EXHIBITION NOTES

An important change has been made in the Prize List in the requirement for Breeders Young Herd in the pure bred classes. As amended—only the females are necessarily both owned and bred by the Exhibitor. The bulls can be purchased but must be owned by the Exhibitor within the Province in which he resided at least three months before the Exhibition opens.

The Grand Stand on the Exhibition Grounds has been re-roofed and was used for the first time at the Firemen's Tournament. Precautions have been taken by way of extra ties and bracing which will prevent a recurrence of the mishap of last winter when the roof was carried away.

Entries are coming in very fast in all classes and the prospects are that the showing in the various departments will be the largest in the history of the Exhibition. This is no doubt due in part to the free carriage of freight concession made by the I. C. R. and D. A. R. and the fact of there being no Exhibition in either St. John or Charlottetown.

The Poultry Building which has been doubled in capacity since the Exhibition of 1900 is now about completed. A large part of the addition will be used for cage birds. The action of the Commission in largely increasing the prize list in this department has met the enthusiastic approval of fanciers who will respond with an attractive show.

The Attractions Programme is about completed. It will be second to none yet offered. Official programmes are now in preparation giving full particulars. These may be had by dropping a line to the Secretary at Halifax.

G. W. Hunt of the Ottawa Fruit Exchange in a letter to the Picton Times says he has received about the last of his reports from the various apple districts, and find the crop is very light, not only in Canada, but in the United States, Great Britain and Germany as well. In Prince Edward County Astrachans and Duchess will be a fairly good crop, in fact all fall varieties show up fairly well there, but Spies and Baldwins are only 40 per cent of a crop, Greenings 60 per cent, and Kings 70 per cent. In Northumberland County a fairly good crop of Spies and Russets is promised. The best yield in the Niagara district is promised from Spies, while Greenings, Russets and Ben Davis will not show over one-fourth a crop. In Bruce there will not be half a crop on the average.

Great Britain will not have nearly as good a crop this year as last year. Mr. Hunt says it will not surprise him to see Ontario farmers getting \$2 per barrel on the trees for good varieties. In fact, he believes two dollars will be under, rather than over the mark for good winter varieties.—Toronto Sun.

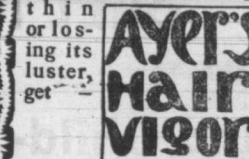

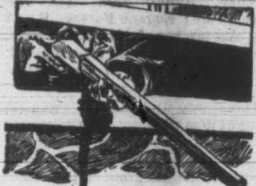

Canada is certainly a very productive country and now we are told that we must raise our own generals. Well we can do it!

According to the new census the population of Canada has lost about half its natural growth and the whole of its immigration in the last decade. We expect to hear from those who talked and wrote about blue ruin ten years ago when the result of the census was disappointing but much larger than this year.

The population of Nova Scotia has increased by 8,720 in ten years. Sydney has a record of increase of 7,481 so that under "the growing times" of the present Liberal government this province has been standing still. The iron and steel industry alone has saved Nova Scotia from a loss of population. As the present government has stopped the exodus we wonder what has become of our people.

THE CENSUS

The return of the census items already made public are very disappointing. The growing times we have been hearing about has turned out to be growing in nothing except the increase in taxation. According to Sir Richard Cartwright it was criminal to spend thirty six million dollars seven years ago, so what words can express the action of the government now in spending sixty million dollars? We find we only have a very few more people to bear this great increase in taxation.

The population of the towns of the Maritime Provinces has been announced and although Lunenburg with less than 1000 is mentioned we see no return of Kentville or Wolfville. What has become of these? Has our numbers so decreased that we can no longer classify with towns exceeding 1000 population?

Sydney, with its 9,908, has the largest population of any town in Nova Scotia. Yarmouth comes second, Truro is third, Amherst fourth, Dartmouth fifth and Lunenburg sixth. At the census of 1891 the order stood: Dartmouth 1st, Yarmouth 2nd, Truro 3rd, Lunenburg 4th, Springhill 5th.

All planning to take A work should be at school without fail on Monday.

Miss Best is a graduate of Acadia and an excellent teacher, one of the very best in the inspectorate, both as a disciplinarian and as an instructor. 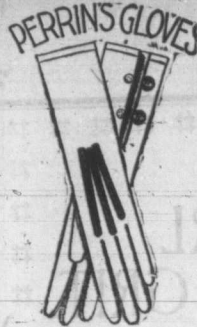
