SOLIGNUM.
A Remarkable Test! Locally made by
Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.
To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the at-
tacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet
in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the
balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the
centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immedi-
ately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf
(which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first)
for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we
found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance
in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had pene-
trated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly
begun boring before coming in contact with it.
Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we
handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends,
leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same
place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and
Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but
the centre was riddled with worm holes.
Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by
those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other
wood work.

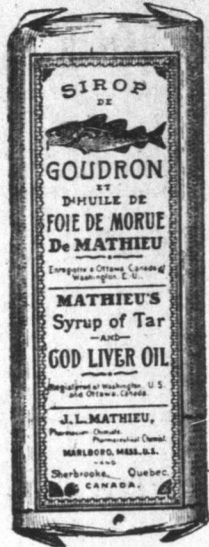

The Search for an Arctic Man.

Early Will go North in an Effort to Find Captain Mikkelsen—"If I do not Succeed, I Shall Not Come Back."

London, April 25.—The announcement that a search party is to set out to find Captain Mikkelsen, the Arctic explorer, brings to the fore the valiant personality of this man, whose whole life has been cast under the spell of the Arctic.

Those who know Einar Mikkelsen know him as a giant of a man, well over six feet, with shoulders broad in proportion. His fair hair and his eyes the color of tempered steel mark him as a true son of the Vikings.

ried out the greater part of their purpose when they were forced to return to the ship because of the advanced summer. The second reason of Einar Mikkelsen's journey was to pierce through Greenland on the east coast, make a map of the Peary channel, and eventually come out at Cape York on the west coast. No man has yet done this. If he succeeds he will have performed one of the most remarkable feats in the history of Arctic exploring.

The letters that have been received from him since his departure tell their own story of the difficulties that had to be overcome.

On September 25, five men started north with four sledges and thirty dogs. Night and day they pushed over the ice, and on October 31 Mikkelsen achieved his first object.

Far north, on the seventy-ninth degree, he came upon a rifle stuck in the snow, and by the rifle he found the corpse of Bronlund.

He found the notebooks, with the grim story of the sufferings of his comrades and himself, but he did not find the bodies of the other two men. There was new ice everywhere, and the two bodies are supposed to have been carried out to sea.

Alone in the northland they buried Bronlund. Einar Mikkelsen went north again to cross Greenland over the inland ice, and only one man accompanied him—Mr. Iversen, a Navy engineer. They started on March 3, and walked, supported by a second party of three men, for a month, when the support party left them. With provisions for 105 days and fifteen dogs, Mikkelsen and Iversen then went on alone. Mikkelsen gave orders for the support party to wait for him until August 1, 1910. If he did not return before then the ship was to go back to Denmark.

And so, with that leave-taking among the ice and snow, Einar Mikkelsen and his companion pass out of the story until the search party shall establish whether success or failure has attended them.

An Obliging Post Office

Probably the most colossal task ever undertaken by Great Britain is the making of India. One method of the making is disclosed in recently published statistics concerning the Postal Service.

There are now nearly nineteen thousand post-offices in India. They are kept in working order by ninety-two thousand persons. Last year mail trains traveled no less than a hundred and thirty-five million miles. But these were not the only carriers. While mail trains run over thirty-two thousand miles of railway, many letters are carried by boat and forest runners.

As to the parcels post, over nine hundred million articles—or more than three to each person in India—were entered last year at the post-office for transmission. Though many of these articles were posted without even an address, and though many contained diamonds and other valuables only eight out of every twenty-five hundred sent to the dead-letter office failed to reach either the sender or the receiver.

In the money-order department nearly twenty-five million money-orders were issued, aggregating a hundred and forty-five million dollars.

In establishing a service combining the money-order and parcels departments, the Indian post-office is more obliging than most post-offices. It will receive a parcel from a merchant, transmit it, collect the declared value from the addressee, and return the money to the seller; last year, in return for such parcels, the post-office passed into the hands of tradesmen nearly twenty-eight million dollars.

Last year the post-office savings bank depositories in India reported one and one-third million separate and active accounts aggregating fifty-two and a half million dollars.

Finally, the Indian post-office is philanthropic as is hardly any other, for in a malarial country like India it is of vital moment to the people that a post-office should have for sale, as it has, small envelopes containing quinine.—The Outlook.

Society Discusses King's Order for Earlier Court Hours, and the Queen Barring Hobble and Harem Skirts.

London, May 1.—Earl Spencer, Lord Chamberlain, has decreed that women attired in hobble skirts will not be allowed at any of the court functions at the Coronation of King George. Fashionable dressmakers have been notified to tell their customers of the prohibition.

No written message has been sent to dressmakers, but an official from the Lord Chamberlain's office personally and requested the managers to convey to their clients the information that it was undesirable that tight skirts should be worn at court. It is understood the order has been inspired by the Queen.

In court circles it is whispered that Queen Mary positively abhors the hobble skirt, in fact, she discontenances all extremes of fashion such as tight skirts, enormous hats and exaggerated coiffures. The disappearance of the hobble, of course, means the end of the harem skirt.

It seems to me that the life of Lysses Grant ought to be a knock-down argument for any man who dares at any age to say, "I am a failure. My chances for success are over."

Had Grant said, "I am a hopeless failure. I have failed at everything I have tried. There is no use in my trying to lead a regiment," the history of this country might have been altogether different.

Here are a few facts in Grant's life history.

He was born April 27, 1822. He was educated at West Point, graduating twenty-first in a class of thirty-nine.

He went to the Mexican war as a lieutenant. At its close he was a brevet captain, being then twenty-six years old.

This was in 1848. In 1854, at the

age of thirty-two his downgrade began when he was forced to resign from the army because of drunkenness.

He went into the real estate business, worked in the custom house and even as an auctioneer. It is said.

"During this time," his biographer says, "it was so painful to see him that all who knew him preferred to cross the street rather than meet him."

"Finally," to quote the biographer again, "to him and his family, for whom he could not earn even needful bread, his father had become a last shelter against the struggles of life."

This was his condition when war was declared.

Immediately he offered his services as the captain of a regiment which had helped to recruit and drill.

June 16, 1861, he became Colonel. August 7 he was made brigadier-general of volunteers.

February 16, 1862, he was made major-general of volunteers.

April 9, 1865, he received Lee's surrender.

May 14, 1868, he was unanimously nominated for President at the National Republican Convention in Chicago.

November 4 he was elected President of the United States.

Seven years from a clerkship in a country town to the President's chair! It is perhaps, take it all in all, the most remarkable record of any of our public men.

To the unsuccessful man of thirty-five or forty or forty-five or, in fact, to the man of any age, who dares to feel that there is no use trying any more, Grant's life is a tremendous rebuke, and a wonderful word of hope.

Atlantic Cable Amalgamation.

Latest Details of the New Scheme.

The activity in the stocks of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company during the past few days is to be attributed to the fact that the negotiations for an amalgamation of working interests between the Western Union and the British Companies are in their final stages, and will, the promoters of the scheme hope, be completed during the present visit to London of Mr. Theodore Vail, the President of the Western Union Company, who is mainly responsible for the policy of amalgamation. A good deal of mystery has hitherto been maintained in connection with the proposed deal, but we have now obtained information from well-informed sources, and Mr. Vail has himself furnished information as to the character and objects of the scheme.

It may be stated at once that the only companies which would be included in the arrangement would be the pioneer cable company, the Anglo-American, the Direct United States Cable Company, and the Western Union. These three companies control in all eight Atlantic cables, the four Anglo lines, the three Western lines, and the one cable of the Direct Company. There would still, therefore, be nine cables outside the proposed combination—the five lines of the Commercial Company, the two French, and the two German cables.

The proposals which have now been made to the British companies for an amalgamation, not of capital but of working interests, arose, it is claimed, out of the desire of the Western Union management to improve telegraphic communication between Great Britain and the American Continent, where the Western Union and the allied company, the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, operate some 12 million miles of land telegraph and telephone lines.

The recent increase in the traffic of these undertakings is said to be largely due to the cheapening of rates, and particularly to the introduction of the night and day letter business, by which, during the period of light traffic at night, or by yielding preference to messages paid for at a higher rate during the day hours, messages in plain language and not in code may be transmitted at a rate much below the ordinary tariff. The response made by the public to this system has far exceeded the anticipations of its sponsors. In the case of the Western Union Company the night letter business is stated to have yielded an income of \$1,500,000 within six months.

This satisfactory response to the provision of additional facilities is regarded as an important step in the direction of inducing the commercial community in America to employ the telegraph for a considerable proportion of the written communications which at present pass through the post.

It was the success of the policy just outlined which led to the negotiations first opened a year ago for the consolidation of Atlantic cable interests, such as would enable the cable services and the land line services to be operated by one management and give direct working from all parts of Great Britain to the cities in the vast area served by the Western Union and its allies.

The original intention of the American Company was to lay down fresh cables on its own account, but preference was subsequently given to the policy of making a better use of the existing cable facilities rather than incur large capital outlays in duplicating cables.

Financial Position of Companies.

In view of the character which the amalgamation of interests will probably assume, it will be interesting to compare the capital and dividends paid by the three companies concerned—

The Anglo-American Company has a reserve fund of nearly one million and the Direct United Company a reserve fund of £533,024. The reserves shown in the accounts of the Western Union Company for 1910 are \$2,500,000.

It will be noted from these particulars that the three companies interested pay varying rates of dividend upon their capital. The Western Union has only during the past two years recovered the long fall in net revenue earnings, from over \$8,000,000 in 1903 to \$3,402,936 in 1908. The net revenue for 1910 was \$7,274,900, and the dividend paid on the stock was, as in the previous year, 3 per cent.

The Anglo-American Company, in distributing 3% per cent. upon its undivided Ordinary last year, giving the rates on the split stock shown in the table, made its best distribution

Assuming that the amalgamation of interests outlined becomes an accomplished fact, the Western Union Company would undertake the management of the business, which would have the result, while leaving the capital and independent existence of the British companies unaffected, of reducing them to the level of merely collecting guaranteed dividends.

But the plan has that appearance of surprise which has often been expressed that the British Post Office has not acquired the interests of such a company as the Anglo-American, and thus secured a Government Atlantic cable system, and this surprise will be accentuated at a moment when negotiations are in progress which may have the effect of placing the whole of the British Atlantic cables under American management, even if this step is designed to improve the facilities offered to the public. The assurance is given, however, that if the scheme is accepted no raising of rates is contemplated, but that on the contrary the experiment will be made of opening up cable communication to new classes of service on lower rates than those now prevailing.—The Times.
