A CURIOUS CASE.

Hebrew Rabbis Charged With Cruelty, Owing to Their Method of Killing Cattle—The Charge Not Proven.

LONDON, Oct. 16 .- A test case which LONDON, Oct. 16.—A test case which caused considerable excitement among the Hebrews of the United Kingdom was ended to-day at Aberdeen, where the trial had been proceeding for several days. Rabbi Littmann and Rabbi Zemittick ware charged with expectations. tick were charged with cruelty to animals for killing a bullock according to Jewish rite. Several Hobrew doctors and others testified that the Jewish method of slaughter was less painful than the method applied by Christians, and that the flesh of animals thus slain was healthier than that of animals killed by Christian method. The prosecution submitted evidence to show that the animal, on the killing of which the suit animal, on the killing of which the suit was based, lived in conscious agony for seven minutes after his throat had been cut.) Other instances were cited where animals had lived longer than this after having their throats cut. The flesh of animals slain by the method of Jewish faith underwest, according to the prosecution's witnesses, morbid changes that rendered it unfit for food purposes. To-day the magistrate decided that in view of difference of opinion among the experts who had testified the charge of cruelty had not been proven. The rabbis were, therefore, discharged.

The Richmond for several seasons past has been chartered to the Toledo, St. Louis and Kansas City line, and ran in the general merchandise trade between Toledo and this port. She carried no passengers on the present trip. Her cargo consisted almost entirely of flour from St. Louis and other southwestern points.

FOURTEEN DROWNED.

PORT BURWELL, Oct. 16.—The heaviest gale of the season was experienced here Friday night and Saturday last. A steam barge, the Woocken, of Cleveland, Onio, sank about fifteen miles east of here Saturday evening. Fourteen of her crew took to the boat, but she capsized and all perished. The remainder, three in number, were taken from the rigging yesterday afternoon. The fishing interest here and along this shore was very much damaged.

DUNKIRK, N. Y., Oct. 16.—Only one nan escaped from the lost Dean Richmond, man escaped from the lost Dean Richmond, and he was found on the beach near Van Buren Point to-day. His haggard face and sunken eyes told a story of terrible suffering. He was aimlessly wandering up and down the beach and when spoken to burst into tears, and said he was looking for his dog. He was questioned and said he had been washed off the Richmond, and was unquestionably the only man saved. He said his name was C. L. Clarke and he shipped in Toledo just before the Richmond sailed. "There were nineteen in the Richmond rew," he said, "besides Capt. Stoddardt, his wife and three children. We left Toledo at 6 o'clock Friday night and sailed along all right until we got into the gale on Saturday. The waves ran over our decks and everything moveable was swept overboard. The captain's wife aad children were locked up in the cabin for safety, and the crew was working to their lives on deck. and he was found on the beach near Van anie was swept overloard. Ine captain's wife and children were locked up in the cabin for safety, and the crew was working for their lives on deck. An hour later we had lost a mast and smokestack. Then we continued to drift along at the mercy of the wind and waves. About 7 o'clock in the evening the wheel house was washed away. The rudder and wheel were broken and we were badly crippled. The captain had made up his mind to run for the shore fifteen miles away and beach his vessel. He made fair headway with a hard fight, and I began to get things ready to get out in the yawl boat with the captain's wife and children. I went back to see the captain and just before I reached him a big wave struck us and I was carried overboard. I kept sight of the Richmond's lights for some time and saw her drifting down the lake turning and twisting in every direction. Then I lost consciousness and did not know any thing until I found and did not know any thing until I found myself lying on the beach near Silver Creek."

CANADA'S GREAT CRICKETER.

A Sketch of Rev. F. W. Terry, late of the London Asylum Club-His Cricket Career.

The Toronto Globe of Saturday contains a handsome photo-gravure of Rev. F. W. Terry, the great cricketer whose achieve-ments as a member of the London Asylum

ments as a member of the London Asylum team first brought him into prominence on the Canadian crease. A brief sketch of his career is also given as follows:
"Rev. F. W. Terry was born at Frome in Somersetshire, England, in 1861. After passing through the usual course at school he matriculated at Oxford University, becoming an undergraduate of Menton College.

"From his earliest years he evinced a great liking for cricket, and long before he went to school he had imbibed that love for the noble game which he has shown at ail times since then. At Oxford, during his first May term, he played in the Freshmen's match and distinguished himself by some good scoring. He never actually played for the University vs. Cambridge at Low's, but has represented his 'varsity in several of the trial matches. He was, however, chosen as twelfth, or spare man during the second summer that he was in residence, and through that was enabled to wear the dark blue colors. He was chosen as a member of the Somersetshire county team shortly after he went up to Oxford and has done much good work for his native shire. He is particularly quick behind the sticks, and as a wicket-keeper it would be hard to find a better man—the redoubtable Blackham, perhaps, excepted. He left Oxford in 1886 and was in that year ordained by the Bishop of Chicester. all times since then. Agitation to Secure Better Weights on Shipments of Cheese.

Shipments of Cheese.

There were comparatively few cheese onarded at the cheese market here on Saturday last, and the attendance of factorymen was small. The price of goods seems to be going up and salesmen are looking for something like 12½ cents a pound for September and October cheese. Whether they will attain their desire or not is hard to say, but the indications are that most of the fall goods will bring considerably over 11 cents.

Quite a little excitement was created among the factorymen when a notice of

Quite a little excitement was created among the factorymen when a notice of motion was given by one of the buyers to have a resolution passed that in all transfections between buyers and sellers on the London market one-half pound extra be given above the weight of cheese marked on the box at time of shipment, to take effect at the beginning of 1894. This motion will come up for discussion on Oct. 28, and will no doubt bring forth strong opposition from some of the salesmen. A few of the factorymen look upon it as a scheme on the part of the buyers to secure a little more cheese from them. They seem to come to this conclusion without considering fully the facts of the case and without weighing carefully the arguments on both sides and the effect that such a resolution would have in prejudicing the old country dealers in favor of Western Ontario cheese. The buyers complain that they do not get sufficient weight from many of the factories in the west, which makes it very difficult for them to give the best satisfaction to their customers in the old country, who are becoming somewhat prejudiced against sending their orders here, and prefer to send them where they can get better weights.

All Canadian cheese exported are bought

All Canadian cheese exported are bought by the British dealer according to the invoice of weights when the cheese are shipped from the factories or local railway points of shipment, and consequently the district or locality which gives the best weight is going to get the preference, providing the quality is as good and other conditions as favorable. In Eastern Ontario all cheese are sold subject to their holding out good up-beam weight in Montreal. In the Eastern States somewhat the same regulation is in force, and all cheese are sold subject to the New York weights, consequently these sections will get and are getting the preference, and the British dealer is sending more of his orders there because he feels that he is getting better satisfaction in weights, and the shrinkage is not so great.

is not so great.

It is not expected that the western factorymen will guarantee weights in Montreal and it would not be fair to demand it, as the distance is so great, but considering the facts that our competing districts have made au effort to meet the wishes of the dealers, in this matter and that the British dealer is showing a preference to buy his goods in these sections, it does seem reasonable that the factorymen should adopt some means of overcoming this preference and endeavor to retain the present trade and secure more orders for Western Ontario.

The buyers claim that if the salesmen of the factories represented at the different chease markets in Western Ontario will agree to give one-half pound box up-beam weight above the weight marked on the box, and have it come in force next year, it will have the wholesome effect of removing any objection that the British desler may have to sending his orders to Western Ontario, and will make him more favorable towards our western goods if he knows definitely that he is going to get good weight. This extra half pound will not man so much to the factorymen as would seem at first sight. Under the present arrangement of full up-beam weight at the point of shipment it often happens that a cheese will go ½ or ¾ of a pound above the even pound, and this is that as no fraction of a pound is taken. In these cases the transport of the even pound would not hold out, and one pound would not be deducted.

A resolution to the same effect as the one to come before the London market was passed at the Woodstock cheese market not long ago, and will come into force next season in that locality. If there is any benefit at all to be derived from such a resolution it should be adopted by all the boards in Western Ontario, and it is hoped that the buyers and sellers of cheese will come to something definite in regard to the difficulties conceptablished in Western Ontario, If the reputation were once established in Western Ontario of giving good weight at the factories, and the dealer could rely on getting cheese that would bable to get a higher price for our cheese, and what the factorymen would lose in one way they would gain in another.

We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection.

It is the most gorgeous of modern merrymakings that the nations are watching in the France-Russian celebration. It is a demonstration made ostensibly under the direct auspices of peace. The question on the lips of all Europe is what are the chances of peace? It may safely be assumed that no indiscreet word or act in the official programme of the next two weeks will contain a hint of menace or war.

nature of the visit of the Russian fleet and deny, perhaps, a little too strongly any warlike signification.

Mr. Evans added: "I have been informed by a leading Unionist politician that it has been arranged between the Conservatives and Unionists that the next Government shall be the Premier." Mr. Evans refused to name his informant, and would not describe the nature of Mr. Chamberlain's approaches.

Forty years ago the Wallsend collieries were the most famous in the world for quality of coal and extent of output. One of quality of coal and extent of output. One of these projected high above the engine house, and the pressure forced the flame, which burned night and day, high into the air and illuminated the country for miles around. The gas made the pits dangerous, but it was the tremendous milux of water which finally caused the abandonment of the workings. A syndicate has now been formed to reopen the pits, and, if successful, each member of it will make a fortune; for it is reliably estimated that in one of the seams there is unworked coal to the weight of 4,668,000 tons, in amother 7,700,000 tons, and in a third 9,700,000 tons. Operations have already been commenced on the long disused shaft, and the work is being watched with the greatest interest throughout the north of England.


