War Measure is Efficient.

DEFENCE OF CANADA ACT STANDS BETWEEN THE PUBLIC AND LAWLESS ELEMENTS.

Ottawa, Oct. 29th.—A resolute in force issued here that those convicted of making seditious utterances are liable to a fine of \$5,000 or a term of five years in the penitentiary, or both, under the Defence of Canada Act.

It was under this Act that a foreign-born individual was sentenced to two years in the Kingston Penitentiary after conviction in Toronto recently.

Nations at war require some such Act as this one in order to protect the law-abiding elements of the country from the reign of terror which habitually follows open seditious propaganda, apart altogether from the military question concerning Canada's efficient legislative protection against such disorder and officials here are determined that, should any regular monthly will be enforced without equivocation. Mammoth Turtle.

What is believed to be the largest turtle ever seen in northern waters was sighted and killed on Thursday by the crew of the little fishing sloop, Pontic, Capt. W. D. Cushman, the vessel at the time being about 15 miles to the southwest of Portland lightship.

The turtle when first seen was floating on top of the water with its head protruding and it was apparently dead as it made no attempt to rise as the sloop approached, but quickly came to life when a harpoon was driven into him by one of the crew. In some way, it cleaved itself and dove, remaining under water about 15 minutes when it came up into the boat which it also leaped itself.

For the third time it was speared and this time the iron held, and the turtle was towed alongside. Such was its size and weight, however, that the five fishermen on board the Pontic were unable to get it on board their craft. The fishermen described the turtle as a perfect monster, being all of eight feet in length and more than two feet through its thickest part, with a head bigger than a water pail, its weight being apparently near 1,000 pounds.—Glooucester Times.

What is Winter Comfort?

The public school rooms are in Scotland required to be kept 53 and so higher, for the benefit of the health of the pupils. But that would mean tortures for an American school child, coming from a home where the temperature is often maintained at 68. The Kelvin is obliged to wear up all his upper garments as soon as the temperature in his igloo is raised, by the radiation of his whale-oil lamp, as high as 50 degrees. All the continent of Europe, outside of Rome and perhaps one or two other northern countries, sits in perfect comfort in a temperature of 60 degrees. And that our own people do not really need more is proved by the fact that it takes only a single winter ahead to acclimatize them to the 45 degree standard, so that they shiver the indoor heat to which they were born.—Boston Transcript.

## The Late Dr. R. V. Jones.

The funeral of the late Dr. Jones, for over fifty years professor of classics at Acadia University, took place from his residence on Sunday. It was largely attended by the citizens of the town. J. Y. Fayant, of Halifax, a class mate of the deceased, and Dr. Johnstone Hunt, of Halifax, an old pupil, were also present, and several other former pupils. The faculty of the university in cap and gown attended, and the whole body of students. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Harkness, pastor of the Wolfville Baptist church, and were participated in by Rev. Dr. DeWolf, head of the seminary, President Cutler, Rev. Dr. Gates and Rev. E. F. Vanover, rector of St. John's church, Wolfville. All bore testimony to the many fine qualities of the deceased, and voiced the general regret at his departure. Dr. Jones will indeed be widely and sorely missed in Wolfville, and by the many hundreds of his old pupils now scattered over the whole continent. He was a man of exceptionally lovable disposition and gracious winning personality. A ripe classical scholar and a fine teacher, he bore a prominent part in the up-building of Acadia during the past half a century. He was a life-long member of the Baptist church. He is survived by his wife a very estimable lady and a member of the well-known Pince family, four sons, William, of Vancouver, B. C., Walter, in Australia, John, professor of English literature at Pillsbury academy, Oronotown, Minn.; Rev. Ralph, pastor of the Baptist church at Chester, Vermont, and two daughters, Mrs. Mable Marteson, Berwick, and Miss Letty, at home.

## Patronage.

Canadian public men should find encouragement for well-doing in the contemptuous chorus of approval with which the announcement of the abolition of patronage has been greeted. While there is heard here and there a word of doubt, of government determination resolutely to maintain the promise made, and while the party press has many 'gibe' at those who will suffer as a consequence of the changed conditions, there is remarkable unanimity of opinion that the decision is in the public interest. The Toronto Globe, discussing the announcement, points out some of the beneficial effects of the patronage system, and expresses warm hopes of a decided improvement in Canadian public life as a result of a strict adherence to the new rule. The Globe says:

The abolition of the patronage system, both in appointments to the civil service and in the purchase of public supplies, work will be a beneficent revolution in Canadian politics by cutting at the root of some of its gravest evils. The interest of many men in public affairs is merely self-interest. When their party is in power they harass public men by their importunities for office, or contracts, or some place at the public crib. When their party is in opposition they are a lively sense of public duty to a lively sense of selfishness. They try to establish a claim to reward by a bustling prominence in party 'machine' activities, which give them a power out of all proportion to their number and personal standing. Without patronage they will cease from troubling, much to the relief of public-spirited men whose interest in politics is the welfare of their country. Many good citizens have served on patronage committees from no selfish motives, desiring to make the best of a system they disapproved. Very often, it must be admitted, the rewards of party service are not misplaced, but for one who obtains office or a hundred claimants making life a burden to every public man, unless he is devoted to patronage for his local popularity, and sometimes his livelihood. One result ought to be to induce men who have been repelled by patronage influences to come forward and take their rightful place in the party councils. A seat in Parliament, too, should be more attractive to high-minded citizens. It is not denied that party campaign funds are derived to a large extent from the manipulation of patronage, particularly in public contracts. This is a cancer in the body politic which must be cut out. If the Union government exercises this salutary surgery it will do much to justify its existence.

# Why does Canada Raise Money by Selling Bonds?

**BONDS** are issued payable in ten or twenty years, as the case may be. It means that repayment of the money will be spread over ten or twenty years instead of being raised by taxation to meet current expenditures. To raise by taxation all the money as fast as it is needed to carry on Canada's share in winning the war, would be an unbearable burden upon the people. It would mean that more than a million dollars a day would have to be raised right now.
