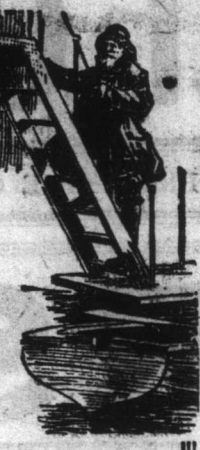

Polish Troops Win Victory

Bolsheviks Routed Along Beresina River--Four Neurotic Passengers Suicide -- Startling Statement of Missionary Secretary-- Methodist Conference Endorse League of Nations -- Sir Thomas Lipton at New York.

POLISH VICTORY.
WARSAW, June 11. The great battle along the River Beresina, which began on May 14th, was crowned with great success for the Poles, according to the Polish official communique to-day. The Bolsheviks, says the statement, had concentrated nine divisions of infantry in this section and threatened to take the initiative, throwing all their forces in the attack. Bitter fighting resulted, various positions changing hands frequently. The enemy, however, was definitely defeated on June 8th, the communique states, and next day the Poles attacked and drove the bulk of the hostile forces beyond the Beresina, taking six hundred prisoners and capturing numerous machine guns. In Goral region, at the junction of the Beresina and Dniester, Polish detachments made a daring dash and destroyed fifty boats. The Bolsheviks had prepared for crossing the river. North of Kiev, adds the statement, Soviet forces are developing serious activities in the vicinity of Tchernobil, near the junction of the Propet and Dniester.

prisoners under a United States army guard, and 250 women and children. She is heading for Norfolk and is due there to-morrow. The Czecho-Slovak legation here has appealed to the American Red Cross for aid when the ship arrives. The Legation later explained that the long and monotonous voyage from Vladivostok had greatly lowered the morals of the returning troops and that the Red Cross, Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. had been asked to do all they could to cheer up those aboard when the vessel reaches Norfolk. The Antigonish is accompanying the disabled ship.

DR. MANNING'S REMARKABLE STATEMENT.

TORONTO, June 11. The Toronto Methodist Conference was rather startled to hear the statement of the Rev. Dr. Manning, Secretary of the Mome Mission department, that it was a plain matter of mathematical calculation that in forty years at the present rate of drain there would not be a minister left in Canadian Methodism to preach the Gospel, so rapidly were the ranks of the Methodist ministry being depleted.

(The alleged cause for scarcity of probationers for the Methodist Church in Canada is small salaries. Outside of wealthy city churches, or missions and small circuits, men can't pay their way owing to high cost of living, and prospective candidates for the ministry are turning to other professions.—Com.)

HUDSON BAY ROUTE.

OTTAWA, June 11. That the route to Hudson Bay is feasible, that valuable fish and marine animals abound in the Bay and Strait, and that consideration should be given to the matter of making Churchill, instead of Nelson, the terminus of the Road, are the main features of the report of the special committee of the Senate appointed to investigate the Hudson Bay route.

GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

MURFIELD, Scotland, June 11. Cyril Tuhey of the Oxford University team, won the British amateur golf championship to-day, defeating Robert A. Gardner of Chicago, by one hole.

LIPTON SANGUINE.

NEW YORK, June 11. Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of Shamrock Four, which will try to lift America's Cup in the coming yachting classic, arrived here to-day on the steamship Celtic. Sir Thomas said he

was confident his vessel was superior of either the Vanitie or the Resolute, her American rivals, and had no doubt he would carry the coveted trophy back to England with him.

PROTEST AGAINST TAIL TWISTING.

TORONTO, June 11. A resolution endorsing the League of Nations and expressing appreciation of the action of various church bodies in the United States, disapproving of anti-British propaganda now being carried on in that country, especially with reference to the Irish question, was passed by a standing vote of the Toronto Methodist Conference yesterday.

VOLUNTEER SEAMEN.

COPENHAGEN, June 11. The Danish steamer Frederick VIII, with many passengers aboard left for New York yesterday manned by a volunteer crew. The seamen's strike has tied up Danish shipping for some time and the Frederick VIII, is the first ship to leave Denmark for America in over two months. Ships to the number of 171, or about half the Dutch merchant fleet, are now manned by volunteers.

VANITIE AGAIN BEATEN.

NEWPORT, R.I., June 11. The Resolute was winner to-day in the sixth race with the Vanitie to determine which will be selected to defend America's Cup. Over a windward and leeward course of thirty mile, the Resolute scored the fourth victory of the series. The winning sloop crossed the finish line with a broken topmast.

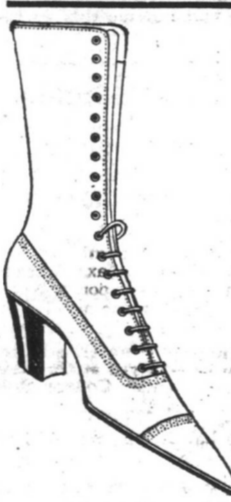

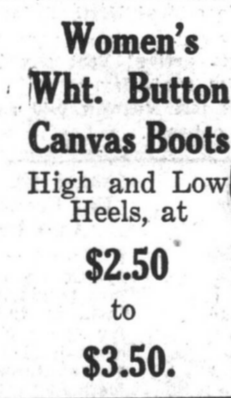

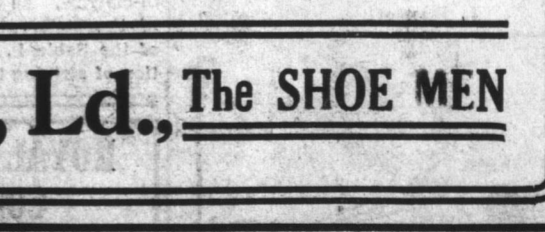

The petition was supported by Messrs. Fox and Vinicombe. Mr. MacDonnell presented petitions signed by 1100 residents of St. George's District re modification of the Prohibition Act, and asked if anything was to be done about it. Mr. Squires explained that a very large number of petitions had been received in this connection and it had been decided to appoint a representative and responsible commission to enquire into the whole matter. The application of the Act here, the working of the Acts in Canada and the United States will have to be considered and an examination made of local conditions. The views of those who favored the passing of the Act, and of those seeking moderation as well as issuing of scripts by doctors and smuggling will have to be taken into account.

Mr. MacDonnell.—"Will we get a report this session?"

Mr. Squires.—"No. The matter will take considerable thought and a long search."

years before for the election that year. As the law stood before, which made the lists good for only one year and that period had elapsed and the general election was imminent, the new lists were necessary, hence the Bill. But there is a vast difference in the two cases. In the first the election was unduly late, the House was short of members and the calling of an election to fill the districts was of an absolute necessity. The situation asked to be confirmed to-day, the rush made to bring the bill in, is different. The whole idea is to make it law to apply particularly to the Bay-de-Verde election, as Mr. Squires himself states the list is being already taken. Time will disclose how far the Government will have cause for congratulation on the Bill and justify his opposition to it. The district is already represented in the House and the Bill is now being made an excuse in order to afford the Government an opportunity to justify themselves in re-appointing the late Minister of Shipping to a position which Mr. Squires said was only to be of temporary duration. The special Bill brought in before was cut out in the Upper House because the Court invalidated the election. Extremity has committed them to a Bill whose wisdom will be testified by time which will also justify opposition to it. The election has been rushed unduly for obvious reasons. The Government thought that Mr. Hickman would be the Opposition candidate if the election were to be held in a normal, fair manner. The writ of election, further, was issued as soon as another man of influence in the district was absent from the country. He would oppose the measure.

The Bill was read a second time, after which notice of questions was given by Sir M. P. Cashin, Mr. Fox and Mr. W. J. Walsh, and the House adjourned till Monday.
