LONDON, Feb. 25. The village of Petit Miramont, south of the Ancre in France, has been entered by British troops as the result of an advance southeast of Miraumont, says the official from the War Office to-night. The British line south-south-east of Serre, north of the Ancre, was also pushed forward on a front of over a mile and a half. The official reads: As a result of the unceasing pressure of our troops, the enemy to-day vacated further important positions on both banks of the Ancre. We made considerable progress south and southeast of Miraumont, on a front of a mile, and entered the village of Petit Miraumont. We also advanced our lines on a front of over one and a half miles south and southeast of Serres. During the night the enemy rushed one of our posts west of Lens. We recovered the post by immediate counterattack. There has been considerable mutual artillery activity at intervals during the day and night on both Arras, and south of Ypres.



Great British Victory! MASSATTA

Germans Make Greatest Relirement on West Front for the Past Two Years --- Bapaume Threatened.

FROM BRITISH FRONT IN FRANCE, To-Day. On one portion of the British front at least the war to-day became a war of movement. Under cover of fog and mist, which has been particularly heavy in the past 48 hours, the Germans carried out the greatest retirement they have made on the Western front in the last two years, and the British have swept into possession of Pys, Serre, Miraumont and Petit Miraumont, including the famous Butte de Warlencourt, which has been the scene of the fiercest fighting of the war, and in places is deep with the bones of dead men. The exact extent of the German retirement is not known to-night, but it is estimated that it approaches a depth of 3 miles at some points. British patrols are out in all The Old 'Wooden Fleet' directions harrassing the Germans and keeping in touch with their movements. Until they report it will not be possible to say just where the Germans have determined to fix their next lines of resistance. Nevertheless it can be stated that the British now are, or soon will be, in a position possibly to force the evacuation of Bapaume, which has been the key to the German position since the beginning of the battle of the Somme. Points which already have fallen into the British hands have stood out in the history of the fighting on this front.





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
