, that we may do them good.

Gracious Saviour, who, in the days of Thy flesh, manifested Thy good-will to little children, rebuking those who would have kept them from Thee, bless those who may be admitted to this Home from time to time. If their lives are spared, may they live to Thy glory; or if Thou seest fit to remove them, take them to Thyself, since Thou hast said, of such is Thy heavenly kingdom. O Lord, hear us and bless us, and give us, we beseech Thee, a right judgment in all things, for the sake of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.
