





MAKE THE LIST LEGAL The objection of the corrupt section of either political party against action which proposes to make the voters' list conform to the "one man, one vote" law is easy to understand. By as many names as the list exceeds the legal standard, opportunities for the casting of fraudulent ballots are given. If the St. John list contains the names of 250 men who, by reason of non-residence, have no qualification to vote either in St. John city or county and the great majority of whom have no intention of coming here to vote, just that many chances for impersonation and perjury are provided. It is difficult to see why any supporter of pure politics would oppose the reduction of those chances. Besides its illegal non-resident addi-tions the St. John voters' list is other-wise very imperfect. According to the






