

LLOYD GEORGE THREATENS TO RESIGN POST

Revolt of "Die-Hard" Tories Against His Leadership Causing Premier Anxiety.

CHAMBERLAIN LEADER OF THE COALITION

Unionist Leader Might Be Called Upon to Form Gov't Should Premier Resign.

London, March 1.—The report that the Prime Minister had threatened to resign has been the political sensation of the day. Hints of Mr. Lloyd George's resignation have been current ever since Sir George Young, head of the Conservative party organization, engineered a revolt of some fifty "die-hards" Tories against the Premier during the latter's absence at the business meeting. One outcome of that revolution was a practical split in the Coalition and public abandonment of the so-called co-operation system, which heretofore candidates, whether Conservatives or Liberals, entered the electoral contests under a united banner.

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If He Presents His Resignation It Will Be Personal and Not Resignation of Govt.

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If the Prime Minister presents his resignation, it will surely be a personal resignation and not the resignation of the Government.

MANY CLASHES OCCURRED IN DAIL EIREANN

De Valera Continued to Press for Recognition of the Dail's Supremacy.

MINISTERS HOLD THEY ARE SUPREME

Net Results of Two Days Debate Has Strengthened the Hands of Provisional Gov't.

Dublin, March 1.—Numerous clashes occurred again in the Dail Eireann today, the feeling running high. Mr. De Valera continued to press for recognition of the Dail's supremacy, but the Ministers of the Provisional Government held firmly that they were supreme and responsible only to the Irish people. Divisions continue to show there is no doubt that Griffith is in control. Observers expressed the opinion tonight that the net results of the two days' debate had been to strengthen the hands of the Provisional Government and increase public confidence in their ability to handle the situation.

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All Night With the Wine 27 Men Reel Into Court

Crap Shooters and Wine Locked Up in the Same Jail Corridor.

Lynn, Mass., March 1.—Twenty-seven craphooters and twenty-seven barrels of wine were locked up in the same jail corridor last night.

When the prisoners reeled into the court room today the court told them severely that they should know better than to drink liquor in the law's custody, and fined each of them \$5. They paid, some of them remarking that the wine was well worth it.

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DYNAMITING INCREASING IN MINING DISTRICTS OF SOUTH AFRICA

Eight Heavy Explosions Occurred Yesterday—Attempt to Blow Up Rail Line

London, March 1.—Dynamiting is increasing in the disturbed mining districts of South Africa. Reuter's Johannesburg correspondent states that eight heavy explosions occurred today, five on the power line. Little damage was done however. An attempt was made on the railway line near the Apex Station, while other attempts at doing damage were reported on the water line at Benoni. There has been an explosion near Bokaburg, but the exact location has not yet been ascertained.

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EXPECT GOOD EFFECT FROM VISITATION

Little Hope However Mr. Fielding's Trip to Washington Will Result in Reciprocity.

FARMER BLOC ALL POWERFUL

This Class, Many Near Bankruptcy, Want Higher Duties on Agriculture Products.

Washington, March 1.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, today, in private consultation with President Harding, following his interview yesterday with Acting Secretary of State Fletcher. The visit of the Canadian Minister aroused much interest in political circles here, and there is a great deal of speculation as to the possible outcome of the Department of State, recalls of the object of Mr. Fielding's visit, and Mr. Fielding himself has refused to make any statement. From unofficial sources, however, it is learned that the possibility of an arrangement of reciprocal free trade in certain commodities, at some future time, has been discussed during the conference, together with the effect of prospective tariff legislation.

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BRITISH GOVT WILL EXTRADITE SCHOONER CREW

Have Moved for Custody of Those Held in Connection With Captain Chute's Death.

CLAIM BASED ON CONVENTION OF 1882

Six Men Held in Connection With Alleged Murder of Ship's Commander.

Key West, Fla., March 1.—The British Government moved today to claim custody of members of the British schooner *Lewis Brothers* held here in connection with the death at sea last week of Captain St. Chute, of the vessel which British vice-consul Taylor forwarded to Washington a formal request based on instructions from his government that the men be extradited to New York. The men are held here in connection with the case, one, V. Brackishure, mate of the schooner, on a charge of murder; Giuseppe Amore, an Italian subject, while Carter is a British subject.

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NOVA SCOTIA MINERS AND BRITISH EMPIRE STEEL CORPORATION HAVE AGREED ON WORKING CONDITIONS

Details Not Given Out, But It Is Said Settlement Will Bring About Peace and Harmony at the Mines for Remainder of the Year.

Montreal, March 1.—An agreement in the matter of wages and working conditions was reached this afternoon by the executive officers of District 26 (Nova Scotia) United Mine Workers of America and officials of the British Empire Steel Corporation, who have been in conference here for the past two days. The terms of the agreement were not given out, pending a report by the union officials to all the miners of District 26, but it was said that the settlement would bring about peace and harmony at the coal mines for the remainder of the year.

From the coal mining districts of Nova Scotia, in convention at Truro last week, members of the District Executive Board of the United Mine Workers proceeded to Montreal and have, during the past two days, been in conference with Vice-President R. H. MacDougall, of the British Empire Steel Corporation, in regard to the wage questions that have been outstanding. While it is understood that a satisfactory settlement of all the points at issue between the mine workers and the coal companies with the British Empire Steel Corporation has been arranged, details of the settlement are withheld until these have been placed before the mine workers by their union officials. It may be stated, however, that the settlement will bring about peace and harmony at the coal mines for the remainder of the year.

HOLDS BABY IN TUB OF WATER TILL IT DIES

Father, 19, Says He Wanted to Die and Decided to Take Baby With Him.

New York, Mar. 1.—Walter Liddle, 19 years old, of 507 East 179th street, The Bronx, went to 143rd street near Alexander avenue yesterday afternoon to meet his wife, Mrs. Mary Corrigan Liddle, of 397 Willett avenue, from whom he has been separated for a month. He took from her their eight-month-old son, which he had said would take to his home for dinner. He told her that she would never see the child alive again, but she thought he was joking and did not pay much attention to him.

THE LEGISLATURE.

The session of the Legislative Assembly which opens today will provide abundant opportunities for the Opposition to successfully challenge the methods of administering provincial affairs which the Foster Government has been practising.

A despatch from Fredericton contains a partial forecast as to what the Speech from the Throne will contain. Criticism of this must necessarily stand over until the Speech is delivered and the contents made public.

The most far reaching proposal is that made by Representative Ten Eyck, of New York State, whose bill calls for the ceding of the south bank of the St. Lawrence to the United States.

As for the highways, the more money that is spent upon them, the more they seem to need. After having spent \$4,989,885 on so-called permanent roads, and \$1,302,511 on ordinary roads during the last five years, these roads should be in such a condition as not to require any very heavy further expenditures in the near future.

P., for Northumberland, who succeeded his father, the late J. W. Vanderbeck, being elected on a by-election, also H. D. D. Stewart of Dalhousie, M. P. P., for Restigouche, whose election, at the time of the general election, was protested but who took their seats through a decision of the Courts. Identity of Man Stabbed To Death Remains Mystery

All Possible Marks of Identification Had Been Removed from Clothing. White Plains, N. Y., Mar. 1.—County detectives working on various clues for 24 hours are still in the dark as to the identity of the well-dressed young man who was found stabbed to death on the Mount Calvary Cemetery road, near the White Plains Fair Grounds, on Sunday, or the cause that led to the murder. Coroner Edward Fitzgerald and Sheriff Geo. J. Wagner made a minute examination of the clothing of the murdered man today and could find nothing that would help solve the mystery. It was announced that the name of the maker of the dead man's collar had been removed by some kind of an emollient, the makers' tag on the overcoat and the coat had been slashed away and the man's collar had been stolen. The police first received word that a cap, believed to have belonged to the man who met his death at the hands of at least four men, who slashed his back and head in eight different places, had been seen near the place where the body was found. After the body had been taken to the Lyons and Barnett morgue at White Plains, Coroner Fitzgerald sent an officer to get the cap, which the police had failed to pick up in the first instance, and then it was discovered that some one had taken it away. Detective Frank Chetico, who has run down many Italian murders in Westchester county, believes that friends of the murderers, or one of them, returned to the scene of the crime after the officers had left, and took the cap. Husband Shot By Wife In Dispute Following Party

Woman Claims She Fired in Self Defence as She Fears Beating.

New York, Mar. 1.—A dispute that began at an all-night party in their home on the top floor of a little two-family house at 153 42nd street, Brooklyn, came to an end early this morning shortly after the guests had gone home, when Mrs. Helen Eysel shot and killed her husband, George Eysel. She said later that she fired in self-defence just as her husband came through the door of the dining room with a blackjack to strike her. This was corroborated by the police by the finding of the weapon with the strap around the wrist of the dead man. The shooting was witnessed by Albert Diaz, a police officer, and Mrs. Eysel by her former husband. After her arrest on a charge of homicide, Mrs. Eysel was taken to the office of the assistant district attorney Reuben Wilson and to him she told the whole sordid story of her married life and of the killing. She opened her fur coat and showed bruises as evidence of a beating she said she had but recently received at the hands of her husband. Eysel was 38 years old, and his wife is about the same age. She married him in 1917. Her first husband was a lieutenant in the British Royal Artillery, by him she had a son, Albert, and a younger daughter. Picking up the blackjack from Mr. Wilson's desk, Mrs. Eysel illustrated how the dead man had threatened her when she stood across the few feet of space the one bullet which dropped him to the floor. "I called to him twice, George, are you dead?" she told the assistant district attorney. "I thought he was taking. I could see no blood. I thought he was going to get me. 'If you are not dead, I am going to kill you,' I told him." There was no response, Mrs. Eysel said, and she dropped her husband's head and went down the stairs into the street. When she got to the sidewalk, she met Policeman John Patten running toward the front door. She handed him the revolver and told him she had shot her husband. Series of Quarrels. According to Mrs. Eysel, her married life had been a series of family quarrels complicated by her objection to her husband's attention to her sister, Mrs. Margaret O'Brien, who lived in the neighborhood. A more recent cause of trouble, she said, was that Eysel had taken \$109 which she had saved. Eysel, the police said, became a bootlegger. During the party Eysel got out his revolver to show to the guests. Mrs. Eysel told Mr. Wilson that it was unloaded. When she got to the sidewalk, she met Policeman John Patten running toward the front door. She handed him the revolver and told him she had shot her husband. When the situation grew acute between husband and wife, the guests left hurriedly. In the dining room was reference to the sister-in-law who had been at the party, and she was present part of the time. Mrs. O'Brien went downstairs and the pair were quarrelling. A few minutes afterward Eysel followed her. When he returned the blackjack was fast about his wrist. "When I heard him open the door I knew he was going to beat me," Mrs. Eysel said. "I pointed the revolver at him and pulled the trigger. I was much surprised when it went off. I thought it was not loaded. He must have put cartridges in it after he showed it to his friends earlier in the evening." Her ten-year-old son, Albert, who was only a few feet away from his mother when she killed her husband, corroborated her story of the shooting.
