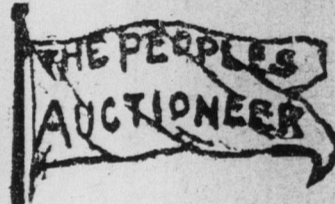

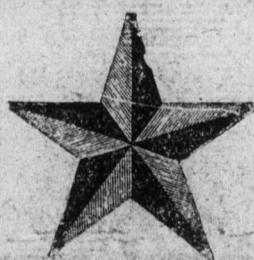

# The Househo

## Household Notes

After thoroughly washing white lace curtains, put them in a solution of one teaspoonful of chloride of lime to three quarts of warm water. Let the curtains stand in the solution for about an hour.

If the seats of caned chairs sag, turn them upside down, wash well with soapy water, soaking so as to thoroughly wet them, and in drying they will stiffen to almost, if not quite, their normal condition.

When cooking an old-fashioned boiled dinner, place the spinach in a cheesecloth bag, then when the dinner is done it can be easily taken out, and the other vegetables will not be covered with bits of green.

If for any reason the red bricks in your fireplace become discolored or have white spots on them, rub them with linseed oil, giving them all they will absorb, and after a few applications the spots will disappear.

Before using new tins fill them with cold water, adding a handful of salt. Allow them to stand several hours, then rinse well in clear, cold water. After this method has been followed, nothing sticks to them.

To prevent dresses and other articles from becoming yellow with age, take a good-sized pillow case and blue it thoroughly, and place the dress in it. When you open the blue bag your dress will be as white as when you placed it in.

To stiffen hair brushes, wash the brush well in a quart of hot water, to which a dessert-spoonful of ammonia has been added, then dissolve a large lump of salt in cold water, dip the brush in several times and leave to dry in the open air.

To clean a net waist, put it into a two-quart fruit jar filled with gasoline. Be sure that it is well screwed on. Let it stand overnight. In the morning, shake the can back and forth. The motion will clean the dirt out of the waist.

## Nfld. Society Hear Social Problems.

Topics covering Imperial relationships and social distress were touched upon by the speakers at the annual banquet of the Newfoundland Society last night. Dr. C. A. Peters presided. In proposing the toast to Canada the Rev. Dr. Pedley said he hoped that Canada would always have a place as a constituent part of the great agency of the British Empire. Called on to propose the toast to Newfoundland, Professor Dale of McGill scored the present trend of Canadian civic growth. The problems of Europe were becoming manifest in this country, he said. While predicting a great future and a solution of all Canada's Imperial troubles, the speaker was in serious vein with regard to the social problems of to-day, with Canadian cities filled to overflowing with a tide of foreign immigration that is too great for the assimilative powers of the country and with the special problem of the Southern European, who outnumbered as a class all other immigrants.

Infantile morality and child crime in our large cities constituted pressing problems, he said. Park spaces in Montreal were on a low percentage with the number of darkened chambers, and in much improvement could be made to the educational system.

Others who spoke were Lieut.-Col. Renouf, J. F. Jackman, Olivier Asselin, President of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, and Professor Barnes, of McGill.—Montreal Star, Nov. 19.

## Smugglers Use Aeroplanes.

Paris, Nov. 13.—The first instance of an airship being employed for smuggling purposes has come to the knowledge of the French police. It seems that an airship has been hovering in the neighbourhood of Armentieres recently, dropping packets of tobacco and other contraband goods on French soil. It manoeuvred so rapidly that the police could not follow it, and its confederates escaped with the tobacco. It is now suggested that if this sort of thing goes on an aerial police will have to be established.

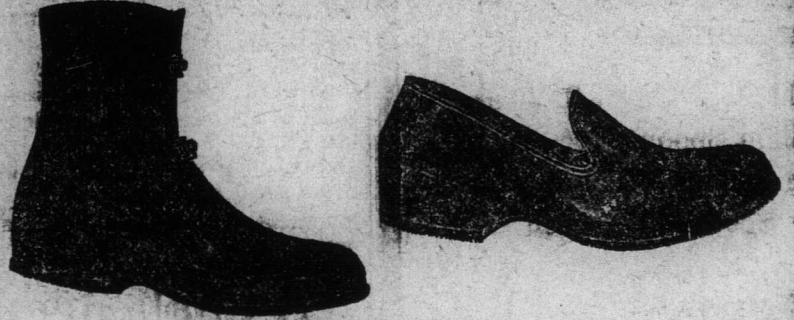
An aeroplane can hardly cross the English channel without being seen, must report itself on arrival, and give an account of itself. But such regulations are made easily evaded on a land frontier, and the chase of the aerial smuggler by the police ship may in future yield adventures as exciting as the chase of smugglers on the coast by revenue officers in the old days. Indeed, some French papers think that it will be impossible to prevent this form of smuggling, and that it will in future cause so much trouble that the revenue will seriously suffer.

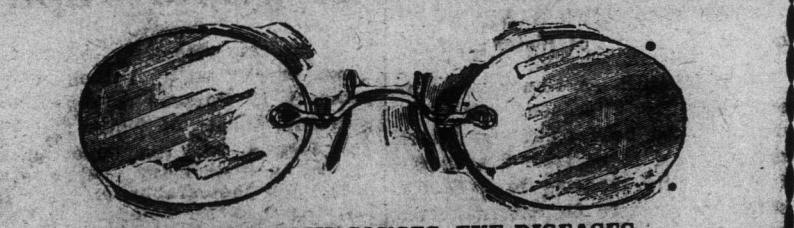

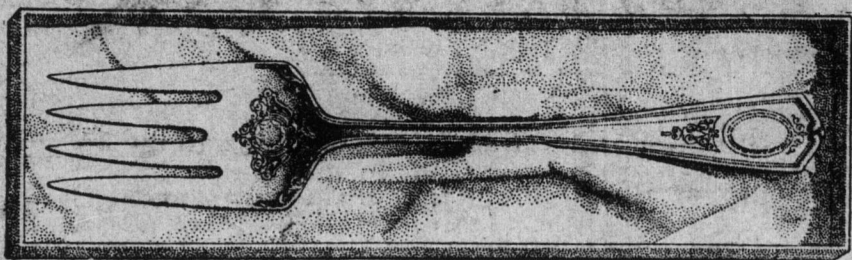

### Must Pay the Piper.

We have often dwelt on the reckless extravagance of the administration of Sir Edward Morris. We have shown that he led the country astray and into believing that his first loan would pay for the building and entire completion of the Branch Railway Contract of 1910; that he had to eat his own words two years later when he found it necessary to raise a second loan to go on with the work, and that the end is not yet. He has undertaken that the Fortune Bay railway shall traverse the length of the Burin peninsula and terminate at Grand Bank. He has also undertaken to extend the Trepassey branch to St. Mary's. He can neither finish the 1910 contract nor go on with the work outside of the Branch Railway Contracts without raising a third loan. Loans are now difficult to raise. The investing public are fighting shy of investing in Colonial Government loans, even when Four and Four and a half per cent. debentures are offered at a discount. Underwriters are full up with them and have decided not to underwrite any more until they have got their hands what they have there. The outlook for raising a third loan is black enough from circumstances alone beyond the control of Newfoundland, and black enough even for big and powerful Dominions. But, in the case of Newfoundland, it has been partly made worse by the wanton extravagance of the past four years, and particularly from the way the Civil Service has been swollen during the past two years or more, and the great expenditure made this summer and fall in public works; but more especially has it been made worse by the electioneering budget of last spring, which took off some \$380,000 of duties. All kinds of flimsy arguments were advanced to show that the

revenue would be sufficiently buoyant to overcome the adverse effects of these reductions and to give a revenue of some Four million dollars by June 30th next. The Government is now putting their fiscal theory to the test, and when the House meets next February, the Minister of Finance will have a chance to show how the facts square with the rosy expectations he laid down and how far the income for the current year will meet the expenditure which has gone on and is going on. The Auditor General's reports to be tabled next session should prove illuminating and should afford many topics for discussions in the House and in the Press. Morris and his colleagues have had their election dance, now they have to pay the piper.

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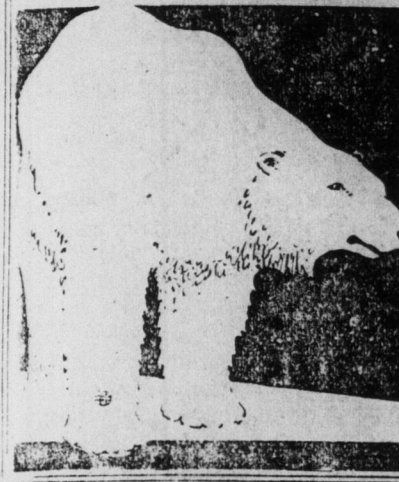

**Finest Orators  
of the Age.**

**How They Strike Lord Curzon-  
Pointed Criticism of  
Famous Men.**

The characteristics of the oratorical style of the past as compared with that of the present were analyzed by Lord Curzon at Cambridge, when he delivered the Rede lecture.

He spoke on "Modern Parliamentary Eloquence," and he had some interesting criticism on all the chief orators of the day.

The second half of the eighteenth century, he said, was generally regarded as "the golden age" of British oratory. The change in Parliamentary eloquence was far more prejudicial to the cultivation of oratory than any change in the individual member. The House of Commons was now much more concerned with legislation and much less with administration than a century ago. Now Parliament had become a gigantic workshop in which the machinery was always humming and the dust from the spindles was flying thickly in the air.

The power of the Whigs and the tyranny of the party machine had grown so immensely that there was little opening for independence—the natural seed-ground of oratory—and but rare opportunities of turning votes by eloquence. Speeches therefore tended to become standardized and conformed to a conventional and commonplace type.

By far the greatest change wrought in Parliamentary conditions, as they affect speaking, had been the result of victim reporting in the press. Now that every word was taken down and the speaker, particularly the prominent or Front Bench speaker, knew that he was addressing, not a private club, but a gathering that might embrace the whole nation, and in the case of Foreign office debates a much wider audience still, he must measure his paces; he could not frisk and frolic in the flowery meads of rhetoric; he dare not "let himself go," as Chatham or Fox could afford to do.

Where War Cries are Uttered.  
Still more had the growth of plat-

his powerful and penetrating intellect his mordant humor, and literar skill. For the orator's arts he has neither the equipment nor the inclination. In most of the attributes associated with the orator he was wholly wanting, and yet he was one of the most fascinating, and in his latter days one of the most impressive speakers it was possible to listen to. A speaker who was equally deficient in the arts of oratory and ever more indifferent to applause was the Duke of Devonshire.

In regard to Lord Randolph Churchill, his lordship said the tomahawk was always in his hand. It was impossible to describe the gleeful ferocity with which he swept off the scalps of friend and foe. Some of his speeches when attacking Mr. Gladstone and the Liberal Party, scarcely less respectful to persons who they led the Conservative party, contained the grossest errors of taste, and nearly all were marked by a vein of almost burlesque exaggeration. Later, however, he led the House of Commons with unquestioned brilliance.

Mr. Chamberlain was another illustration of great talents equally effective in the Senate and on the platform. For mastery of the arts of debate, clearness, conciseness, humor, invective, ridicule, cogent and relentless reasoning, he was unsurpassed. On the platform his strokes were straight to the mark. It was hard to say whether he was more effective as a demagogue waging fierce war against privilege and monopoly or as a patriot preaching with burning enthusiasm the Gospel of Empire.

Of Lord Rosebery, he said, "What ever subject he touches is raised a once out of the commonplace; it is gilded with happy phrases; it sparkles with effervescence and laughter, and it becomes a part of the intellectual capital of the whole community."

Mr. Balfour, continued Lord Curzon had consciously cultivated a single rhetorical art, and it could only have been by mistake if he ever strayed into a peroration.

Mr. Asquith represented a type of public speaking carried to a higher perfection than by anyone in modern times. Possessed of a copious vocabulary, an extraordinary and effortless command of the right word, a remarkable gift of lucidity and compression, and a resonant voice, he produced an over-powering effect of Parliamentary and forensic strength.

Mr. Bonar Law, the present leader of the Unionist Party, declared Lord Curzon would never have been chosen to succeed Mr. Balfour, but for his power of speech, which had given him a high reputation. Fearless courage and an uncommon faculty for going straight to the heart of things had justified the choice.

Mr. Winston Churchill at times practised the literary style with great ability. On the platform he adopted a double style. The exigencies of modern democracy seemed to require from his favorites a twofold gift—at one time the utterance of the statesman, at another the "patter" of the music hall artist who must tickle the most demoneiac self-control and illimitable "gallery."

Parnell was not eloquent, much less an orator. He hissed out his sentences of concentrated passion and scorn, and gave an impression of almost demonic self-control and illimitable strength. One of the main sources of Mr. John Redmond's success had been a power of speech consistently verging upon eloquence and sometimes tinged with genuine emotion.

The most talented member of the Irish party, with an unsurpassed gift of corrosive humor and almost diabolical irony, was and is Mr. Timothy Healy.

His lordship concluded by discussing masterpieces of eloquence, and said he escaped the task of deciding which was the masterpiece of modern British eloquence by awarding the distinction to Abraham Lincoln's speech at Gettysburg Cemetery on November 19th, 1863.

**Oxford Afraid  
of Rhodes' Men.**

Oxford, Eng., Nov. 18.—A meeting of the Oxford University athletic committee was held to-night to consider the question of Rhodes Scholars competing in the freshmen's sports. Two resolutions were adopted: First, that residence at any time in any other university or similar institution, shall disqualify a student from competing in the Freshmen's sports, and second, that in the Oxford University Athletic Club's sports, as distinct from the college sports, no competitor shall be allowed who is over 21 years of age.

The resolutions will go into effect in October next. They are undoubtedly the outcome of the recent success of the Rhodes Scholars in the Freshmen's sports, held last October. It is pointed out that the new rules will in practice extend to the Queen's Club sports between Oxford and Cambridge, because the winning competitors in the Oxford University sports are chosen to represent Oxford against Cambridge.

The average age of the Rhodes men when they arrive at Oxford is 22 years, and therefore they will be eligible during the first two years of their residence.

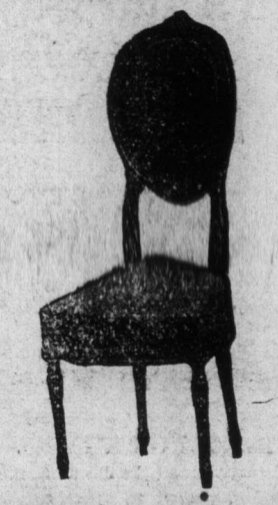
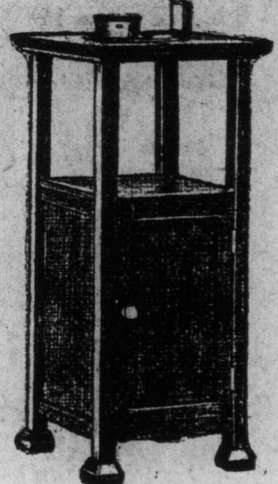
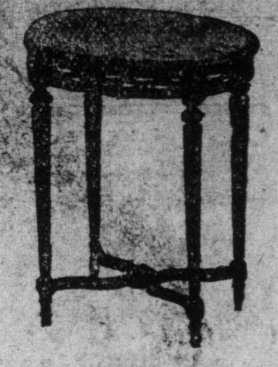

**MEXICO CITY, To-day.**  
First bill introduced in New Mexican Congress was one to ratify the concession to Europeans.

**DURBAN, Natal, To-day.**  
Three East Indians were killed and a score injured to-day during a collision with police at Esperanza in the sugar cane growing district on the South Coast of Natal. The police were obliged to use rifles to quell the outbreak among strikers.

**ES PASO, Texas, To-day.**  
A train bearing fifty wounded and several dead rebels reached Juarez shortly after noon when it returned south and carried nurses and doctors. Americans who returned from the front reported that Federal artillery is doing great damage to the rebels.

**GOSPORT, Eng., To-day.**  
The keel of the Shamrock which is to try to capture the America Cup next year, is to be cast here to-morrow. Lipton, with a few friends will attend the ceremony. Good progress has been made in preparation of the material for the challenger, and after casting her keel the advance in construction will be rapid.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Prince Lobengula, the son of the famous King of Matabele, and who caused the British Government so much trouble in the eighties, died in poverty yesterday in an humble dwelling at Pendleton, near Manchester.

**WASHINGTON, To-day.**  
President Wilson and members of the cabinet discussed the Mexican situation briefly yesterday. An assurance later was given that no change in the attitude of the States toward the Huerta Provisional Government had taken place. The most important of the day's developments from the American standpoint was the departure of President Wilson's special envoy, Lind, on the battleship Rhode Island with Rear Admiral Fletcher for Tampico to investigate the conditions where British oil interests have been regarded as in grave danger. It is sending of Lind is generally regarded here as an indication that the States is extremely desirous to avert any hostile move and that a thorough examination of the situation would be made before any marines from an American warship were landed on Mexican soil. Secretary Bryan stated that Lind had been authorized to visit Tampico and Tuxpan with Admiral Fletcher but that he had been given no special instructions.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Postmaster General Samuels delivered an address to the Political Society of the National Liberal Club on Liberal and Imperial Policy. He declared the old idea that Liberalism had no business to have a policy in relation to the empire has been given the go by Liberals to-day who entertained the view that the freedom of the Dominions was the real strength

of the empire. As to future Liberal Imperial policy, Samuels said, he did not believe the present constitution of the empire could be a final form of the relations of the Mother country to the Dominions, the political organs common to the whole Empire were four, the Monarchy, the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, the Imperial conference and the Committee and Imperial Defense, but none of them had any effective executive power. Any one who knew the Dominions must come to the conclusion that these nations would some time desire to exercise control over high matters which vitally concern them and would not be content merely with the influence of those who exercised that control.

### Spectacular Gun Battle in New York.

New York, Nov. 19.—One of the most spectacular gun battles among gangsters in this city in recent years was fought at the doors of a club house on the lower east side last night. Many men escaped over the roofs carrying their wounded with them. Six revolvers were found in the club house and six more in the street. The men arrested refused to tell the cause of the trouble. It was apparent to the police that those in the club house had expected and prepared for the attack.

### Sleuths Haste After Kidnaped Model.

New York, Nov. 20.—"Come quick, my model has been stolen," said a female voice over the telephone to the Bronx Park Police station late last night.

**Icebergs.**

By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "At Good Old Siquash."

An iceberg is a misplaced competitor of the ice trust. Icebergs grow in the polar regions where they are of no use at all and drift down into the steamer lanes where they are of still less use if possible. An iceberg consists of from nine to forty-seven billion tons of fresh ice, all of which goes to dilute the salt water of the ocean and keep it cool enough to use for bathing purposes at Atlantic City and elsewhere. In the meanwhile the babies of the poor, a few hundred miles away, are dying for want of fresh milk.

Icebergs are formed by glaciers, which slide gently down to the sea in the frigid regions, and in the spring break up at the lower end into vast mountains of ice. Some of these chunks are half a mile long and several hundred feet high. They draw nine times as much in feet as their height, so that there is little chance that an iceberg will ever get into New York harbour and block navigation.

When the iceberg is spawned by the glacier it is seized by the restless ocean current and carried relentlessly seaward. This is exceedingly hard upon the berg. For all its vast size it is delicate of constitution and as the hot summer sun beats upon it, he comes exceedingly passive and dejected. Nothing looks more enduring and substantial than a vast iceberg. But the tourist who engaged passage upon one of these leviathans in Baffin's Bay would discover to his horror upon reaching the gulf stream that he was without visible means of support.

All summer long the icebergs swarm down the northern ocean, melting industriously and cooling the atmosphere for miles around in spots where it is cool enough already for all practical purposes. Formerly these bergs were treated with quiet contempt by steamship crews, but of late they have been given every consideration and are allowed to roam the ocean in peace. Until governments employ vessels, however, to round up the wandering bergs and hang red and green lights upon them, no one else will feel very comfortable in their vicinity.

Science is gradually rolling up its shirt sleeves and attacking the great problems of the day, but it has remained silent and indifferent regarding the iceberg. In the iceberg fleets of the spring, vast national resources are going to waste. Let us look forward eagerly to the day when young and inexperienced icebergs will be harpooned by daring ice men and sawed into 100-pound blocks for the preservation of human comfort on shore.

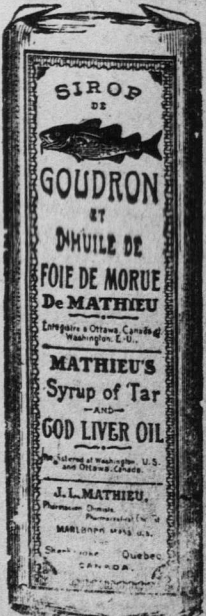

**Labor Men Demand Asiatic Exclusion.**

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 19.—Committee reports were in order when the American Federation of Labor met to-day.

The resolution of President Berry, of the pressmen, urging the formation of a labor party, may be reported at any time, and is certain to precipitate a long debate.

With only five dissenting votes the Congress adopted resolutions demanding the exclusion of all Asiatics and a literacy test for Caucasians.

In a two hours' debate on the resolutions, most of the leading men of the Federation spoke, making clear that they opposed the immigration only of those Europeans who would be the prey of exploiters, and whose coming would tend to lower the American standard of living.

Fiercy speeches were made yesterday, attacking the Michigan Copper Mine owners, whose employees are on strike.

**New Organ**

For Halifax School of the Blind.

(Extract from Halifax Daily Mail.) Halifax is to be congratulated on the splendid pipe organ that now is available outside of the Churches, and Dr. C. F. Frazer and the school for the blind are to be doubly felicitated on its installation.

The organ was opened last night by a brilliant organist—Dr. Minor C. Baldwin, of New York. It is a magnificent instrument, a credit to its builders and a means of delight to music lovers. The organ occupies the place at the rear of the platform in the assembly hall and in appearance it is dignified and imposing.

This was Dr. Baldwin's second performance in Halifax. It was he who opened the organ in St. Andrew's Church two or three years ago, and now he gives to music lovers another rich treat. He played with a master touch and his work abounded in color and bold and delicate effects. Dr. Baldwin's style is appealing and he is full of the spirit of harmony. On things specially noteworthy about his playing is its perfect freedom. The organ became, as it were, a part of himself, and he riveted attention with the concord of sweet sounds that it produced.

Dr. Baldwin was given several encores, in fact these were the rule and not the exception. After the Beethoven andante, Dr. Baldwin's response to the encore was a fine rendering of the old song, now being revived, "Silvery Threads Among the Gold."

**Scotland After Burns' Mss.**

New York, November 20.—A London cable to the Tribune says:—

Just now the liveliest interest is being taken by the admirers of Robert Burns in the fate of the Glenrider manuscripts and letters formerly in possession of the Liverpool Athenaeum. Headed by the Lord Provost of Glasgow, many Scottish citizens recently combined for the purpose of purchasing and securing relics for Scotland, in spite of the fact that they are now in America.

Some months ago the trustees of the Liverpool Athenaeum sent them to Setchby's for sale by private negotiation. Joseph Hornstein, a well-known book collector, paid Setchby's a satisfactory sum, and in due course they dispatched the relics to his agent in New York, having in his mind a particular client interested in the famous Burns Manuscripts.

On being approached by the Lord Provost of Glasgow, however, Mr. Hornstein called his agent to withdraw the offer of the manuscripts and when he found the situation rendered all the more difficult from the fact the agent had sent an emissary with the relics to find the client away from New York—in fact, in the far west—he sent out a special representative from England. In the meantime the New York agent had despatched a man in pursuit of the precious relics.

Seen yesterday, Mr. Hornstein expressed hopefulness of ultimate success in the chase. At the same time he pointed out that as his client was on a wandering expedition the tracks of pursuers and pursued would be bewildering, and that even weeks might elapse before definite tidings could reach him.

**Clean Up the Civil Service.**

Editor The Evening Telegram.  
 Dear Sir.—Please find space in your valuable paper for the following:—

Now the elections are over and the People's Party has again been returned to power, we should turn our attention to the affairs of the country in general and ask our representatives to try to bring about better conditions, especially from an economical point of view. The general opinion here is, that for a starter, there should be something done towards reducing our civil service. It is a well known fact that we have too many public officials, many of whom presumptuous upstarts, who, when they get a job in the Government, imagine they own the universe, and instead of being a public servant, constitute themselves their master. It is a case of swelled head and two or three inches extra chest measurement with some of them, and it never was more in evidence than when the election returns were coming in this fall in some parts of this district. Since the present Government was returned to power in 1909 the civil service has been increased out of all proportion to the increase of either trade or population. Take Belleoram, for instance. Previous to 1909 one man, the present Sub-Collector, Mr. F. Curnew, who is a very capable and very popular man did the work of all the bay east. Since then a Tidewater has been appointed at Belleoram with a large salary to do the work which was being done by an old fisherman for about thirty dollars yearly. Not only does an old fisherman lose his thirty dollars but a young able-bodied man gets almost twenty times as much, all of which comes out of the very fishermen whom they put out of the job. Conditions are even worse in St. Jacques than Belleoram. There are three men drawing yearly salaries at this place, and I understand two or three more emergency men who I presume are employed when a big shipment arrives, or on the arrival of a large number of vessels from foreign ports. This is the state of affairs all over the country, paying out large salaries to able-bodied loafers instead of increasing the old age pension fund. Another thing I wish to mention is the way coals and provisions are sold in this bay. A little while ago a vessel began selling produce in Belleoram with a measure that some of the purchasers claim did not have the right weight by 20 lbs. on a barrel of potatoes and 50 lbs. on turnips. This is a ridiculous thing to happen right under the eyes of an Inspector who is drawing a salary to look after those things and to whom I understand a complaint was made about the same thing. This condition of affairs will not be tolerated much longer, and if that Inspector at Belleoram will not do his duty he must give up the job to someone who will.

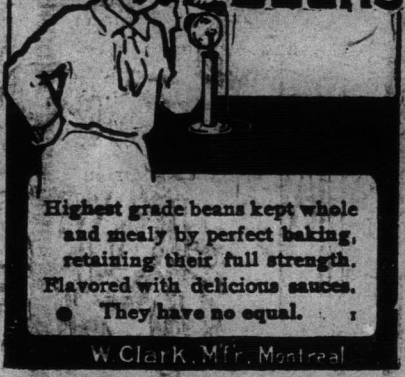

**BUC, France, Nov. 25.**  
 Edmond Parrovo, one of the best known aviators of France, was killed to-day.

**OTTAWA, Nov. 25.**

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.**

 Premier Asquith received a deputation to-day, which proposed measures such as increased pay and certain privileges to attract men to the territorial forces, which are 32,000 short. Viscount Haldane, speaking in London, in the evening, complained that young men were more attracted by football and golf, and latterly by the 'Tanjo' rather than by service in the forces of Defence.

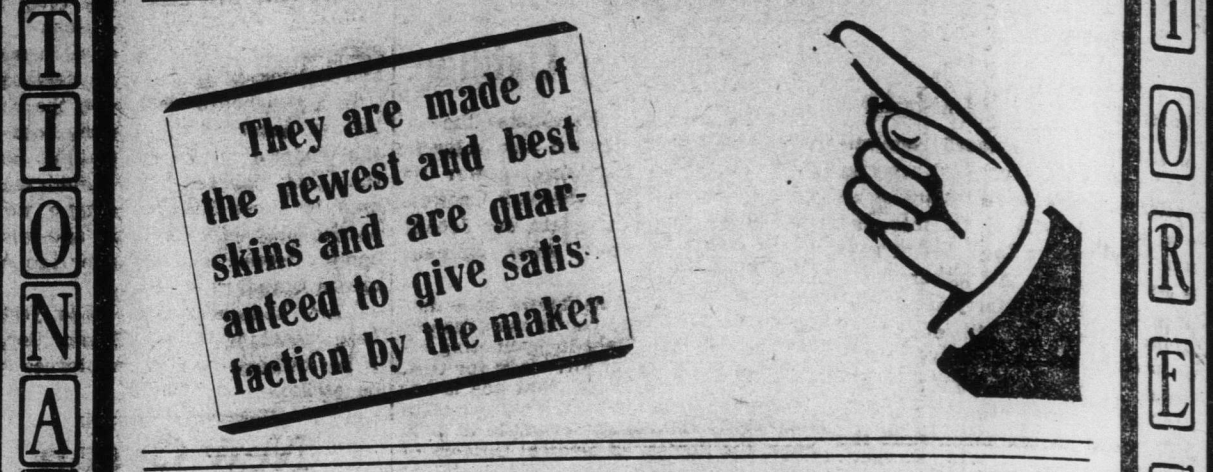
**PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.**

**SIMIA, Nov. 25.**

The Indian Government cabled twice during the last few days impressing upon Lord Crewe the need of an impartial investigation into the charges of ill-treatment in the mines, urging that the Hindoos be represented in direct negotiations between the Government of India and South Africa. Governor General Gladstone and Viceroy Hardinge have already exchanged cable messages on the subject.

**LONDON, Nov. 25.**  
 General Botha, in a speech upon the Indian situation at Natal, last night, made it clear that South African autonomy was to be respected, as much as that of Canada, Australia or New Zealand. Interference by His Majesty's Indian Viceroy in a matter which was obviously a domestic one, would not be tolerated. The South African Government, he claimed, had every right to deal with the present situation in its own way. He uttered a serious warning about the possible mischief that might arise from criticism in the British press, of the treatment of Indian coolies. He said that if any genuine case of cruelty was brought to notice, the Government was ready to make thorough investigation. So far, there was nothing to support the allegations made.

**The Work of the Storm.**

The advent of yesterday's snow storm, which was entirely unexpected was a material set back to business generally. Early yesterday morning the snow began to fall with a stiff easterly breeze raging. Towards evening the wind increased in violence and a regular hurricane and blizzard swept the city. People living in houses in bleak sections of the city felt the storm severely. On the higher levels the gale was terrific and householders had to remain in doors owing to the blinding snowstorm. At ten hour there was plenty of snow on the streets and in places to a depth of several feet. At 7 o'clock the elements subsided, but only for a short period as an hour later the gale came on with increased velocity.

In consequence of the storm all telegraph lines were interrupted and no messages could be received or sent to any of the coastal steamers around the coast, while the street railway in the city was completely thrown out of kilter. Very little business was done by the commercial houses on Water Street, while labour along the waterfront, from the Furness Withy Line pier to the Dry Dock, had to be suspended. The steamers Mongolian and Nascopie, the barq. Novelty and a couple of other vessels that were on this coast in the teeth of last night's storm must have had a hard time of it. Last night there was a very heavy undertow in the harbour and many crafts that were in the stream with fish cargoes awaiting to be discharged ran quickly to comfortable places of refuge. Although nothing definite in the way of damage done as the result of the storm will be known for a few days, yet it is the earnest hope of every one that no sea tragedies have occurred.

This morning some of the farmers and milk vendors that came to the city reported that they never witnessed the like of last night's gale as it raged countrywards nor do they want to see it repeated. Along the country roads the snow was very deep and sleighs and sleds were very much inconvenienced.

**Mr. Adams Scarlet Gown.**

Boston, Mass., Nov. 19.—The brilliant scarlet gown that Charles Francis Adams wore during the ceremony in which Oxford University conferred upon him the degree of doctor of letters, was held up by the customs officials, because they could not decide what it was made of.

So peculiar was the weave and texture of the material that the inspector had to send for a cloth expert before they were convinced it was not of excessive value.

Mr. Adams has been three months in London collecting historical data.

**First to Hear Tablet's Tale**

Dr. J. A. Craig Translates Message of Babylonian Brick 4500 Years Old.

Reaching back into the dim centuries that preceded the birth of Abraham, into the mighty cradle of early civilization, and reviving by inductive logic and scholarship the dead bones of Nineveh and Babylon, Dr. J. A. Craig brought his lecture to a close, when before the McGill Oriental Society last evening, he translated for the first time in public a brick tablet record which comes from the city where Abraham was born, but 600 years prior to his generation.

Dr. Craig graduated from McGill in 1880. He received the degree of B.D. at Yale and Ph.D. at Leipzig, Germany, where he spent five years studying Assyrian and cognate languages. To-day one of the foremost Orientalists and Assyriologists on this continent, and with an enviable European reputation, Dr. Craig, after being head of the Semitic department in the University of Michigan for 19 years, finds himself back in his native land. He retired a year ago.

His address last night confined itself entirely to the history of how after many attempts, the key to Persia, Susiana, Babylon and Nineveh records was found in the translation by an inductive process of reasoning of the cuneiform writings. In this discovery Grotfeld and Rawlinson, the one a German scholar and the other a British cavalry officer, and also a scholar, shared honors equally. The heroic note in scholarly investigation, one which is rarely sounded in this country, was caught in the lecturer's simple tale of the money Rawlinson spent and of the weeks he passed, holding on a ladder at peril of his life, in order that he might make exact copies of the great inscriptions of Darius and blazon forth to the world the records of the glories of Babylon and of the dynasties that overawed the peoples of the Euphrates valley hundreds of years before Christ.

The lecturer has with him a cuneiform tablet, one of his own possessions, and the translation of which he made to his fascinated audience, following out the method adopted by Grotfeld and Rawlinson, and which had been proved by the checking up of the proper names found in the Bible and Semitic records.

The tablet, a small piece of baked brick, bears, it was found, a stock inventory telling of the cattle which had been sent to a temple during the first year of the reign of Bur Sin, known to Babylon as the King of Ur (Abraham's birthplace), about 2500 B.C., six hundred years before Abraham was born. As this tablet was translated just recently by Dr. Craig, the Oriental Society of McGill, was the first large body to hear the translation of a record dead for 4500 years.

Dr. Rose, professor of Latin, moved the vote of thanks and Prof. A. R. Gordon, of the Presbyterian College, seconded. He was frank also in saying that it was a source of surprise to many that McGill had no money with which to fund a chair of Assyriology and that while the States, and every country in Europe were represented in active work of exploration, Canada was idle. Professor Gordon paid an eloquent tribute to Dr. Craig, as the friend of and co-worker of the great Orientalists of to-day.—Montreal Star, Nov. 19.

Many of these women earn only \$1.50 a week and there were thousands of women and girls who were suffering actual hunger, want and destitution, although working every available hour the full year round.

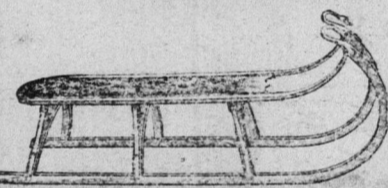
