S. S. Ranger in Port

AST OF SHIPS TO ARRIVE FROM NORTHERN SEALFISHERY.

S.S. Ranger, Capt. Wesley Kean, arved yesterday at 6.30 p.m., bringing me the key to the northern sealshery. The Ranger halls for 18,000 old and young seals, but judging by the heavily laden appearance of the ship when entering port, her turnout will probably exceed this esti-mate. The Ranger was the last of the ships to proceed north, having battled with the ice barricade on the outside for four days before getting into open water. Capt. Kean then took a course for the eastward and, working in due west from Fogo Island, struck a small patch of seals on St. Patrick's Day, off Cape John, in which 3.500 were killed and panned. Whilst the crew were engaged in taking them on board, the ship was driven into Green Bay with the seals, and ed ice. For two weeks the ship remained in this position, and it was not until the end of March that she got free again. Word was then received that a patch of seals lay in White Bay. Captain Kean steered direct for Hr. Deep and on the 2nd of April, in company with the Thetis, a fairly good patch was struck, of which 12,000 were accounted for. The crew were busily engaged hauling the pelts on board, all of which had to be brought over the rough ice, a distance of from three to seven miles. On April 17th, with 16,000 stowed, the Ranger was worked out of White Bay, after which fair progress was made in the vicinity of the Funks, where the hunt for the bedlamers began. Over 2,000 of these were killed in the heavy rafted ice on the following day and hauled on board. Weather conditions getting worse, Capt. Kean decided to abandon the voyage ,and with a snug load stowed down below decks, the greatest of care had to be exercised in bringing the ship along. Easterly winds and heavy seas forced the ship into Seal Cove, where she remained for sevral days. The next port was Valleyfield, and on Tuesday night last, the ship was forced to put into Pool's Island, B.B., leaving the latter port early yesterday morning. She made a good run down the coast, passing Catalina at 11 a.m., and arrived in port in the time al-






