BURIAL AT GODERICH





PLEADS HER POVERTY ON \$10,000 A YEAR

Wife of Major Julian Smith Says She Was "Dreadfully Poor and Couldn't Entertain."

New York, Feb. 3.—The household accounts of Mrs. Elizabeth C. Smith proved too much for a jury in the Queens County Supreme Court yesterday. She submitted them in support of her contention that she was "dreadfully poor" on an income of \$10,000 a year. This dire poverty, she said, prevented her from offering her friends even the simplest private entertainments. Her exposition of her financial condition was interposed as a defence to the suit of her husband, Major Julian Smith, who wants her to account for money he left with her or sent to his wife while he was in the A. E. F. in France.

FAT MAN DIES

BUDAPEST, Feb. 3.—Many poor people of this city are being driven to wholesale theft by the fuel shortage. The recent theft of 25 carloads of wood from one train of 100 carloads as it entered the city shows the extent to which the stealing is going on. Wood is so scarce that when a wagon-load is driven through the streets people stop and gaze after it until it is out of sight. During small boys are ever on the alert for a stray piece of wood or anything that will give heat at home. They scamp after every passing wood wagon, but are soon frightened away by long whips in the hands of two women who sit on guard astride the load.

WITHDRAWAL OF ARGENTINE DELEGATES FROM LEAGUE WAS EXPRESSLY ORDERED

President of South American Republic Insisted That Delegates Should Carry Out Instructions Demanding That All Sovereign States Should Have Right of Membership in League.

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 4.—(Associated Press).—The withdrawal of the Argentine delegates from the League of Nations Assembly at Geneva was expressly ordered by President Irigoyen, after the chief of the Argentine delegation inquired whether Argentina would be satisfied with a partial compliance with its demand that all sovereign states should have the right of membership in the league. This has been disclosed by official documents now made public here confirming previous unofficial declarations that President Irigoyen had personally directed the action of the Argentine delegation at Geneva. The documents show that Dr. Honorio Pueyrredon, head of the Argentine delegation, had been instructed before the meeting of the league assembly that the Argentine delegation must not compromise itself in any way or take any part in the work of the assembly before a decision had been reached on the "fundamental proposition" that all the sovereign states were entitled to admission to the league.

Two days after the league assembly, Dr. Pueyrredon was instructed by the Government that "if for any reason whatever" the Argentine contention should "not prove or should not be proved," the Argentine delegation must "without delay retire," presenting a note explaining its point of view and its ideals.

MODEST AUTHOR LEADS CURIOUS A LONG SEARCH

"William Denham, Knight," On Prime Minister's List, Proves a Mystery. EXPERTS ARE PUZZLED

Coalition Whip Ultimately Re-members and Identifies Unionist Supporter.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—There is such a thing as overdoing modesty, says the opinion of persons in London literary circles who for some days worried themselves considerably with efforts to find out who one of the newly-made knights by the name of William Denham could be. The name in the list issued by the prime minister, he was described merely as "author and writer." But it seems that no one had ever heard of William Denham, nor could they think of anything he had written.

Inquiries became so widespread and curiosity became so keen as to why and for what special deed the unknown had been raised to the knighthood that the London Daily Mail finally assigned a reporter to solve the mystery. He began by looking through all the English reference books that make any pretence at listing notable names of authors, including Who's Who, London telephone and post office directories, Publishers' Catalogue, the Literary Who's Who, Sell's World's Press and the British Imperial Calendar without getting a clue.

Next he made inquiries of the secretary of Premier Lloyd George, the Author's Club, Max Pemberton of the London School of Journalism, Sir Henry Brittain of the Pilgrims, the headquarters of the Unionist Party, the Board of Trade, the coalition whip's office and a dozen government offices and other like places, at the end of which search his score still was zero.

Finally the indigible reporter began calling up all the Denhams in the telephone book. One of these afforded a slight hope. He had in his library a book by Denham. He would look it up. But he returned to the telephone and looking through all the Denhams who had written that book had not used his initials and that besides it was printed in 1912, so that the author probably was no longer among the living.

The editor of the Whitehall Gazette, a government organ, said he had some data somewhere about a William Denham and would look them up. But later he announced that he made a mistake, that the name he had been thinking of was Sir Wilfred Denham, about whom he knew nothing. The reporter went back to the reference books, again without results.

At last the mystery was solved after a fashion by Lord Edmund Talbot, Chief Coalition Whip, who said that he had put forward the name of Sir Wilfred, but even could not remember exactly for what reason he had put the name forward.

"Sir Wilfred is a very old supporter of the Unionist party," he explained. "He is now a very old man. He has from time to time written political articles for the party, and during the war he wrote an important article or pamphlet or book—I cannot remember for the moment whether it was a poem or in prose, but I am quite sure it was something for the must balls. At any rate, it was very popular, but the name of it has gone out of my head. Sir Wilfred's name was put forward twice before, but was overlooked. But I am glad it went through this time, for his work has been important and well deserving of the honor."

POPE'S CONVENT BAN LAID TO PRO-GERMANS

Sisters Expelled in Alsace Made Trouble, It Is Said.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—That perennial of the Catholic convent in the village of Marienthal in Alsace is beginning to have results which may reveal whether the convent, as some assert, was the scene of wild orgies or whether the whole furor was aroused by pro-German sisters who were expelled from Alsace because they refused to adopt French nationality.

The father of a nun known as Sister Marguerite, who apparently has lent too willing an ear to the tales of wild life, has demanded that the legal authorities force his daughter, who is under 21, to return home. This she refuses to do, insisting that she will never leave the convent unless compelled by force.

Friends of the convent are petitioning the pope to direct an impartial investigation of all charges, but since the bull was issued the Vatican persists in ignoring everything relating to the excommunicated group. The public of Marienthal is vigorously condemning the methods used by the pope's envoy, who prohibited the continuance of the convent. It now seems that this emissary not only forced his way into the convent, but with the aid of a clock-maker succeeded in removing sacred relics, despite cries of protest from the occupants.

The sisters insist that during the war they were not engaged in anti-German propaganda, although they admit that a superior now dead, left a written prophecy that once the French troops entered Alsace the war would end abruptly. It is suggested that it was this prophecy that aroused the cry of the German nuns, who in turn succeeded in obtaining the papal injunction.
