

DEVELOPMENT AT DRUMMOND MINES.

(Continued from page 2.)

In measuring the mine owners on assurances of a \$6,400 a mile subsidy from the Dominion government and the Provincial Government guaranteeing the bonds for a branch line designed to construct the road, themselves from the Mine to Black's Cut on the I. C. R. a few miles from here, the understanding being that the line would be extended to this port, the Dominion Government further agreeing to dredge Bathurst Harbor to permit shipments of ore; and the Gloucester County Council exempting the Drummonds from taxation for 20 years, and voting a bonus of \$25,000 to be paid when shipments would be made from a port in Gloucester County.

The new railway is about completed except "Fruit-a-lives" cut and the Drummond. The contract was given to Messrs. Wheaton Brothers and it is needless to say that the well known and reliable railway contractors are making a high class road in every respect. Ballasting is now being proceeded with and the line will be opened for traffic the present month.

Mr. James J. Taylor, now on the St. John Valley Railway Survey was in charge of the engineering work on the Northern N. B. and Sea Board Railway the name of the Drummond Mine. His associates were Messrs. Danny Shaw and Charles Bruce—the latter now being in charge of the completion of the works.

Mr. Taylor is a man of experience, ability and character, and it is felt in Gloucester circles that the Provincial Government was fortunate in securing his services as an associate of Mr. D. E. Maxwell in the survey of the St. John Valley line.

Most Bathurst people hope to have their harbor dredged to such an extent that all the ore from the Drummond mine will be shipped from that port with the next few years. Some wise heads appear to feel however, that it is not practical to think of making Bathurst a port of shipment at all—the cost would be too great, etc. Other wise property holders for Newcastle and Bathurst through the shipment of ore within the next few years.

For over a year in the immediate vicinity of the mine the Drummonds have been making large improvements, clearing grounds, constructing dwelling houses, store houses, etc., and unearthing the iron preparatory to the construction of the mine. Immense machinery for the working of the mines is now being placed in position there.

Already a large store has been opened at the mine by Mr. T. M. Burns and it is expected that within a year what was a forest little more than twelve months ago will be a thriving village and rapidly going on to town or city size.

In a few months several hundred men will be engaged at the mines.

There are splendid farming lands between here and the mine, the course of the Anglo-Saxon, has begun to clear the ground to instruct that these

lands be surveyed into farms of 100 acres each and it is expected that the date by between 100 and 200 new settlers.

It has been the effect of the Drummond Mine and the new railway on the business of Bathurst. Most marked, indeed. The population of the town is showing a very noticeable increase and property values have been greatly enhanced. There is a feeling of hopefulness to be observed on every hand; and while the leading business men hope for nothing like a mining boom, all are experiencing the good effect of the advance of a genuine mining boom.

Who are the Drummonds? They are Montreal gentlemen, three brothers of the late Dr. Drummond, who next to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, stood close to the hearts of the people of Quebec—Dr. Drummond who will long a place in the affections of French Canada as the discoverer of "The Habitant." The living brothers are Messrs. Thos. J. George E. and John J. Drummond. They are the moving spirits in the great Canada Iron Corporation of which Mr. Edgar Macdougall of Montreal is managing director of the Royal Bank of Canada, President of the Lake Superior Corporations at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, and a Past President of the Montreal Board of Trade. The Canada Iron Company is the parent company of the Drummond Mines.

SERMON FROM SHAKESPEARE.

O God, that men should put an enemy into their mouths To steal away their brains.

Act II, Sc. 3.

The age is groaning under the weight of the time. There was no half-hearted performance and the idea of the period went to excess in all things. It is difficult to conceive of the creator of Sir John Falstaff and Sir Toby Belch in the role of a temperance lecturer, but no more fitting discourse on the evils of intemperance was ever delivered than that contained in Act II, Sc. 3 of "Othello." Cassio has "with joy, pleasure, revel, and applause," transformed himself into "a beast." By close application to his profession, by his genial manners and noble character he was winning his way upwards. A trustful officer—he was carrying out a brilliant career with his sword. One drinking bout apparently ruined all, and in his despair he could but exclaim, "O, I have lost the reputation I have lost the immortal part of myself and what remains is beastly."

A man who, through strong drink, has once been guilty of an act of trust is no longer believed in. His associates, friends and employers are always expecting that the enemy which he allowed to steal away his brains may again take hold of him. He is a tainted object, and it is difficult for him to live down his reputation. He lives under a cloud of his own creation, a cloud, hard to scatter.


