Two Hundred Men Gave Up their Lives to Clear Way for Victors-Powers will Force Balkan Allies to Give Up Fruits of Victory—Preparing for Demonstration.

Cettinje, April 2.—The Great Tarabosch fort, which for months has held the allies off Scutari, is now practically in the hands of the Montenegrins, thanks to the sacrifice of 200 bomb throwers, every one of whom lost his life in a last desperate effort to clear the way to the town, for the possession of which Montenegro is ready to give up everything.

These bomb throwers were all picked men, chosen from several battalions. Clambering up the mountain side under a murderous fire from the Turkish guns, they cut the wire entanglements, and getting into close quarters, threw bombs among the Turks thus opening the way for the storming party.

Not one of the bomb throwers returned, but they had accomplished their object, and the Montenegrin infantry, following close upon them, charged the trenches. The Turks held their ground and a desperate and bloody hand-to-hand fight ensued, lasting an hour, and ending in a victory for the Montenegrins, who lost 300 men killed and wounded.






