Fram Esocartor Act.—In the Royal Genetic of the 25th ult., there was published a Despatch, dated 25th Nov., 1852, from the Colonial Secretary, Sir John S. Pakington, to the Liceutenant Governor, Sir A. Bannerman, in subtance stating, with respect to the Free Education and the Small Delta Acts, that—notwithstanding a Memorial from Landed Proprietors and Land Agents, in Prince Edward Island, praying that Her Majosty might be advised to disallow these Acts—the Orders in Council, necessary for their confirmation, would be transmitted by an early opportunity.

It will, consequently, we may reasonably expect, very shortly be the duty of His Excellency, the Lieutenant Governor, to call the Free Education Act into operation, as directed in the last clause thereof; and, therefore, that our Subscribers—almost every one of whom will have some direct interest therein —may be duly and correctly informed concerning the provisions of the Act, and prepared "to govern themselves accordingly," we now take leave to lay before them the subjoined carefully prepared.

They who teach Latin will be entitled to 10s. for each scholar so taught, till their salaries amount to £60 each.

Nor having been able to get our new Power Press into complete working order quite so soon as we expected, we could not issue our paper at the usual hour yesterday. Our readers will, however, we hope, kindly excuse the unavoidable delay, particularly as it has afforded us an opportunity of laying before them, as subjoined, the principal items of the latest European news, gleaned from our Halifax exchanges, which we received at a late hour last night, the Mail Couriers having at last been able to effect a passage of the Gulf.

The Mail Couriers brought 23 Colonial Mail Bags, but no English letters or papers,—they are, however, expected to-night.

The Royal Mail Steamship Asia, Capt. Lott, 14 days from Liverpool, bound to New York, put into Halifax on 1st January.

The Asia left Liverpool on Saturday, the 18th December, and was just a fortnight out. She brought 62 passengers for New York; and escountered a succession of severe gales. On Monday last she experienced a terrific hurricane, wind N. W. and N., in which she lost a life boat, but met no other injury.

The news by the Asia is highly interesting and important. After 4 days debate on Mr. D'Israeli's Budget, Ministers sustained a defeat by a majority of 19.

The surveys for its location have been completed, and the ground has been found quire as favourable for the easy and apeedy construction of the work as was expected. Several routes have been surveyed, which will combit the legislature of Michigan and contractors to obtain a perfect understanding of the whole subject. The canal will be a fraction less than a subject. mile in length. The law of Congress provides that the locks shall be at least 250 feet long, and 60 feet wide, and the Michigan legislature has power to enlarge the dimensions. When completed, this canal will enable steamers of the largest class to run from Buffalo to the head waters of the lake without any transhipments—an im-provement that will quadruple the trade of this provement that will quantify means.

National Intelligence, will be to survey portions of called "The Filot," with about twenty men. Its objects, as we learn from a long article in the National Intelligencer, will be to survey portions of the China and Japan seas, the route between China and California, and the North Pacific Ocean in the region of Behring's Straits. It may probably also ascend the Sea of Tartary, to make some ably also ascend the Sea of Tartary, to make some examinations needed for the advantageous presention of commercial enterprises in those comparatively unknown waters. Congress has apprepriated \$ 125,000 for the Expedition. Its preparation and equipment is most complete. In every particular, it will be thoroughly prepared for the work before it. The vessels will all be peculiarly adapted for it in their construction and equipment all the machinery of ateamers have been introduced into one of the vessels; and the boats have been constructed in the heat manner, with special reconstructed in the best manner, with special reference to the contemplated surveys. The most eminent medical skill in the service will be detailed eminent medical skill in the service will be detailed and seientific men, in every department, will be selected, with reference to their high reputation and eminent suitableness for the duties in view. The crewa also will consist alone of young, healthy vigorous, and efficient seamen, and their clothing and food have been particularly attended to. It will probably be the most complete expedition for scientific purposes which has ever been sent out by any government; and its progress will be watched with much interest. The commander Cadwalader Ringgold, whose qualifications and charaçter afford an ample guarantee that success Cadwalader Ringold, whose qualifications and character afford an ample guarantee that success will attend his efforts, and that his laboure will prove worthy the admiration and gratitude of his countrymen.
