Before Mr. Justice Craig today are being heard the vagrant cases appealed from the decision of Mr. Justice Macaulay sitting as the police magistrate in the lower court. Originally there were three of the vag cases, the accused in each instance being charged with having no visible himself for the most part by gambling. There was also a fourth case that of Emmons, whose charge was that of keeping a gaming house in South Dawson

In each of the four cases the crown secured a conviction in the lower court, a sentence of one month at hard labor being imposed on each offender. Labord, Scofield and Emmons at once gave notice of appeal but Davis, better known as "Poker Dick," accepted his sentence as a sort of matter of fact with the result that it is now almost at an end:


