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# EXPLLASTION OF THE ARTICLES OF THE CILENOAR 

AND

## Astronomical Notices for the Year 1888.

On the left hand page of each month are given all the data for Solar observations for Time and Latitude, namely :-The Equation of Time (Sun slow or fast of clock) which is the difference between Apparent and Mean Time, and is given for the instant of Apparent Noon, and the Sun's Declination at Meản Noon, both Greenwich time. Also the Sun's apparent semi-diameter to the nearest second of arc for every day throughout the year. With these exceptions all the calculations are reduced to the nearest minute of Local Mean Time at Charlottetown, Latitude $46^{\circ} 13^{\prime} 55^{\prime \prime}$ North. Longitude $63^{\circ}, 7^{\prime} 23^{\prime \prime}$ West, giving 4 h .12 m . 29.5 sec , slow on Greenwich Time.

If the Sun's Declination at Greenwich Apparent Noon is required it can be obtained from the data here given by multiplying the hourly variation of Declination by the Equation of Time for the same day reduced to the decimal of an hour and applying the result according to the conditions given below :-

From the Sun's Apparent Semi diameter, (last column on the same page) may be found the Sun's Horizontal Parallax (which equal the earth's apparent semi-diameter as it would appear at the distance of the Sun's centre) by dividing it by the constant quantity 107.44, which is the proportion the Sun's actual diameter bears to that of the earth taken as unity. Thus, for July ist, when the Sun is farthest from the earth we have the semi-diameter of the Sun $15^{\prime} 45.9^{\prime \prime}=945.9$ giving $\frac{0.8 .0}{107.44}=8 .{ }^{.1804}$, Sun's Horizontal Parallax, in like manner on the 31st December, when the Sun is in Perigee the semi-diameter is $16^{\prime} 18.2^{\prime \prime}=978.2^{\prime \prime}$ giving $\frac{077^{\circ} .2^{2}}{107.4^{\prime}}$ $=9 . " 108$ Horizontal Parallax.

The Parallax in altitude may be found by multip'ying the Horizontal Parallax by the natural cosine of the Sun's observed altitude.

Example. - The Horizontal Parallax being 8.'404 and the Sun's observed altitude $50^{\circ}, 8 . " 804 \times .643=5 . " 659$ parallax in altitude.

On the right hand page of each month are given the Changes of the Mcon, its Rising, Setting and Southing, and the Time of High Water at Charlottetown for every day.

The bearing of the Moon at the times of change, its Perigee and Apogee, and its crossing the Equinoctial and reaching its greatest North and South Declination, are given for the purpose of assisting in testing weather forecasts. It being found that the Lunar Equinoctials are generally accompanied by atmospheric disturbances the more marked the nearer their times agree with those of the Moon's changes or Perigee ; ** or ${ }^{* * *}$ are added where two or three of these influences concur within the space of 48 hours.

## ECLIPSES.

There will occur five Eclipses during the year, viz : three of the Sun and two of the Moon, of these only the Lunar Eclipses will be visible.

III. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun July 8th, Greenwich Mean Time of Conjunction $18 \mathrm{~h} .35 \mathrm{~m} .32,8 \mathrm{sec}$, only visible in South Antarctic ocean.
IV. A Total Eclipse of the Moon July 22nd, Greenwich Mean Time of Opposition, 17 h .44 m .31 .2 sec ., visible at Charlottetown.

## PLANETS.

Mercury.-Mercury will be at his greatest elongation east as an evening star and west as a morning star, as follows : February 16th, $18^{\circ} 5^{\prime}$ E.; March 30 th, $27^{\circ} 47^{\prime}$ W.; June 11th, $24^{\circ} 24^{\prime}$ E.; July 28th, $19^{\circ} 26^{\prime}$ W.; October 7th, $25^{\circ} 5^{\prime}$ E.; November 16th, $19^{\circ} 25^{\prime}$ W. Between these dates he will pass and re-pass the Sun in inferior or superior conjunction. The conditions favorable for finding this minute but brilliant planet are that at the time of his greatest elungation whether to the east or west of the Sun, his declination should be north of that of the Sun, this will be

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the case about the end of March, on the 27 th of which he will be seen in the east before sunrise in such close proximity to Venus ( $2^{\prime}$ apart) as to appear but as one star.

Venus at the commencement ot the year will be the Morning Star with direct motion, coming to superior conjunction with the Sun July rith, re-appearing as an Evening Star in the early part of August, still with direct motion throughout the year.

Mars will commence the year as a Morning Star with direct motion becoming retrograde March 4th, till May 22nd, afterwards direct to the end of the year. He will be in opposition to the Sun April roth, on the meridian at midnight, at his nearest to the earth and greatest apparent magnitude.

Juprter begins the year as a Morning Star, with direct motion. In close conjunction with Venus January 2nd, apparent motion retrograde from March 21st to Jcly 23rd, and direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun May 22nd, and in conjunction December 8th.

Saturn commences the year retrograde till March 3oth, after which direct till December 1st, then retrograde to the end of the ycar. He will be in opposition to the Suu January 23rd, in conjunction August ist.

Uranus at the commencement of the year his motion is direct till January $2 \mathbf{1 s t}$, retrograde till June 20th, then direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun on April 4th, in conjunction October 19th, he has Mars for a near companion during the first half of the year, the two planets being in conjunction three times, January 9th, May 5th, and June 6th. On September 19th, he will be in close conjunction with Mercury and Venus.

Neptune begins the year with retrograde motion till February 6th, direct till September ist, afterward retrograde till the end of the year. In conjunction with the Sun May 19th, in opposition November z2nd.

OCCULATIONS.
There will be eight occulations of Planets by the Moon during the year named, six of Saturn, January 28th, April 19th, May 16th, June 12 th, September 3rd, and October 1st, one of Venus March 9th. None of these will be visible at Charlottetown, occurring in the day time or when the Moon is below the horizon. One of Mars will occur December 6th, at 11 minutes past 6 in the evening, but this in our latitude will only appear as a near approach, the Moon passing about one-sixth of its diameter to the south of the planet.

If there were no truth in Astrology, it could never have enchained the thought and imagination of the many great philosophers and poets of all ages who have pursued it with avidity. To class the founder of modern astronomy-the really great Kepler-as a lunatic because he believed in astrology would be too absurd for even nineteenth-century philosophy! Supposing astrology to be altogether erroneous, there can be no shorter way to explode it than to subject it to the test of observation and experience. Authority, even in the case of a judge, cannot be allowed to decide this vexed question, when it is evident that knowledge of the subject is entirely wanting on the part of such authority.-Zadkiel.

January, 1888.-Thus wrote the poet of the Augustan era of the ancient astrologers who founded the science of astrology upon observation and induction, which has survived the many convulsions of the world; and is proved, at the present day, to be true by the fulfilment

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of predictions of great events, published at various times. The martial planet of Old England hastens to conjunction with Uranus in the 18th degree of the sign Libra, so that our country will not yet shake off the incubus of trouble which has weighed so heavily upon her for the past ten years. Jupiter approaching the meridian, and being in his chief dignity, the sign Sagittarius, and within orbs of the trine ( \(\mathbf{1 2 0 0}\) ) aspect with the Sun, promises some beneficial legislation, reform, and some measure of prosperity. Ramesey avers that an eclipse of the Moon in the first decanate of the sign Aquarius pre-signifies "the misfortune of some king under Aquarius." The Czar of Russia and the King of Prussia are therefore warned to safeguard their health and avoid war, if possible, this summer.

The Sun enters Libra September 22nd, 2h. 35m.
Jupiter is the planet most powerfully situated, being in the roth house, in his chief dignity the sign Sagittarius, and in sextile \(\left(60^{\circ}\right)\) aspect with the Sun. A fortunate quarter is therefore promised for Old England, advancement of trade and commerce, and honor to her arms. The presence of Venus in (Libra) and Mercury in the gth house is very favorable to art, science and literature, and to new inventions, of which there will be several of a highly advantageous nature. Travelling will greatly increase.

Jerome Cardan, born at Milan on the ist of October, 1501, who was a physician and professor of medicine in some Italian universities; who enjoyed a world-wide renown for his talent in philosophy, medicine, astrology, and mathematics ; who rescued from obscurity the sacred philosophy of the Cabala and the Cabalists ; has transmitted to posterity the following aphorisms relating to husbandry.

His enemy Scaliger was so candid as to admlt that Cardan was endowed with a very comprehensive, penetrating, and incomparable mind.

1, If you prune your vines when the Moon is at full in Taurus, Leo, Scorpio, or Sagittarius, neither worms nor birds will infest your grapes.
2. Graft not trees when the Moon is waning, or not to be seen. If you shear sheep in her increase their wool will grow again the better.
3. Fruits and woods for use should be cut in the decrease of the Moon ; but if you would have timber to keep long, fell it towards the latter end of winter, the Moun being under the earth and in aspect with Saturn, for that will prevent its rotting and render it exceedingly hard and durable.
4. Fire-wood and what you would have grown quickly again cut when the Moon is above the earth in her first quarter in aspect with either Venus or Jupiter.
5. Sow or plant when the Moon is in either Taurus, Virgo, or Scorpio, in good aspect with Saturn; when she is in Cancer set or sow all kinds of pulse; when in Libra or Capricornus dress your gardens and trim your small trees and shrubs.
