DUBLIN. Aug. 18. The Government is fully prepared for trouble in Ulster. The Irish Times says that the anti-Home Rulers may make good heir threats of revolt but their revolt will not last long, because all preparations have been made for suppressing it with the utmost vigour. The proceedings of the Ulster Rifle Club are being watched with the keenest interest, continues the Times, and conferences are being held be tween the heads of the military constabulary and the officials at Dublin Castle. Military plans have been completed to cope with any emergency Belfast has been carefully mapped out with the purpose of dealing with any disturbance there. Cipher messages are constantly passing between Dublin Castle and the Home Office.

LONDON, Aug. 18. The dramatic arrest and execution of several generals, including Chang Chen Wu, alleged to be the head of the recently unearthed plot atH ankow, have recently caused intense excitement in the Chinese capital. According to the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, the army officers arrived openly at Peking a few days ago. President Yuan Shi Kai received number of secret messages from General Luen Heng, Vice-President of China, proving the complicity of the generals in the recent abortive revolution, and the President acted with such swiftness that escape was impossible. The generals were seized in the dead of night and two of the leaders were shot after being tried by a drumhead court-martial. The other officers were returned in chains to Hankow, and there executed.

Special Evening Telegram, MONTREAL, Aug. 18. A thrilling tale of impenetrable fog and deadly ice, is told by Capt. Anderson, of the Norwegian steamer Spiral, which docked to-day with pitch pine from Jacksonville, Florida. The Spiral was eleven days on the voyage; she was two days lying off Green Islands. She had a narrow escape colliding with ice off Newfoundland. The ship was creeping along very slowly when ce was seen ahead. Engines were reersed and the vessel thrown to staroard, passing the berg by less than he ship's length. "I have been 26 ears at sea, but never saw such ice and fog in my life," declared the Cap-
