City of Santo Domisoo (via Havana), Aug. 22.—Infornation has reached here that on the night of Aug. 29 Haytian troops stationed near the frontier of the Dominican Republic invaded the territory of this country. The Dominican Government at once dispatched an armed force to drive out the intruders. The Dominican troops were successful and repulsed the enemy, killing 23 men and wounding a number of others. MR. Webb's Dailly TALK.

New York, Aug. 22.—Mr. Webb tonight gave out a statement declaring that the company had not discharged any men because they belonged to a labor organization. The discharge of the 50 or 60 men mentioned in Mr. Powderly's appeal was due to drunkenness, incapacity, breach of duty and insubordination on the part of the men, and to lack of sufficient work to employ them. The officials of the company do not intend to transfer their duties, including the employment and discharge of employes, to any one except their duly appointed successors. The remark is made that it would probably be criminal neglect of duty not to discharge a switch tower man for drunkenness when the safety of many passengers depended on the man's sobriety. No business could be carried on, says Mr. Webb, when men are allowed to be absent without leave, and no employer could tolerate insolence and insubordination based upon the belief that the offender will be supported therein by a secret organization, by the agency of which the employers' business can be damaged or stopped. Mr. Webb considers it a monstrous absurdity for Powderly and his associates to ask that anybody except the railroad authorities should be satisfied that causes existed for discharging the men.

Fearful Descent of a Car at Reading— Four People Killed Outright,

READING, Pa., Aug. 22.—A horrible accident occurred this forenoon shortly before 11 o'clock on the Mount Penn Gravity

Ballway a mountain slope encircling Mount

Was on the ebb and the surf h Il o'clock on the Mount Penn Gravity Railway, a mountain slope encircling Mount Penn, 800 feet above the city of Reading. The cars were taken from a point on the outskirts of the city to the top of the mountains, a distance of five miles. On returning the cars were allowed to go down the mountain by gravity by way of another route to the point of starting. This forenoon at 10:30 a car containing about eighteen passengers was taken from the station to the top of the mountain. This consumed about 30 minutes. On top of the mountain there is a high stone tower, where the passengers were allowed to alight to enjoy the scenery for 30 minutes. There are different stories as to the cause of the accident, but it appears that when the tower was scenery for 30 minutes. There are different stories as to be cause of the accident, but it appears that when the tower was reached, the point where the gravity portion of the road commences, the engine was detached and the car ran away while the passengers were still on board. The distance to the point of starting is five miles, and it is estimated that this was covered by the runaway car in three minutes, the car attaining a fearful speed, estimated at 80 miles an hour. It remained on the track to the foot of the plane, going around all the curves, while the passengers shricked in their fright, and acveral jumped off. When the car reached the station at the foot of the plane it jumped off the track and rolled down a 50-foot embankment, where it landed upside down with the passengers imprisoned inside. Doctors and the ambulance were sent for and the dead and injured removed. Four were taken out dead. They included Charles Rettow, conductor of the car, and E. M. Lavan, a lawyer of this city. A number of the injured may die.

THE STRUGGLE FOR SUNDAY REST.

In the Lyceum there is an interesting survey of the revolt against the burden of seven days' continuous labor. In Germany a Government bill now before the Reichstag forbids work on Sundays in mines, salt pits, quarries, collieries, foundries, workshops, timber-yards, tile-yards, and factories of all kinds. Commercial cierks shall not work on Sundays for more than four hours at most. In breweries and in inse every third Sunday must be granted as a free day to those employed. 

Buried Alive.

It is well known that in France the dread of premature interment is very much more widespread than it is in this country, where little of it is heard, though there are, no doubt, many amongst us who entertain a morbid dread of being buried alive. But in France it is by no means an uncommen thing to insert a clause in wills directing that the heart of the doceased shall be pierced before burial, in the presence of the surviving relatives. But in Belgium this morbid fear must be pretty prevalent, for in that country an ingenious inventor has devised a new kind of coffint the express purpose of which is to preven, the possibility of such a calamity. "The pressure of the sarth thrown on the lid of the coffin liberates a sort of stiletto, which is so placed that on being disengaged it pierces the heart of the occupant."—[Christian at Work.

What Mr. Parnell had said was, "I wonder why so many men in the House of Commons are baid?"

Renorting a Hundred Years Ago.

The Slave Question in a New Light.

From London comes the report by cable that the British East African Company has released 4,000 slaves who had been dragged to the coast from their homes in the interior. The truth is the company have discovered a new way of dealing with the slave-trade problem, which has worked very well, and this is the scory: A year ago the British East African Company, noted above decided to establish friendly relations with the Arab merchants on the coast controlled by the company. These Arabs had about 4,000 slaves, the fruits of former raids, in their establishments. The British company offered to buy these slaves, and in the past fifteen months about 4,000 of them have received their papers of freedom, the company paying \$25 apiece for them. Tracts of land where they could support themselves were given them, and many of them are working for wages around Mombass. Then the

company told the Arabs that if they would not seize any more slaves their caravans would be provided with trade goods to trade into the interior, and the company would buy the ivery they brought to the coast. The Arabs accepted the offer, and to-day all the capital needed in trading enterprises that is not supplied by the Arabs themselves is advanced at a small rate of interest by the company, and it buys all the merchandise brought down to the coast. In short, the company has become a partner of the former slave dealers in their trading operations, and Mr. Mackenzie, the company's superintendent, expresses the opinion that the slave trade question is settled as far as the Britis East Coast is concerned. It is true that as relates to the suppression of the emtire African slave trade the action of the company as noted is only a drop of water to a bucketful. Still, while such enterprises like this corporation and the African Lakes Company are in a way lessening the slave trade or diminishing the evils of the liquor traffic, it cannot be truthfully asserted as was recently said by an English magazine writer, that all the white trading enterprises in Equatorial Africa are increasing the degradation and misery of the inhabitants.—[Christian at Work.

The Weighing of Thought.

Starting with the idea that the hand varies sensibly in size with the amount of blood present in it at any moment, Professor Mosso, the Italian physiologist, has made some most interesting investigations. 
