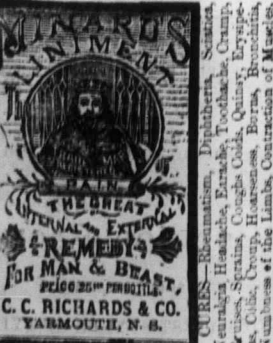

SHIPPING.—Schr. J. P. Blake, Durant, sailed for New York on Monday having on board 6,685 bushels of potatoes.

SHIPPERS.—Schr. J. P. Blake, Durant, sailed for Havana, Cuba, on Monday. Her cargo consisted of 1,370 bushels potatoes, 154 barrels apples, 6 M feet lumber, Shippers, C. E. Borden and Sheffield & Wickwire. This new schooner is without doubt the fastest vessel of her tonnage that sails out of Nova Scotia.

The schr. Edmund, which sailed from Digby the 26th ult., will have to move along quickly or the Resolution will land at a Spanish port the first cargo under the regulations of the new treaty. Of course one week's start for Havana makes a great difference: give it to the Resolution and the Edmund would be nowhere.

Schr. Unaccepted, Barteen, sailed for New York on Monday having on board 1,792 barrels apples. She was loaded by R. M. Rand, W. H. Chase & Co. and Austin Kimball & Co.—Brig Alice, Baker, sailed for Havana on Tuesday carrying 1,375 barrels potatoes and 4 M feet lumber.—Schr Jesse D., Hatfield, will load potatoes here for the American Market. C. E. Borden has chartered here.

COERCION.—It is reported a meeting was held at Booths Bay to select a candidate to represent this ward at the council board. Jonathan Steele, one of the present councillors, was the choice of the meeting. At another meeting, held in Pearsaux, for the same purpose, Leonard Insley and D. B. Newcomb were selected as candidates. It is probable that one of these gentlemen will retire before the time for placing their nomination papers in the hands of the officer who holds the election, thus avoiding any contest in this ward.
