BRITISH TIN INDUSTRY

Brokers Say Exports for 1904 Show a Record Increase.

bution to the fiscal controversy is given by a firm of well-known tinplate brokers in their report on the industry for last year. British exports, these brokers state, show a record increase over 1903, and, although the total quantity was not itself a record, it is higher than it has been

in a sense be said to date from the adop-tion of the McKinley tariff in America in 1896. The Welsh tinplate manufacturers at the time feared the tariff would kill their trade, but instead it proved a blessing in disguise.

The makers realized that if their trade was to survive they must take the coats off, they must cheapen the cost coats off, they must cheapen the cost of manufacture and develop new markets. To do that raw materials at the lowest possible price were necessary, and fortunately the fiscal system of Great Britain gave to the makers opportunities in this respect superior to those of any other country. Thus eight years of hard work has brought its reward and the British tinplate trade is in a sounder position than it ever has been before.



Milk Pails of Crystal; Author Grows Cobless Corn; Expects to Breed Stingless Bees.

Boston, Jan. 30. - The farmers in the orn belt whose lands run near the farm of George Ade, the humorist and playwright, in Indiana, have not done enough work for the past fortnight to keep their weeds down. They go to the Ade farm at all hours, confident that a surprise awaits them.

They are seldom disappointed. Mr

Ade has begun his farming on an upto-date plan that leaves unconsidered all the methods handed down from father to son in the days of hand labor. Modern machinery has been used for every process of farm life, and in some cases the machinery is of a sor that has never been seen here. where the steam harvester and the automobile plow are matters of course. The playwright acquired his land

with the crops standing, and had to harvest them himself. A 200-acre wheat field was one of the lots to be covered and Mr. Ade astonished the natives with a machine that was not only a to work in the corn after the whe was bagged. Steam harvesters are usually not eco-

nomical, for they are idle so much of their time that they "eats their own heads off" in interest on their cost. Mr. Ade's is not that sort. Besides the usual crew of eight she carries a cook and a spare hand.

A new attachment, with all sorts of little machines in it, catches the biggest grains of the wheat, grinds then hulls them, adds the necessary ingredients to make batter, and fries flapjacks over the waste heat in the flues as the machine moves through the fields. The cook simply turns the flapjacks as re get syrup from a little drip-cock on the side of the harvester, connected with

The spare hand relieves one man fter another for dinner, and as the knives kill quail squatting in the fields, he picks them, cleans them and tosses them to the cook, who has them in the pan while they are still kicking and served out to the men ten minutes after

The machine runs all night, the spare nand relieving one man after another chinists, not farmers, for the harvester does all that, even plowing and seed-ing the ground behind almost before the crop is off it. It bags the wheat tencils the address of the buyer or

His herd lives in a stable the like of which has never been seen in this coun ations serving for scratching posts. The runlets of water through the stalls for drinking purposes go through little troughs of purest topaz, and the racks whence the cows twitch hand-weeded clover are barred with silver. Overhead each cow's name is set in brilliants with electric lights behind. The cows are named for jewels, and each cow's name stone is used; rubies, diamonds, opals,

pearls, all shine in order there.

The stable on Mr. Ade's farm is sta ble, engine room, garage, machine shop and carriage house, all in one. All his veretables go to market in automobiles. "The self-governing colonies are much more in sympathy with the Liberals than with the Tories on nine points out of ten in the rival programmes of the two parties. The colonies had no state church; they had absolute popular control in theological tests in the state schools; theological tests in the state schools; they were without exception home rulers; their liquor legislation was now all on Liberal lines. The great experiments made in reference to land, labor and social questions in Australia and New Zealand were in the direction of proposals supported by the advanced section of the Liberal party in this country.

"Nothing would suit British Liberals better than closer union with the colonies. It would enable our people to realize would enable our people to realize how the land prospers under Liberal legislation granted by Great Britain to the colony that would accord that liberty to its representatives at a conference. "What happened in the Parliament of Manitoba proved that Canada is not at present prepared in return for a preference to make even substantial reductions in its tariff against British goods. The Canadian woolen and cotton manufac-turer has a greater dread of British com-petition than of American trade rivalry. He wants to be protected against Ger-many. I believe there is much that can be done to promote trade and co-opera-tion between the colonies and the mother country without pulling either into tariff

What is wanted is a conference where, after a frank statement of limitations on both sides, methods could be discussed whereby Britain and the self-govern-ing colonies could render greater help to each other, both commercially and imperially. But Mr. Balfour thinks the Liberals are hostile to the idea of conferring with the colonies. Quite the referring with the colonies. Quite the reverse so long as you make it perfectly clear to the colonies that there are certain proposals which it would be futile to discuss in the present state of British opinion—for instance, taxation of food. It will be much more straightforward and businesslike to let them know the limitations of such a conference in advance than it would be to drag them here, thousands of miles, as if the idea of taxing corn were an open question. of taxing corn were an open question, and then turn around and tell them it was ruled out by popular vote at the elections. The news of this defeat is especially hard for the Government. The popular idea continues to be that the advance was undertaken to divert attention from the events in European Russia.

The Russians carried the first line of entrenchments, but were unable to maintain their position on the outskirts of Sandepas in the face of fierce cannonading.

The fighting was transferred westward. The Japanese counter-attacked with a brigade of infantry, endeavoring to envelop the Russians, but the cavalry protecting the Russian flank drove back the Japanese with heavy loss. A counter-attack on the village captured by the Russians at the outset of the fight was also beaten off. but at the cost to the Russians of several thousand killed or wounded, including General Mistchenko, who was wounded in the knee. The heaviest sufferers were the newly-arrived brigade of riflemen. The official re-port of the casualties in the fighting at Hounlitadzy and Hugodi, on Jan. 25. and Jan. 26. says they were 45 officers and 1,050 men. A hundred Japanese prisoners have arrived here.
