

Strike Down the Enemy THE address of the Leader of the Opposition, Hon. D. Gordon, published in this issue, briefly and tersely sets forth some of the many reasons why the present Provincial Government should be removed from power on the 12th of December. As is plainly evident from the evidence furnished

Government have broken their pledges, falsified their promises and have consequently, forfeited the confidence of the electorate of this Province. They promised to reduce public expenditure; but the record shows they have largely increased it. In the strongest language possible they condemned a Provincial debt; yet in nine years they have added about \$500,-000 to the debt of the Province. They solemnly declared when they took office the day of taxation was far off, and have since then assur-ed the electors they would receive an amount of money from Ottawa that would remove taxation for all time. In all these declarations they have most outrageously deceived the electorate; for in their nine years of office they have collected from the people \$288,649 in taxes. This is what the people have for placing in power the present Government and keeping them there. They promised to make revenue and expenditure how that the average annual

meet; but the public accounts deficit, since they assumed power, has been \$39,543. When in opposition they never ceased to proclaim that there was no necessity or a Commissioner of Public Works and that the Land Office should be closed. But, in the face of this, they have continued although they have been in office over nine years. The financial policy of the Government has been simply ruinous, as any one can see by giving the matter a little thought. Although they extracted, in the shape of taxes, the sum of \$288.649 from the pockets of the people, they ran behind in their accounts during their time in office, as we have al ready shown, to the tune of \$355,-Adding together these deficits and taxes we have the enormous sum of \$644,537. This is the way the Government have carried out their promises and have made revenue and expenditure meet. In return for all this expenditure and taxation the people have received no substantial benefit. Our public road system, as carried on by the Government is simply a public scandal; a sink for absorbing the people's money, without any returns in the shape of improved highways. Our Province is without sources of public revenues, such as the valuable mineral and lumber areas of the other Provinces of the Dominion, and if the policy of going in debt is to be permitted much longer, the Island will be irretrievably mortgaged to the money lenders. This is no imag-inary picture of our financial consee who will take the trouble to give the matter serious considera-tion. Is it not, therefore, time to call a halt; to rouse ourselves from our lethargy and make an effort to preserve our heritage, by re-
