EXPLANATION OF THE ARTICLES OF THE CALENDAR

AND

Astronomical Notices for the Year 1888.

Ladies' Silver Watches, very pretty, at WELLNER'S.

On the left hand page of each month are given all the data for Solar observations for Time and Latitude, namely:—The Equation of Time (Sun slow or fast of clock) which is the difference between Apparent and Mean Time, and is given for the instant of Apparent Noon, and the Sun's Declination at Mean Noon, both Greenwich time. Also the Sun's apparent semi-diameter to the nearest second of arc for every day throughout the year. With these exceptions all the calculations are reduced to the nearest minute of Local Mean Time at Charlottetown, Latitude $46^{\circ} 13' 55''$ North. Longitude $63^{\circ} 7' 23''$ West, giving 4h. 12m. 29.5 sec. slow on Greenwich Time.

If the Sun's Declination at Greenwich Apparent Noon is required it can be obtained from the data here given by multiplying the hourly variation of Declination by the Equation of Time for the same day reduced to the decimal of an hour and applying the result according to the conditions given below:—

From the Sun's Apparent Semi diameter, (last column on the same page) may be found the Sun's Horizontal Parallax (which equal the earth's apparent semi-diameter as it would appear at the distance of the Sun's centre) by dividing it by the constant quantity 107.44, which is the proportion the Sun's actual diameter bears to that of the earth taken as unity. Thus, for July 1st, when the Sun is farthest from the earth we have the semi-diameter of the Sun $15' 45.9'' = 945.9$ giving $\frac{945.9}{107.44} = 8.804$, Sun's Horizontal Parallax, in like manner on the 31st December, when the Sun is in Perigee the semi-diameter is $16' 18.2'' = 978.2$ giving $\frac{978.2}{107.44} = 9.108$ Horizontal Parallax.

The Parallax in altitude may be found by multiplying the Horizontal Parallax by the natural cosine of the Sun's observed altitude.

Example.—The Horizontal Parallax being 8.404 and the Sun's observed altitude 50° , $8.804 \times .643 = 5.659$ parallax in altitude.

On the right hand page of each month are given the Changes of the Moon, its Rising, Setting and Southing, and the Time of High Water at Charlottetown for every day.

The bearing of the Moon at the times of change, its Perigee and Apogee, and its crossing the Equinoctial and reaching its greatest North and South Declination, are given for the purpose of assisting in testing weather forecasts. It being found that the Lunar Equinoctials are generally accompanied by atmospheric disturbances the more marked the nearer their times agree with those of the Moon's changes or Perigee; ** or *** are added where two or three of these influences concur within the space of 48 hours.

ECLIPSES.

There will occur five Eclipses during the year, viz: three of the Sun and two of the Moon, of these only the Lunar Eclipses will be visible.

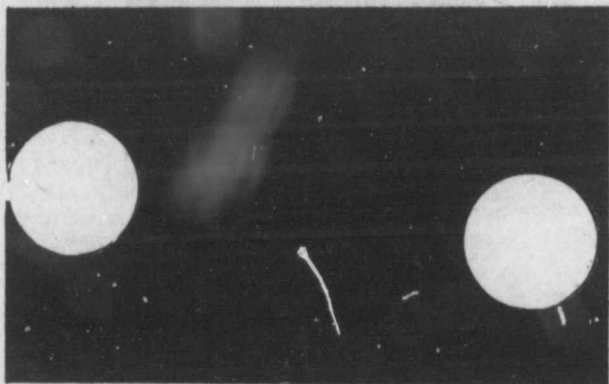

PLANETS.

MERCURY.—Mercury will be at his greatest elongation east as an evening star and west as a morning star, as follows: February 16th, $18^{\circ} 5' E.$; March 30th, $27^{\circ} 47' W.$; June 11th, $24^{\circ} 24' E.$; July 28th, $19^{\circ} 26' W.$; October 7th, $25^{\circ} 5' E.$; November 16th, $19^{\circ} 25' W.$ Between these dates he will pass and re-pass the Sun in inferior or superior conjunction. The conditions favorable for finding this minute but brilliant planet are that at the time of his greatest elongation whether to the east or west of the Sun, his declination should be north of that of the Sun, this will be

the case about the end of March, on the 27th of which he will be seen in the east before sunrise in such close proximity to Venus (2' apart) as to appear but as one star.

VENUS at the commencement of the year will be the Morning Star with direct motion, coming to superior conjunction with the Sun July 11th, re-appearing as an Evening Star in the early part of August, still with direct motion throughout the year.

MARS will commence the year as a Morning Star with direct motion becoming retrograde March 4th, till May 22nd, afterwards direct to the end of the year. He will be in opposition to the Sun April 10th, on the meridian at midnight, at his nearest to the earth and greatest apparent magnitude.

JUPITER begins the year as a Morning Star, with direct motion. In close conjunction with Venus January 2nd, apparent motion retrograde from March 21st to July 23rd, and direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun May 22nd, and in conjunction December 8th.

SATURN commences the year retrograde till March 30th, after which direct till December 1st, then retrograde to the end of the year. He will be in opposition to the Sun January 23rd, in conjunction August 1st.

URANUS at the commencement of the year his motion is direct till January 21st, retrograde till June 20th, then direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun on April 4th, in conjunction October 19th, he has Mars for a near companion during the first half of the year, the two planets being in conjunction three times, January 9th, May 5th, and June 6th. On September 19th, he will be in close conjunction with Mercury and Venus.

NEPTUNE begins the year with retrograde motion till February 6th, direct till September 1st, afterward retrograde till the end of the year. In conjunction with the Sun May 19th, in opposition November 22nd.

OCCULTATIONS.

There will be eight occultations of Planets by the Moon during the year named, six of Saturn, January 28th, April 19th, May 16th, June 12th, September 3rd, and October 1st, one of Venus March 9th. None of these will be visible at Charlottetown, occurring in the day time or when the Moon is below the horizon. One of Mars will occur December 6th, at 11 minutes past 6 in the evening, but this in our latitude will only appear as a near approach, the Moon passing about one-sixth of its diameter to the south of the planet.

REMARKS.—1. The nearer the Moon's changes to midnight the fairer the weather will be during the next seven days; the nearer to mid-day the rougher and more stormy. The former time occupies from 10 p. m. to 2 a. m., the latter from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m.

2. The phases happening from 4 to 10 p. m., may be followed by fair weather, but this chiefly depends upon the direction of the wind.

3. If a storm arises from the East, on or immediately preceding the Spring Equinox, or a week after, the following Spring or Summer will be wet four times out of five; if from the West, North or South-west, the Spring and Summer will be dry five times out of six.

of predictions of great events, published at various times. The martial planet of Old England hastens to conjunction with Uranus in the 18th degree of the sign *Libra*, so that our country will not yet shake off the incubus of trouble which has weighed so heavily upon her for the past ten years. 2nd house pre-signifies a great prevalence of fraud and robbery, and a declining revenue. Venus and Jupiter in the 3rd house should benefit the railways.

At SAN FRANCISCO, the ingress takes place at 6h. 55.1m., p. m., of the 21st. Saturn is in the ascendant, and both Mars and Uranus are near the 4th angle, which positions are indicative of a stormy and trying winter; much sickness and many sudden deaths. Trade will be far from good in the winter quarter. The birth-rate will be high, as Jupiter is in the 5th house and Venus hastening thereto.

Total Eclipse of the Moon January 28th. (Visible in the British Isles.)

There will be many deaths among the great; and in France "great and noble men will be slain," for Saturn is elevated above the Moon and Jupiter.

Mars rising, and less than 7° separated from Uranus, foreshadows danger of foreign war, and of mob violence at home. Precautions should be taken against the dynamitards who are very likely to do mischief at this period.

This figure is very threatening as to earthquakes, which are very likely to cause serious damage to the Riviera, and will be felt in Rome, Sicily, and the south of France. The south of England, Portsmouth and Bristol, are very likely to experience some vibration.

The Sun enters Aries March 20th, at 3h. 55m., a. m.

Jupiter approaching the meridian, and being in his chief dignity, the sign *Sagittarius*, and within orbs of the trine (120°) aspect with the Sun, promises some beneficial legislation, reform, and some measure of prosperity. It can hardly be expected, however, that fortune will come to us "with both hands full," inasmuch as Saturn is in the 7th house and in square aspect with Mars, and the ascending degree is afflicted by both these malefic planets, from which we may judge that there will be much sickness and a high death-rate during the spring quarter; also many disasters at sea, destructive storms, and weather adverse to the crops and fruits.

The Sun in the second house and well configured is favorable for the revenue, which should show great improvement over late years. Jupiter elevated above and in aspect with Mercury, pre-signifies advancement of science, literature and art, and of the professors thereof.

The enemies of Old England will be mischievous, but I judge from the position of Jupiter, that peace will be preserved.

At VIENNA, Saturn is in the 6th house and Mars in the 8th, consequently the outbreak of an epidemic is to be feared and guarded against as far as possible. Violent and sudden deaths will be very numerous.

At OTTAWA, the ingress takes place at 10h. 53m., p. m., of March 19th. Jupiter is in the 1st house, and this pre-signifies a fine, dry, and healthy season, temperate air, and general prosperity. The Canadian fishermen will do a good trade this season. On the coasts there will be some sad shipwrecks.

At WASHINGTON, the ingress takes place at 10h. 40m., p. m., of the 19th March. Jupiter in the ascendant is very favorable for the public health and prosperity and the general state of the weather. Towards the end of May there will be some fluctuations and depression on the New York Stock Exchange, and more than one lame duck will be hatched. At SAN FRANCISCO, the ingress takes place at 7h. 46m. 20s., p. m., of the 19th of March. Saturn is in midheaven in square aspect with Mars in the ascendant, and Uranus is just risen. These positions pre-signify a reign of violence, public alarm, and a crop of accidents. Strikes and riots will do great injury to trade. Ramesey says that Mars rising weak, retrograde, and afflicted, pre-signifies that "the people will disagree among one another, and will beat

and wound one another, from which cause much evil and damage shall happen to them." Nevertheless, as Jupiter is in the 2nd house, trade will soon recover and prosperity smile on the people. Venus and Mercury in the 5th house, the birth-rate will be above the average, sport will flourish, and education be advanced.

The Sun enters Cancer June 21st, at oh. 14m., a. m.

Mars in the house of war, and nearly in square aspect with Mercury, is indicative of strained relations with a neighbouring Power. We must be on our guard against a surprise. Criminals will give a good deal of trouble, and robberies with violence will be very numerous; in fact murderous outrages will be appalling. On the whole, this quarter promises to be pretty fortunate for workpeople. Railways will benefit by increased traffic.

At PARIS, the French will have a sharp quarrel on their hands, and will find it difficult to avoid war; they will be in a very excitable and impatient mood, and the dissensions between the various political parties will be unusually bitter.

At ST. PETERSBURG epidemic disease—probably cholera—will be rife, and there will be earthquake shocks, and falling houses in several parts beside the capital, particularly towards the end of July.

At OTTAWA the ingress takes place at 7h. 11m. 20s., p. m., of the 20th of June. Mars has just passed the meridian, yet he is near enough to threaten trouble to the Government, and increase of taxation. Venus in the 7th house pre-signifies an increase in the marriage-rate, and improved foreign trade. The Moon and Jupiter in the 11th house is fortunate for the Canadian people, who will benefit in many ways. Saturn's presence in the 8th house indicates much mortality among aged people and an increase of death from diseases of the heart and spine.

At WASHINGTON, the ingress takes place at 7h. 6m., p. m., of June 20th. Mars is within half a degree of the meridian; this is evil for the President and his Cabinet, who will have their hands full of thorny questions. Otherwise, a successful quarter is promised for the American people, whose trade will be greatly expanded. Sudden

deaths will be very numerous, especially from heart disease, in Philadelphia and Charleston as well as in the capital and New York. The latter end of July will be remarkable for the numerous deaths from heat and apoplexy.

At SAN FRANCISCO the ingress takes place at 4h. 47m., p. m., of the 20th June. The Moon and Jupiter are in the ascendant, and this promises well for the health and prosperity of the public. Venus in the 8th house and near the Sun, mortality will be rather high among women and grantees. Mercury on the cusp of the 9th house and in square aspect with Mars on the 11th, disputes will be embittered in the law courts and in the council chamber; and the shipping trade will be subject to some serious losses. Mercury having the trine aspect with the Moon, travelling will be very much indulged in, and the means of communication by railway and by sea will be increased.

Total Eclipse of the Moon, July 23rd, 1888.

This figure is very significant as to earthquakes, and some shocks will be felt in England, in the north chiefly. Near Madrid a destructive earthquake is threatened.

In South America, chiefly in Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia, the worst effects will be felt as the Moon will be in the zenith and Saturn in the nadir at the middle of the eclipse, in those countries; and there is much reason to fear a great catastrophe in Ecuador.

Ramesey avers that an eclipse of the Moon in the first decanate of the sign *Aquarius* pre-signifies "the misfortune of some king under *Aquarius*." The Czar of Russia and the King of Prussia are therefore warned to safeguard their health and avoid war, if possible, this summer.

The Sun enters Libra September 22nd, 2h. 35m.

Jupiter is the planet most powerfully situated, being in the 10th house, in his chief dignity the sign *Sagittarius*, and in sextile (60°) aspect with the Sun. A fortunate quarter is therefore promised for Old England, advancement of trade and commerce, and honor to her arms. The presence of Venus in (*Libra*) and Mercury in the 9th house is very favorable to art, science and literature, and to new inventions, of which there will be several of a highly advantageous nature. Travelling will greatly increase.

His enemy Scaliger was so candid as to admit that Cardan was endowed with a very comprehensive, penetrating, and incomparable mind.

1. If you prune your vines when the Moon is at full in *Taurus*, *Leo*, *Scorpio*, or *Sagittarius*, neither worms nor birds will infest your grapes.

2. Graft not trees when the Moon is waning, or not to be seen. If you shear sheep in her increase their wool will grow again the better.

3. Fruits and woods for use should be cut in the decrease of the Moon; but if you would have timber to keep long, fell it towards the latter end of winter, the Moon being under the earth and in aspect with Saturn, for that will prevent its rotting and render it exceedingly hard and durable.

4. Fire-wood and what you would have grown quickly again cut when the Moon is above the earth in her first quarter in aspect with either Venus or Jupiter.

5. Sow or plant when the Moon is in either *Taurus*, *Virgo*, or *Scorpio*, in good aspect with Saturn; when she is in *Cancer* set or sow all kinds of pulse; when in *Libra* or *Capricornus* dress your gardens and trim your small trees and shrubs.

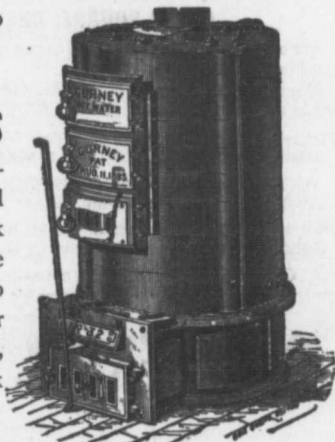
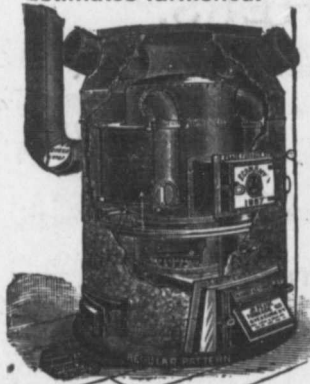

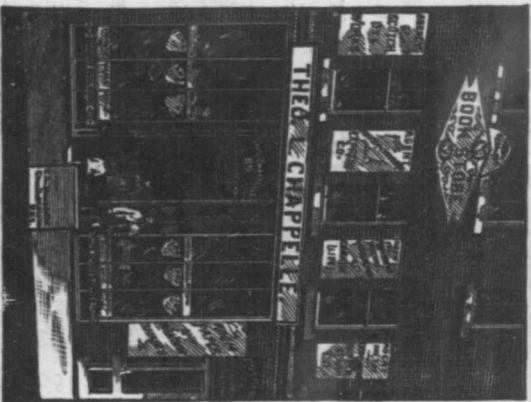
