POSTAL MEN ISSUE WARNING TO PUBLIC

Message Through Press Advises That All Important Mail Matter Be Posted Before 12 o'Clock Tomorrow-Government Remains Firm as Employees Prepare for Impending Strike.

RETURNS SHOW MAJORITY FAVOR WALKOUT

Ottawa, June 17.—A strike of the postal clerks throughout the Dominion is indicated by the following message which has been given to the public through the press by the secretary of the Dominion Federation of Postal Employees:
"The public are warned through the press that all important

mail should be posted before 12 o'clock noon tomorrow." The warning of the impending strike has been conveyed to the local Retail Merchants' Association and the board of trade, who are calling emergency meetings to deal with the unusual situation. At the same time the government remains firm in its decision to stand behind the civil service commission's schedule of salaries.

INDICATIONS POINT TO STRIKE.

Indications this afternoon point to a Dominion-wide strike of 10,000 Canadian postal workers. Unless some action is taken by the Dominion government to bring the civil, service act before parliament in order that amendments to the salary schedule submitted by the civil service commission may be effected, or unless some other action is taken by the cabinet to conciliate the postal employees, it is expected that the Dominion executive of the Federation of Postal Employees before midnight will decide the question of a walkout.

SCHOOL DEPOSITS SHOW INCREASE

Total in Past Two Months Is More Than Double of Former Years.

Deposits from London public chools in the Penny Bank of Canada have shown large increases for the months of March and April. For March there was over \$2,500 more deposited during March of this year than for the same month last year. During April there was nearly \$1,000 more than for the same month in

In London schools deposits during March for the last three years have been: 1922, \$1,610.89; 1923, \$1,615.33; 1924, \$4,205.11. For the month of April over the same period the deposits were: 1922, \$1,202.77; 1923, \$1,673.21; 1924, \$2,571.32.
For March and April of this year children of Canadian schools loaned \$100,877.93 to the government.







POSTMEN DEMAND LAW TO ALLOW GOVT. ACTION

Ultimatum Is Sent To Parliament by Executive of Federation Calling For Change in Law Giving Power To Government To Deal With Critical Situation.

FIX TIME LIMIT OF TWENTY-FOUR HOURS

Toronto, June 16.—The Dominion executive of the Canadian Federation of Postal Employees passed a resolution this afternoon, which was forwarded to Ottawa tonight, calling on parliament to amend the federal act so that the government would have power to deal with the situation caused by the postal employees' refusal to accept the salary schedule recommended by the civil service

This action by the executive of the federation was taken in view of the statement by Premier King that final power in regard to the salaries of the civil servants rests with the civil service commission, and the government is powerless to interfere unless the act is amended

The government and parliament, federation officials said, have been given 24 hours in which to make a satisfactory reply, and if it is not forthcoming by tomorrow night they expected a strike call will be issued at once. It was explained that a strike could not be called until all the returns from the voting had been received, which will be tomorrow night at 6 o'clock.






