THE JAPANESE SAILORS.  
The five or six hundred men from  
the Japanese warships, smart and  
trim, with very ornate capbands, who  
have been driving about London this  
last week waving Union Jacks and  
Japanese flags, have thoroughly en-  
joyed their sightseeing. One found  
them in the evenings crowding the  
shops about Paddington (the termin-  
us of the Great Western Railway)  
buying views and postcards of Lon-  
don, and puzzling over the Bairns-  
father books. These were men from  
ships which escorted that wonderful  
convoy of forty Australasian troop-  
ships to Egypt at the beginning of the  
war, and who for years have been on  
duty in the Mediterranean. Some  
were survivors from torpedoed de-  
stroyers. One of their countrymen  
told me they were immensely im-  
pressed by London. St. Paul's Cathed-  
ral, which they entered, amazed  
them by its size, and they thought the  
Tower of London very wonderful.  
They were much interested in the ar-  
mour, which they compared with  
their own fine work, and the jewels  
and crown delighted them, but at  
seems they were rather shocked by  
the site of Royal executions. "There  
is nothing in our history of that  
kind." What pleased them most of  
all was the Nelson Monument. "Of  
course, they liked that best," said my  
informant. "Isn't Nelson the god of  
the Navy?"

DIAMOND CUTTING AND THE  
DUTCH.  
I learn from a conversation with  
an authority on the subject who has  
just arrived in London from Amster-  
dam that both in that city and in the  
Netherlands generally there is a feel-  
ing of considerable alarm as to the  
progress which is being made in the  
United Kingdom in the diamond cut-  
ting and setting industry. That that  
industry in Holland should have de-  
clined almost to zero during the war  
was to be looked for, but arrange-  
ments are now apparently to be made  
by some of the leading Dutch houses  
to establish themselves in England  
for the purpose of recovering their  
trade not only in connection with di-  
amonds, but cheap jewelry. As to the  
former, it may be recalled that a de-  
cline of diamond cutting was done during  
the later period of the war by invali-  
dated soldiers at Brighton, who took  
to the novel calling with remarkable  
acuteness; and the fruits of this very  
interesting industrial experiment are  
not at all likely to be allowed to be  
lost.

ERMETE NOVELLI.  
The death is reported of Ermete  
Novelli, the last descendant of that  
great line of Italian actors which in-  
cluded Ristori, Rossi, and Salvini  
(Duse, although still alive, has not  
acted for a long time now). But  
Novelli had a specialty in that he was  
as great a comic actor as he was a  
tragedian. I do not know whether  
he ever acted comedy, but any one  
who saw him will agree that it is not  
easy to imagine him in a comic part.  
All he did and said had some of the  
dignity of tragedy. Novelli, on the  
other hand, seemed to have no diffi-  
culty whatever in passing from one  
genre to another. In the same week  
he would play Shylock, Hamlet, a  
couple of wretched French farces,  
Ferrari's play on Goldoni, an Italian  
classic (Alfieri or Cosca), and per-  
haps a pochade for a Sunday matinee.  
There is only one great actor left in  
Italy now—Ermete Zaccanti, who in-  
troduced Deen into Italy.

Memorial Tablet.

His Ideal.

In a notable speech at Arichat,  
Nova Scotia, in 1901, Sir Wilfrid  
Laurier said:  
"When visiting England at the  
Queen's Jubilee, I had the privilege of  
visiting one of those marvels of Gothic  
architecture which the hand of  
genius, guided by an unerring faith,  
has made a harmonious whole, in  
which granite, marble, oak, and other  
materials were blended. This Cathed-  
ral is the image of the nation which  
I hope to see Canada become. As  
long as I have the power to labor in  
the service of the country, I shall re-  
pel the idea that the different ele-  
ments of the nation must be changed.  
I am willing that the marble shall  
remain the marble, that the granite  
shall remain the granite, that the oak  
shall remain the oak; I am willing for  
the sturdy Scotchman to remain the  
Scotchman, for the brainy Eng-  
lishman to remain the Englishman,  
for the warm-hearted Irishman to re-  
main the Irishman. I want to take  
all these elements and build a nation  
that will be among the foremost great  
Powers of the world."

HUGE DRAPERY PROFITS.

Those who are complaining of the  
high price of feminine clothes will be  
interested in the results of the past  
year's trading of the wholesale drap-  
ery houses. The reports so far is-  
sued provide an excellent indication  
of the exceedingly prosperous time  
which the wholesalers have enjoyed  
during the war. In one case profits  
are nearly twelve times those of 1913.  
In another they must have been  
about \$1,375,000 higher before the ex-  
cess profits duty was deducted. One  
company which made a profit of \$126,  
460 in 1913, now reports one of \$282,  
505, and that after allowing for ex-  
cess profits. A Manchester firm an-  
nounces a net profit which, in five  
years, has more than quadrupled, the  
exact figures being \$91,555 and \$383,  
460, this latter amount also after mak-  
ing provision for the Exchequer's 80  
per cent. A London house has con-  
verted a loss of \$32,030 five years ago  
into a profit of \$243,375.

### Her Lecture Voice.

By RUTH CAMERON.



There is one interesting thing which the war has done to women. Which does not mean to say only one. I suppose books might be written on the various ways in which the war has entered into and changed the lives of the women of every other country in the world.

But it means to say that one small but interesting effect has drawn my attention recently. I refer to the acquisition of the speechmaking habit by woman who, before the war, never made a speech in her life.

Just as Our Telephone Voices Are Different.

I fell to talking the other day with a chance acquaintance on a railway train. Via the war, the talk drifted to politics and to the need of cleaner city government, and all of a sudden her voice changed and I became conscious that I was no longer a chance acquaintance, but had become an audience. You have heard the way the voice of some member of your family will totally change, how much sweeter, more carefully pitched and more impressive it will become when, in the middle of a conversation, she is called to the telephone. If you hadn't heard her telephone voice before, you would scarcely believe it was the same voice that had just been raised in family controversy. Well, the change striking, though of a somewhat different nature. It took on an impersonal note, an audience note. Moreover, the words she used were different and the note of her discourse, instead of being conversational, became instructive and inspirational. In fact, I realized at once that I was being addressed instead of talked to.

How the War Dragged Women Forth. Something which she let drop in her conversation gave me a chance to place this woman, and on meeting someone from her home town afterwards I inquired about her and found that just what I suspected was true. She belonged to a fine old family whose women before the war had been mostly of the homekeeping type, but when the war came she had immediately become engaged in activities of

one sort or another. The town had been organized for war work, the Red Cross local chapter had to be enlarged, meetings had to be held for this purpose and that. She soon learned to get up on the platform and speak, and in the natural course of events she had become a perfectly self-possessed public speaker.

I just wonder how many women that one stands for. Hundreds of thousands I fancy. And I wonder what they will do with their public voices. Will they keep them for discussions of politics? Or will they go on using them on the platform, or will they gradually lose them? Who can tell?

### Own Your Own Home.

The "Own Your Own Home" movement which is already active in Winnipeg, has received Government sanction in the United States. One branch of the new Division of Public Works and Construction Development of the United States Department of Labor is known as the "Own Your Own Home Section," and a movement has been started to enable building and loan associations in the United States to provide capital for housing at low rates of interest. The Department of Labor announces that information which it has obtained indicates that there is a national shortage of more than half a million houses. The statement adds: "The Department believes nothing more helpful to the general situation could be done than at once to resume building. The homes are needed; it is very doubtful if labor or material conditions and prices will improve for several years. Building being a basic industry, if accelerated, will add impetus to general business throughout the country."

### When Whales Had Feet.

Prof. D'Arcy Thompson concluded his series of lectures on fishes of the sea at the Royal Institution, London, recently, when he spoke of whales. He said that the whale had originally four feet or fins, but that the two hinder ones had dwindled away, and had become merely vestiges, as were the buttons on the sleeves and back of a man's morning coat. Those buttons were at one time used for fastening up the long cuffs and the wide skirts of the period, and, though these had now been abolished, the buttons still remained. So it was with the hinder

### McCrae of Canada

One of the Men Who Helped to Win the War.

Canada has few sons of whom she has more reason to be proud than General A. D. McCrae.

Few men even in the West have crowded more adventure and work into a comparatively short life than this versatile general, who first opened his eyes on the world in Glencoe, Ontario, forty-three years ago. At nineteen he left his humble home to seek fortune in Duluth, and acquitted himself so well that, while still in the twenties, he had built up one of the biggest insurance businesses in the West, and had established a group of rural banks.

Nothing could stop him now. One adventure followed another, and each was a brilliant success. He did more than any other half-dozen men to plant settlers in the West; he became the head of big industrial enterprises from lumbering to whalefishing, until while still in the thirties, he was one of the richest men in Canada. When the war came and the Canadian Government needed horses, the task was committed to McCrae, and he did it so well that he was next entrusted with the organizing of supply and transport, saving millions of pounds by checking waste.

He established the famous Canadian ration system, and introduced reforms and economies, until the Canadian army was the best and most economically fed army in Europe.

On his appointment as Quartermaster-General in 1916, he did still more brilliant and useful work on a large scale, notably by the clever disposal of surplus and obsolete stores at many times the price they would have fetched now.

He was a marked man; and when a business organizer was wanted for the Information Ministry, there was no difficulty in the selection. McCrae was the one man for the post, and he got it.

In appearance General McCrae is tall, well-built and soldierly, with a strong, clean-shaven face, keen eyes and a resolute mouth and chin. He looks what he is—a man of clever head and iron will, who always knows what to do and how to do it, and sees that it is done. Such a man cannot fail to go far; and those who know McCrae best predict for him much bigger things than he has accomplished so far.—Pearson's Weekly.

### The Canning of Lobsters.

The canning of lobsters on the American continent is an industry now almost one hundred years old. Unfortunately, but few records have been kept or collected regarding its earlier years. It did not appear then to be considered as of commercial importance, and yet the business proposed along the coasts of Maine and Massachusetts for many years, and attention began to be directed to the supplies of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, where they were considered to be inexhaustible.

### Starting in Cold Weather

On cold, winter days, and with the heavy gasoline now used, it is sometimes difficult to start the engine. If there is illuminating gas in the garage a quick and easy start can be made by slipping a rubber tube onto the gas jet and putting the other end into the air intake of the carburetor. The gasoline should not be turned on, nor the carburetor flooded, before the engine has warmed up.

### Pellets and Pills.

London, Feb. 10.—Pellets and pills of concentrated whisky or beer, may be made, if the dreams of certain English chemists are realized. Such a pellet dropped into a glass of "near beer" or any such salubrious concoction would add a decided "kick" to it. That there has been no need for such pills has delayed ingenuity in this direction, but it is expected prohibition will insure and accelerate a palliative invention. In the meantime American distillers and other concerns are trying to find a market here for their surplus alcohol.

### When the Bicycle Becomes an Ice-Boat.

Why leave the bicycle idle in the cellar during the winter months? When the roads are covered with snow, the bicycle can be turned into a temporary ice-boat and used on frozen ponds and rivers. At least that is what occurred to a Brooklynite, and he set to work to prove his assertions.

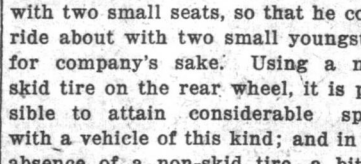
The bicycle can be readily converted into a serviceable ice-boat by removing the front wheel and using in its place some form of a frame resting on a pair of skates. In this case the Brooklynite arranged the frame with two small seats, so that he could ride about with two small youngsters for company's sake. Using a non-skid tire on the rear wheel, it is possible to attain considerable speed with a vehicle of this kind; and in the absence of a non-skid tire, a bit of adhesive tape at regular intervals along the tire serves the purpose of better traction.

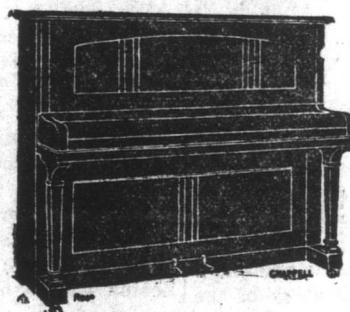

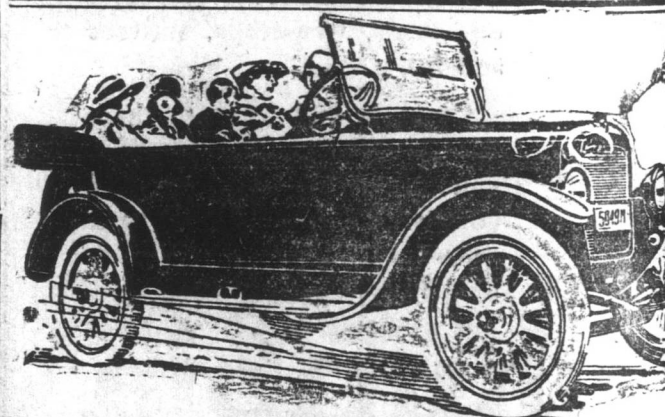
