## DEATH OF JOHN W. CUDLIP.

We regret to have to announce the death of John W. Cudlip Esq., Inspector of Customs, which took place at his residence on Sunday morning. Mr. Cudlip complained of feeling tired on Saturday evening and retired at an early hour to his own room. Some of the family were with him at 9 o'clock and left him then sleeping. Shortly after, one of his children, hearing him call, ran to his assistance and found the room filled with smoke and the bed-clothing in flames, which had caught from the paper he was reading. The flames were quickly extinguished, and medical aid at once summoned, but the most skillful efforts to save his life proved unavailing, and about 3 o'clock on Sunday morning he passed away peacefully, conscious to the last, and surrounded by his wife and family for whom the heartfelt sympathy of the community is manifested. Mr. Cudlip was the son of a British naval officer who served with distinction at Nelson at Trafalgar, and who was also present at the siege of Washington. He was educated in St. John and England, and on his return to St. John entered mercantile life with the late Hon. John Robertson, and afterwards formed with Mr. G. E. Snider the business house of Cudlip & Snider, which was for many years one of the most influential firms in the Local Legislature for many years and he was particularly active in securing the legislation which built the Western Extension. He actively opposed Confederation, and was elected against the Quebec scheme, and subsequently became a member of the Smith administration in Sir Arthur Gordon's time. He gave valuable and disinterested service to the public, and his strongest political opponent could never charge him with using position for his personal benefit. On the success of Confederation Mr. Cudlip retired from active political life, and in 1873 he was appointed Inspector of Customs by the Mackenzie administration, and he discharged the duties of his office with ability. He was a man whose great popularity rested on the enduring basis of an independent character and honorable dealing, and hence he was deservedly beloved by rich and poor alike. Those who knew him in his early years will be kindly remembered. For his family and immediate relatives there is much sympathy.—*Globe* 25th.
