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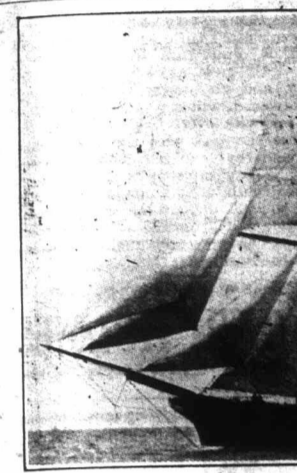

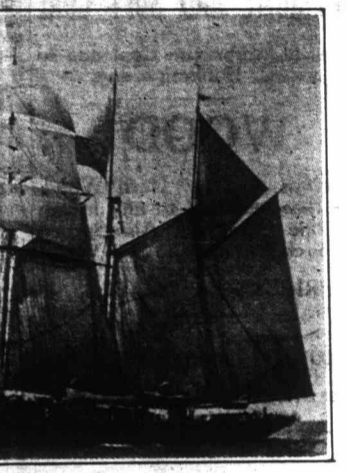

Their fleet, can never be forgotten.

GOLF BALL UNSTRAYED
If one takes a bramble ball and puts it
On a table he will find that the ball does
Not come to rest except on three or four
Of the excrescences or pimples. Now, if
One puts a perfect sphere on a perfectly
Level plane or table it will remain exactly
In the spot where it has been placed. The
Bramble ball practically never does this.
It is always trying to settle on three or
Four points. This tendency is much less
Marked in the case of a golf ball, for this
Comes to rest on the edge of the ring formed
By the outer edge of the one dimple. When
A player sees his approach putt which is
Heading nicely for the hole, going in
The last yard or so away from it, he gener-
ally opens the green. He does not realize
That it is in the vast majority of cases
Simply "Weary Willy" looking for his
Little three-legged stool. In other words,
It is the natural tendency of irregularly
Marked balls to come to rest on three or
Four feet.

Dear old vessel! How many, many

Your name! You are, I venture to believe,
A household word in many lands. Nothing
That is unworthy marks your long and
Cheerful story. Old friends, you are as
A living thing to me. How often have I
Sighed at your name, when, spending hours,

There may be sorrow without regret.
For many reasons, on which I need not
Dwell, I feel sure that I am writing right
In the consolation of knowing that my
Old vessel in her new line may do good
Work in many ways for long years to
Come.

GOLF BALLS AND CLUBS

TAKING into consideration the ex-
tremely important position that
the golf holds to-day, it has received at
the hands of those who write about it,
but scant attention. Nor indeed, have
those who make a large portion of their
income out of providing them for the
golfer devoted much consideration to the
structure of the ball. In view of the im-
portant improvement in golf balls, brought
about by the introduction of the rubber-
cored sphere, this may seem an extreme
statement.

For instance, even in the best rubber-
cored balls, the centre of gravity is fre-
quently not where it should be. This,
in turn, affects the flight of the ball and the
result is a matter of far greater impor-
tance than the golfer realizes. Originally,
as nearly all golfers know, the ball was
practically smooth and then its flight was
very irregular and the ball was apt to
drift considerably. It was noticed that
they carried better after they had been
knocked about and indented by usage.
Then came the gutta-percha ball, and
these were indented in a regular manner
by hammering, which made them fly much
more steadily.
In the course of time the balls were
moulded with regularly indented lines
crossing each other so as to divide the
space as nearly as possible into small
squares. This, so far as can be remem-
bered, was the earliest device for making
the ball more accurate. The next develop-
ment in the marking of the ball was the
pimples or brambles, little excrescences
scattered all over the ball. This soon
became popular, but there can be little
doubt that it is the most unscientific
marking that was ever put on a ball
intended for scientific and accurate play.
The opportunities come all too seldom in
these days of maddest shills. Here in
Bombay it is a pleasure to remember that
the visit of the Sunbeam in 1914 awakened
general interest. All the Indian friends
whom we had the honor to meet at the
Government House, the rulers of important
States, those without claim to hereditary
honors, all sorts and conditions of men
were desired to see the Sunbeam, and were
graciously received by my dear daughter,
Lady Mabelle Egerton. There must be
many here by whom she is remembered.
Every man in His Excellency's body-
guard has been seen to see the Sunbeam.
Many had never been abroad before. Their
entire weight almost submerged our fleet
of boats. These splendid occasions, which
were not more than four could be in any
cabin at one time, never coincided, so sin-
cere, so serene, so skillfully and grace-
fully fighting this inaccuracy of the ball all
