Missionary Appeal.

To the Baptists of Kings Co., Nova Scotia:
DEAR BROTHERS—The heart of every loyal member of our churches must have been moved by the reports of the mission board have come to hand.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.
The Foreign Mission Board, besides caring for three stations in Bolivia are in India serving twenty-two stations with a missionary staff of eighty-six of whom five are physicians. These are assisted by five hundred and forty-one native helpers. There are more than two hundred village schools, nine boarding schools, two high schools, one normal school, a theological seminary, an industrial school and five hospitals. Christians are found in four hundred and eighty-four villages on the field, and at least fifteen hundred villages receive monthly gospel preaching. Eleven hundred and forty-nine have been baptized during the past year.

HOME MISSIONS
The task you have set your Home-Vision Board is relatively so important, and the report of the past year is so encouraging. Seventy-three fields in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have been served. Eighty-six missionaries have performed 327 weeks of labor, preached 6472 sermons and made 14313 religious visits. Two hundred and forty-five converts have been baptized.

APPEAL.
Owing to the failure of some sources of revenue upon which reliance was placed, the eastern section of the foreign board has a deficit of \$4000, and both boards are appealing for special help at this critical time in their history. The existence of these deficits is not only a mass retrenchment, with all its heart-breaking accompaniments, but actual personal privation, especially to some home missionaries whose salaries are unpaid.

The district meeting held at Aylesford on the 11th inst. past a resolution recommending all of the Baptist churches in the county to make a special offering for the purpose of assisting to wipe out these deficits, and appointed the undersigned a committee which would impress upon pastors and all members of our churches and congregations the importance of co-operating to make the appeal successful. To this end we recommend—

1. That one Sunday in December be set apart for the consideration of this appeal;

2. That the principles of Thank-giving and self-denial be emphasized in the canvass;

3. That either the 'special envelope' or every member canvass plan be employed; and

4. That the proceeds be sent to the treasurer of denominational funds at Wolfville to be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions.

Shall the Woman Hang?

The Gloucester, Mass., Times, says: Connecticut is now compelled to face the question which has so often agitated other States? Shall a woman, convicted of murder, suffer the death penalty? A man and a woman in Connecticut have been sentenced to die early in March for the carefully planned and brutally executed murder of the woman's husband. The cause was found in the attachment existing between the two murderers. There is no question of the guilt. And there is also no question that if capital punishment is to be considered seriously, this is a case where it is deserved.

And yet shall the woman hang? There are those who favor their hands in abhorrence at the idea. But if the woman is spared, shall the man hang? That complicates the question.

The woman is as guilty morally as the man, and as she is a responsible person, why is to be dealt with equally by the law, there is no argument, save that of chivalry why the man should be hung and she should be spared.

Thus the question of capital punishment comes up in this neighboring state of our—in a peculiarly vexatious form. Whichever way the matter is decided, there will be criticism. And if the law is not executed, it should either be removed from the books or made such that it will not apply to women. The people who are opposed to such punishment on principle have no difficulty with this case. But the other party has a decided difficulty.

The fact that such a murder as this was committed would seem to indicate that the present law in Connecticut does not deter men and women from murder if that seems to them an effective way of gaining a desired end. And yet the defenders of the law say that this is just what is accomplished. The very discussion, however, shows that we have by no means as yet reached finality in such a case. Yet execution is as burdensome in these cases as in the hardest others for which it was once the penalty.

Politics in Municipal Elections.

The New Glasgow Enterprise says: "It is a thousand pities that party politics were introduced into the recent Municipal Elections. It may be all right in the federal and provincial elections to introduce politics, and make a cleavage between the two parties, but Municipal Elections should never have anything whatever in common with party politics. Whether they be Liberal or Conservative, we care not so long as the man elected throughout the County to look after our municipal affairs is worthy of the trust and confidence of the honest and fair minded electors of their various sections. There are unfortunately too many people in our midst who would drag party politics into everything. When will the men of our country become more liberal minded, more fair and broad in their views, and exercise a little more charity and common sense in the public affairs of the land? We certainly need a change for the better."

So long as the present system of preparing voters' lists is continued so long will party politics be forced into Municipal elections. Like the assessment system, with which it is closely connected, the Revising system has become a hobnob of perjury. Boys under age and men without property qualification are knowingly put on the lists, and properly qualified persons are knowingly kept off those lists by men who have taken oaths to do their duty as required by law. These facts are notorious and afford good and sufficient explanation of the constant attempt to keep the man who belongs to the other party out of the Council and to put the good men of our party in. The evil has been growing tremendously of late years and the late election, in which leaders of both parties sent out private instructions to their respective electors to see that good party men were nominated, will probably be the last in which any pretence will be made to keep party politics in abeyance.

The remedy, we believe, is to be found in the adoption of a system under which assessments and revision of electoral lists will be taken out of the hands of Municipal Councils as now organized. Let the country be divided into small districts modeled after the school section system: give the inhabitants of these districts control of local affairs, such as roads and schools and let assessors and revisors of electoral lists be appointed by, and report to, the ratepayers of the district in mass meeting assembled, and the scandals that attach to our assessments and electoral lists will be greatly diminished. Few men would care to do things that they could not justify to a public meeting, especially if that public meeting had power to correct irregularities.—Berwick Register.

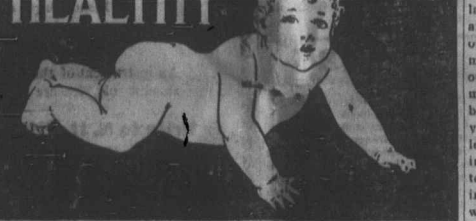

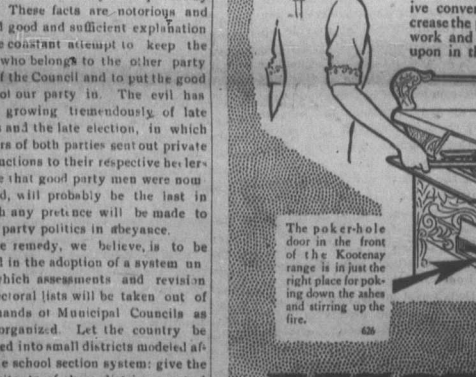

Editorial Notes.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier observed his seventy-second birthday last Thursday, the 20th inst. He is in splendid health and received a great number of congratulatory messages, among them being one from King George.

Mount Allison University is erecting a new science building costing between \$30,000 and \$40,000. This was decided at the meeting of the board of regents held at Sackville last week. The new structure will probably be of stone. The University endowment fund is making good progress.

Persons driving into Wolfville during the late season of dark nights and muddy roads have seen the benefit of our good roads movement forcibly demonstrated. Our town has made a number of good investments during recent years but none better than the money expended upon Main street. This ACADIAN takes special pride in this evidence of civic advancement because for many years in seasons and out, it has advocated this important work. Now that our citizens are beginning to reap tangible results for the money expended and to realize fully the advantages, we expect to see the good work continue. Not only will Main street be finished but, one by one, the other streets will be similarly treated and modern side-walks provided.

The Boy Scouts.

No doubt everyone in the town of Wolfville and vicinity has received during the past week at least one visit from the enterprising small boys of this town.

So far the sale of tickets for the entertainment has been disappointingly small and from the answers given to the boys it would appear that the object of this entertainment is not as desired and therefore a word of explanation may be in order.

While the people of Wolfville have generously given the boys of the town a building of which they are deservedly proud, their responsibility cannot end there. Funds are absolutely necessary to carry on the work and without such funds the Boy Scout organization cannot exist.

It has been found that at least one hundred dollars is required each year to meet the expenses of hockey, camping, 'wireless', etc., which activities constitute the life of the movement.

Some are not satisfied with the work being done. They claim that the boys are just as bad as ever and that the movement is failing in its object. Surely it should be sufficient answer to this that the men in charge of the work and who are naturally most closely in touch with it are so hopeful for the future that they are willing to give unreservedly of their time and money to push it actively along provided that they receive the slight financial backing asked for.

All that is asked of the people is that they purchase a ticket for an annual entertainment at the small cost of twenty-five cents. If they are able to present the boys will try to give them the most money's worth. If they cannot be present a ticket may be sent to them by mail. They do not deny themselves some slight extravagance in order to purchase at least one ticket from the small boy who offers them.

Acadia Notes.

The annual relay race for the Buller Cup was run on the campus last Saturday afternoon. The teams were those of the College classes, the Acad and the Kings department. Each team was composed of eight men and each man ran one mile. From the start the Acad team took the lead and maintained it to the end. At the end of the first mile their man had a lead of a hundred yards, and the interest began to centre on who should win second place. The Kings held this position until the sixth mile, when the Sophomores forged ahead and finished second place. The Freshmen came third, the Freshmen fourth, Juniors fifth, Seniors sixth.

The fastest mile was run by Cook of the Acadia in a time of 20 sec. and Horse of the Sophomores in 21 min. 58 sec. The total time for the race was 43 min. 47 sec. This is the second year the Acadia has won the cup. Their team was a faster bunch all round, each man winning on his own time and not any lead given him. They finished nearly half a lap ahead of second man and nearly a lap and a half ahead of the last. After the race the cup was presented to the winners by Dr. Cotton, President of Acadia University.

Death's Message on Football.

When Death enters a home there is no uncertainty about it's much dreaded presence. But with it comes always a message spoken in the still, small voice, and all too seldom failing to catch the attention of mourners and friends.

Can you not imagine Death whispering, 'Why do you fear me? I can reap only what you have sown. Make this, then, not a day of remorse, but a day of dedication to more active work in the longer preservation of valuable lives now sacrificed in immaturity through human ignorance and folly.' (See Hosea 4:6)

A recent death in Wolfville ought to bring a distinct message to all of us, and more especially to fathers and mothers of boys. If education is a preparation for fuller and better living, then the first question to be asked of all branches of educational effort, intellectual, moral or physical, should be this, What is the relative value of all these things to the ordinary human life; to the man with an ambition to carry his own weight here and to leave the world perhaps a little better than he found it?

Let me be brief. What is the relative value of football in a proper scheme of education? Does football pay dividends out of earnings or out of capital?

Without appealing to our limited statistics of fatalities or of broken bones and other externally recognized injuries, or to that larger class of internal injuries and strains which no statistics can cover and which may only be suspected by the unfortunate footballist later in life, let me ask you to admit that in football a man brings into play every ounce of physical energy in his body.

When you buy a horse you become aware of a certain value wrapped up in that collection of bone and muscle and its possibilities in the way of work and profit.

How many dollars will you take and let me put your horse to some rough work which will call for the expenditure of all he has in him? I don't want your answer. I know it.

Or perhaps you have a piece of inanimate property. It may be an engine or a vehicle of some kind. What will you take and let me load that engine or that vehicle to the limit?

Again, I say I know your answer. It will be the whole value in dollars and cents. Nothing less.

Now there is no question here of bringing boys down to the level of horses and machinery, but as has been said before, it is a question of bringing boys up to the level of horses and machinery. And if parents cannot be appealed to on higher grounds, then I wish to remind them that their boys cost them as many times the future possibilities of their yard stock, and deserve, at least as intelligent a system of care and education.

Go among men past middle life and ask them if they are conscious of strains from over exertion which partly incapacitate them for ordinary work. I am sure the majority will acknowledge that they are. And it really seems as if misery did love company, for these people send their boys onward over the paths they themselves have trodden to their undoing.

Boys should be continually impressed, both by precept and example, that never, except when life is in danger, does it pay to put forth one's greatest energies either physical or mental; and that the plaudits of the crowd are as nothing when weighed in the balance with life, health and happiness.

Home Buttermaking.

Market reports invariably quote creamery butter higher than dairy butter, which is the designation given to that which is made on the farm. It is unfortunate that circumstances at times make it impracticable for dairy farmers to patronize a creamery. When this can be done, not only are the profits, as a rule, increased, but much hard work is taken away from the overburdened members of the family.

There is no good reason why butter made in the home dairy should not be as fine as that made in a creamery where cream produced under all manner of conditions has to be made up. All that is necessary is the carrying out of a well established system in feeding the cows, caring for the milks and cream and the churning and getting up of the butter. In order to teach the proper method of carrying out these various operations, there has been prepared, under the direction of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner at Ottawa, a bulletin entitled 'Buttermaking on the Farm,' written by Mr. Geo. H. Barr, Chief of the Dairy Division.

This work, which may be secured free from the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture, explains the common defects of dairy butter as well as the conditions that are necessary to produce the flavored cream. It then deals with churning, washing, salting, working and packing butter, and considers the modern necessary utensils and their care. There are shown in clear illustrations. This bulletin, which is No. 17 of the Dairy and Cold Storage series, concludes with the following recommendation:—'Keep good cows, feed them liberally, keep them comfortable and clean when in the stable, skim a rich cream and keep it cool, churn at a temperature that will give a baby granule in the butter; use clean, pure water for washing butter and more than three degrees colder or warmer than the butter-milk. Put the butter up in neat, clean, attractive packages, and keep everything in and about the dairy clean and attractive.'
