Parliament of Canada. Cable News! HOUSE OF COMMONS, Ottawa, Nov. 13th.

The debate on the Address was con-tinued yesterday by Dr. Tupper. There was nothing new in his remarks, merely a discussion of the history of the Con-federation question in Nova Scotia, gave the anti-Union view of the case. His criticism on the unnecessary multiplica-tion of departments in the government, will be concurred in by others than anti-Unionists.

Unionists. - Mr. James Young of South Waterloo, made an able speech. He said he was a humble member of that party which had for many years been in the ascendant in Ontario, and which he believed, though temporarily betrayed by false friends, still contained in its ranks a majority of the people of that Province. Although they had been denounced as disunionists and disloyal because of that desperate fellow of Nova Scotia, Joseph Howe, he begreed to say there were no truer friends of col-onial union to be found than the western Reformers of Ontario. Nay more, he would asy that if it had not been for the long and disinterested advocacy of re-presentitive reform by that party, we would not now be rejoicing over a united British America. He thought that in the constitution we had received, the powers of Government were rather too much centralized, and recent events appeared to give ground for the supicion that some members of the Government and other Conservativo members of the House were hostile to the continuance of the Local Legislatures. He believed he expressed what was the general feeling throughout Ontario when he said that, unless it had been believed that we were to receive the full control of our local affairs. Ontario at least, would never have accepted the measure. Although no amendment was to be moved from his side of the House, he deemed it his duty to express the opinion of his con-sitinents with regard to the present Gov-ernment and position of public affairs. He contended that there was no justifica-tion for the present Coalition, and that the Minister of Justie had merely used the no-party cry to gain strength for his own party. He referred to the pergrin-ations of Ministers during the elections, and particularly to the visit of Sir John A. Macdonald to Brantford to scent the withdrawal of the Conservative candi-form his-opposition to Coalition, and ac-cepted office in the one horse Coalition of Ontario.
