

#### Charles Kingsley, Clerical Novelist.

The roof of was born at Holne Vicarage, Dartmoor, the station was damaged. Farther east there were terrible scenes in the names, an hereditary country gentleman, having been forced through the Poplar district. A bomb fell on a carelessness of his guardians, to follow some profession, and chosen the children. It penetrated the roof, and clerical one. This son composed and wrote prose and poems from four through the top storey door into the years of age, and after studying at various schools, became an undergraduate at Magdalene College, Cambridge, in 1838, and a scholar of it next year. In 1842 he was ordained curate of Eversley, in Hampshire, and two years later was appointed its vicar, as the parishioners anxiously desired. When crossing its heathercovered common, for visiting them, he sometimes stuck his tobacco pipe into one of the bushes till he should pass again, and a stranger was going to take it out, but his companion forbade him, saving, "That is our parson's," His "Yeast." "Alton Lock." and "Westward Ho!" belong to the highest class of novels, but his thirty-six published works include ten volumes of sermons. and others on scientific and practical subjects. Honours were bestowed upon him, for in 1848 he was appointed Professor of English Literature in Queen's College, just then founded in London, and in 1859 Queen Victoria appointed him one of her chaplain in ordinary, and next year Regius Professor of Modern History at Cam-

bridge, whose salary has since risen rom £371 to £800 a year. In 1869 he was appointed a Residentiary Canon of Chester, with £500 a year, and in 1873 was promoted to one at Westminster Abbey with £1,000 a year. He died at Eversley on January 23, 1875, and his burial there was attended by a great concourse of friends, including distinguished political and military men, besides villagers and huntsmen, whose horses and hounds waited for them in the churchyard. By his wife, who survived him, he left two sons and two daughters.





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#### Legislative Council.

The House met at 4 p.m. An Act to authorize the Montrea Trust Co. to do business in the Colony, and an Act respecting Posta and Telegraph Services passed the third reading.

An Act respecting Certificates of Masters and Mates passed the Com-

mittee stage. The Exportation of Salt Codfish Bill occupied the attention of the House for the rest of the evening, Hons. D. A. Ryan, Sir P. T. McGrath and R. K. Bishop taking part in the debate. Hon. Geo. Shea in submitting the Bill for consideration of committee, said it was part and parcel of the legislation of the Government's regulations respecting our staple industry, which were necessarily of an experimental character. Hon. Mr. Grieve opposed the bill which he thought was calculated to do immense harm to exporters, and cause damages which will react on the whole industry of the colony. The principal points in his speech were that the establishment of arbitrary prices have been the cause of severe monetary losses to the trade. The restrictions, while not wholly responsible, helped considerably to bring us to the conditions in which we find ourselves to-day. He pointed out to the House that already the law had been evaded and fish was sold at 98 while the control price was 102 6 and that the Advisory Board was cognizant of the fact, but had taken no ac tion. Continuing he quoted a west ern outport shipper who was offered 76 - less 1% at Oporto but the Board refused permission to sell under the regulation price which was 84 -. The

fish was later sold at an enormous loss, "I state," said the Hon. men ber, "that if this bill passes nothing short of a miracle will realize \$12 for shore and \$10 for Labrador fish this fall. Competition is necessary in order to maintain prices. An immense quantity of old fish still unsold will overlap the new and the disaster in in the fall of the year will be such that it will sweep away the strongest Government. I am not a poli tician, but if I were in the Opposition I would say let the regulations go through. I view the Bill as a great political blunder, and a greater

commercial blunder." Hon. R. K. Bishop, in replying, said he thought there were many safeguards in the Bill. The shipping of fish on consignment might have entailed very heavy losses on Hon. Mr. Grieve, and as to the Western outport man he may have sustained losses or a cargo which he thought he had sold. Such losses are often met during the course of negotiations. He did not, however, think there were any hope of obtaining \$10 per quintal for Labrador fish this fall or \$12 for Shore. It was a serious mistake on the part of the Minister to send the fishermen away with these prices in



#### Sugar Jobbing.

(From the Toronto Globe.) The story of two cars of sugar as unfolded before the Board of Com merce at Ottawa recently is one of misdirected enterprise at the expense of the consumers.

The lot was sold by the refiners at \$19.98 per hundredweight to Montreal buyer, who had no desire to consume it himself. He turned it over to dealers at Magog, Que. High Class Residence and and they disposed of it to a Mon Grounds on Waterford trealer, who had, like themselves only a speculative interest in sugar The Montrealer No. 2 resold it to an Ottawa wholesale firm, who charge some retail grocers 27 cents a pound The retailers sold it to consumers a 30 cents a pound. Thus the sugar passed through five stages between the factory and the home, the price rising with each change of hands Whether in following these transac tions the two cars took a side-trip from Montreal to Magog, or remained in Montreal until their final destitution was decided by the energetic middleman, the despatches do not say The Acting Chairman of the Board of Commerce used somewhat vigorous language in characterizing this roundabout way of doing business. He announced that the scope of the inquiry would be widened. The public has a right to know whether this case is exceptional, or whether it is a usual or frequent practise to erect five tollgates between the producer and the ultimate consumer. Apparently there is a field of usefulness for the Board of Commerce, despite the attacks upon it from many quarters. #### Yorkshire and Surrey

WIN IN CRICKET SERIES.

London, June 4.-Yorkshire completely outplayed Gloucestershire Tuesday, winning by an innings and 55 runs. The scores were: Yorkshire, 229; Gloucestshire, 60 and 114. For the winners, Waddington took nine wickets for 80 runs.

A high average of run getting marked the Essex-Surrey match, the totals being: Essex., 248 and 238: Surrey, 333 and 156 for six wickets. Surrey won by four wickets. Rev Gillingham, a London clergyman made 95 for Essex.

In the Notts-Middlesex match rain prevented play for one whole day, but the match was finished when Notts scored 213 and 144 for seven wickets and declared. Middlesex scored 98 and 109, and Notts won by 151.

Rain caused much delay also in the Kent-Leicestershire, Lancashire-Sussex, and Northamptonshire-Warwickshire matches. 


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
