HAIG'S MEN PUSH NEARER PERONNE-BAPAUME ROAD

British Only Short Distance From Main Artery Immediately Behind German Lines North of Combles.

Germans Fiercely Contesting Ground Around Thiepval—British Lose Section of Hessian Trenches, but Quickly Drive Invaders Out - Rain Halts Activity on French Front.

Steadily the British troops are pressing forward toward the Peronne-Bapaume road, the main artery immediately behind the German lines north of Combles. After taking 500 yards of trenches southwest of Le Sara, General Sir Douglas Haig's men made additional progress in the capture of 500 yards of German trenches east of Lesboeufs.

The British occupation of territory between Thiepval nd the Ancre is being contested strongly by the Germans. A German counter-attack, following the entry of the British into a section of the Hessian trenches resulted in the forcing back of the holders. The section was regained later, however, by the British, London says. Heavy fighting also has occurred around the Stuff redoubt. Rain is hampering operations on the remainder of the Anglo-French front north

Paris mentions no activity following the advance between Fregicourt and Morval toward Sailly, on the Perconne-Bapaume road.

QUIET IN THE OTHER WAR THEATRES.

There has been no great activity on any of the other fronts in Europe except in Transylvania, where the Austro-Germans have repulsed the Roumanians at Hermannstadt. Vienna says the Teutonic forces also have occupied the heights east and southeast of the town after violent fighting. The battle in this section, however, has not yet been finished. The intense fighting in the region of Korynitza, on the eastern front in Russia, appears to have come to an end. Berlin and Vienna say that the Russia, appears to have come to an end. HYPHENS HE DON'T

Angered by Message Accusing Him of Pro-British Tendency Serves Notice on Disloyal Americans.

New York, Sept. 29—Stung to anger by an avalanche of insulting and insistent communications, demanding that the government take certain action with regard to Germany, President Wilson, through the medium of a telegram addressed to Jeremiah A. O'Leary, president of the so-called American Truth Society, an organization formed for the purpose of aiding the German propaganda, today served notice on the hyphenates that he wants no "disloyal" American to vote for him. The president's message, which was in reply to a telegram from O'Leary accusing him of being pro-British, was sent from Long Branch, N. J. and reads:

"Your telegram received. I would feel deeply mortified to have you or anybody like you vote for me. Since you have access to many disloyal Americans and I have not, I will ask you to convey this message to them."



MOST VIOLENT ATTACKS BY BULGARS FUTILE AGAINST VALIANT

Serbians Still in Possession of Highest Peak of Kaimakcalon Ridge in Spite of Furious Assaults by Bulgarians.

Saloniki, Sept. 29, via London (1.50 p. m.)—Despite violent attacks by the Bulgarians the Serbians still held the highest peak of the Kaimakcalan ridge, says an official statement issued today by the Serbian war office. The statement follows:

"On the night of September 27 the Bulgarians undertook four flerce attacks on the Serbian Drina division. All were repulsed with heavy loss3s. The highest peak of Kaimakcalan, (called by the Serbians Crown Prince Boris), is still in Serbian hands.
