Increased Livestock Production To Overcome Meats Shortage

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—Canadian Press.—There is a world shortage of meats at the present time, and this is likely to become greater as time passes, according to P. E. Light, chief of he market intelligence division, who deals with this subject in the Agricultural Gazette. It is estimated that the world requires fifty billion pounds of meat annually, and that while the population increased by 85,000,000 (from 510,000,000 to 595,000,000) between the years 1901 to 1914, cattle, sheep and hogs combined only increased 40,000,000 (from 1,065,000,000 to 1,105,000,000)

Mr. Light points out that general economic progre well as the increase in human population, makes fresh mands upon available lands and tends to bring about a relative decline in the output of animal produce. The decline must be offset by an extension in live stock production sufficient to meet increased consumptive demand. Any great augmentation of population in Canada at the present time would find us in a situation where we would either be severely taxed to provide for the total domestic demand or else compelled to curtail our export trade.



New York, Feb. 3 .- The household accounts of Mrs. Elizabeth C. Smith proved too much for a jury in the Queens County Supreme Court yesterday. Among the items which Mrs. Smith charged to her husband's account were \$352 for trips she made to St. Louis to see about an inheritance; \$80 for dues in the Douglaston Association; sums for personal gifts to her church, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the cost of gift photographs and clothes and cigarettes for her son Donafd, who is "self-supporting." The cigarette item was justified on the ground that Mr. Smith told the wife to buy a present for the boy.

Excerpts of the letters designed to prove that Smith approved of his wife's expenditures were read into the record. One of them said:

I was prepared to read a lot from you about finances or lack of finances and was not disappointed. Am awfully sorry that I had to leave same in such a bad shape, but it was impossible to help it. You know, I left New York, practically without a cent and living here is horribly expensive. The insurance premiums, about \$79 must be paid every three months. Then there is another insurance premium, payable once a year, due some time in June, about \$150. The taxes should be paid as they fall due. So don't worry over money matters as long as you have a few hundred dollars in any bank. It is not worth while making any remarks about the list of bills, etc., that you write of. I have been so used to bills that they have ceased to worry me, and over here it is a pleasure to forget them altogether (or try to).

The evidence showed that \$3,000 of Mrs. Smith's income was her own and \$2,000 came from her husband. Justice Faber reserved decision and allowed the attorneys until February 15 to submit briefs.



FRENCH STUDIOS HURT BY AMERICAN FILMS

Competition From U. S. and Germany

PARIS, Feb. 3.—The French cinema ndustry is dangerously near collapse, says M. Delac, one of the leaders in the film world here. In appealing to the Paris municipal council not to compel the closing of theatres by the proposed increase of city taxes, he points out that American as well as German competition spells death to the film studios of France, and will force 600,000 persons out of work.
"Cinema photography is a French art

which has been industrialized by Americans and Germans," M. Delac said. "At present we are actually sub-merged with thousands of American films, while a large number of German films bearing American marks are find-ing their way over the market." M. Delac insists that the French Gov-ernment must take a hand if it wishes to get the advantage of propaganda which the United States is obtaining from films sent abroad. NEW ANAESTHETIC BETTER THAN GOCAINE. THOUGH ITS NAME IS 47 LETTERS LONG

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Feb. 3.—It has remained for surgeons to deaden pain with 47 letters of the alphabet. These letters form the word "para-amino-benzoyldie-thyla mino-ethanol-hydrochlorid." This is a new anaesthetic, better kno wn as pro-cain, or novo-cain, which possesses all the pain deadening, but none of the habit-forming qual-

It was discovered in Germany early in the present century, but did not come into common usage until early in the war. Physicians of the University of Virginia Hospital were among the first to introduce the drug into this country, and for the past few years it has been used extensively in this institution for operations upon the eye, ear, nose and throat, and for major operations.
Some of its unusual properties were described today by Dr. J.

N. Waddell.

"The fact that novo-cain is teen times less poisonous, or toxic, than cocaine, makes it more desirable as a local anaesthetic," he said. "It is a synthetic benezine derivative, non-irritating in character, and quantities as high as seven and one helf grains may be administered without harmful effects. It superinduces no exhibitation, after being absorbed by the blood, Its after-effects are practically nil. In operations where large areas have to be injected with a local anaesthetic to block off pain impressions from the brain, doctors are always fearful of using a great quantity of cocain e on account of its harmful effects upon the heart and respiration."

The Argentine Government officials have stated that Argentina will not formally announce its withdrawal from the league because it takes the ground that it had given only its "adheston in general," to the league, and that this did not constitute actual membership.

POPE'S CONVENT BAN LAID TO PRO-GERMANS

Sisters Expelled in Alsace Made Trouble, It Is Said.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—That perennial of the Carmelite Convent in the village of Marienthal, in Alsace, is beginning to have results which may reveal whether the convent, as some assert, was the scene of wild orgies or whether the whole furor was aroused by pro-German sisters who were expelled from Alsace because they refused to adopt French nationality.

The father of a nun known as Sister Marguerite, who apparently has lent to willing an ear to the tales of wild life, has demanded that the legal authorities force his daughter, who is under 21, to return home. This she refuses to do, insisting that she will never leave the convent unless compelled by force Friends of the convent are petitioning the pope to direct an impartial investi-gation of all charges, but since the bull was issued the Vatican persists in ignoring everything relating to the ex-communicated group. The public of Martenthal is vigorously condemning the methods used by the pope's envoy, who prohibited the continuance of the convent. It now seems that this emissary not only forced his way into the convent, but with the aid of a clock-maker succeeded in removing sacred relics, despite cries of protest from the

NEWSPRINT PRODUCTION ON INCREASE IN U. S.

New York, Feb. 4.—(By Canadian Press).—Figures compiled by the federal trade commission show that the production of newsprint in the United States is on the increase. The output of the United States mills for the twelve months, ending December 31, 1920, amounted to 1,511,968 tons, against 1,374,517 tons in 1919, and 1,260,225 tons in 1918. While many United States publishers are still largely dependent upon Canada for their supplies, there are indications that the recent increase in price effected by some of the Canadian mills has turned United States consumers to other markets, and the prediction is made here that if the prices of the Canadian product åre maintained at their present high level, Canada's export newsprint business may be seriously affected.

The trade commission's statistics show that the Dominion manufacturers are meeting with ever-increasing competition from Europe. In. November, 1919, Canada had a monopoly of the United States market, not a roll of newsprint being received in this country from Europe, while Canadian mills sent 59,266 tons of non-duttable printing paper (which includes practically all newsprint) to this market. In November, 1920, however, Canada's share of the trade was cut down to 52,337 tons, while imports from Europe were: From Germany, 4,059 tons; from Swedden, 2,920 tons; from Norway, 1,472 tons.



Carried Credits.

The report says the 1919/and 1920 budgets of Germany carried a number of credits, which were only partially disbursed, such as 16,500,000,000 marks for the Allied armies of occupation expenses, of which only 4,500,000,000 marks was spent. The budget for 1920 carried 42,000,000,000 marks for execution of the peace treaty while only 17,000,000,000 marks had been paid out up to December 1 last.

PACIFISM IN U. S.

Pershing Says Republic Should Go Ahead Till Rest Agree to Quit.

Washington, Feb. 2.-A. warping, against pacifism and unpreparedness was given the House naval committee today by Gen. Pershing, who appeared to discuss world disarmament. While expressing approval of the proposal for a world disarmament cenfernce, he said the United States should go ahead with its present navy and army programs, until a definite agreearmy programs, until a definite agreement has been reached by at least the five great world powers.

"We should steer, clear of drifting into a pacifist state of mind simply because we are discussing, the subject." Gen. Pershing asserted. None of us wants war, but we do not want to becaught unprepared if war comes."

The nations of the world know the general added, that the economic position of the United States would enable it to outstrip the world in military preparation if it so desired, and that, therefore, they would realize the sincerity of a move for disarmament if initiated by this country, and would subscribe to it gladly.

"A war between Great Britain and the United States is not conceivable," said Gen. Pershing.

NEEDS HALF BILLION.
Washington, Feb. 2.—Nearly half a illion dollars will be required to comlete the United States naval building rogram, embarked upon in 1916, the program, embarked upon in 1916, the House appropriations committee estimated today in a report on the anuual naval appropriation bill for the fiscal year 1922. The committee said that while the total cost of completing the program was vriginally placed at \$544,700,000, increased cost of materials and labor probably would increase the total cost to \$972,931,000, of which \$538,270,000 byer here supropriated.


