tain and Ireland. The salt water inshore area, not including minor indentations, covers more than 1,500 square miles, without the numerous lakes in Manitoba and other western districts well stocked with excellent speces of food fish.

The total fisheries expenditure for the year amounted to \$956,196, subdivided as follows: Fisheries proper, \$157,874; fish breeding, \$235,601 fisheries protection service \$225,280; miscellaneous as expenditure \$181,287, and \$156,114 distributed as fishing bounties. The total revenue from fishing Hoenses, fines, etc., durng the same period in the different provinces was \$90,666, including \$10,000 received from the United States fishing fleet, as modus vivendi fees. The deep sea fishermen of the Maritime Provinces received \$186,114 as bounties on their catches for the season of 1907, of which amount the owners and crews of \$27 fishing vessels received \$61,785, and the balace \$94,229, was distributed among 20,520 boat fishermen. Nova Scotia received \$93,281 of the total. Quebec, \$6,102, New Brunswick, \$16,664, and P.

E. Island, \$10,175. Since 1882 the sum of \$4,105,815 has been distributed among the deep sea fishermen to five above named provinces to better enable them to develop their industry.

MADRID, Feb. 18.—The bitter controversy aroused last week by the publication here of some cablegrams exchanged between General Blanco at Havana and the government at Madrid regarding the surrender of the city of Santiage, Cuba, to General Shafter, on Santiage, Cuba, to General Shafter, on the chains cut. The same day General Blanco cabled Madrid that the juncture of the third army corps with the Santiago garrison had become impossible but that Toral must not surrender except on honorable conditions. Madrid thereupon authorized Toral to treat independently of Blanco, but Blanco ascertaining this sent a telegraphic warning to Toral that he could not include the intrefourth army corps in the surrender as the other garrisons were caapble of holding out. Nevertheless General Toral on July 17, surrendered the whole army corps with its war material. In transmitting the announcement of the surrender to Madrid, Blanco reproached the government saying he could have prevented it upon the terms made. He added: "In spite of its dismemberment the army continues intact and the war can be continued."

The Correspondencia which publishes these despatches, declares the exchanges aquit General Blanco of any responsibility and prove "the sad truth that the capitulation was arranged as a preliminary to making peace."





Includes Expenditure of Eleven Millions for Fleet and Fortifications.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 17.—The bills providing for better sea and land defences for Copenhagen and the coast of Zealand, introduced to the Folkething February 12, are meeting with considerable opposition. Even the Ministerialists and many of the cabinet supporters are of the opinion that the existing maritime defences are sufficient without the expense of fortifications on the land side, and there is already talk of a possible dissolution of the Folkething and the elections in March to give the people a chance to decide this matter for themselves. The contemplated fortifications involve an expenditure of something over \$11,-000,000, and include the construction of a score of torpedo boats and half a dozen submarlnes. There is reason to believe that the government, in advocating this scheme has been influenced by the great powers who advertised that Denmark should put herself in a position to repel any attempt by an individual power to occupy Danish terrtory in the event of an outbreak of war.
