The Hague, Jan. 4.-Via London .- The first report received directly from Belgians deported to Germany, who have been invalided from the camp at Soltau, Prussia, has been given to the Associated Press. These persons were returned from Germany because they were in almost a dying condition. A number of them who were interviewed while separated from each other agreed in their stories of conditions prevailing in the Soltau camp.

SECRET PEACE MANDEUVRE ARE TRANSPIRING AT

Surface of Absolute Silence M aintained by Official Diplomatic Circles Ripples Un der Upheavals of Rumored Negotiations That Centre Around Wilson's Reported Access To Peace Terms of Central Powers.

New York, Jan. 4.—An Associated Press dispatch from Washington today says:

The Administration policy of absolute secrecy which curtains the moves in the peace negotiations at this stage, so far as the United States is concerned, remains unrelaxed but does not alter well-defined impressions that important developments are transpiring under the surface.

All officials are silent over the reports that Ambassador Gerard, as a result of his talk with the German chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, probably transmitted a report on details of Germany's peace terms to make them available to the Entente Allies. They also refuse comment on the statements attributed to the former Hungarian premier, Count Julius Andrassy, that the Entente could learn Germany's peace terms through the presi-

Neither is there official comment available on the statement that the Entente reply to President Wilson's note will be in his hands two days before it is made public.

Col. E. M. House, who had advised closely with President Wilson all along on the peace movement, conferred at length with the president today and was about the official circle conferring with others in touch with the subject.

Definite arrangements for publication of the Entente reply have not yet been announced here.

President Wilson's attitude was again described today as being sure that some beneficial results will come of the negotiations, and he is holding himself ready for the next step.

HUMANE(!) TEUTONS TERRIBLY HURT BY

Make Weird Attempt To Blame the "English."

SOME CROCODILE TEARS

All With Hope of Spreading Disaffection Among the French Populace.

One of the latest means employed by the Germans to attempt to cause dissatisfaction among the Entente Allies, and especially among the French civil population, is described by Q .- M .- Sergt. Frank Hodges, Army Service Corps, in a letter to his sister, Miss A. Hodges of this city.

Pamphlets, pretending to set forth facts in connection with British air raids, he writes, were attached to a balloon by the Germans and sent over the French lines. The balloon was brought down by the British, and he was able to secure one of the pamphlets as well as a piece of the balloon.

Those who have read descriptions of German zennelin raids on Old London German zeppelin raids on Old London and other English cities are apt to find the pleas contained in the pamphlet rather hypocritical, Translated it reads:

"French! "Your airmen, by means of throw ing bombs, have killed a great number of civilians-men, women and children, in the last few weeks, far behind the firing line in Germany. Even at Karls-ruhe in June we counted 48 deaths, among which were 30 innocent children.
"Mullheim was bombarded June 22,
Fribourg July 16, Kandern, Holzer
and Mappach July 17, Heltershein near Fribourg and Mulheim July 22. In all those attacks we suffered as many killed as wounded. None of these places are of the least importance from a military standpoint, as anyone with any military knowledge would know by casting a glance at the map.

"The German military commander could not believe at first that the French Government and the general staff were capable of allowing such an act of barbarism, which has no con-nection with the conduct of the war. He thought your airmen must have made a mistake in carrying out their

a mistake. By chance we have learned the cause of these atrocities. Today we know, and there cannot be the least doubt in this respect, that they were committed at the order of your Gov-





LONDON, Jan. 3.—"President Wilson now knows the peace conditions of the Teutonic allies and the Entente powers can learn what they are from him," Count Julius Andrassy, formerly premier of Hungary, is quoted as asserting in a dispatch from Budapest forwarded to the Central News Agency by way of Amsterdam. The statement attributed to Count Andrassy was made in a New Year's

"As the Entente alleges that our peace proposal was only a manoeuvre and was not made with any earnest desire to bring about peace, I am able to declare that President Wilson now knows our peace conditions and the Entente can learn them from that source.'

The version of the Budapest dispatch received by the Reuter Telegram Company via Amsterdam quotes Count. Andrassy as saying that the peace conditions of the central powers will be communicated to President Wilson, the quotation being as follows:

"If the Entente reject our peace offer only because they maintain that our offer is not honestly meant, but is merely a manoeuvre, and that they cannot enter into negotiations before knowing our conditions, they can learn these from President Wilson, to whom they will be com-


