





Berlin, June 22.-Two officers of the German Navy on the active list, Rear-Admiral Witschel and Rear-Admiral Stiege, have now added their voices to those of the many naval experts in this country who condemn the theories of Sir Percy Scott. Much of their argument has been already covered in your correspondence and leading articles. Both officers lay stress on the slowness of the submarine belew water, and its dependence upon aircraft and ships which float upon the surface.

Admiral Stiege says that the "deadliness" of the submarine has never been practically demonstrated, and that the conclusions for its efficiency in "the real thing" should not be drawn from its achievements in peace time. He recalls the enthusiasm over the torpedo-boat in the middle of the cighties. It was such that battleship building in Germany was temporarily "paralysed," and there was an interruption in battleship building in France which has not yet been made good. Much was hoped from the torpedo, and the disappointment came in the Russo-Japanese War. Admiral Stiege adds that Sir Percy Scott is without any war experience of the submarine. He believes that the last word has not yet been spoken as regards the method of repelling it, and that battleships are not nearly so vulnerable to torpedo attack as they used to be. He concludes:-"The great majority of experts-that much is clearly established-have not been persuaded by the achievemnts of the submarine in time of peace that

naval warfare upon the surface of the sea is bankrupt, and there the matter will have to remain for a long time to come. The struggle for the mastery at sea, cruiser warfare, and commercial warfare will be carried on by the old method. Despite the revolutions caused by submarines and aircraft in the management and con struction of naval weapons, the battleship remains, for a period still incalculable, the chief and indispensable factor in warfare on the ocean and in warfare in home waters."





It is not venturing into controversial politics to state that the question as to whether Ireland shall or shall not have Home Rule, after being current for forty years, is now about to be settled. Intense feeling has been aroused between the two great sections of the Irish population. The Nationalist and Catholic portion of the country desire Home Rule for Ireland keenly. The Protestant and Unionist section allocated in the province of Ulster dislikes it equally intensely. The Irish Home Rule Bill is now on the verge of becoming law but with a view to settling the local



Palace. A noteworthy item with regard to this is that this will be a meeting for the first time between the Irish Nationalist leaders and the English monarch. It has been the lifelong practice of Mr. Redmond and his colleagues pending the granting of Home Rule to Ireland, to abstain from taking part in any of those functions at which members of Parliament are thrown into contact with royalty. That policy has been completely preserved since the first Home Rule Bill and before it, and if it is broken now it is only because the King's command left the Irish leaders no alternative. Another point which receives special comment from close observers of politics is the fact that the conference is to be held at Buckingham Palace. The natural seem to be St. James's Palace. The difference may not seem an impor-tant one, but it would, for one thing, have underlined the formality of the relationship of the King to the conerence and doubtless have minimized the opportunities for comment had it been removed from the domestic precincts of royalty. The Peace Conference of the Balkan Powers about two years ago at St. James's Palace is a precedent of a sort for conference there, but the convening of a conference by the King of the leaders of

With a view, however, to minimize inconvenience to the public, His Britannic Majesty's Government will, ungrace, permit the transmission of such telegrams and radio-telegrams in plain language as foreign Governments or the public choose to send, provided that such telegrams and radio-telegrams are written in English or French, and on the understanding that they are accepted at the sender's risk and subject to censor ship by the British authorities: that is, that they may be stopped, delayed spects at the discretion of)those spect of them, whether for the reimbursement of the sums paid for transmission or otherwise, will be considered by His Majesty's Government in any circumstances whatever. It is, moreover, essential that such telebear the sender's name at the end of the text, otherwise they are liable to be stopped until the name is notified by paid telegram. Registered abbreviated addresses will not be accepted, either as addresses or as the names of senders.

Note:-The term "telegram" is applied to radio-telegraph messages sent from shore to shore, as well as to those sent by cable or land line.
