Canadian, British and Foreign.

[To the Associated Press.]

London, Jan. 2. Breadstuffs quiet; Consols 91 1/8. Despatches to London papers agree that European powers will recognize Alfonso as soon as his representatives are accredited at the various Courts. News despatches say Castelar, Martos, Admiral Topete, Zorilla, and General Paris promised to support Alfonso.

The Cuban army telegraphed its adhesion to the new order. Dorregary, Lazzarini and 800 other Carlist officers are expected to join Alfonso. Alfonso awaits the arrival of a Spanish frigate at Manzanillo to proceed to Spain. He will visit the armies before entering Madrid. A squadron of Government vessels sailed from Cartagena for Manzanillo to escort King Alfonso to Spain, who will probably disembark at Valencia. A telegram from Carlist headquarters says: "Alfonso's proclamation leaves the situation unchanged. No defection of Carlist army, the change strengthening us and weakening the enemy."

New York, Jan. 2. Gold 112 1/2; Exchange unchanged. At the burning of a residence near Blairville, Pa., last night two persons were burned to death, and three others fatally injured by jumping from windows.

London, Jan. 4. GARRIBOLDI declines the national grant for his relief on account of the condition of the Italian finances.

KAMMER WILHELM says he is gratified at the continuance of peace in Europe, which it was the first duty of Germany to preserve.

It is said that Italy is negotiating with other powers for a common course of action with regard to Spain.

Germany is prepared to recognize Alfonso. The King of the Belgians has not recognized the new King as reported. Recognition by American and European Cabinets is expected.

A COMPLETE AMNESTY has been granted to all Carlists. GENERAL SUPPORT. The new King is promised general support by the military and naval authorities.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4. MINERS' STRIKE. Work in the coal and iron works of Pennsylvania is generally suspended, the workmen refusing to accept the new scale of wages offered.
